

Auto Strike Averted Just Before Deadline

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corp. and the United Auto Workers Union announced today a national contract, averting the threat of a nationwide strike by some 75,000 workers.

The announcement came less than one hour before the strike deadline.

Walter P. Reuther, union president, termed the contract agreement "the most historic agreement in the history of the American labor movement."

Reuther told newsmen the settlement included a pension plan calling for up to \$600 a month payment in benefits at the age of 60 years for workers with 30 years service.

Reuther said negotiators were still working on language technicalities but that a three-year agreement had been reached on all major issues.

Without a contract, a crippling walkout would have hit Chrysler's 40 plants in 12 states and shut down production just as the new 1965 models have started rolling off the assembly lines.

Reuther said he had notified all local units across the nation of the settlement.

There was still a remote possibility of scattered walkouts on local plant agreements—but more than half of the UAW bargaining units already have reported settlements of their problems.

Reuther said the agreement added two new paid holidays for each worker—Good Friday and the birthday of each employee. The auto company previously granted six full holidays and two half-days.

Reuther said the UAW had achieved an historic pension agreement which under certain conditions would give a worker 80 years old with 30 years service a \$400 a month pension.

The agreement also included an increase in current pensions for those already retired. Reuther estimated the overall economic package at 18 cents more than the offer which Chrysler made to the UAW on Aug. 17.

That offer originally was evaluated by the UAW at 35 cents an hour.

President Calls Meeting on Viet

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson summoned his top military and diplomatic advisers to a White House conference today to consider new moves the United States might make to strengthen the anti-Communist war effort in strife-torn South Viet Nam.

Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor, who returned from Saigon Monday, has already held two days of discussions with State and Defense department leaders on the South Vietnamese crisis.

The White House meeting was called for midmorning with Taylor, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara as principal participants.

Taylor held a private discussion with Johnson Tuesday night, presumably to lay the groundwork for today's session. Informants said the consensus developed so far in the policy

Fulbright Denounces Attacks on Humphrey

Narcotics Agents Say Man Admits Bank Theft Role

NEW YORK (AP)—Narcotics squad officers, acting on a hunch, arrested a man who admitted taking part in a \$64,181 holdup of a bank in Connecticut, police said today.

Search of an auto in which the man and three other persons were found last night in the Bronx disclosed an attache case containing \$24,800 in wrappings indicating the money came from the Ridgefield Branch of the Connecticut National Bank, police said.

The alleged holdup man was described by police as Robert Gorman, 27, of Houston, Tex.

Two men with guns robbed the bank in Ridgefield in northwest Connecticut yesterday. They forced a teller to hand over reserve cash stored in the vault. One robber forced Mrs. Edward Bordenman, a teller, to empty her cash drawer.

Police here said they had no knowledge of the whereabouts of the second robber.

Police gave this account: A loaded revolver was found in the attache case with the money in the car trunk.

Two detectives and a patrolman became suspicious of the occupants of the auto, which bore Texas license plates, when they saw it parked at Story and Colgate Aves.

Gorman and another occupant of the car, listed as George Le Brecht, of Bethpage, Long Island, N.Y., were selecting themselves with heroin when the policemen approached.

Gorman offered the officers \$10,000 to let him go.

The other persons in the car were Rolly Duffy, 24, of Brooklyn, and her 2-year-old son, Michael.

Gorman, Le Brecht and the woman were described as chance acquaintances.

The three were taken to a police station for questioning.

The look was figured at \$4,181 just since April 22 last year, when another branch of the Connecticut National Bank was robbed of over \$65,000, had so much money been stolen from a bank in Connecticut.

The \$65,000 Monroe Bank robbery was solved last March when Patrick O'Keefe, 37, of Fairfield was caught shortly after he hid up a bank in Shelton for \$2,000. O'Keefe admitted the Monroe holdup as well as the case in Shelton and pleaded guilty April 21 to both charges.

Last Thursday three men robbed a branch bank in Hartford of about \$25,000. And on Friday a lone bandit held up a bank on the New Haven Green and was caught almost immediately with his pockets full of the \$1,000 loot.

Whipping the Atlantic coast with 115-mile-an-hour gusts, the storm, which had indirectly taken three lives, thrashed slowly toward the northeast Florida coast at eight miles an hour.

First advance gusts of hurricane force to reach shore knocked out telephone service to Marineland, a tourist spot 20 miles south of here noted for its collection of living sea creatures.

Waves were beginning to break over St. Augustine's seawall into bayfront parkway, a main thoroughfare in the nation's oldest city.

At the same time, Jacksonville was feeling the first blows of wind and sea. The city of 250,000 never has taken the full impact of a big hurricane.

Tide and wind arrived at Jacksonville at the same time. Gusts of 60 miles an hour mapped a few power lines. Waves began to crash over the seawall at Jacksonville Beach.

Hurricane warnings were dispatched from Vero Beach, Fla., to Brunswick, Ga., and gave warning of a hurricane watch over extended northward to Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Thirty miles north of St. Augustine, the city of Jacksonville was braced by the first head-on blow by a hurricane in its history. Highest wind ever recorded in this city of 250,000 is 50 miles an hour in gusts in 1946.

Waves washed over Highway A1A between St. Augustine Beach and the mainland. The Mayport Navy Base at Jacksonville which usually hums with activity was virtually deserted except for four destroyers on repair status at the base. Other vessels put to sea to ride out the storm. Light cranes were moved up river. A five-foot tide topped by breaking waves rolled into the beach along the coastline of a narrow peninsula just across Matanzas Bay from St. Augustine.

Another hurricane, Ethel, was "stacked up" in the Atlantic, like an airliner over a crowded airport, apparently waiting for Dora to land before making her own move.

South Windsor Zoning Panel Denies Shop Center Request

The planning and zoning commission last night denied the application of Hayes Co. to build a shopping center between Sullivan Ave. and Ellington Rd. Chairman of the commission, Joseph Carino, said "An executive session was held following the public hearing and after considerable deliberation, the commission voted unanimously to reject the application."

Carino stated the commission rejected the application for three reasons. The shopping center does not conform to the plan of development for the town; it would increase the congestion in the streets, and would be destructive of residential property values in the neighborhood.

Some 75 residents attended the public hearing. Strong opposition to the shopping center was voiced by several of the town residents on Sullivan Ave.

These residents said they had built their homes in an R-20 zone. They complained of the added traffic and noise problem of a shopping center.

Atty. Thomas Donnelly, representing Hayes Co., said that within 500 feet of the proposed shopping center, a residential property owner has a right to be heard. The petition represents 50 per cent opposition to the center.

The petition also contained 33 names of opposing property owners beyond 500 feet of the center. With such a petition, Hayes Co. has a right to be heard. Hayes Co. has a two-thirds majority vote of the commission to accept an application.

In stating his case, Donnelly said that the zoning code is showing that the land could not be put to better use such as a civic center. The 1959 comprehensive plan of the commission designated this land as a civic center. He said if the commission granted this same change it would destroy the plan of development for the town.

In conclusion Donnelly said this would be "a spot zoning" and would destroy the plan of development for the town.

Spot zoning is a change of zone in a small area within an overall different zone. The zoning in this area is R-20. The applicant was asking for a change to commercial.

Atty. Edwin Leason, representing Commercial Investors said the people in the area have a right to have their land zoned. He added the planning and zoning commission should not set up its comprehensive plan in 1959.

He said the area at Ellington, Church and Beulah is a hazardous area at rush hours without added traffic from a shopping center.

Atty. David Kotkin, representing Hayes Co., said that the shopping center would offer many benefits to the town.

In his application to the commission he said they were not admitting a plan of development at the hearing but presented an artist's color sketch of the center.

According to Atty. Kotkin, Hayes was approached by prospectors after the shopping center. The attorney said the town population has jumped from 4,000 to 12,000 since 1954. He said retail sales in

The Doctor Says

SOAP IS FIRST STEP TO RIDING ACNE BLAGS. By Wayne G. Brandstadt, M.D. Newspaper Enterprise Assn. You would almost think that acne was a normal condition of growing up — it is so widespread. About 75 per cent of all teen-agers have it, and millions of dollars are expended each year on preparations to cure it.

The whiteheads may be white plugs of keratin and oil similar to the blackheads or they may be pustules caused by squeezing a pustule and thus infecting it. If the infection involves the oil glands of the skin, there may be some scarring and pitting of the face.

Various female sex hormones, taken internally, have been found to suppress oiliness. Acne pills have been used to control acne, but they cannot be recommended because they produce any benefits. In any case, girls should avoid cold creams, cleaning creams and makeup because they may aggravate the problem. It is best to use any local applications that have not been specifically approved by your doctor.

Although a diet low in sugar and fat is recommended, evidence of its effectiveness is hard to find. If you can't resist that some food makes your own acne worse, avoid it. But don't expect your friends to get the same results. It is much more important to avoid iodized salt and cough medicines that contain potassium iodide.

DEAR POLLY — When knitting gifts for the new arrivals of friends and relatives, save the label from a skein of yarn and enclose it in the gift box, as most labels contain the proper washing instructions.
