Sheinwold on Bridge

HARD TO TAKE TRICKS IF OPERATING IN DARK
 BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD
 National Men's Team Champion
 One reason aggressive bidders who is that the defenders sometimes fail to take the trick. Declarer can see what he has to work with in each hand, but the defenders operate in the dark and therefore sometimes stumble.

South dealer
 North-South vulnerable
 Opening lead—Two of Diamonds

When this hand was played in a recent team match, the bidding was the same at both tables. South, if you like, at such aggressive bidding. South seems doomed to lose two spades, a club and a diamond. But save your criticism until you hear the result.

The play began in the same way at both tables. West led the ace of diamonds. East put up the queen, and South won with the ace in the hope of convincing West he was not holding the king of diamonds.

At both tables, also, South drew three rounds of trumps. Then the two declarers parted company.

Leads Club
 The first declarer next led the low club from his hand. West played low, and dummy's king won. The next club went to West's ace.

West was afraid to lead another club, and quite right so. This would allow dummy to ruff while South discarded a spade. West was equally afraid to lead a spade; this would cost a trick if South held the king of spades. By the process of elimination, West was bound to return a diamond. This gave South a free finesse and his contract.

At the other table, South did not lead a club after drawing trumps. Instead, he led the three of diamonds from his hand.

West could have stepped up with the jack of diamonds, but this would cost a trick if his partner had started with the doubleton K-Q. So West played low, and dummy's nine won the trick. Here again, therefore, declarer made an "impossible" contract.

If your opponents have trouble taking their tricks, you're better off bidding no-trump games than stopping at part-score contracts.

Dial Question
 Partner opens with one spade, and the next player bids two hearts. You hold: Spades 9-8-7; Hearts 10-9-8-7; Diamonds 9-8-7; Clubs, K-Q.

What do you say?
 Answer: Pass. Don't double a low contract when that is the only contract you can expect to defeat. The other opponent or your partner usually bids, and then you must find a way to discourage your partner.

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Events In Nation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Preliminary estimates by the Department of Commerce showed Wednesday that the gross national product in the third quarter of 1964 reached an annual rate of \$97.5 billion.

This is \$1 billion above the second quarter level and \$4.5 billion above the gross national product for 1963.

The report also showed: — Consumer purchases of goods and services, paced by a vigorous demand for automobiles, rose about \$4.5 billion during the July-September period.

— Fixed investments increased about \$2 billion.

— Residential construction dipped \$200 million, and the rate of inventory accumulation dropped from \$1.7 billion to \$1.7 billion.

The estimates will be revised next month when comprehensive information becomes available.

WASHINGTON (AP)

— President Johnson signed Wednesday that gives ministers until next April 15 to decide if they must be covered by Social Security.

An earlier law making ministers eligible for Social Security had fixed the deadline at April 15, 1962.

Johnson also signed a bill extending to June 30, 1967, the period during which federal payments may be made for foster care in child-care institutions under the aid to dependent children program.

The measure also raises from 16 to 21 the age limit for benefit payments to dependent children attending high school or vocational school.

WASHINGTON (AP)

— Ten pickets paraded Wednesday in a downtown park across from a building which houses the Mexican government's tourist office in protest of what they termed support for Fidel Castro's Cuban regime by the government of Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateos.

Luis Reyes, a New York restaurant worker and chairman of the Cuban Exiles here, said: "We are going to continue the demonstrations here in protest to discourage tourists from going to Mexico, and as a protest at what we consider the unfortunate, mistaken personal policies of President Lopez Mateos."

Mexico is the only Latin American country that maintains diplomatic relations with the Castro regime.

WASHINGTON (AP)

— Halting it as a vital program, President Johnson has signed a bill expanding the Reserve Officers Training Corps in the Senate House announced Wednesday.

The measure calls for expanding the ROTC in secondary schools from 534 high schools to a maximum of 1,500. It also continues the four-year college ROTC program but allows a two-year program.

WASHINGTON (AP)

— Undersea explorer Jacques Cousteau says he is going to ride the Gulf Stream from the South Atlantic to the North Atlantic in his deep diving bathyscaphe.

Piccard told a news conference he wants to study the undercurrent flow of the Gulf Stream and pick up samples of ocean floor.

The trip may take two months, said Piccard, who is attending a meeting of the world federation of underwater activities. He said he would submerge off the coast of Latin America. He didn't say when.

MRS. GOLDWATER

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Mrs. Barry Goldwater says her husband likes steak so much he could eat it for breakfast.

"But," she said, "he usually skips breakfast and has a light lunch and a simple dinner, especially when I'm cooking."

Mrs. Goldwater, in Harrisburg to boost her husband's campaign for president, also told a news conference her favorite family sport is deep sea fishing, and added: "I'm probably a better fisherman than he is."

ETHEL MERRMAN

Australia (AP) — Ethel Merrman arrived in Sydney to open night club engagement and refused to talk to reporters about her marriage to actor Ernest Borgnine.

She and Borgnine separated 36 days after the wedding.

"I'm here to sing," said Mrs. Merrman, "not to discuss my private life."

NEW-YORK TO POLICE

NEW YORK (AP) — Continuing the policy it adopted seven years ago, the Long Island Rail Road has again asked its commuters in the towns along its routes what colors they want their station plaques to be.

The custom of asking residents to pick their own station colors began back in 1937 when LIRR President Thomas M. Goodfellow invited voters, civic leaders and presidents of chambers of commerce to sound off those who use the stations for their views on bus.

In their latest redecoration program, the company said, it allowed only three communities wanted drastic changes in the color schemes. One was pleased. The others were satisfied, or wanted only slight changes.

Vernon's Merger Hannabury Involved From the Beginning

Mayor's approval of consolidation began in earnest six years ago when a group of men, concerned with the state of government in Rockville and Vernon, banded together to see what improvements could be made.

They were prompted to act by an apparent lack of interest and non-action which followed a \$10,000 study sponsored by the town and made by a New York management consultant firm of Boston, Allen and Hamilton.

Atty. Herbert Hannabury, then a resident of Vernon for about a year, was invited to join the group, later known as the Consolidation Committee.

Members and the city's mayor, led to their serving as the town's second consolidation commission in 1958.

The second vote for consolidation disclosed that the city residents still favored consolidation, but the proposal was again defeated in the district in 1961.

The work of the town's third commission is now a matter of record.

"I cannot take credit for consolidation," Atty. Hannabury, who rose from chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Better Government to chairman of the third consolidation commission.

"There have been many people who devoted their time and effort to the cause of consolidation. I'm just the last in line."

"Every time anything happened, it moved us closer," Hannabury continued. "The time was when things that divide Rockville and the fire district," he continued, "but there are far more things that unite us than divide us. We will never go back to the idea of separate municipalities."

Herbert Hannabury, who was named chairman of the county committee in 1963, is a native of Chelsea, Mass., a city to the north of Boston. One of four children, he served in the Navy in World War II in the South Pacific.

He attended Boston University and the law school at the University of Connecticut.

Hannabury studied law nights at UConn with two other local attorneys, Leo B. Flaherty Jr. and Francis McCoy.

The thing which might take your Social Security away is President Johnson's Medicare program. Just think of what it would mean. At the present time people must wait from 2 weeks to 2 months for a hospital bed. What would it mean if we had Medicare? Consider the expense of the program. They say a 1 1/2% increase in the payroll deductions would suffice. Would it and for how long? We have thousands of people over 65 who are sick and being cared for at home but Medicare is passed they will immediately be put in the hospital at government expense. Count every town and city in this nation plus the thousands of people living abroad, and compute the expense per person for hospitalization and you will have a very rough idea of what the cost of this bill which would eat into the Social Security Fund. It would not be too long before the program would be bankrupt, that is why Congress has been so reluctant to pass it even though President Kennedy and President Johnson have been so anxious for it.

Don't be misled with all this talk about our Republican presidential candidates, most of them are physically handicapped as well as to the able-bodied, but the proposed FDR Memorial with its countless levels and steps would not be such a handicap as would create a formidable challenge to the able-bodied as do the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials.

Coventry Charter Panel to Propose Full-time First Selectman

A full-time first selectman will be recommended by the Coventry Charter Commission at a public hearing by the commission slated for some time in November. Atty. John W. Allen, commission chairman, said today.

The commission was formed by the board of selectmen last December. It was charged with the duty of producing a town charter for the approval of the voters.

Also to be proposed at the public hearing will be that there be six other members of the board of selectmen, in addition to the above mentioned position, but these additional members will receive no compensation. Presently as first selectman, Richard M. Galtner receives \$2,000; second selectman Donald S. Davis, \$200, and third selectman Leonard G. Jean, \$200.

Chairman Allen further pointed out that under the plan to be recommended, the board of selectmen will have the authority to pass ordinances although the electors will have the power to petition for a town meeting to veto the board's actions.

Under the proposed charter, all boards and officials will be appointed by the board of selectmen, who are themselves to be elected, excepting the boards of education, finance, tax reviewing board of appeals, as well as the constables, registrars, tax collector and town clerk — treasurer.

The charter commission must submit a final draft of its proposed charter to the board of selectmen prior to Dec. 1, 1964.

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences announced the award to Dr. Anselme Kowalevsky of the University of Michigan and Dr. Heinrich Wieland of the University of Göttingen.

The prize was awarded for their discovery of the mechanism by which cholesterol is synthesized in the body.

Dr. Kowalevsky discovered the enzyme HMG-CoA synthetase, which is the first step in the synthesis of cholesterol.

Dr. Wieland discovered the enzyme HMG-CoA lyase, which is the second step in the synthesis of cholesterol.

The prize is awarded, under terms of the will of the Swedish dynamite baron Alfred Nobel, belonging after their death to the Nobel Foundation in Stockholm.

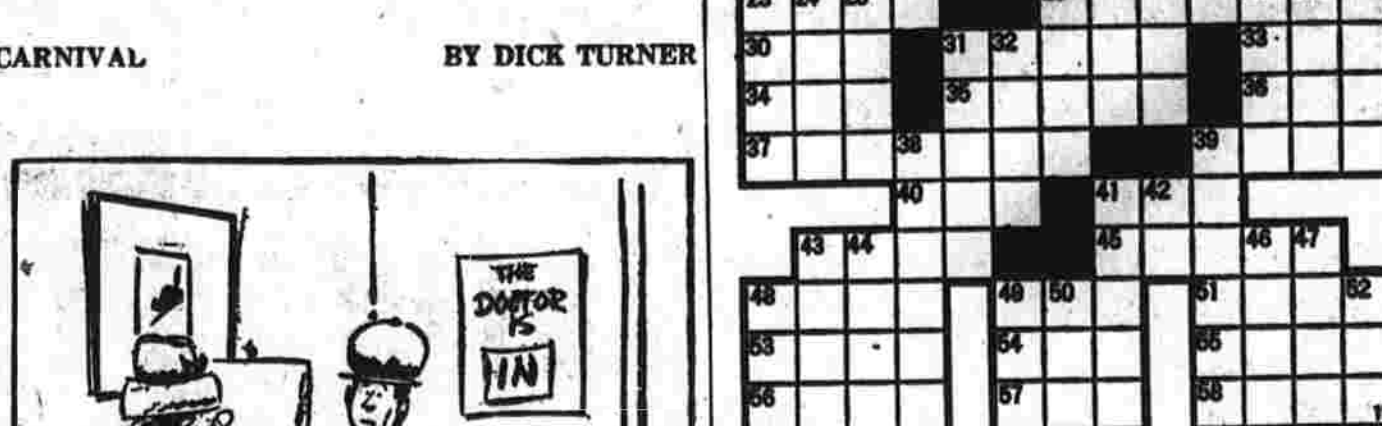
