The assessment of drugs used in early pregnancy to disclose potential human fetal abnormality is one of the most sensitive devices ever invented by man. The detection of micro-meteoroids in space. Forest Fire Destroys Homes in Napa Valley

CALISTOGA, Calif. (AP) — A wind-whipped forest fire burned into this Napa Valley resort town today, destroying between 35 and 50 homes, touching off other threatening fires and leaving one side of a mountain charred.

At sunrise, hundreds of evacuated residents began to return to their homes. Some returned to vacant lots, with only ashes where their homes had stood.

State Forestry Service officials said the blaze, which threatened Calistoga on three sides around 1 a.m., apparently had burned itself out on the north edge of the town.

However, they kept on the alert as the fire still raged in stands of timber outside Calistoga. Some 7,000 acres of timber had been burned.

One of the other fires, in the Comberville area on the outskirts of Napa, 30 miles south, raged out of control. Forestry officials said five homes had been destroyed there by 8 a.m.

At the height of the fire, winds of 40 miles an hour with gusts up to 70 miles sent up clouds of fiery ash that touched off blazes in other nearby communities.

The fire swept into Calistoga late Sunday. At one time it created a vacuum in the atmosphere over the city, giving the whole area a glow of burning ash.

Most of the destroyed buildings caught fire when ash set off their roof tops.

More than half the town's 2,500 residents and tourists had been evacuated during the night, police said. There were no casualties reported.

Police Chief Kenneth Ely said the "tormented vineyards" which surround Calistoga, credited in the heart of the Napa Valley Wine Belt, helped halt the fire.

"Thank God for our plowed vineyards," he said. Most of the vineyards had recently been plowed, leaving nothing to burn between the green vines.

The face of Mt. St. Helena, where the fire had started in tall trees, was left starkly nakedly down Calistoga.

As residents poured back into the town, trees and isolated patches of shrubbery continued to burn.

The forestry service said it had no hope of completely controlling the fire until Wednesday.

Many residents refused evacuation, braving the incendiary task to try and save their homes. More than 200 were unaccounted for from surrounding towns in the Napa Valley wine belt poured into Calistoga to aid.

Ely said an official count showed 35 buildings — including the historic Tubbs Mansion, a Calistoga landmark — were burned. But there were unconfirmed reports that as many as 60 homes had been burned.

Calistoga police said fires had been reported on the outskirts of Napa, 30 miles south of Calistoga, in Stonecroft, near Napa; in the towns of Rutherford and Angwin to the east; and Vallejo Lakes.

There was no immediate damage. Emergency shelters were set up at an elementary school in St. Helena, 10 miles south of Calistoga. Red Cross officials said more than 200 evacuees had reported to the stations as of 8 a.m.

Ely said reports indicated the fire had been contained in the northern section of Calistoga — the blaze hardest hit.

The blaze swept down from tall timber into the town about midnight.

Forestry officials said the fire started sometime late Saturday, but had been considered under control until high winds rose late Sunday.

The flames spread from tree-to-tree and charged down Mount St. Helena into the outskirts of Calistoga.

The California Highway Patrol closed all highways north of Calistoga, with only fire equipment allowed to pass.
