Keane, who resigned as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals only 19 hours after leading them to World Series victory over the Yankees, succeeds Yogi Berra, who was fired despite winning a pennant in his first year as manager.

Keane is the 18th Yankee manager and his fourth in the last five years. General Manager Ralph Houk, who announced Keane's signing at a press conference today, said the 32-year-old Keane had been given one-year contract.

Terms were not disclosed but it is believed Keane will receive around \$45,000.

Move to Delay U.N. Opening Gains Backing

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Support is growing for a move to postpone the U.N. General Assembly opening to give the United States and the new Soviet regime time to work out a compromise on the issue of paying peacekeeping dues.

Information said a number of Asian and African delegates are willing to go along with the move.

Before the Soviets dumped Nikita Khrushchev, the United States had warned that at the assembly opening, the U.S. would invoke a U.N. charter provision that members two years in arrears on their dues should lose their assembly votes.

The Soviet Union reportedly refused to pay for contributions to the peacekeeping forces, contending the assessments were illegal because the General Assembly made them instead of the Security Council.

Polish and Hungarian leaders who refused to join in the Kremlin's denunciation of Khrushchev issued a joint appeal for talks to end the rift in international communism.

Non-Communist governments in Britain, analyzing Monday's speeches by the Soviet Premier and his secretary, Leonid I. Brezhnev, noted these points: 1. Khrushchev's pledge that Soviet defenses would be strengthened.

2. Brezhnev called for an international meeting on interparty unity to be held in Moscow in a preparatory session Khrushchev had called for Dec. 15.

3. The Red Chinese had denounced this as "the day of the great split."


