There, Sir Alec Douglas-Home has just used his persuasive and voluble manner to set Oct. 15 as the date for a new national election. This is a date just three weeks before the legal deadline limiting the life of the present Parliament. So Sir Alec has called for the election at just about the last possible minute.

So doing, however, he has been able to wait for the pleasant moment when British public opinion polls had finally begun to run in the direction of his Conservative party, after years of seeming to forecast a Labor victory in the next election, whenever it was held, as something almost automatic. There were many political experts who thought that he should have called the election in spring, or in early summer, because, in their opinion, conditions were as favorable for the Conservatives then as they were ever likely to be.

But it so happened that, taking the option he did, Sir Alec came out with his election set for the very season in which the polls had begun to turn his way. Perhaps, in this instance, it happened to be so happy coincidence. But now that the potential magic has been demonstrated, it would be foolish to set any future prime minister ever to set an election date without consulting the public opinion polls first, and doing his best to go to the people on a rising rather than on a falling tide. This would seem to give the pollsters, in Britain, an even tighter grip on the political process than they manage in this country. Here they hinder and mislead and anticipate the return, but it could be that all this, however much it may annoy us, is quite shadowy compared to the power to set the date when an election shall be held.

Dallas And Hartford... Could a Lee Harvey Oswald have fulfilled his tragic mission in Hartford yesterday?

The answer would seem to be that yes, a madman can always get a shot at a President, and that a determined and crazed and anticlerical madman does it yesterday. But he would have had to adjust his strategy to his immediate opportunity; he could not have set himself up sure of his moment or target; he could never have planned it to have the slightest chance of escape for himself.

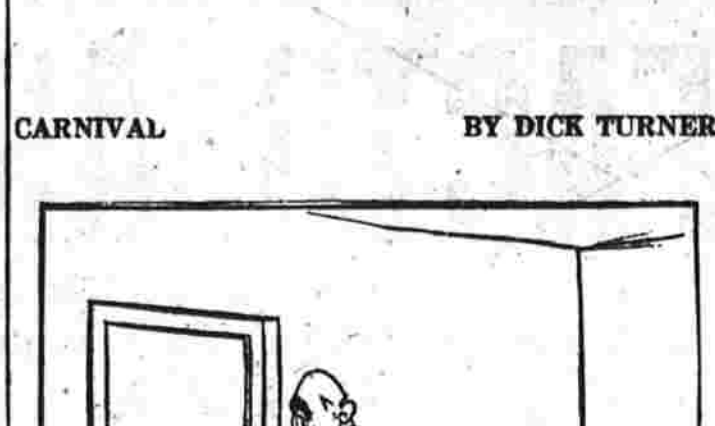

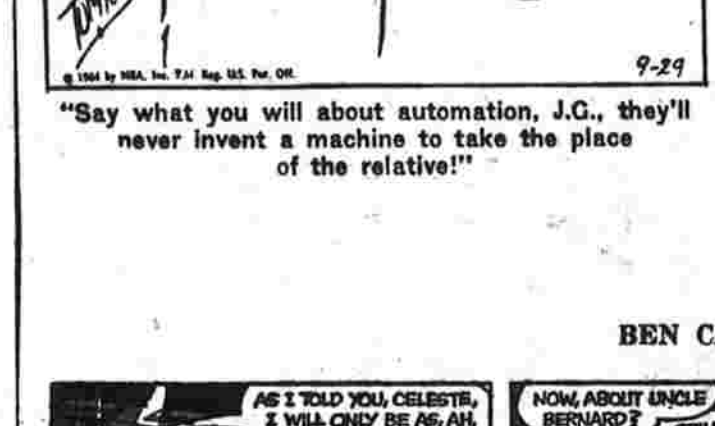

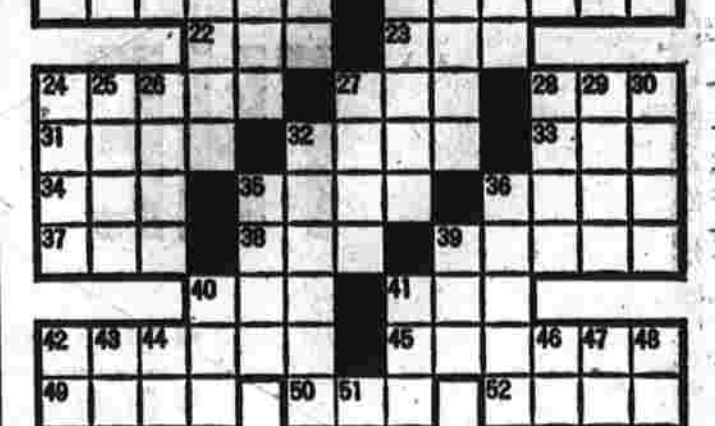
