WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP)—The sudden fall from power of Premier Khrushchev stunned world leaders and men on the street around the world. The abrupt shakeup triggered reactions ranging from calm to alarm. Speculation was widespread among government officials, diplomats and in the press over the new leaders, Communist party head Leonid I. Brezhnev and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin. Would they follow Khrushchev's policy of peaceful coexistence or steer the country on a new, radical course?

ing. The very nature of the Soviet regime operates against any concept of free men... What has been shown the world, so far, in the way of a submission to Khrushchev does not look very permanent.

But even while we thus emphasize the uncertainty of the future as far as the identity and nature of the Russian leadership is concerned, the fundamental trends of history in our time, outside Russia, is our relationship with Russia, and to the relationship between Russia and China, are probably beyond the reach of personalities or cliques.

Khrushchev himself once purged Malenkov who was too concerned with producing consumer goods for the people of Russia, and Khrushchev came to decide for more consumer goods himself and the people who replaced him yesterday may have thought he was thereby in error. But they themselves, whoever they prove to be, will come to be in favor of more consumer goods for the people of Russia.

Similarly, Malenkov once picked flowers for Western India, and that may have been considered a revolutionary act in his time, but the greatest decline in tensions in the cold war between Russia and the West has continued through Khrushchev and is likely to have its greatest effect in the future, not because of the individuals involved, but because of the time involved and the way the pendulum of history has been swinging ever since history began.

Liberalism, the rift between the West and Russia has never been a matter of personalities, but one of massive geopolitical facts. The success of Khrushchev could conceivably bring a different kind of balance to the relations between the two Communist giants, but it cannot repeat their mutual geography.

Such estimates of what is likely to prove stable for the Communist world, no matter how the faces may change, are also a judgment on what United States policy should try to be. We should continue to try to emerge from a policy of response into a policy of being, and that is a policy of being ourselves, and of behaving in loyalty to our own values and principles. If we can state ourselves by the best stars in our national constellation, the identity of the betwixt elsewhere has a little less importance.

No Printer's Devil At Abbey's Printery

CALLOWEND, England (AP)—"Printer's devil" is the common term for a printer's mischievous, but helpful, assistant. At nearby Stanbrook Abbey, these gnomes most work with ink and not lead to produce some of the most beautiful books and broadsheets in Britain.

Before printing was invented, the "scriptorium" of an abbey was a busy place. Where manuscripts were copied, for distribution mainly among the clergy.

Now Stanbrook's presses form the scriptorium's modern equivalent. Books of a religious nature are printed with ink on handmade paper. Many are finished by hand illumination in gold and brightly colored inks.

The abbey was founded in 1088 and its printing history dates from 1876, when Brother Laurence Bingham of the Order of Saint Benedict bought a small press and employed a local printer to teach him how to run it.

From then on, says the pressman, "We have passed the craft on from generation to generation, with only a little help from outside."

Now there are six presses, including the original one, and seven men running them. Most of our publications are with mechanical equipment; expert workmen are allowed to do the lettering and make repairs.

However, typographical advice is applied to the printer through a grille because technically no man is allowed inside the room except the essential workmen.

The spokesman's name cannot be revealed. "Our custom is to remain anonymous," he says. "We are strict about this because we are the strictest of all, known as Papal printers."

The printer entered the Benedictine order in 1941. "I had never printed before and I didn't know anything about it," he said. "But I always loved to read and collected first editions and beautiful bindings when I could afford them."

The press prints fine editions of poetry, medieval spiritual writings and plainer editions of liturgical books.

The actual printing operation is a kind of venerable and modern process. The press on which the finest work is done has an automatic feeding mechanism capable of printing hundreds of sheets an hour. "But the automatic feed is detached and the damp, handmade sheets are fed in slowly and carefully after stopping the machine between impressions," the printer said.

The men wear their usual habits as they scurry about the machinery. Long aprons protect the white portions of the habit.

After the sheets are dried and, in the case of books, bound, illuminated letters and designs are added. Much of this is done by two laymen—Harry and Margaret Adams, two who collaborate with Stanbrook Press.

"We decide ourselves, in consultation with the lady abbot, what we print," the printer said. "We write things ourselves, and print what we write. Most of our publications are books that we either write, edit or translate."

The abbey is subject to censorship by the Roman Catholic archbishop of the Worcester diocese.

Many books are available only to those inside the order, but the more secular works can be bought commercially. So can Christmas cards.

"We print for our own bread and butter," the printer said. "Some books are sold through rare book dealers, mainly in London. Other purchasers hear about the press and write for lists. Still others form a large list of permanent subscribers to the press's publications."

Town Pumps Water, Studies Future Need

The town water department has begun pumping water overland to supplement the water supply in two town reservoirs. The pumping project got underway last week in an effort to counteract the effect of a prolonged summer drought.

Simultaneously, General Manager Richard Martin has begun a study of ways to meet town water needs. The first part of the study—a projection of water use—shows that water consumption in Manchester will double over the next 20 years.

Water superintendent Lawrence Witkofski has reported that his department began pumping water from the Howard reservoir east of the Highland Park section last Friday.

The department has resorted to pumping in order to maintain the level of the Howard reservoir at a usable level.

To accomplish the water exchange, a six-inch, aluminum irrigation pipe has been laid for about 2,000 feet between the two reservoirs. Water is forced through the pipe about 12 hours each day by a town pump capable of about 200 gallons per minute. The other source feeding the reservoir is a brook which Witkofski says is "down to a trickle."

The reservoir supplies about 800,000 gallons of water daily into the town water system—slightly more than 300 gallons per minute.

The Howard reservoir, from which the reserves are being drawn, is still relatively well stocked.

On Wednesday a borrowed three-inch irrigation pipe hooked to the town's Fern St. well was put into operation. It carries about 300 gallons per minute to a brook which feeds the Globe Hollow reservoir. The reservoir is also supplied from streams which Witkofski reports are flowing surprisingly well considering the drought conditions.

The daily drain on the reservoir is about 700,000 gallons, somewhat more than 40 gallons per minute.

The supplementary supply pumped to the Globe Hollow Reservoir will permit the town to cut down on the flow from the Roaring Brook reservoir in Glastonbury, which currently is at a dangerously low level.

Town reservoirs are cut off when they are still partially full because the water outlets are located above the bottom, in order

much water in 1964 as it does now.

Using town water consumption from 1950 as a base, water demand will increase by 28 per cent by 1970, by 84 per cent by 1980, by 180 per cent by 1990, and by 278 per cent by the year 2000.

The total in gallons used in 1960 was 912 million gallons. According to the projection, consumption by 2000 will be 3,450 million gallons.

Of the total consumption in 1960, about 65 per cent was supplied by the town water department and 35 per cent came from Manchester Water Co. sources.

Tansky estimates that new development will swing the balance even more heavily toward the town water department by 2000. By then, he says, the town will supply about 75 per cent of the total water used, the company about 25 per cent.

On this basis, the town must be prepared to supply about 2,600 million gallons by 2000, as against 990 million gallons in 1960.

The projections are based on an estimated population of 90,000 by 2000 (it is about 44,000 now) and an increasing but average consumption of water per person in Manchester water users now consume about 18
