

Warren Report Stirs Congress, New Presidential Safety Sought

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Warren Commission's report on President John F. Kennedy's assassination has sparked a demand that Congress act at once to improve presidential security.

While the commission's findings—and criticisms of the FBI and Secret Service—were being relayed to the world, President Johnson swiftly appointed a four-man committee to advise him "on the execution" of the commission's recommendations.

The main conclusion by the seven-man presidential commission is that Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone and not as part of any foreign or domestic conspiracy, murdered President Kennedy. It said Jack Ruby acted as a loner in gunning down Oswald two days later.

The main recommendation of the commission in its 888-page report, made public Sunday night, is legislation—to lighten protection of presidents and to make the killing of a president or a vice president a federal crime.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said Congress should stay on the job to act on such recommendations even though it is adjournment-bound.

But whether President Johnson plans to submit any legislative proposals along these lines apparently will await the advice of the four-man committee he appointed. Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon, acting Atty. Gen. Nicholas deB. Katzenbach, Director John A. McCone of the Central Intelligence Agency, and McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to the President for national security affairs.

Among the first to comment on the commission's findings was Robert F. Kennedy, brother of the late President. The former Attorney General, now running for the U.S. Senate in New York, said the commission's inquiry was thorough and conscientious, and that he was satisfied it had "investigated every lead and examined every piece of evidence."

He said he did not intend to read the report. Texas Gov. John B. Connally, who was riding with Kennedy when the President was assassinated last Nov. 22 in Dallas, said he agreed fully with the Warren Commission's conclusions.

The general feeling in Dallas was that the commission's report amounted to a verdict of innocence for the city where Kennedy met death.

Overseas, the British press generally agreed that the commission came up with an honest and competent report. But the report was denounced by the Communist press. The Warren report pinned

have been threatening Johnson, not Nixon, the commission said. It was Johnson, then vice president, who was in Dallas at the time. His visit, April 23, 1963, was just 13 days after Oswald fired a nighttime rifle shot that just missed former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker.

The 888-page report by Chief Justice Earl Warren and six distinguished colleagues urged creation of a cabinet committee to assume top responsibility for presidential safety.

This new body might consider, the report urged, "suggestions" made to the commission but not specifically endorsed by it—that the duty of protecting Presidents be removed from the Secret Service. The executive and Congress should make the decision, it said.

The report praised the swift action of individual agents in the November tragedy. The response of some "was in the highest tradition of government service," it said.

But the report called for more funds and personnel immediately, better lines of coordination between agencies, and a "complete overhaul" of advance detection practices.

It noted Kennedy's own comment to an aide, on the day he died—that "if anybody really wanted to shoot the President of the United States, it was not a very difficult job—all one had to do was get a high building some day with a telescopic rifle, and there was nothing anybody could do to defend against such an attempt."

But the report critically recited a chain of what it called official failures, omissions and errors, including:

1. The Secret Service "as a matter of practice did not investigate, or cause to be checked, any building along the motorcade route" to be used by Kennedy, Johnson and Connally.
2. The Federal Bureau of Investigation failed to alert the Secret Service to the presence in Dallas of Oswald, the lonely, hooding onetime defector to

60,000 on Hand To Greet Johnson In Hartford

HARTFORD (AP)—President Lyndon B. Johnson paid a visit to Connecticut today—the second stop on a tour of five New England states.

The President's plane touched down at Rentschler Field in neighboring East Hartford at 1:02 p.m., and he left by motorcade for an appearance and speech from the portico of the Hartford Times.

Thousands of persons jammed downtown Hartford for a glimpse of Johnson and to hear his talk—delivered from the same rostrum that John F. Kennedy used when he campaigned for the presidency in 1960.

Police Chief John J. Kerrigan estimated that a crowd of 60,000 persons was assembled in the area before the Times Building. He estimated that another 20,000 persons were assembled along the route of the President's route into the city.

Numerous placards were held aloft by the crowd that greeted the President outside the newspaper building. Some of them said: "Let Us Continue with LBJ."

Some signs boosting Republican presidential candidate, Barry Goldwater also were in evidence. Johnson's visit coincided with the formal opening of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd's campaign for re-election.

Dodd, a longtime friend of Johnson, introduced the President to the large crowd. Others on hand were Sen. Abraham Ribicoff and National and State Democratic Chairman John M. Bailey.

The city's schools were closed at noon for the occasion. Workers in the state office buildings and downtown Hartford business firms were given time off to see the President.

Dodd and Bailey were on the plane with Johnson when it landed in East Hartford. Gov. John N. Dempsey and his wife greeted Johnson and the First Lady at the airport. Dodd's wife Grace also was among the airport welcome.

Mrs. Dempsey presented a large bouquet of yellow roses to Mrs. Johnson, who wore a red suit. The President, upon leaving the plane, embraced Mrs. Dodd. He shook hands to a group

Train Crash Kills Four, Injures 40

MONTGOMERY, Ill. (AP)—A Burlington passenger train slammed into a standing Rock Island passenger train shortly before midnight, killing four train crewmen and injuring at least 40 passengers.

Hours later, the cause of the crash on the Burlington mainline was not explained. The Rock Island's Golden State Limited, enroute from Los Angeles to Chicago, was starting a detour forced by a broken bridge on the Rock Island line at Joliet.

Jack Steele, an employe in the Burlington's Montgomery control tower, told authorities: "According to my books, both trains had clear tracks."

The eastbound Rock Island train had stopped at a block signal. The Burlington train, the Ak-Sar-Ben Zephyr, westbound from Chicago to Omaha, was using the eastbound track.

Witnesses said the Rock Island train was not moving at the time. The Burlington train was traveling at an estimated 40 to 45 miles-an-hour, officials said.

"We were just sitting there—waiting for about five minutes," Earl Peis, 61, Chicago, a passenger on the Rock Island train, told The Associated Press.

"Most of us were just relaxing. I was reading. All of a sudden there was a terrific bang," Peis said. "My head hit the seat in front of me and I started gushing blood."

Bank Holdup In Hartford Nets \$600

HARTFORD (AP)—A bandit held up the Northwest Branch of The Society for Savings today about the time President Johnson was scheduled to arrive here.

The bandit made off with about \$600, it is reported. He entered the bank and thrust a note at the teller demanding the money. He was last seen running north on Blue Hills Ave. from the bank at 1300 Albany Ave.

The holdup apparently was planned to coincide with the presidential visit when most of Hartford's police would be busy handling heavy downtown crowds.

It was the 19th holdup of a bank or savings and loan association in Connecticut this year. The last bank holdup was on Sept. 17 when the Wolcott Branch of the Waterbury Savings was held up. A camera recording the pictures of the bandit leaving the bank led to his arrest along with a young Suffield woman charged with being an accessory.

Dallas Hails Report As Innocent Verdict

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Dallas leaders hailed the Warren Commission report today as a verdict of innocence—an exoneration of charges that the city was to blame for President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

"I have never had any misgivings about there's an unfavorable climate in Dallas that engenders an assassination," Mayor Erik Jonsson said after reading a summary of the report.

The President was slain in downtown Dallas last Nov. 22 by a sniper the commission said Sunday was Lee Harvey Oswald.

Oswald said he had no conspirators, foreign or domestic, leftwing or right. Dallas had been criticized from many quarters as a haven of "hate groups," particularly extremist right-wing elements.

John Stemmmons, president of the Dallas Citizens Council, viewed the Warren report as "complete vindication of such malicious and impulsive charges."

"The report," he said, "is conclusive proof this was an act of a madman, not that of some government opposing our government, or a group opposed to our way of life."

The Dallas Citizens Council, composed of 250 business executives, has guided the city to most of its business and cultural achievements since 1956, including integration gains.

552 Persons Tell Stories During Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Warren Commission and its staff took the testimony of 552 witnesses in the nine months and 26 days it existed.

By executive order, President Johnson created it last Nov. 29, seven days after John F. Kennedy was assassinated, and told it to find the truth.

The commission technically ended Sept. 24 when it presented its report, saying merely to the President: "Your commission to investigate the assassination of President Kennedy on Nov. 22, 1963, having completed its assignment in accordance with executive order No. 11130 of Nov. 29, 1963, herewith submits its final report."

In its foreword, the commission said it had functioned neither as a court nor as a prosecutor. "But as a fact-finding agency committed to the ascertainment of the truth."

Taking testimony did not begin until Feb. 3. Of the 552 witnesses, 44 appeared before members of the commission, 396 were questioned by the staff, 61 supplied sworn affidavits and two gave statements.

The two who gave statements were President and Mrs. Johnson, who were riding in the second auto behind the one in which Kennedy was shot.

The commission went to the Washington home of Mrs. John F. Kennedy, the widow, to take testimony in person. She is the only member of the Kennedy family on the witness list.

Gov. and Mrs. John B. Connally of Texas, who were in the Kennedy car, appeared in person at the commission's hearing room.

The list of witnesses includes such diverse persons as FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and a tourist who was in Minsk, Soviet Union, in 1961, when accused (See Page Two)

Scientific Methods Used by Commission

WASHINGTON (AP)—Warren Commission investigators used everything from atomic science to plane geometry in developing the report on President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

The report issued Sunday is studded with references to the scientific techniques in criminology, including such old standbys as fingerprint analysis and the relatively recent method of spectrographic analysis.

These techniques were employed to show, among other things: That bullets fired from a gun ordered, owned and used by Lee Harvey Oswald killed Kennedy and wounded Gov. John B. Connally of Texas.

That one bullet which struck Kennedy probably also struck Connally.

That the shots—probably three—were fired from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository building in Dallas over a span of between 4.8 and more than 7 seconds.

To begin with, FBI ballistics tests—employing microscopic examination of markings—showed a Mannlicher-Carcano 6.5 millimeter Italian army rifle fired the three cartridge cases found near the sixth floor corner window of the building. They also showed the nearly complete bullet found on Connally's stretcher and fragments of a bullet or bullets found in the presidential limousine to have been fired by the rifle.

FBI and Dallas police fingerprint experts found Oswald's finger or palm prints on the rifle, on cartons near the window and on a homemade paper sack in which the rifle was concealed when it was carried into the building.

Fiber and spectrographic analysis by the FBI showed the bag was made of paper and tape of the same kind available in the Depository mailing room. Fiber analysis showed further that strands of a blanket in which the rifle had been wrapped were on the paper.

Human hair on the blanket was identical to Oswald's. A small scrap of fiber caught in the rifle stock was identical to that in a shirt Oswald was wearing when arrested.

The Oak Ridge National Laboratory performed a neutron-activation analysis on paraffin casts made of Oswald's hands and right cheek. They showed residues of barium and antimony which also were present on the rifle and pistol used in the Kennedy assassination and later fatal shooting of a Dallas police (See Page Eight)

AGREEMENT ENDED
NEW HAVEN (AP)—A federal judge today terminated a proposed leasing agreement that would have allowed the New Haven Railroad to lease new or reconstructed commuter cars from the Port of New York Authority.

Judge Robert F. Anderson, who supervises the affairs of the railroad under the Federal Bankruptcy Act, said he would not be justified in pending the action on the leasing plan after the Westchester County Board of Supervisors refused to participate in it. The proposed leasing plan required the approval of both the state of Connecticut and of Westchester County.

ESPIONAGE TRIAL
NEW YORK (AP)—Indictments were filed today at the opening of the espionage trial of a Soviet couple that the government expects a Soviet military intelligence agent to testify for the prosecution.

The couple is accused of carrying an spy track for six years, the indictment charges. The couple, a husband and wife, were arrested in New York last year. Defense lawyer Edward Brodsky, in answering a demand for disclosure of the charges, brought out the apparent source of the spy track—Soviet military intelligence.

Foreign Reaction Divided, Report Praised by Non-Reds

LONDON (AP)—Non-Communist newspapers in Britain and on the European continent generally praised the Warren report today. Communist and leftist newspapers said it failed to dissipate all doubt.

"An impressive document," said a typical British comment in the Guardian. "Only the most skeptical will continue to harbor doubts in the fact of this massive memorandum report."

Tass, the Soviet news agency, said in a dispatch from Washington: "The Warren report fails to dissipate all doubts and suspicions about the assassination."

It didn't mention that Lee Harvey Oswald had spent time in the Soviet Union but said: "The reactionary American press tried to picture Oswald as a Marxist."

Rome's pro-Communist Paese Sera said in a front-page headline that the report "raises more doubts than it settles."

Rome's independent Il Tempo emphasized that the report indicates the cause of the crime was the Marxist convictions of the killer.

Said London's conservative Daily Telegraph: "The assassination was a tragedy, personal, national and international, but any suspicions of a conspiracy behind it are now set at rest."

The independent Times of London said: "It is thorough, painstaking, voluminously frank, and above all truly scrupulously careful in its analysis and conclusions."

While approving the report, London's conservative Daily Mail expressed "incredulous amazement at the catastrophic negligence of those responsible for the President's safety. The precautions broke down at near-

Astronaut Opens State Aviation Week

Astronaut Eugene A. Cernan, jet pilot, engineer, and public speaker, opened Connecticut Aviation Week this morning in Hartford, Conn. Cernan, a member of the new third group of astronauts, flew into Hartford at 11 o'clock last night.

Cernan, with two school friends and patiently answered questions from the press.

Win Goodwin of 30 Spruce Lane, Wapping, a Pratt and Whitney supervising flight test engineer, and Charles Chidlow, a salesman for a Union Carbide product used in space flights, both figured they had some type of closed system going with their old friend.

Chidlow said the high temperature nickel base alloy used in the Goodwin tests and Cernan flew. All three men attended Purdue University together and went on to Navy flight school at Pensacola, Fla.

Astronaut Cernan says his new group of spacemen were picked with a new emphasis on education than the previous two groups. The new men were not required to be test pilots although some are.

Cernan said the third group's major objective is a manned landing. He said all astronauts may be picked for these flights and not the last group above.

One picked, he said, all astronauts are fully qualified for all space operations involved in a space flight. They are so trained that they are interchangeable, though one man is considered a virtual spare.

Part of Cernan's visit is to see first hand the Connecticut conditions that would be used in space travel. Cernan cited the accomplishments of United Aircraft and Hamilton Standard in the manufacture of life support systems, propulsion, and other space equipment.

C. Eugene S. Briggs of 55 Baldwin Rd., Hamilton Standard's product manager on the astronaut space suits, explained the suit's operation and its life supporting back-pack unit. The unit is designed to produce entire environmental control for the astronaut well below.

Briggs said the picnic-basket-sized unit removes heat and perspiration, carbon dioxide and other contaminants, supplies oxygen and recirculates it. Cernan talked about his relationship with other projects manufactured in the state, including the United Aircraft fuel cell power plant made by Hamilton. This all purpose unit is expected to supply all moon flight electrical power requirements, with drinking water through it.

Fuel cell drinking water was served for the benefit of the communication people. It tasted like a good grade of well water. It was cooled by ice cubes of the same water.

Fuel cell devices operating on oxygen and hydrogen are able to supply power for all life support, guidance, communications, and other electronic equipment for a period of 30 days. This is 13 days in excess of a previous eight-day moon flight five or six years hence.

United Aircraft's Norden Division demonstrated recent technical accomplishments in weight saving that will permit the flights. Norden displayed a six-watt amplifier the size of a woman's engagement diamond.

The miniature device was said to perform all the operations of a normal amplifier. It was reported the company now has a 60-watt amplifier approximately the same size.

L. Cernan, born in Chicago in 1924, holds a master's degree in aeronautical engineering. He entered the Navy in 1950 and became a member of Attack Squadron 113 at Miramar, Calif., Naval Air Station.

The astronaut is six feet tall and weighs 170 pounds. He has logged more than 1,000 hours in jet flying time, with 1,400 hours in jet aircraft.

L. Cernan's present specialty as an astronaut is work on spacecraft population systems and two-man earth orbital Gemini flights at the Manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Texas. He has a daughter, Teresa Dawn, 18 months old.

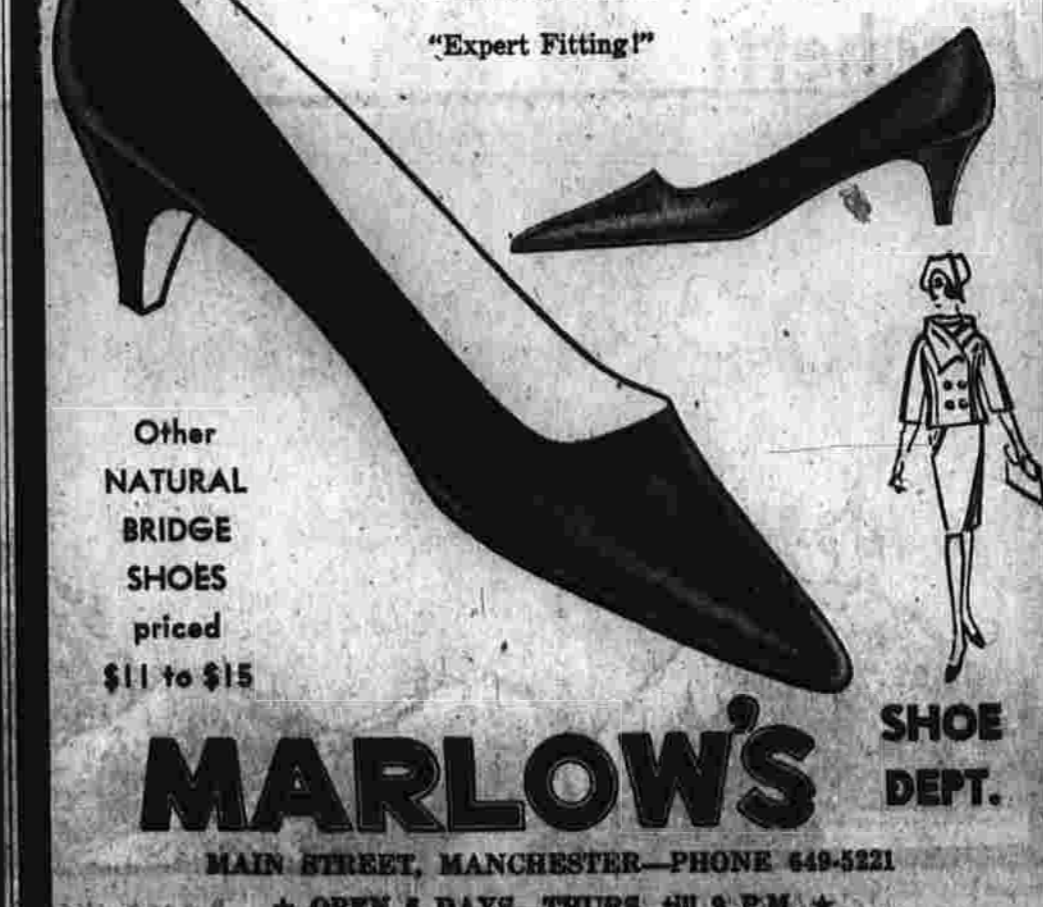

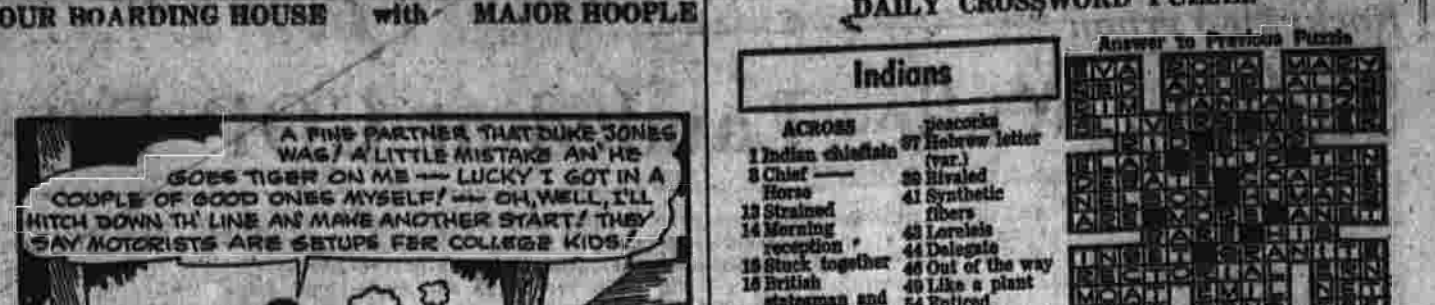
