### Happeny Plans to Sue Town To Get Back Candidate Fee

Francis J. Happeny of 221 School St. wants to get back a \$25 deposit he made with the town for town primary petitions, but the town counsel says he is not entitled to it.

Happeny said this morning he will go to Small Claims Court and try to get the refund.

It all began when Happeny posted the \$25 with Frederick Peck, Republican registrar of voters, and received petition blanks he intended to circulate for the post of town clerk. The Republicans had not named a candidate to oppose Town Clerk

Edward J. Tomkiel, a Democrat.

Happeny claims (1) the town clerk's office sent him the wrong set of petitions and (2) Happeny was hospitalized, and couldn't get the corrected petitions circulated before the deadline for filing petitions.

Peck inquired of Atty. Irving Aronson for a ruling, and the town counsel said, "This money must remain, and is not to be returned to the person paying such sum for any reason whatsoever."

Happeny says, "If I had circulated the petition, and received signatures of at least 5 per cent of the registered Republican voters, there would have been no hassle, and the town would have had spent \$1,500 for a primary, but the \$25 is being held back on a questionable technicality."

**Evenings Start with Youth**

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)**—A study of the television schedules for the new season indicates the networks have adopted this strategy for winning ratings: Grab 'em young and grab 'em early. Never has so much money gone into series that begin the evening programming. The thinking appears to be that if a family starts out watching a certain network, it is likely to stick with the same channel. The rating record appears to bear this out. One network usually dominates an entire evening. For instance, CBS has traditionally looked in Monday night, ABC is strongest on Thursday, NBC does best on Sunday. This season will bring an unusual amount of early-evening series obviously aimed at the youthful viewer. Will adults stick with the channel the kids turn on? The networks hope so.

Thus we find ABC starting out its Monday programming with "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea," about the adventures of an atomic submarine. NBC is offering "90 Bristol Court," three separate situation comedies loosely tied together. NBC starts Tuesday with "Mr. Novak" and its built-in teen-age appeal, while ABC offers the war series, "Combat."

Thursday finds a three-way fight for the youngsters. NBC hopes "Daniel Boone" will recapture Fess Parker's "Davy Crockett" and its magical hold on young fancies. CBS is countering with a comedy about Frankenstein and other lovelies, "The Munsters." ABC is stringing along with "The Flintstones."

"International Showtime" begins Friday for NBC. CBS continues with "Rawhide," beefing up the Western with guest stars like Rita Hayworth and Dean Martin. ABC is bringing another cartoon series out of the Hanna-Barbera factory, "Jonny Quest."

Saturday finds NBC in an all-out campaign for the young stay-at-homes—"Flipper," the educated dolphin; "Mr. Magoo," the near-sighted bumbler; and "Kentucky Jones," with Dennis Weaver as foster father of a Chinese boy. ABC will offer

"Outer Limits" for young lovers of the far-out. CBS confidently continues with the middle-aged Jackie Gleason.

On Sunday, CBS begins early with "Mr. Ed" followed by "Lassie" followed by "My Favorite Martian," a hard-to-beat parlay for young audiences. But NBC hopes the kids will want to take a palatable history lesson with "Profiles in Courage," which will precede the ever-appealing Walt Disney. ABC trails along with "Wagon Train," cut down to an hour from last season's 90 minutes.

 Ed Sullivan, whose long-lived "Ed Sullivan Show," has occasionally come to American viewers from such far-flung locations as Portugal, West Germany, the Soviet Union and Japan, is planning a trip to Melbourne, Australia for a show there next season.

**From Ford Show To 'Pea-Pickers'**

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)**—ABC has announced a "major overhaul" of its daytime programming starting early in October. It consists of abandoning, after all those tear-stained years, "Queen for a Day," in favor of still another soap opera, "The Young Marrieds," and of changing the title of "The Tennessee Ernie Ford Show" to "Hello, Pea-Pickers."

The creative department of NBC has not been napping—it has changed the name of "The Jack Benny Show" to "The Jack Benny Program." "The New Breed," a Dixieland jazz group from the Hartford Jazz Society, appear on "Here and There" Thursday at 9 p.m. on Channel 24.

**Boyer, 65, Disclaims Lover Tag**

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)**—Many men mark their 65th birthday by retiring from their life's work. Charles Boyer is celebrating his 65th by costarring in a movie and a television series simultaneously.

It seems incredible that Hollywood's version of "Le Grand Charles" could be 65, but he is the first to admit it. Today is his birthday. "I have never tried to hide my age," said the ever-charming Boyer. "Oh, I know that actresses do it and some actors, too. But it is silly. There are so many ways of finding out an actor's age."

"Besides, if you don't tell your age, people are apt to think you are older than you really are." Boyer is one of the few actors whose birthdate is plainly printed in his official biography. He has never made any fuss about his baldness; he plays roles with or without toupees, his hair having thinned at age 37.

Smooth-topped or wigged, he remains a handsome figure of a man. The romantic quality is still present, and that is a factor he has had to live with all these years. "It's really a misconception," he argued. "Mainly it has lasted because of all the night club imitators who use the one line—'Come wis me to the Casbah.' After that line they don't know what to do."

"I actually did very few romantic roles; 'Love Affair' was one, and it remains one of my favorites. When I first came to Hollywood to appear in American films, they tried to make me play the role of the lover. After 'Caravan,' in which I played a gypsy with a violin, I wanted to go back to France. But then Walter Wanger signed me to a contract and put me in films like 'Private Worlds' and 'Algiers,' in 'Algiers,' from which that famous line was supposed to have come, I played a gangster who was stuck inside the Casbah and was killed when he tried to break out."

# Two-Network Man, Backus a Threat

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — A few months ago an NBC vice president, apparently the one in charge of station breaks, telephoned Jim Backus, the actor who plays the voice of Mr. Magoo in the network's new half-hour comedy starring the near-sighted cartoon character.

"Do you want to drop over to the studio and make voice-over promotion for the end of your show telling the audience to stay tuned to 'Kentucky Jones'?" asked the vice president.

No," said Backus promptly. "I don't want to. I don't want them to stay tuned to NBC. I want them to switch to CBS."

The vice president, obviously shaken, murmured that he'd get back to Backus. He never did.

The actor had a valid reason for his firm refusal: Jim Backus is also a star in a new CBS show, "Gilligan's Island," which follows "The Famous Adventures of Mr. Magoo" on the rival network.

This makes Backus television's only double-threat, two-network, performer.

It would be difficult to replace Backus in "Mr. Magoo" since he has played it since the little fellow was created as a theater cartoon about 15 years ago. "I AM Magoo," he says.

"The Famous Adventures of Mr. Magoo" is a spin-off of NBC's special "Mr. Magoo's Christmas Carol," in which the little character played Ebenezer Scrooge. During the next few months he'll be playing Rip Van Winkle, Friar Tuck, Long John Silver, all the seven dwarfs, Don Quixote, Captain Kidd, Cyrano, William Tell and Gunga Din, among others, in adaptations of famous stories.

In the comedy series "Gilligan's Island," Backus will be playing a millionaire cast-away, one of seven survivors of a shipwreck, who continues to live in country-club style in spite of his surroundings and problem of survival.

Backus, who started his radio career almost 20 years ago, made his first television splash 11 years ago with "I Married Joan," in which he played straight man to the late Joan Davis. The series is still around in re-runs, and so is another series he made later. Then there are all the Magoo shows seen in

assorted children's hours, plus a raft of commercials starring the character.

## Frustrations Plague U.S. In Viet War

PHUOC VINH, South Viet Nam (AP) — Twenty Americans flying five helicopters fought a five-hour battle Monday with a Communist Viet Cong crew firing one 50-caliber machine gun, and failed to silence it.

The action capsuled frustrations plaguing U.S. efforts to help the South Vietnamese armed forces crush the Red guerrillas.

The battle was weighted in the Viet Cong's favor because the lone machine gun was hidden and had a maximum effective range more than double that of the helicopters' 30-caliber guns and 2.75-inch rockets.

By the book, the battle 25 miles northeast of Saigon on the edge of the Communist-infested D Zone, probably should not have taken place at all.

More effective weapons were available in the hands of the Vietnamese army and air force. But because of red tape and an apparent lack of aggressiveness and overcentralization of command on the Vietnamese side, they were not brought to bear when needed.

## Resort Peaceful After Youth Riot

HAMPTON BEACH, N.H. (AP) — This seashore resort town was peaceful today after a Labor Day riot in which some 10,000 teen-agers battled state troopers, local police and National Guardsmen for four hours.

Authorities finally ran the young persons out of town Monday night by forming human wedges and walking from the beach area in the center of town to either end.

Some 200 persons were arrested. Twenty were injured.

Police couldn't explain the reasons for the rioting, but Robert W. Rhodes, commissioner of public safety in New Hampshire, blamed the youths' parents for a lack of discipline in the home.

"The parents have stepped aside and have left their children to the teachers and to the police," Rhodes said.

There were some reports of police brutality in the wake of a score of injuries—one seriously. But Gov. John W. King said: "You can't blame police for lack of parental discipline. The police leaned over backward not to use brutality."

Peter Zamboni, 16, of Everett, Mass., was hit in the face with a birdshot from a police shotgun. Doctors said he probably would lose the sight of his right eye.

Damage was counted in the thousands of dollars. The revelers threw rocks, garbage, beer bottles and cans filled with sand, and set fire to some buildings. They smashed windows along the beachfront.

## Holiday Toll Falls Behind 1963 Record

Traffic fatalities over the long Labor Day weekend soared past the 500 mark early today, although National Safety Council officials said the number of deaths would not approach record figures.

Howard Pyle, president of the safety council, credited cautious driving on the part of home-ward-bound motorists with keeping the death toll behind last year's record of 557 lives. Throughout most of the 78-hour weekend, the number of deaths had kept pace with the record setting 1963 figures.

Early Sunday evening the number of deaths reached 450 and safety council spokesmen expressed fear that a new record would be set as motorists clogged highways on the way home.

At the latest count, traffic accidents across the United States had taken 510 lives. In addition, 18 persons were killed in boating accidents and 86 others had drowned.

The safety council estimated before the holiday began that 400 to 500 persons would be killed during the weekend. An Associated Press survey, made for comparative purposes over a 78-hour nonholiday weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 21, to midnight Monday, Aug. 24, showed 456 persons dead in traffic accidents, 24 in boating accidents and 54 by drowning.

The safety council's Labor Day weekend traffic count began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Monday (local times).

A traffic death record for a three-day weekend was set earlier this year when 504 persons died over July Fourth. The 1964 Memorial Day weekend death toll was 481 and the traffic death record for any holiday

About 1,800 Negroes and seven white children were expected to enroll in the public schools. 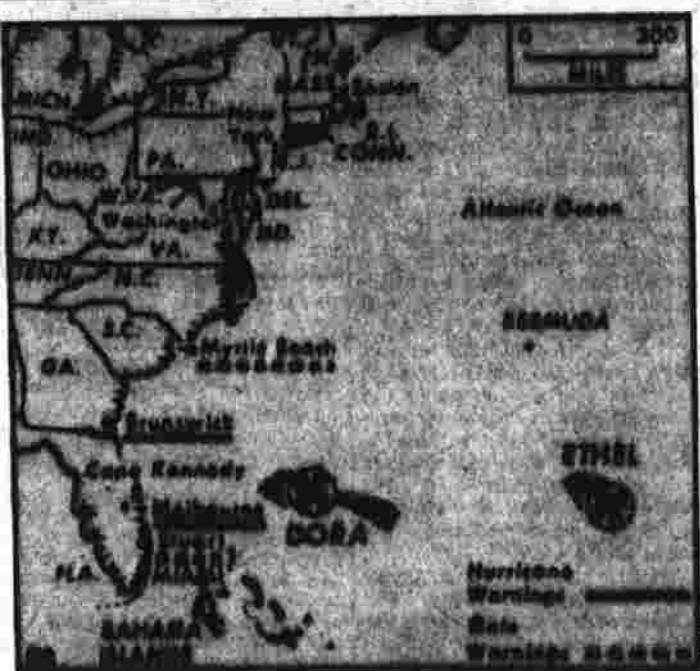

## Senate in Stalemate On Reapportionment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate tackles anew today the chief stumbling block to the adjournment of Congress—a scrap over the Supreme Court's legislative reapportionment decision.

In an effort to force a showdown, Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois planned to file a petition to invoke the Senate's debate-limiting closure rule.

Dirksen is the chief sponsor of a proposal designed to delay for a year or more court orders in the reapportionment of seats in both houses of state legislatures on a basis of population.

His aim is to gain time to seek adoption of a constitutional amendment that would permit states to apportion seats in one branch of their legislatures on a basis other than population.

The closure petition will come to a vote automatically Thursday. To carry it, it must have the support of two-thirds of the senators voting.

Dirksen said he was confident of mustering a majority but laid no claim to the necessary two-thirds margin. He told reporters it will depend on how many senators are absent.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said it appeared "very doubtful" the Senate would invoke its closure rule, under which each senator's speaking time would be limited to one hour.

If the closure move fails, a group of liberal Democrats who have been carrying on what Dirksen calls a filibuster

## 57 in GOP Pressing for Compromise

HARTFORD (AP) — A group of 57 small town Republicans were ready today to join forces with Democrats in an effort to force consideration in the House of a reapportionment package passed last week by the Democratic-controlled Senate.

The 57 signed a petition that could bring the Democratic bill out of the House Judiciary Committee for action in the House.

The action of the small town GOP legislators was in opposition to the wishes of the Republican leadership in the House.

The signing of the petition to force the Democratic bill out of committee came a few hours before the measure had even been sent there.

The maneuvering was so complex and had so many facets that no one appeared certain just what might happen next. It was clear, however, that the small town Republicans were making one last effort to force their own party leaders to reach a compromise with the Democrats that would retain some form of the unit system.

Under this system of representation, each of the state's 169 towns has at least one representative in the House.

Although the Democratic plan would assign only a fraction of a single vote to some of the most lightly populated towns, those towns would still be guaranteed a voice in the House.

The Republicans signed the petition after hearing Rep. Benjamin L. Barringer, R-New Milford, describe a "gentleman's agreement" he said he had reached with Rep. William T. Shea of Meriden. Democratic minority leader in the House, how the Republicans and Democrats could work together in the House.

Meanwhile, Democratic leaders were presenting the terms of this agreement to a Democratic caucus.

At least 60 Democratic signatures would be needed in addition to the 57 Republicans for the required majority to force a bill out of committee.
