

BERLIN (AP)-A German immigrant now in the U.S. Army braved East German bullets Sunday to help a wounded refugee escape over the Berlin wall.

WASHINGTON (AP) -The United States welcomed today the quick collapse of the antigoverment military uprising in South Viet Nam and officials said Premier Nguyen Khanh should now be able to get on rapidly with plans to press the war against Communist guerrillas.

Secretary of State Dean Rush summed up official reaction here, saying "I am pleased that the trouble is over and that the government can now get on with

its main tasks." No one here could say for certain whether Khanh's shaky hold on leadership had been strengthened or weakened by the Sunday coup, but Rusk obviously hoped that Khanh's success in his latest struggle for power would reinforce his post

Friday, once again, the incur the White House availed himself of the unique facilities the Presidency offers for an incumbent seeking reelection. Nobody, knowing Mr. Johnson's instincts and sympathies, can doubt that he would have taken it into his head to make a sudden spectacular trip to the Florida hurricane tracks in any case This kind of thing is the way he lives

and acts in public life. But being able to yield to this instinct, being able to summon official transportation, being able to visit the hurricans damage with the symbol of the federal dollar as well as your own heart of compassion showing on your sleeve—this also happens to constitute what some jealous Republican observers are likely to label

highly partisan advantage. Candidate Goldwater, as a senator from Arizons, or even as his party's candidate, would have to strain a point or two to make such a visit of compassion, and he could carry with him no immediate assurance of any kind of tan-

gible succor.

But if we were Candidate Goldwater and the Republican campaign stratemerican public has, by this time, grown rather sophisticated about things t sees and hears during a politica campaign. It has its way of judging what the candidates might do, in such and such a situation, if there were no campaign imminent.
