Politic Ads Cause Drop In Viewers

NEW YORK (AP) — The three television networks are accepting paid political broadcasts, occasionally political entertainment programs and making room for short talks at the end of shows. They are doing it, but none really likes them very much.
The reason is clear: A political broadcast, even when it is only a five-minute one — invariably loses some of the audience, over and above the usual end of program channel switching. Studies made during the 1960 campaign indicated that a political advertisement, regardless of the party that paid for it, caused a drop-out of audience about 12 per cent higher than usual. That, of course, was not true of the Kennedy-Nixon debates which rolled up huge audiences.
This year, paid, half-hour campaign programs by both Republican and Democrats in spots normally occupied by entertainment shows have caused sharp anticipated drop-off in audience sizes, reflected in the projected figures of television rating services.
"Even those five minute spots at the end of shows result in viewers moving away," said a network research man. "The result is that you lose your lead-in to the next program. It doesn't happen so much with the one minute and shorter spots — most viewers are willing to ride with them."

After a Year, Dinah Returns

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Mel-bow-voiced Dinah Shore is back on the television scene after a year's absence in which she sought and failed to find a new way of life.
At the close of the 1963 season, Dinah announced she was quitting after a dozen highly successful years in television. She started with a 15-minute show, did 444 of them, then switched to an hour-long program that lasted for seven seasons.
"I've worked a long time," said the singer, who had started her career in 1931. "There are things you get to do only once in your life, like watching your children grow up. I'm determined not to let those things pass me by because I was too busy working."
She declared she was going to

make Palm Springs her home, since it afforded a wholesome atmosphere for the rearing of her children. What she didn't reveal was that she also planned to marry Maurice F. Smith, a Palm Springs contractor. Their wedding May 26, 1964, was a surprise.
The marriage lasted a year. Now Dinah has moved her children back to Beverly Hills and is resuming her television career.
"I needed that year off from television," she explained between rehearsals for Saturday night's NBC telecast. "I had to slow down and find out where I was going. I never stopped singing; I would never do that. I played some dates where all I had to do was sing — that's pure enjoyment for me."
"Television was something else again. The blocking out of the show never bothered me; it

was easy to work out the mechanics. The real headache was in the planning: Trying to figure out what to do with the guest stars, how to keep the show moving, what to say. Most dialogue on variety shows is pure pap. It is a constant struggle to make the talk entertaining.
"Even in an hour show I usually did only three or four songs. So I was doing very little singing, which is what I really like to do."
When her marriage broke up and Dinah decided to return to television, she came on her own terms. She will be doing four nighttime specials and three daytime hours on which she will introduce treatments of problems concerning women: Child molestation, perinatal housework vs. career.
Tonight's show will feature David Janssen, Rose Marie and George Gobel.

Art and New Series Await Raymond Burr

NEW YORK (AP) — Raymond Burr, the eminent television barrister who in seven years has never failed to win a case, came to town the other day long enough to be master of ceremonies at a dinner for Medal of Honor winners. He confirmed reports that he, too, believes he is playing his last season as "Perry Mason."

Without a trace of regret, Burr said, "I think this year will wind it up. And, as you know, there are a number of other projects I've been interested in for some time."

There are, of course, Burr's flourishing art galleries and his interest in legal aid organizations, stimulated by his part in the courtroom series.

"And I've been talking with Don Fedderson (a TV producer) about a new series," Burr said. "It's working title is 'The Power,' and I'll play the governor of a state."

In addition to numerous "Perry Mason" fans who have faithfully followed the CBS show, there will be many veteran actors and actresses who will miss the show.

Gail Patrick Jackson, executive producer of the series and one of its owners, is a former motion picture star who has great loyalty to old friends.

She has always made a special point of hiring, whenever possible, some of the people she calls "old timers — people who were acting when I was." Some of them are semiretired and, often, well-to-do, but the acting urge remains strong.

Often, such familiar motion picture faces as Conrad Nagel, Neil Hamilton, Arlene Judge, Stuart Erwin and Mae Clarke pop up in character parts.

Sometimes a few days work in the show helps a performer who found parts growing fewer and farther between as he grew older.

For years, a regular on the show was a well-known — and impoverished — character actor. He was in a minor part until his health became so poor he could work no longer.

Mrs. Jackson went to particular pains last season to find a role for an actress friend who had become paralyzed on one side. She played her role with

her good side facing the camera. This season the name of Ray Collins, who through the years has been playing Lieut. Tragg, Perry's police antagonist, has been kept in the star billing, along with Burr, William Hopper and Barbara Hale. Collins, in all probability, will not appear in a single episode this season. He has been plagued by poor health for the last couple of years, and most often the policeman's role these days is played by Wesley Lau.

"This isn't being the least altruistic," Mrs. Jackson says. "They are all fine performers and bring to the shows something interesting and vital — even when they only have one line."
