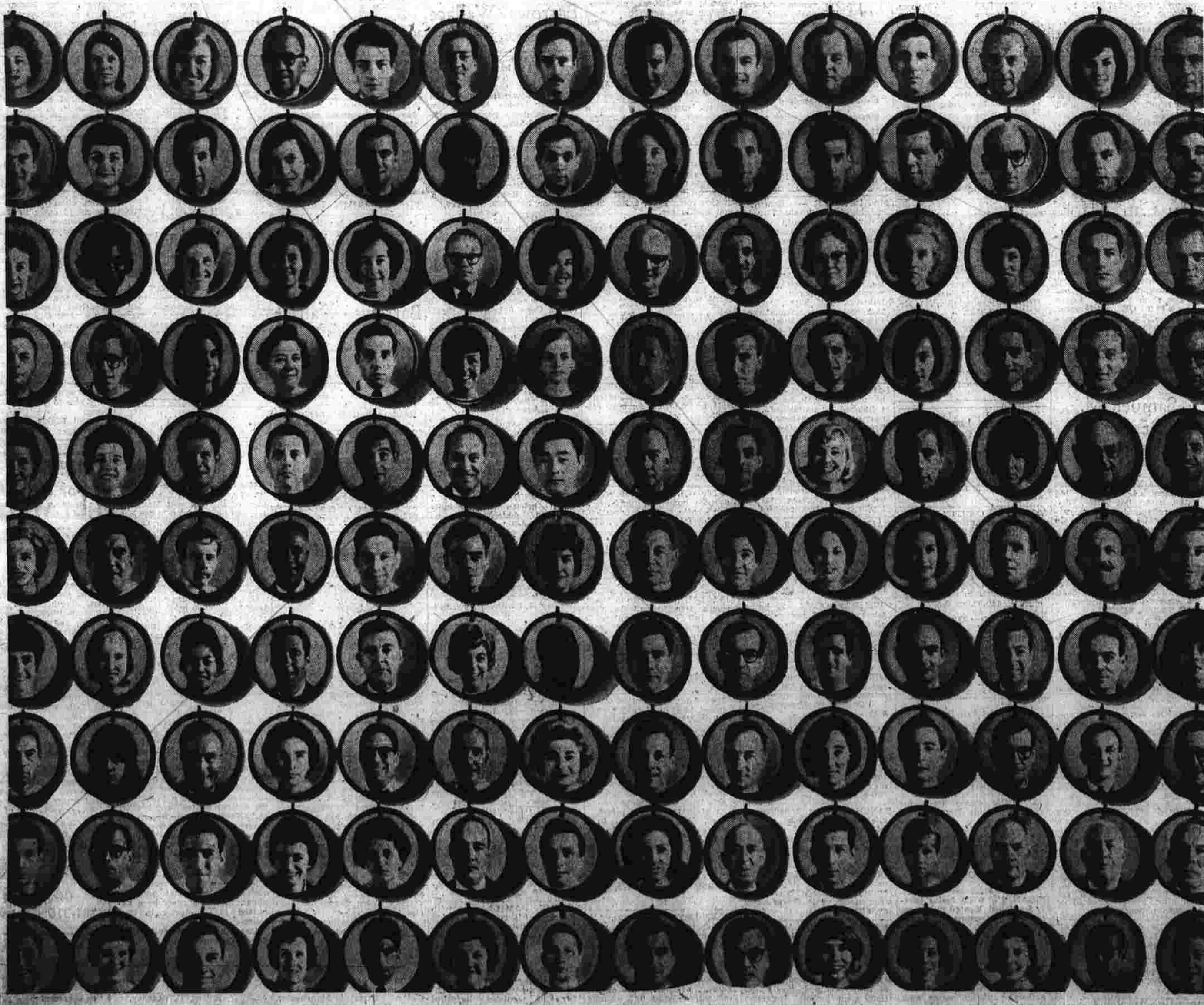

Soviet Espionage Charge Rejected by U.S. Embassy

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union today accused three U.S. military attaches and a British attaché of espionage in Siberia but the American Embassy rejected the charges. The Soviet accusation 'was not responsive to our serious protests against the violations of diplomatic immunity of the attaches, the U.S. Embassy said, referring to an earlier protest that property of the attaches was seized. The Foreign Ministry said it rejected the American and British protests. The Soviet protest was made public a day after Washington and London announced protests against what they called 'a gross violation of the attaches' diplomatic immunity.

HARTFORD (AP) - John M. Lupton, GOP campaign director, today accused the University of Connecticut of unfairness toward the young conservatives group on the campus. He complained in a letter to President Homer Babidge Jr. that the university had refused the group permission to hold a rally Oct. 16 of the Homecoming weekend. The conservatives had planned to invite either Barry Goldwater or Dwight Eisenhower or Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania as rally speaker. Lupton said that despite this denial, Young Democrats were granted permission to hold a rally there on the same date.

Asbestos Scrutinized For Link to Cancer

NEW YORK (AP) - Medical specialists pointed a strong finger of suspicion today at asbestos as a cause not only of lung cancer but also of another extremely rare form of fatal human cancer.

This cancer, known as mesothelioma, involves the lining of the abdominal and chest cavities. Much of the specialists' evidence comes from autopsy studies of men working with asbestos as an insulating material. They said it also is possible that dust from products containing asbestos might be exposing people generally to some risk of cancer. How much risk they might be, they said, they could not tell.

Asbestos is used not only for insulation but as a flooring material, in automobile brake shoes and in many other applications. Ordinary wear and tear, they said, might release dust into the atmosphere. The report was presented to the American Public Health Association by Drs. Irving J. Selikoff and Jacob Churg of the Mount Sinai Hospital, New York, and E. Cuyler Hammond, D., director of statistical research for the American Cancer Society. Dr. Hammond noted for his studies of cigarette smoking in relationship to lung cancer.

Asbestos is a mineral, magnesium silicate, and about 90 million pounds of it are used worldwide each year, they said. In 1963, worldwide usage amounted to about 900 tons, the researchers said. Hard particles of asbestos can lodge in the lungs during mining, processing and application. They also can be inhaled, or possibly from dust raised through normal wear, they said.

'We had previously found that lung cancer and possibly gastrointestinal cancer were markedly increased among workers in the asbestos industry,' they said.

Appointment of Master Sought Third Redistricting Plan Submitted to Federal Panel

NEW HAVEN (AP) - A request would be the job of the three-judge Federal Court has been asked to bypass the politically - torn General Assembly and appoint a special master to recommend a legislative reapportionment plan.

Plaintiffs in the longed Connecticut reapportionment case asked for the appointment yesterday as a first step toward a court-imposed solution. The master would be asked to study various plans before presenting the court with recommendations agreed to by the parties.

Should the court be satisfied with the master's report, it would implement it in the form of a final decree reapportioning the House of Representatives and redistricting the Senate.

The plaintiffs believe that what the court feared might happen has happened. It is concerned for the 11 citizens who initiated the case with the support of the League of Women Voters. The comment was contained in a memorandum filed in Federal Court in support of the motion urging appointment of a master.

The reference was to the obvious gulf separating the Democrats and Republicans on the court's repeated warning that if no agreement was reached in the General Assembly, the court would be forced to assume the reapportionment task itself.

The action, taken at the deadline for filing replies to a court memorandum Sept. 22, left the judges with three plans to consider prior to the reapportionment hearing scheduled for next Monday morning in Federal Court, Hartford.

The first is the court's own which has been accepted by the Republican intervenors in the case. Under the plan there would be no legislative election on Nov. 3. Instead the General Assembly would meet in special session next month to try to reach agreement on reapportionment and to submit a Constitution Convention. An earlier special session ended in failure Sept. 15.

Should a reapportionment bill be enacted, a special election would be held late in January for seats in the realigned assembly. The new district lines would be in effect Feb. 1, 1965.

Test Pilots Sure XB70A Will Hit 700

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) - The color-like bomber called the XB70A has a magic number. It's got to be 700 - the speed it hasn't reached, yet.

The test pilots are convinced the ship will make it - and much more. 'I learned that this plane flies at 700 mph, and it's a hell of a lot faster than that,' said test pilot Alvin S. White Monday after the giant bird's second test flight.

Their goal, at least in initial test flights, is to reach 700 mph. Their second flight hit a top speed of 600 miles an hour as the plane flew to 38,000 feet. The altitude goal, for now, is 30,000 feet.

White indicated another try was in the air. The plane's flight Monday was shortened when the plane's auxiliary hydraulic system apparently failed. The plane landed safely, however.

The outgoing board of directors will hold a regularly scheduled October meeting at 8 tonight in the hearing room of the Municipal Building to discuss and act upon a variety of items, including several added appropriations.

It is expected to set dates for public hearings on two proposed ordinances: On regulating the issuance of permits for septic tanks.

2. Act on an agreement between the town and the Brookhaven Corp. a land development concern which buys water from the town to supply its Brook Reservoir for re-sale to its Glastonbury users.

3. The proposed additional appropriations are: 1. \$3,000 to the Town Pension Board to pay administration costs.

2. \$7,000 to the Building Inspector's Department for hiring a clerk-of-the-works who will supervise the additions and alterations to three schools.

3. \$2,000 to the Municipal Building Account to reimburse the newly-created Northeast Rescue District.

4. \$61,968 to be transferred to the Capital Improvement Fund from the 1963-64 General Fund surplus.

5. \$44,969 to be transferred to the Sewer Department Capital Improvement Reserve Fund for diversion of the flow of sanitary sewers in the vicinity of Manchester Memorial Hospital.

6. \$37,500 to be allocated from the 1964-65 Sewer Department Capital Improvement Reserve Fund for diversion of the flow of sanitary sewers in the vicinity of Manchester Memorial Hospital.

7. Hear reports on: The town tennis program, the sidewalk construction and repair program, the Capital Improvement program for various funds, the fire-house construction program, and the Manchester Redevelopment Agency's progress.

8. \$14,969 to be transferred to the Sewer Department Capital Improvement Reserve Fund for diversion of the flow of sanitary sewers in the vicinity of Manchester Memorial Hospital.

9. Repeals the existing chapter concerning water and sewerage and provides that the two departments will be established by ordinance or by regulation, with the amount requested by the various department heads or recommended by the general manager, whichever is higher.

10. Repeals the existing chapter concerning planning and zoning, which now permits the Planning Commission (ZFC) to retain a town planner and other staff.

11. Sets up a new date for its November meeting, at which time the new board will be sworn in.

12. Defines the powers, duties and procedure of the planning department and director.

13. Permits the board of directors to appoint a town director, with a limit of \$5,000.

14. Removes from the charter the clause which now denies the board of directors "the right to control or interfere with the administrative or executive powers of the general manager, or departments, boards, commissions, bureaus or officers of the town, unless such right is specifically granted to the board of directors."

15. Raises the maximum definition of bonds which may be authorized by the board of directors from its present limit of \$1,000 to a limit of \$5,000.

16. Permits the board of directors to appoint a town director, with a limit of \$5,000.

17. Repeals the present chapter which designates the general manager as the director of public works and establishes a department of public works with a director of public works as its head.

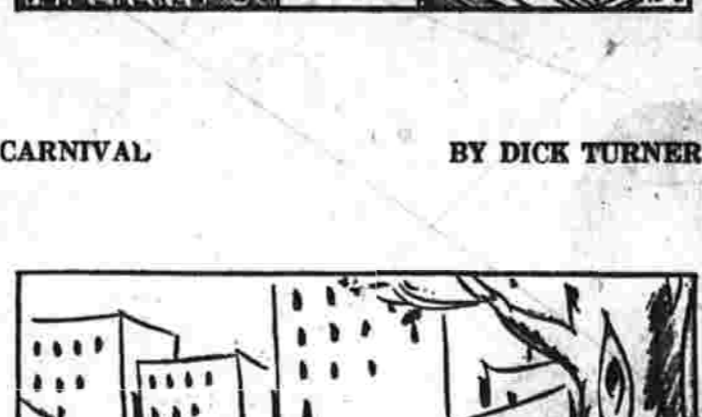

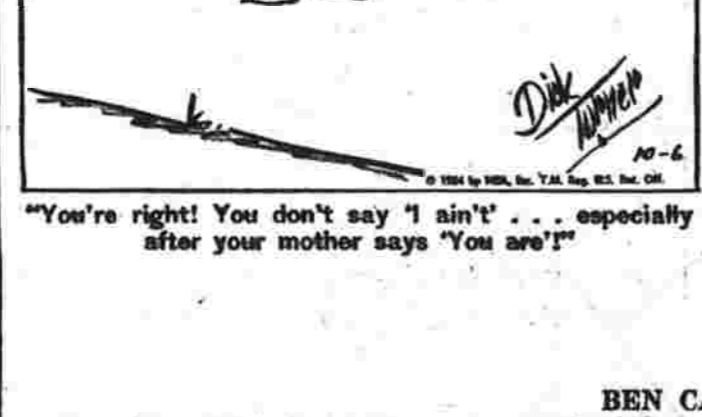
