the following proposed change were adopted, there would be no manager-council form of government. Vote no. Question 4 facilitates the procedure by which any political majority on the Board of Directors could fire a general manager, eliminating the present requirement that any such action should be for cause, with privilege of hearing. Vote no.

Question 5 reiterates the effect of Question 3, making sure it takes away from the General Manager the power to make Conservation Commission appointments. Vote no.

Question 6, requiring the General Manager to set up a six year capital improvement program; Question 7, formally establishing a department of public works; Question 8, amending water and sewerage rules and regulations; Question 9, setting up a special planning department; and Question 11, making it legal to issue town bonds in \$5,000 denominations instead of the present \$5,000 are all either harmless or beneficial. Vote yes, if you have patience for it, on Questions 6, 7, 8, 9, and 11.

Question 10, however, goes back to brass politics, with a Charter amendment designed to make sure that there should be no ally nonnoms about which ever party wins a town election gets its own lawyer appointed town counsel, and Question 12 returns to the general assault on the spirit and letter of the 1947 Town Charter, removing those delegations and divisions of authority and jurisdiction which were intended to see that the Board of Directors remained a legislative body and a policy-making body and did not have its members engaged in trying to pave streets, or taking over personal management of the town's recreational facilities.

After all of these questions had failed to pass last Monday, the voters had a brief period when it appeared possible there might be some non-partisan agreement to submit to the next election of the electorate only those changes which were non-controversial in nature. The leadership of the Democratic party withdrew from this possibility, however, in favor of one more direct assault on the Manchester Town Charter.

It would be safer to vote no on all these questions, thus leaving the worthy ones to be added to the Charter later. It was established in Manchester by the new 1947 Charter.

All of these proposed Charter changes, the good and the bad, lost on that referendum day.

The reason all of the Charter changes lost was that, in the special referendum, not enough people came out to vote for them. The requirement for the adoption of a Charter change in such a special referendum is that at least 15 per cent of the town's population must come out and cast affirmative votes for it.

The easiest way to defeat Charter changes, in such a situation, is not to vote on them at all. So it was that, even when they did get to the polls that day, more than 300 Manchester people voted on the Robertson School and the Urban Renewal questions and still registered no vote on the Charter questions at all. Even with enough people at the polls, the Charter questions could not obtain favorable votes for their passage.

In proposing this same list of questions for the voters of Manchester at the town election next Monday, the Democratic majority of the Charter Commission and the Board of Directors is seeking the advantage of different legal requirements for the success of a Charter amendment. At a formal town election such as that being held Monday, a simple vote is in favor, no matter by what margin, or no matter what the size of the total vote is in favor, is sufficient for enactment.

The Same Old Charter Changes... Last May 19, the voters of Manchester went to the polls in a special election, to decide the fate of 14 questions. One of these questions, by which the voters were asked to authorize \$677,000 for an addition to the Robertson School, was approved by a vote of three to one.

And, on the same day, the voters voted almost three to one in favor of what is now known as the North East Renewal Project.

An affirmative answer to both these questions represented progress forward for Manchester.

On that same referendum day, the voters of Manchester also rendered their decision on 12 other questions, consisting of amendments to the Town Charter.

Some of these changes were unimportant and harmless, some were beneficial and some were downright mischievous in their attempt to launch an underhanded assault on the manager-council form of government as it was established in Manchester by the new 1947 Charter.

### Director Candidates Face Quiz Tonight

Have the candidates for the town board of directors answered all your questions? Or would you prefer to hear them state in person where they stand on the issues that face the town?

The voters will have a chance to question the candidates of both parties tonight when the League of Women Voters conducts its bi-annual candidates quiz at 8 at Bowers School auditorium, Princeton and Henry Sts.

And for voters who can't be there to ask the questions, Radio Station WJMP will record the meeting for broadcast tomorrow night.

All the candidates for both parties have a copy of the League's invitation to take part in tonight's question and answer session.

Written questions will be collected from the audience by league members, and will be put to the candidate by moderator Gilbert Hunt, chairman of the High School English department. Questions will be answered by League President Mrs. Jerome Nathan, who moderated five previous candidate quiz sessions.

Questions may be directed either to an individual or to either party, to be answered by one of the party's candidates.

The local office party has nominated six candidates for the board; voters will be asked to vote for any six at the election Monday. The nine top vote getters will comprise the new board that takes office Nov. 1.

Both parties have adopted and published their platforms for the town elections, and both are in The Herald. Many of the platforms are similar; differences include stands on the community college, on investigations of town departments, and on fiscal policy.

The Republicans say they will continue to support the community college only if it is largely self-supporting; the Democrats have given it an unqualified endorsement.

The Republicans have condemned investigation of town government as wasteful and unnecessary, claiming programs could be cleared up as well within the framework of town government; the Democrats have promised continued investigations when necessary through the general manager and town auditor.

The Republicans have called for a "firm fiscal policy" based on pay-as-you-go for maintenance and improvements; the Democrats have promised to help reduce next year's taxes. 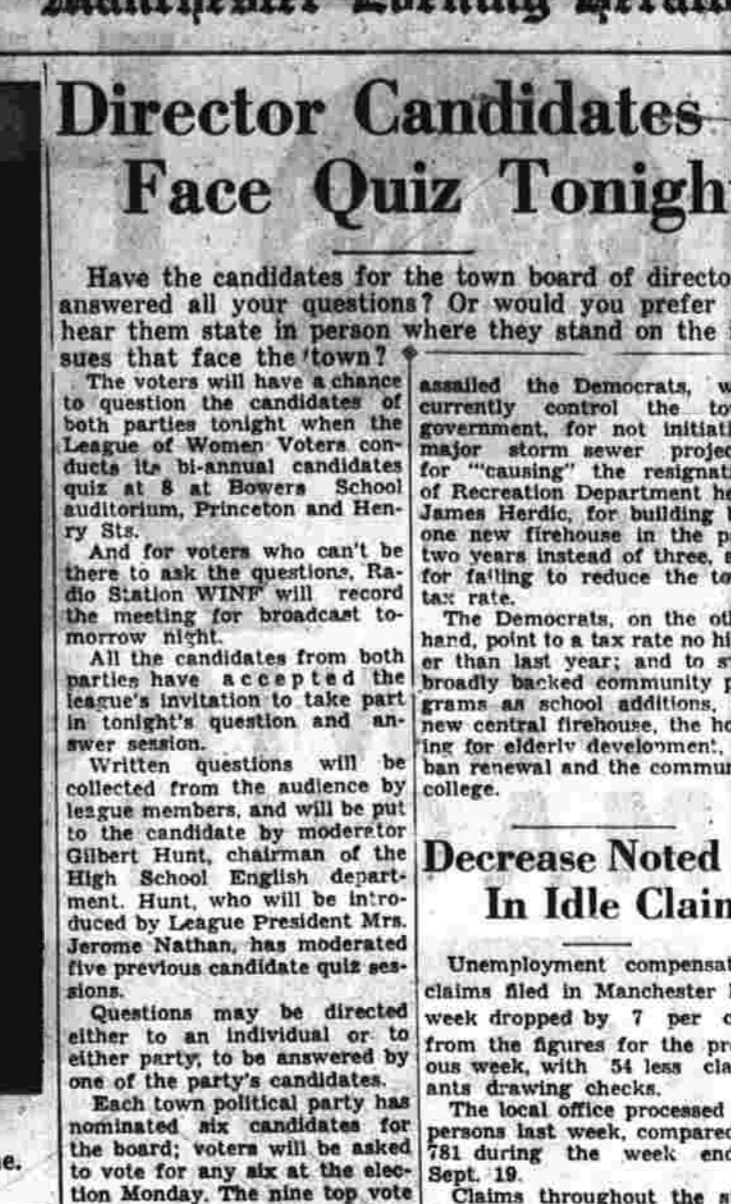

# Colts Moved Up in Ranks Following Offensive Show

NEW YORK (AP)—Baltimore's point parade against the Chicago Bears last Sunday has put the Colts among the National Football League's leading offensive machines, according to NFL team statistics released today.

Chicago's defense, which had fending champion Bears 22-0 over a 21-20 upset of Green Bay, stood third offensively behind Minnesota and Philadelphia—with 947 yards gained in three games. A new ground tack has supplemented the passing of Johnny Unitas and helped counted for five more touchdowns than the Colts had in all of the 1964 season.

Baltimore has gained 558 yards passing and 350 rushing. The Vikings have built their leading total of 1,000 yards primarily on the 22 running punch of Tommy Mason and Bill Brown in their first two games. Mason and Brown, who saw little action in last week's loss to Los Angeles because of injuries, have accounted for most of Minnesota's leading rushing yardage of 324.

The Rams, surprise leaders of the Western Division with a 2-3 record, show the best defensive figures. Los Angeles opponents have gained only 568 yards—an average of 189 per game—and have scored only 10 points, one more than Green Bay, 2-1, has allowed.

The Packers have given up 201 yards rushing, one less than the Rams and Dallas Cowboys, who are tied with a record of 200 yards in a top with a yield of 308 yards.
