Frustrations Plague U.S. In Viet War

PHUOC VINH, South Viet Nam (AP) — Twenty Americans flying five helicopters fought a five-hour battle Monday with a Communist Viet Cong crew firing one 50-caliber machine gun, and failed to silence it.

The action capsuled frustrations plaguing U.S. efforts to help the South Vietnamese armed forces crush the Red guerrillas.

The battle was weighted in the Viet Cong's favor because the lone machine gun was hidden and had a maximum effective range more than double that of the helicopters' 30-caliber guns and 2.75-inch rockets.

By the book, the battle 25 miles northeast of Saigon on the edge of the Communist-infested D Zone, probably should not have taken place at all.

More effective weapons were available in the hands of the Vietnamese army and air force. But because of red tape and an apparent lack of aggressiveness and overcentralization of command on the Vietnamese side, they were not brought to bear when needed.

The duel between the helicopters and the machine gun began at 11:15 a.m. when three copters were looking for a Viet Cong ambush force just south of Phuoc Vinh. An American gunner spotted activity and fired a burst from his weapon. The Viet Cong opened up, sending one slug through the barrel of the gunner's weapon and another through a rotor blade of his wing man's ship.

Resort Peaceful After Youth Riot

HAMPTON BEACH, N.H. (AP) — This seashore resort town was peaceful today after a Labor Day riot in which some 10,000 teen-agers battled state troopers, local police and National Guardsmen for four hours.

Authorities finally ran the young persons out of town Monday night by forming human wedges and walking from the beach area in the center of town to either end.

Some 200 persons were arrested. Twenty were injured.

Police couldn't explain the reasons for the rioting, but Robert W. Rhodes, commissioner of public safety in New Hampshire, blamed the youths' parents for a lack of discipline in the home.

"The parents have stepped aside and have left their children to the teachers and to the police," Rhodes said.

There were some reports of police brutality in the wake of a score of injuries—one seriously. But Gov. John W. King said: "You can't blame police for lack of parental discipline. The police leaned over backward not to use brutality."

Peter Zamboni, 16, of Everett, Mass., was hit in the face with a birdshot from a police shotgun. Doctors said he probably would lose the sight of his right eye.

Damage was counted in the thousands of dollars. The revelers threw rocks, garbage, beer bottles and cans filled with sand, and set fire to some buildings. They smashed windows along the beachfront.

The youths were well-planned and organized to have been a spontaneous affair stimulated by beer and drinking," said Rhodes.

He and other police officials said youths had passed out leaflets and notes inviting other young persons "for the big rumble."

The governor said the riot was a "symptom of a moral sickness in American youth which is potentially explosive."

Chrysler, UAW Hold Marathon Strike Talk

DETROIT (AP) — Negotiators made a last-ditch attempt today to reach agreement on a new labor contract between Chrysler and the United Auto Workers Union, with a strike deadline only hours away.

The clock ticked off the final 24 hours toward the 10 a.m. Wednesday deadline, bargaining teams were expected to meet in round-the-clock sessions.

Chrysler was selected as the UAW's No. 1 strike target this year over General Motors or Ford, the other members of the auto industry's Big Three.

Wary but hopeful, the negotiators decided to break off talks Sunday night and begin the marathon discussions this morning.

"We wanted to have a fresh outlook on this last day because there may be a long haul ahead," commented one of the Chrysler bargainers.

UAW President Walter Reuther observed: "I leave here tired but more hopeful than when I came in. We agreed that we could do more productive work with a fresh start tomorrow."

Three years ago, when GM was the strike target, announcement of an agreement came at 4 a.m., just six hours before the deadline.

Nose Will Detect Bombs on Planes

CHICAGO (AP) — An electronic nose more sensitive than a bloodhound's is being developed to sniff out bombs planted aboard airliners.

The project, conducted by the Illinois Institute of Technology Research Institute, was made possible by a \$30,000 grant from the Federal Aviation Agency.

Holiday Toll Falls Behind 1963 Record

Traffic fatalities over the long Labor Day weekend soared past the 500 mark early today, although National Safety Council officials said the number of deaths would not approach record figures.

Howard Pyle, president of the safety council, credited cautious driving on the part of motorists during the weekend with keeping the death toll behind last year's record of 557 lives. Throughout most of the 78-hour weekend, the number of deaths had kept pace with the record setting 1963 figures.

Early Sunday evening the number of deaths reached 450 and safety council spokesmen expressed fear that a new record would be set as motorists clogged highways on the way home.

At the latest count, traffic accidents across the United States had taken 510 lives. In addition, 18 persons were killed in boating accidents and 86 others had drowned.

The safety council estimated before the holiday began that 400 to 500 persons would be killed during the weekend. An Associated Press survey, made for comparative purposes over a 78-hour nonholiday weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 21, to midnight Monday, Aug. 24, showed 456 persons dead in traffic accidents, 24 in boating accidents and 54 by drowning.

The safety council's Labor Day weekend traffic count began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Monday (local times).

A traffic death record for a three-day weekend was set earlier this year when 504 persons died over July Fourth. The 1964 Memorial Day weekend death toll was 431 and the traffic death record for any holiday

Dixie Schools Reopen, but Bias Remains

FARMVILLE, Va. (AP) — The school bell signals the end today of Prince Edward County's five-year attempt to avoid integrated classes by closing public schools.

Although the schools are resuming operations, at the direction of the U.S. Supreme Court, segregation remains virtually as total as in June 1959 when the last classes were held.

About 1,800 Negroes and seven white children were expected to enroll in the public schools. In another section of this southside Virginia town, the county's 1,240 other school-age white children began their second week at the private, segregated schools operated since 1959 by the Prince Edward School Foundation.

There will be one first — public school facilities will be integrated.

The County Board of Supervisors had anticipated that most white children would remain in the private school. They appropriated \$189,000 for the public schools. Another \$500,000 or so will come from state and federal aid.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane winds of 76 miles or more extended outward 150 miles to the north of Dora's calm eye and 100 miles to the south. Gale extended 350 miles north, 100 south.

Senate in Stalemate On Reapportionment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate tackles anew today the chief stumbling block to the adjournment of Congress—a scrap over the Supreme Court's legislative reapportionment decision.

In an effort to force a showdown, Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois planned to file a petition to invoke the Senate's debate-limiting closure rule.

Dirksen is the chief sponsor of a proposal designed to delay for a year or more court orders in the reapportionment of seats in both houses of state legislatures on a basis of population.

His aim is to gain time to seek adoption of a constitutional amendment that would permit states to apportion seats in one branch of their legislatures on a basis other than population.

The closure petition will come to a vote automatically Thursday. To carry it, it must have the support of two-thirds of the senators voting.

Dirksen said he was confident of mustering a majority but laid no claim to the necessary two-thirds margin. He told reporters it will depend on how many senators are absent.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said it appeared "very doubtful" the Senate would invoke its closure rule, under which each senator's speaking time would be limited to one hour.

If the closure move fails, a group of liberal Democrats who have been carrying on what Dirksen calls a filibuster

Six States Hold Primary Races

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nominations for four Senate seats, four governors' mansions and 28 House seats are at stake today in primary elections in six states.

With no major challenges mounted against incumbent governors or senators, most of the interest is on the Republican gubernatorial races in Arizona and New Hampshire.

Other states with party primaries today are Colorado, Minnesota, Vermont and Wisconsin. Georgia voters will pick House nominees Wednesday and Massachusetts will have a primary involving House, Senate and gubernatorial candidates Thursday.

57 in GOP Pressing for Compromise

HARTFORD (AP) — A group of 57 small town Republicans were ready today to join forces with Democrats in an effort to force consideration in the House of a reapportionment package passed last week by the Democratic-controlled Senate.

The 57 signed a petition that could bring the Democratic bill out of the House Judiciary Committee for action in the House.

The action of the small town GOP legislators was in opposition to the wishes of the Republican leadership in the House.

The signing of the petition to force the Democratic bill out of committee came a few hours before the measure had even been sent there.

The maneuvering was so complex and had so many facets that no one appeared certain just what might happen next. It was clear, however, that the small town Republicans were making one last effort to force their own party leaders to reach a compromise with the Democrats that would retain some form of the unit system.

Under this system of representation, each of the state's 169 towns has at least one representative in the House.

Although the Democratic plan would assign only a fraction of a single vote to some of the most lightly populated towns, those towns would still be guaranteed a voice in the House.

The Republicans signed the petition after hearing Rep. Benjamin L. Barringer, R-New Milford, describe a "gentleman's agreement" he said he had reached with Rep. William T. Shea of Meriden. Democratic minority leader in the House, how the Republicans and Democrats could work together in the House.

Meanwhile, Democratic leaders were presenting the terms of this agreement to a Democratic caucus.

At least 60 Democratic signatures would be needed in addition to the 57 Republicans for the required majority to force a bill out of committee.

There was some question, however, whether the bill could be forced out of committee even by petition, under the legislature's rules, before the Thursday deadline set by a federal court for the General Assembly to complete action on a reapportionment plan for the 1965 legislature.

THE WAY I HEARD IT by John Gruber

A couple of weeks back, when I was talking about the "classical" era in music, I mentioned that the viola was supplanted about this time by the violin.

Actually, the viola and the violin achieved virtual perfection at about the same time, the middle of the 16th century, so they got to an even start with the viola holding the lead in popularity for about two centuries.

Today we seldom see and hear this family of instruments because it occasionally may hear a concerto for "viola D'amore," almost invariably by AT & Vivaldi in D major.

Superficially, and when viewed from the audience, the families of instruments look pretty much alike, but a closer examination will show differences. The viola have a flat back, whereas the violin have a slightly arched back.

Essentially, this is why the viola is considered to be a "stronger" than a flat piece of wood, and better able to resist the pressure of the strings.

Further, the viola back was strengthened internally with some beams and a wood center piece which also added to the name of the instrument and satisfaction of its resonance.

There were no "mollycoddlers" at the 200 persons reported during the riot.

Police reported receiving reports of calls Monday from parents of youngsters of 18 or older who were among the rioters.

Some of them did not even know where their children were, said Rhoads.

The riot began shortly after 10 p.m. Sunday when thousands of youngsters left the beach and gathered through the main street of the resort, making windows of stores and automobiles.

Parking lot officers were set off. Youngsters taunted policemen and shouted obscenities.

The teenagers then massed at the police station, pelting it with stones, rubber balls and eggs. It was then that the National Guard and out of state troopers were called in. They drove thousands of the youngsters out of town.

"This was a frightening thing and we are fortunate that no one was killed," King said.

One man watched a dozen youngsters crowd a car. The police station, waiting to bail their children.

"Maybe that's the trouble," he said. "Where are the fathers?"

"We believe that the American people do not intend their Department of Defense to be operated as a WPA, but rather to provide all the military security necessary for security in the most economical manner."

Estate of Rogers Valued at \$80,000

The estate of the late Willard Rogers—one of Manchester's most colorful residents during his long and active lifetime—was estimated this morning to be valued at about \$80,000, Rogers died Aug. 7.

That estimate was offered by Judge of Probate John J. Walcott at a public hearing attended only by the executors of Rogers' estate.

Named as beneficiaries in the will are Rogers' nephew, Roger Loucks of Glastonbury (one of the executors); Marjorie Willey Harris and Herbert Willey Jr., niece and nephew of Rogers' late wife, Ruth MacCabe Hartford; and Cecile Burke O'Meara of Norfolk, Va.

The exact figures of the gross value of Rogers' estate must await an inventory of all the property, securities and cash accounts.

When the final valuation is in, any claims will be subtracted and the net estate will be divided among the four named beneficiaries according to the terms of the will and two codicils.

The will, dated Sept. 21, 1960, bequeaths a half interest in Rogers' real and personal property to Roger Loucks and a half interest to Marjorie Willey Harris, Pawtucket, R. I., and Herbert Willey Jr. of California.

A codicil filed May 17, 1962, however, specifies that \$100,000 of the net estate is to go to Cecile Burke O'Meara, Norfolk, Va. (listed as Roger's fiancée) before the remainder of the estate is divided among Loucks, Mrs. Harris and Willey.

And a second codicil filed May 20, 1961, increases to \$200,000 the amount to be distributed to Cecile O'Meara.

Loucks and Atty. Paul R. Martin named as executor in the will, reserved control of the distribution of the estate this morning.

The final inventory of Rogers' estate will be filed with the probate court.

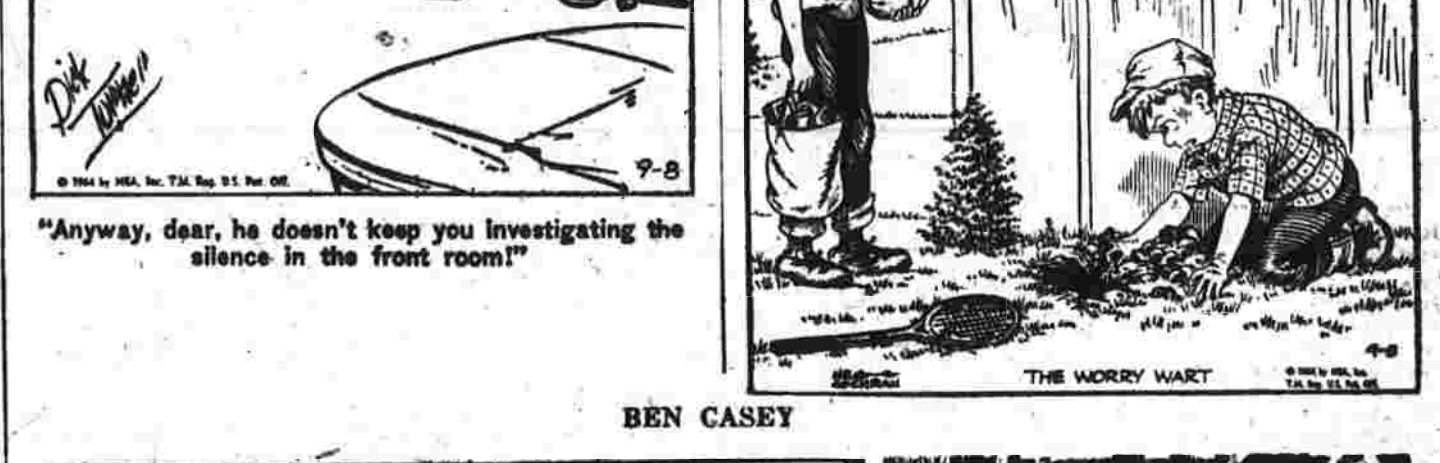
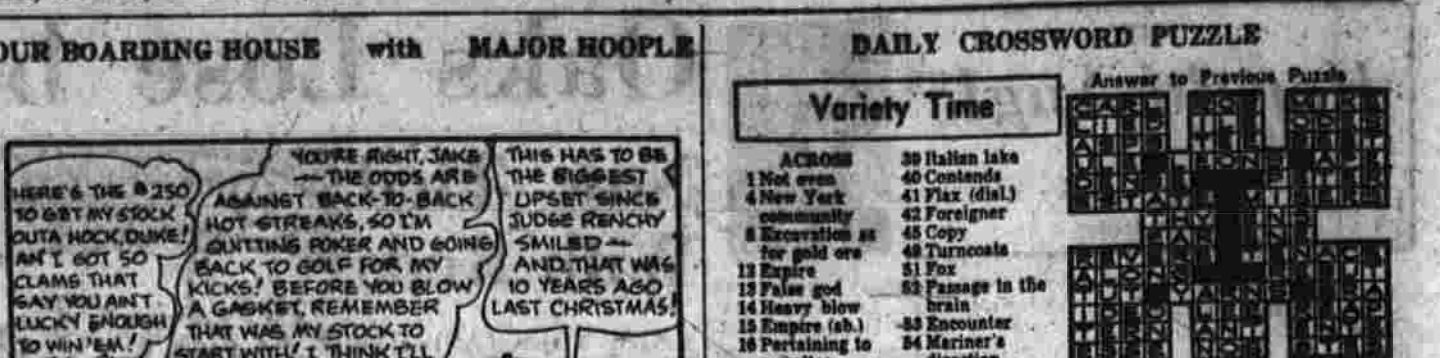
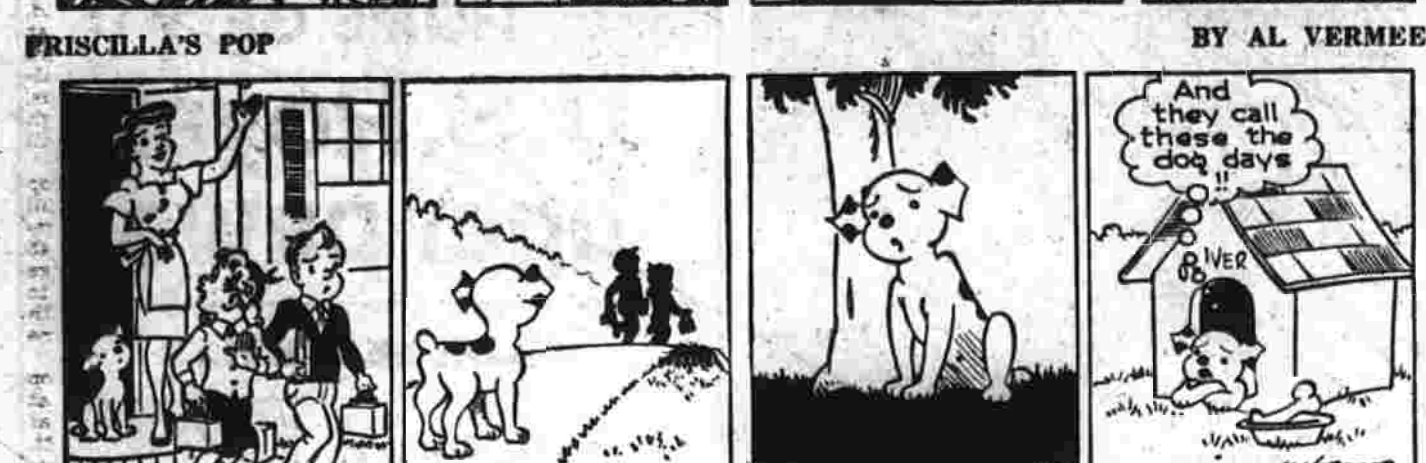
