West opened the queen of spades and East won with the king. After some thought East returned the four of clubs.

In theory, an expert East might wish to club even if he still had another spade. In fact, East was no expert. Every-body at the table knew he had no more spades.

West had often announced that a player should not win for more than 10 points in high cards to make an opening bid. "But with 10 points," he would declaim, "Pass with 10 points."

West had started with A-Q-J-8-4 of spades. He could not hold the ace of clubs since he had failed to bid. Hence South got to the king and passed, knowing it would win the trick.

Encouraging Sign

West signaled encouragement by dropping the nine of clubs. Obviously, this showed the queen of clubs. West now counted out for 7 points in spades and 2 points in clubs. He cashed the top hearts first in the hope of gaining additional information. When the jack of hearts fell, South could mount West for 10 points in high cards. In view of West's pass, West could not have the jack of diamonds. Declarer therefore led a diamond from dummy and won a finesse with the ten. This enabled him to win four diamond tricks and thus make his contract.

There's nothing spectacular, to be sure, about bidding and making one notrump. The important thing to the player who your opponents can rely on your bid and passes to locate every queen and jack? If so, you are a bridge expert.

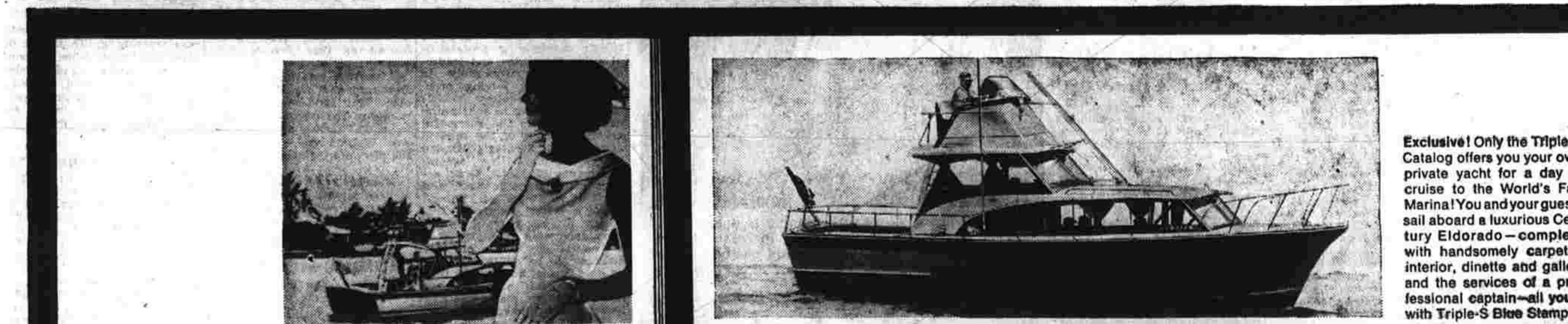

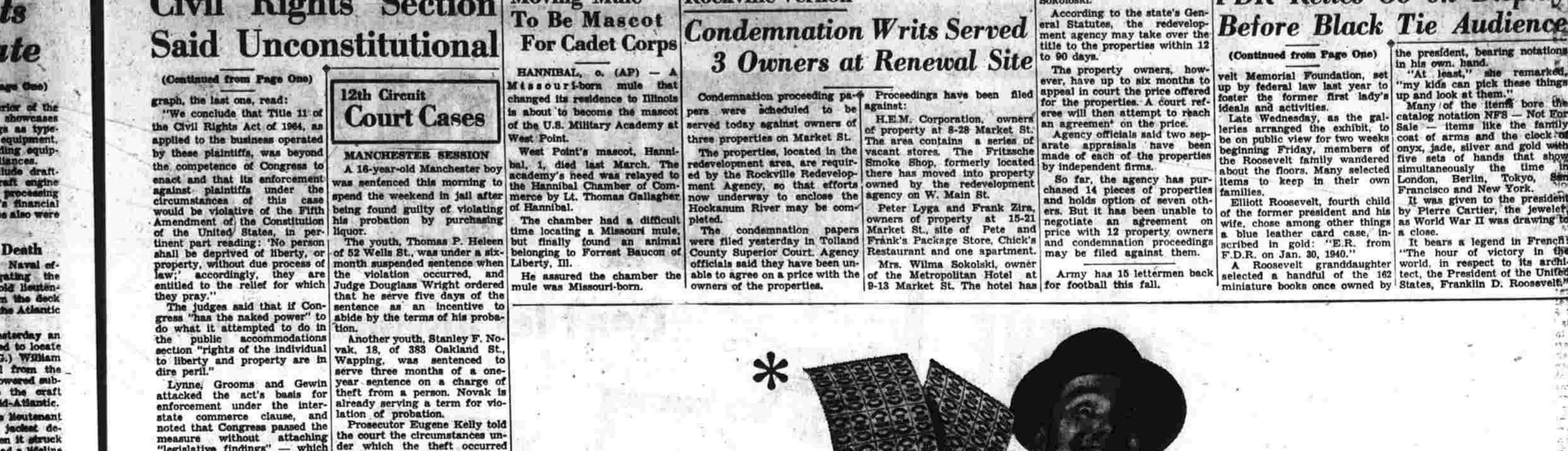

Will Somebody Invent A Tax?

Once again, for want of dollars, pounds, francs, rubles and piastres, peace of the world is being needlessly neglected and imperiled, and this, it seems to us, the most inexcusable of all the things that can possibly happen to this troubled world.

The specific event is the withdrawal of the last United Nations observers from the little Middle East kingdom of Yemen.

To say that this invitation to renewed and expanding trouble in one of the world's smaller trouble spots is just a money question is to simplify it far too much. The money, of course, would be there if human nature were better.

The trouble is that nobody has yet succeeded in proposing and talking through to general acceptance any kind of proposition which would make it automatic that any peace-keeping mission of the United Nations, once duly authorized and ordered, should never have to abandon its efforts to keep the peace merely because the supply of money should have run out.

The New York Times, noting the melancholy circumstances of the withdrawal from Yemen adds that it "follows within three months of the United Nations withdrawal from the Congo, which has plunged that country into civil war" and that "it casts a new shadow on the U.N. force in Cyprus, which also depends on voluntary contributions and is therefore in constant jeopardy and not as effective as it might be."

And beyond threatening existing peace operations, this matter of money casts its pall over potential future operations which might be needed desperately. "Even the standby peace forces newly earmarked by the Scandinavian countries," notes the Times, "would have to be financed by the U.N. once they were called into its service."

All this, again emphasizes the urgency of finding a solution for the United Nations' financial distress without letting the refusal of the U.S.S.R., France and others to pay their legal obligations wreck the United Nations itself.

What has happened is that the dead-end of all kinds of United Nations vetoes—the veto of the pocketbook—has now become an executive veto. The peacekeeping missions it is allowed to kill the stronger it will get and the more often it will be used.

The cure has to be, it seems to us, the discovery and assignment to the United Nations itself of some special taxing power and some special tax source which would make the United Nations its own master financially speaking and free it from either the outright veto or the sometimes gentler policy blackmail to which the U.N. must remain exposed as long as individual nations retain the power of the purse over it.

Why doesn't some fiscal taxing genius realize that some clever plan for a harmless, painless tax the United Nations can collect for itself may be the thing that saves the world?

Politics And Pulpit

It was an easy way to minister to the cloth, the Very Rev. Francis B. Sayre, Jr. took out of the present political campaign in a formidable but evasive sermon he preached last Sunday. All he has to do is stay away from the polls, and, meanwhile, assure himself that he has nevertheless voted with the angels.

Connecticut Yankee

The negotiations which did go on, fruitlessly, between the parties before the special session of the General Assembly demonstrated at a burlesque of itself—these negotiations themselves a man of dangerous ignorance and devastating uncertainty, the other man whose public house is splendid in its every appearance but whose private lack of elicit most inevitably introduces tartness at the very foundation.

"The electorate of this mighty nation," Dean Says continued, "is left homeless, then, by such a pair of nominees. It knows not where to turn, it stares fascinated at the forces that have produced such a sterile choice—frustration and a federation of hostilities in the one party and, in the other, only a cynical manipulation of power."

The political leaders who do this to us are not to blame, Dean Says said, because "they only reflect what they so earnestly receive to be the preoccupation of every single one of us." And that preoccupation is, of course, with selfish gain so that it is "little wonder that the political parties in our society reflect the emptiness of our faith and the tinny snailbaubles by which we forever seek to disguise the lack."

Very well. We salute an entertaining sermon. But not a truly courageous one. For, despite Dean Says' obvious and intentional equal division of time and blame between them, the two candidates he discussed did not disagree him equally; one of them, more than the other, inspired him to his denunciation; his own effort to be "fair" by giving equal doses of disapproval to both constitutes something that some shallow preoccupation and evasion of responsibility of which he accuses the public in general.

Actually, this American habit of calling down a plague on both houses and therefore refusing to choose between them and help one against another is precisely the habit which leaves the field to the innumerable and standards Dean Says himself deplores. It is very sophisticated and very smart-aleck to pretend to be too finicky to make a choice, to pretend to be equally disgusted by either candidate. But this is merely extending to the end process of a campaign the same fault and deficiency with which it began.

Why not, Dean Says, if you must talk politics in a smart pulpit, go all the way and declare your vote?

Liability

It is difficult to imagine Senator Strom Thurmond of South Carolina proving any less of a handicap to the Republican party, which he now professes to have joined, than he has been to the Democratic party in his career up to Wednesday.

CHICAGO—For a fee of \$1,000 each, Illinois Republican factions gathered last week at the Essex Inn on the Chicago lake front in the very room where the Great Goldwater movement was born to hear some strange words from Sen. Barry Goldwater.

This has nothing to do with a "conspiracy of the press" as some Sen. Goldwater's supporters have alleged. It is simply and understandably a reflection of the changing of traditional allegiances accomplished by the Goldwater coup d'état at San Francisco.

The political leaders who do this to us are not to blame, Dean Says said, because "they only reflect what they so earnestly receive to be the preoccupation of every single one of us." And that preoccupation is, of course, with selfish gain so that it is "little wonder that the political parties in our society reflect the emptiness of our faith and the tinny snailbaubles by which we forever seek to disguise the lack."

Very well. We salute an entertaining sermon. But not a truly courageous one. For, despite Dean Says' obvious and intentional equal division of time and blame between them, the two candidates he discussed did not disagree him equally; one of them, more than the other, inspired him to his denunciation; his own effort to be "fair" by giving equal doses of disapproval to both constitutes something that some shallow preoccupation and evasion of responsibility of which he accuses the public in general.

Actually, this American habit of calling down a plague on both houses and therefore refusing to choose between them and help one against another is precisely the habit which leaves the field to the innumerable and standards Dean Says himself deplores. It is very sophisticated and very smart-aleck to pretend to be too finicky to make a choice, to pretend to be equally disgusted by either candidate. But this is merely extending to the end process of a campaign the same fault and deficiency with which it began.

Why not, Dean Says, if you must talk politics in a smart pulpit, go all the way and declare your vote?

Liability

It is difficult to imagine Senator Strom Thurmond of South Carolina proving any less of a handicap to the Republican party, which he now professes to have joined, than he has been to the Democratic party in his career up to Wednesday.

The Democratic party, during the years that it harbored him, at least had the excuse and alibi that the United States was in a state of emergency and that "it casts a new shadow on the U.N. force in Cyprus, which also depends on voluntary contributions and is therefore in constant jeopardy and not as effective as it might be."

And beyond threatening existing peace operations, this matter of money casts its pall over potential future operations which might be needed desperately. "Even the standby peace forces newly earmarked by the Scandinavian countries," notes the Times, "would have to be financed by the U.N. once they were called into its service."

All this, again emphasizes the urgency of finding a solution for the United Nations' financial distress without letting the refusal of the U.S.S.R., France and others to pay their legal obligations wreck the United Nations itself.

What has happened is that the dead-end of all kinds of United Nations vetoes—the veto of the pocketbook—has now become an executive veto. The peacekeeping missions it is allowed to kill the stronger it will get and the more often it will be used.

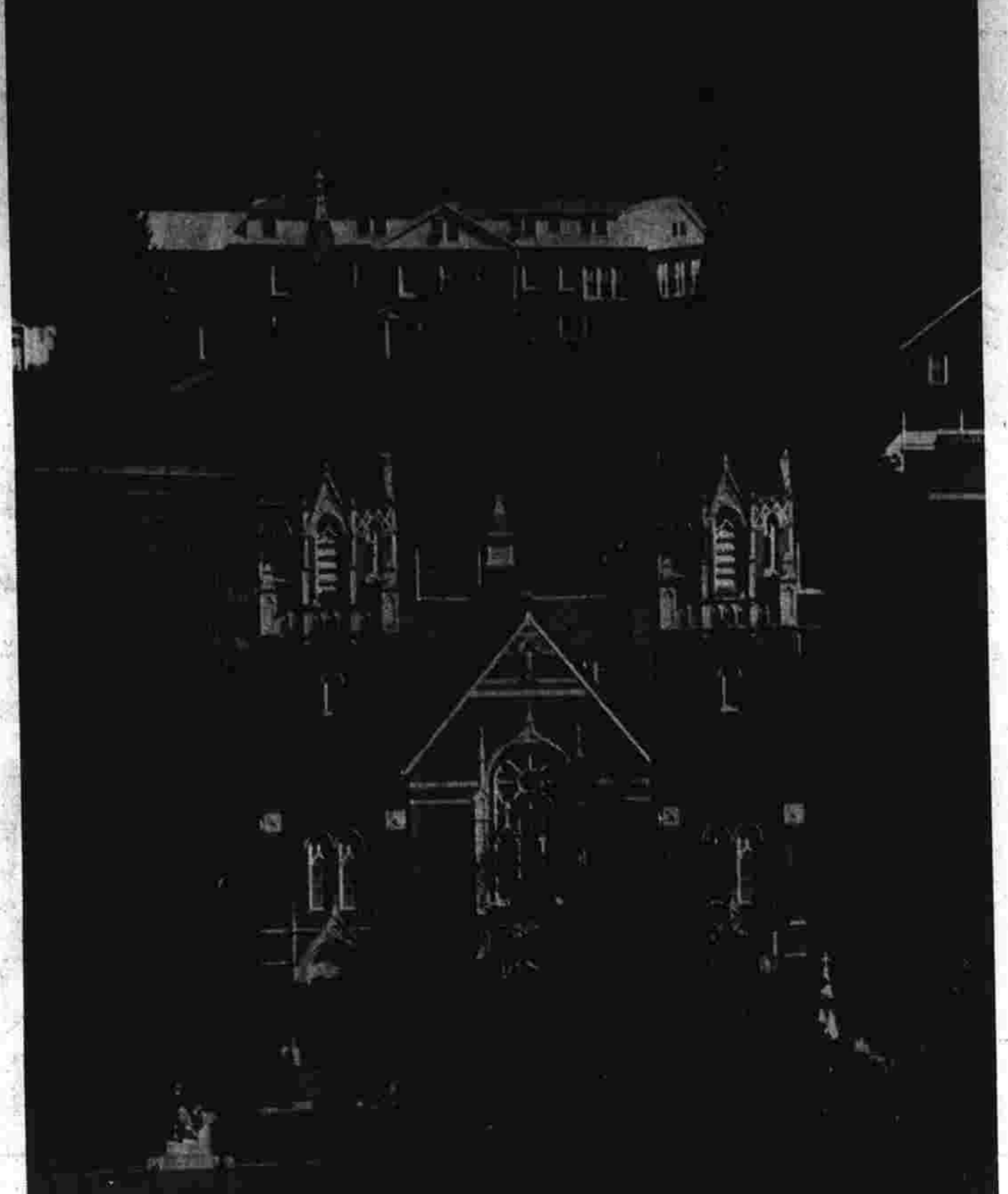

Kelley also is running for nomination for Congress from the 1st District, opposing Rep. Ferdinand J. St. Germain, the endorsed candidate.

St. Germain, seeking a third term, held Kelly in the 1960 and 1962 primaries.

Rhode Island law permits a candidate to run for more than one office at the same time.

Incumbent State Atty. Gen. J. Joseph Nugent is opposed for the Democratic nomination by P. Thomas O'Halloran, a former aide in the department.

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council was asked today to assign a new title of honor to the Virgin Mary.

But bishops debating the issue in St. Peter's disagreed on what the title should be.

Requests for a new title were raised a day after groups of council fathers warned against exaggerated devotion to Mary.

The question of Marian devotion long has been a stumbling block to closer Roman Catholic-Protestant unity.

Some of the council fathers speaking today said they thought devotion to Mary could further Christian unity.

The titles suggested were "Mother of the Church," "Mother of all Mankind," "Mary the Medatrix," "Mary Protectress and Help of Christians," and "Mary the Mother of all Believers."

Speakers among the 18 prelates who debated the issue today included several Latin-American bishops who favored giving Mary as strong a title as possible.

Devotion to Mary is especially widespread in Latin America, although many Church leaders there have expressed increasing concern about it. A group of 45 prelates from Latin-American countries called excessive devotion to Mary "scandalous."

As the council's third session moved along with its work, reliable sources said it may be extended past its scheduled November closing to become the final session.

The council fathers were told this week that they must speed up their work and waste no time disposing of the 13 schemata, or topics, still before them.

The key topics, setting the tone of the entire council, deal with the sharing of some papal powers with the church's bishops, a concept that is called collegiality.

The concept is treated in both the schema now before the council fathers, on the nature of the Church, and in the next schema due up on the pastoral duties of bishops.

After these the council is to take up important schemata on Christian unity, with two added declarations on Catholic-Jewish relations and on religious tolerance, and on revelation, the lay apostolate and the Church in the modern world.

The other seven schemata have been reduced to what are called propositions or resolutions that require no detailed discussion but only votes of acceptance or rejection.

These seven deal with missionary activity, the Oriental (Eastern) Church, the priesthood, the religious, Catholic schools, matrimony as a sacrament and seminars of priestly training.

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Mrs. Jan Wallert of 24 Woodbridge St., a native of Amsterdam, Holland, prepares Veal Croquettes from a Dutch recipe. She says the croquettes are as popular in her homeland as hamburgers are in this country, and are prepared in much the same way and from all manner of places including cars and drive-ins.

Dutch Veal Croquettes
1 cup bouillon (preferably homemade)
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon chopped chives or shallots
1 envelope plain gelatin, dissolved
1 cup chopped cooked veal
1/2 cup lemon juice
Salt pepper
Heat butter on low heat and gradually add flour and mix well. Add bouillon gradually, stirring while adding liquid. Bring mixture to a boil for a few minutes until thickened, remove from heat. Add in gelatin and add remaining ingredients. Cool in pan and spread on flat plate. When firm enough to handle, form into eight croquettes.
Add two teaspoons water to one egg and mix well. Roll croquettes first in bread crumbs then in egg mixture, and finally in crumbs. Fry in deep hot oil until brown. Drain on paper towels. Croquettes may be prepared in advance and chilled until ready to fry. Call after croquettes have been rolled in bread crumbs once. When ready to fry dip in egg mixture, then in crumbs and cook.
Mrs. Wallert makes the bouillon she uses for the recipe from veal or chicken stock.

Bouillon
1 pint water
1/2 pound veal or chicken small bones
Salt and pepper to taste
Simmer meat in water for one-half hour and add remaining ingredients and continue simmering for another half-hour.
Mrs. Wallert and her family have been in Manchester seven months. They came here from Adelaide, Australia.
