THE DOCTOR SAYS HE DOESN'T LIKE SCHOOLS IT MAY BE MOTHERS' FAULT. By Wayne G. Woodland, M.D., Newspaper Editor's Assn. Don't worry, you're not a 'Mother' who doesn't believe it when your child says that. Most normal children like school and would be unhappy and bored without it.

When a child is born, especially those in the lower grades, the child is usually quite a happy and contented. He or she even gets headaches or vomit when the time comes to leave the house. This is the same as pretending illness to avoid going to school.

Our son was operated on at the age of 2 months for an ailment of the skull. This is caused by some fault in the early development of the embryo. It limits the capacity of the skull to grow and because the brain continues to grow at a normal pace, pressure is built up within the skull. Sometimes this can be relieved by operation but there is always some danger of brain damage and blindness. It is most unlikely that this deformity would occur twice in one family.

He explained that having a parent come to the office when picking up a child rather than going to the child's room was to avoid disrupting the class and possibly embarrassing the child.

The principal said that the rule that no child should come to the building before 9 a.m. was relaxed in rainy and cold weather. Apparently in response to some complaints from parents on the rough nature of play before school begins, Nystrom pointed out that a teacher is on duty at this time and that he had personally checked the arrival time of buses. No bus had arrived before 8:30 in the past few days.

Nystrom said he realized that the students were the responsibility of the school when at school and that the parents would study any problems.

The formation of proper study habits, school attendance, the library of about 6,000 volumes were other topics covered by Nystrom in his brief address. He said that the first report conference would be held in November, with parents invited to conferences at about the same time, and he outlined the value of these conferences.

### Sen. Thurmond's Transfer Causes Senate Desk Issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — The political realignment of Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina has caused an upheaval in the Senate — over the question of who has whose desk.

When Thurmond moved from the Democratic to the Republican side of the Senate chamber, the word was that he wanted to take his desk with him but that the Democrats balked.

Thurmond reportedly was under the impression that the desk had been used by John C. Calhoun, a 19th-century South Carolina statesman who was noted as a champion of states' rights.

Now it turns out that Thurmond, but Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., has been sitting at the Calhoun desk.

Long's aides report that he asked for the desk not because Calhoun had used it but because it is the desk that his late father, Huey P. Long (the Kingfish) Long, had occupied while a senator before his assassination in 1935.

Before Russell Long got the desk, it had been used by Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, R-Mass.

### Rail Strike Deadline At Midnight

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — The head of the 10,000-member Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen is free to call a strike in a wage dispute with about 300 of the nation's railroads any time after 11:59 p.m. Wednesday.

W. Gilbert, president of the union, said Wednesday that more than 90 percent of the membership had voted to strike if the union's wage demands are not met. Current wage demands were served on the carriers Dec. 2, 1962.

"We have had our fill of futile negotiations and management favoritism," Gilbert said in a statement. "It is unfortunate for the public that railroad negotiators only understand strike language and never negotiate until there is a crisis."

The threatened strike, third major one since April in this industry, could result in a virtual nationwide rail tieup.

President Johnson can appoint an emergency board under the Railway Labor Act to report on the dispute. This would delay any strike action at least 60 days.

Employees represented by B.L.F.E. got their last wage increase of 50 cents a day March 1, 1964. A union spokesman said the average daily rate for five years is \$21.00 and \$25 for engine-men.

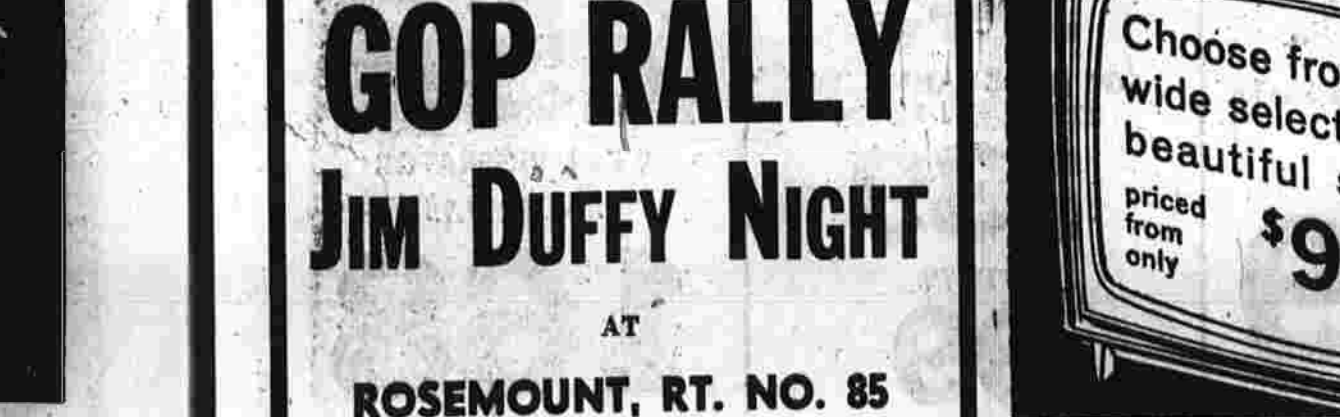

### Tax Stress May Change Next Year

BY SAM DAWSON  
NEW YORK (AP)—The tax stress on many taxpayers is likely to change next year. For most taxpayers the pressure will be applied closer to home. The chances are that one way or another most will pay as much as if not more, in taxes than this year.  
Both political parties are presenting some new federal tax bills in Washington. The question will be what taxes and how much.

Both President Johnson and Treasury Secretary Dillon have proposed that next year federal excise taxes be revised and some lowered or dropped. Dillon says, "We have about 15 categories of excise taxes on the books today, and their labyrinthine complexity requires, not the time-consuming revision based on a comprehensive study of them all, which the Treasury already has well under way."  
The President's excise tax cuts, yet to be spelled out, will be proposed to Congress if he is elected.

Both the President and Dillon talk of possible income tax cuts, but without naming figures or giving flat promises.  
This is based on the belief that federal government will total collections, even at spending cuts by 10 percent, at lower rates, will rise because of increasing income and profits from growing prosperity.  
At most state and local levels, however, the chances of holding down spending are slim indeed. Demands for services for aging populations and for more services to meet demanding citizens, multiply.

To pay for them the authorities have to combat taxpayer resistance to higher rates, and in many cases to the higher rates of bigger debt loads to permit service now and payment later.  
Federal grants to state and local governments take many forms. But the total increase, coming in highway construction and welfare payments, the U.S. Treasury is paying out more than \$10.5 billion this year to state and local projects.  
Congress is considering other projects which will mean still more financial aid for locally based programs. And some Washington officials are proposing that the federal government increase job creation states, without naming specific projects.

If Washington gives up some tax forms, such as excise levies on certain products, the states may be able to increase their own take in sales taxes. One way or another, they will be scrambling even harder to find funds to finance their increased spending.

### Marine Veteran With Bad Arm Badly Beaten

CHICAGO (AP)—When Thomas Kulp's right arm was made useless by wounds during World War II in the South Pacific, Michael Hostelman was 3 years old.  
New Kulp is 47 and Bostonian. Kulp, an ex-Marine, is unable to use his right arm. His left leg is held together by steel plates.  
Kulp testified in court Wednesday that he was walking home from work Thursday night when a group of youths blocked the sidewalk.  
"I said, 'Pardon me, fellows,'" Kulp said, "and they hit me down in the street, punching me, kicking me. There was no reason for it. I don't understand it."  
Kulp identified Hostelman as one of his attackers.  
"But the others," Kulp said, "are what puzzled me. I asked them for help and they just laughed at me."  
A policeman saw the attack and seized Hostelman, but the others escaped.  
Kulp says he may have to return to a hospital because some of his injuries were aggravated. Hostelman, a truck driver, was fined \$500. Unable to pay the fine, he was ordered to work at the assistance at a day in the House of Correction.  
Hostelman denied his part in the incident.

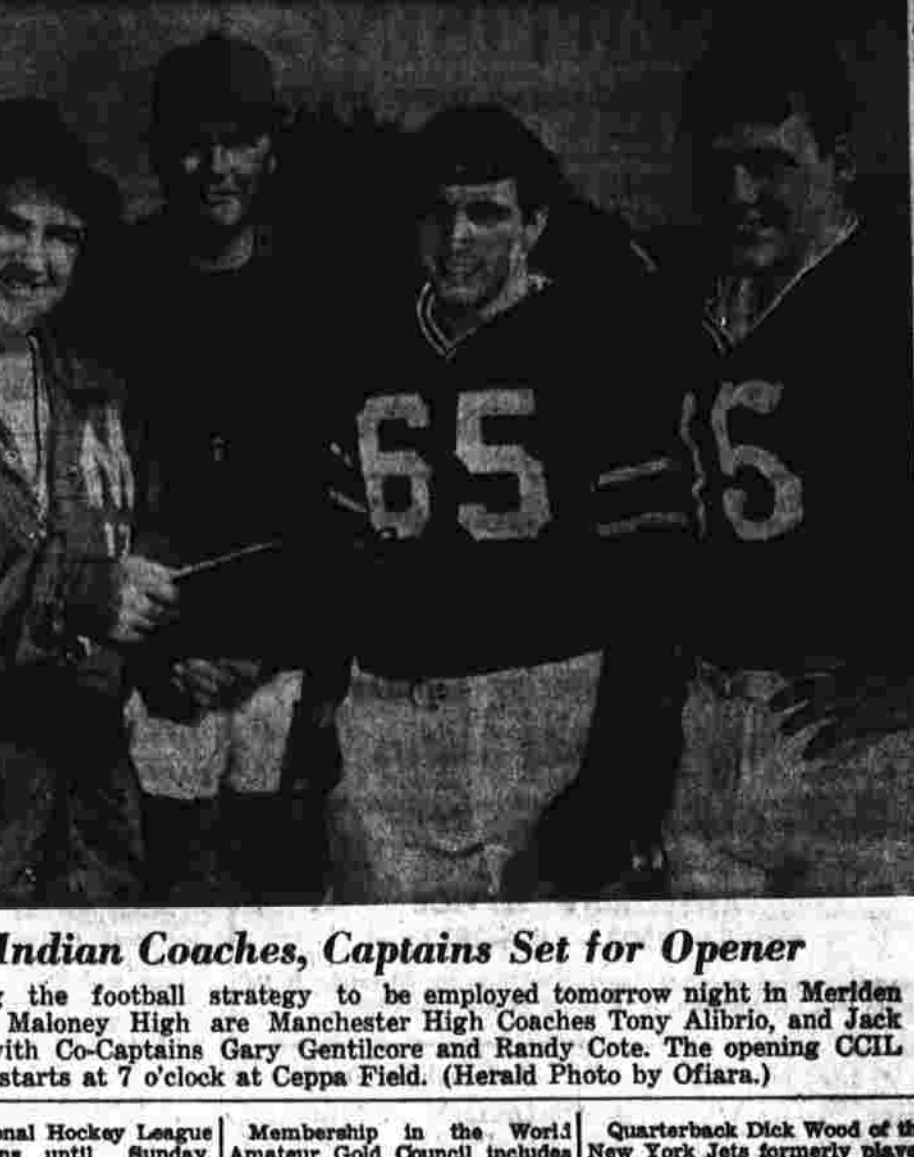
