A 26-year-old Church St. motorist is reported in satisfactory condition today in the special care ward at Manchester Memorial Hospital with injuries received in a head-on crash late last night on Main St. involving a Manchester police cruiser.

Raymond W. Smith of 830 Church St. received a fracture of the right leg, just above the knee, multiple bruises and a facial laceration which required five stitches, a hospital spokesman said.

to disrupt the nation's transportation system. The board, with many acid comments about the "unbusinesslike" state of railroad labor negotiations, also recommended fringe benefits and measures to protect jobs in an industry that has seen drastic employment cuts in recent years.

In a remarkably readable report for such a tangled dispute, the board urged drastic revisions in emergency board procedures to reduce industry irritations, relieve the "frustrations" of board members and lead to better relations.

"It need hardly be added that any improvements in the labor relations of this critical industry would be decidedly in the public interest," the board said.

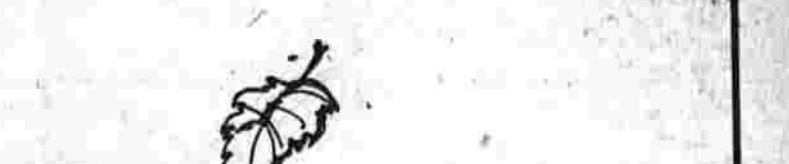
Such achievements may include advances in government, education, housing, jobs or taxing district (and a meter-free Main St.), the Teen Center, and three new school additions on the basis for the application.

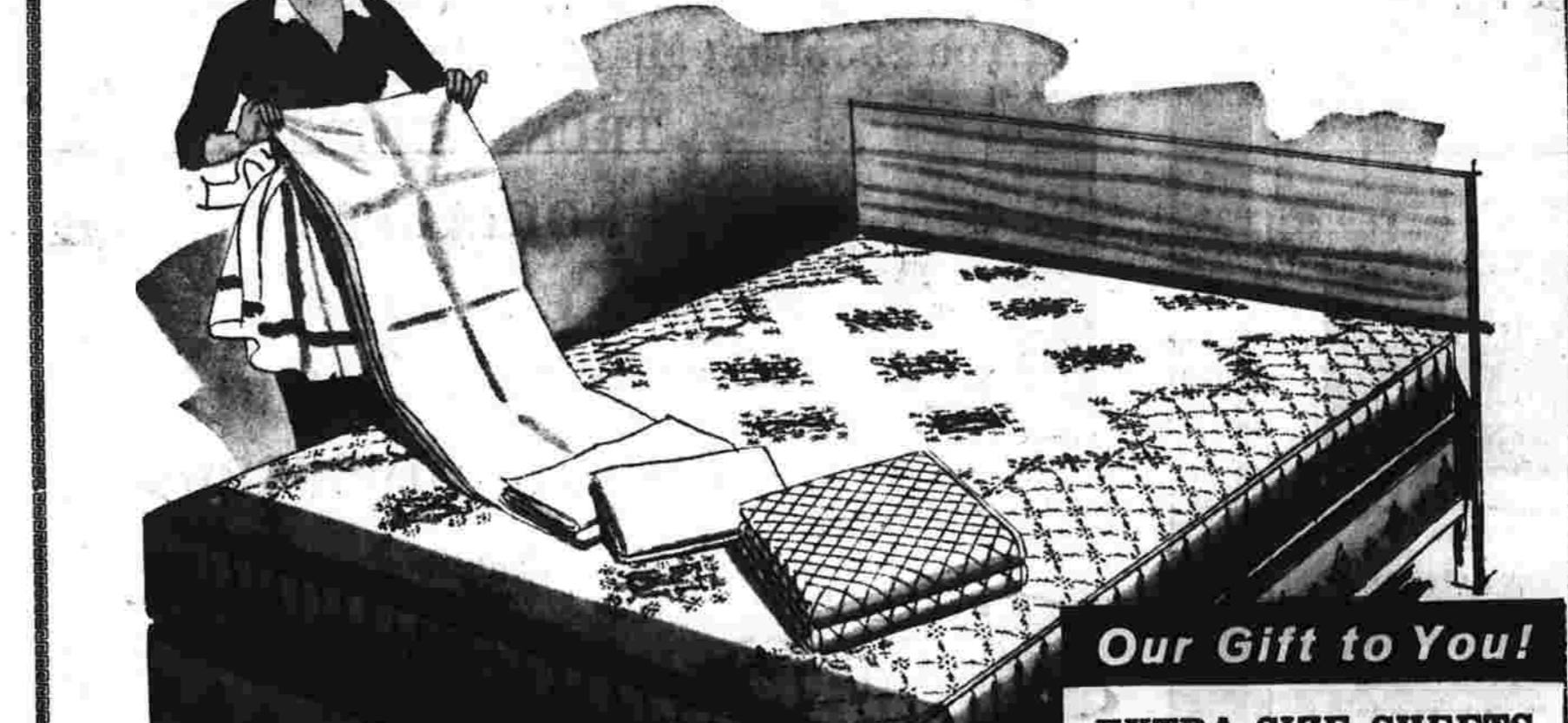

Lodge Will Speak Tonight At High School Auditorium

Former governor John D. Lodge, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, will speak tonight at 8:30 at Manchester High School Auditorium.

Lodge's talk, and a talk on Monday by incumbent U.S. Senator Thomas J. Dodd, are being sponsored by the non-partisan Manchester Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Besides serving as governor of Connecticut from 1961 to 1963, Lodge was a U.S. Representative from 1947 to 1961 and was ambassador to Spain under the Eisenhower administration. He lives now in Westport.

Lodge's talk tonight will be the last event in a day-long campaign tour of the state. He will appear at 7:30 p.m. in Tolland and at 8:30 in Manchester Center.

His talk here will be directed at policy matters, in keeping with the non-partisan nature of the sponsoring Jaycees.

Lodge will be introduced tonight by Francis DellaFera, Republican town chairman. Lodge will answer written questions from the audience, as time permits. Question will be collected and screened by members of the Jaycees.

The object of the film, said Walton, is "to depict the moral decay which has occurred in this country." He placed his cost at \$100,000—\$80,000 to produce and \$20,000 for television time.

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Life Sentence

Taft, who had a rugged primary contest with Ohio's experienced, vote-getting Secretary of State Ted W. Brown, has been running scared since, considering many of the 90-some independent and county fairs and crowd in the appearances wherever possible. He is introduced frequently as "Sen. Taft."

He counters Young's efforts to win too closely in Goldwater by noting that he voted for the civil rights bill while Goldwater opposed it, and that they differ on other issues although both are conservatives.

Taft hammers at the theme of a need for a Congress that is not a rubber stamp for the president. His backers think he will take some of Cleveland's traditional Democratic vote away from Young, an opinion of course not shared by Democrats.

Taft is from Cincinnati; Young from Cleveland. Both live in suburban areas.

While his father had the initials "A," Taft does not like it. "It's to his name to have would be less confusion between him and his famous father. Like Young, he is an attorney and a veteran.

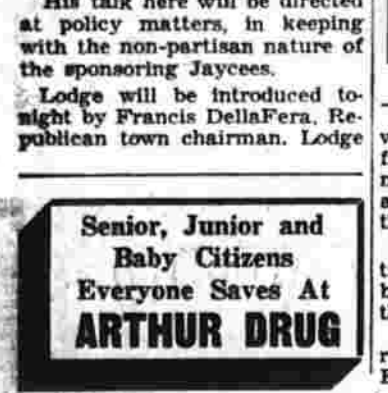

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Rockville-Vernon Road Repair Rebates Spark Controversy

The first pro-consolidation argument to the city of about \$43,000, controversy began taking shape last night when first selectman Samuel W. Pearl dismissed a request from Rockville's Mayor Leo B. Flaherty to correct an inequity between the city and the town over road maintenance.

During the past three or four years, the town has been reimbursing the city for part of the city's road maintenance expenses.

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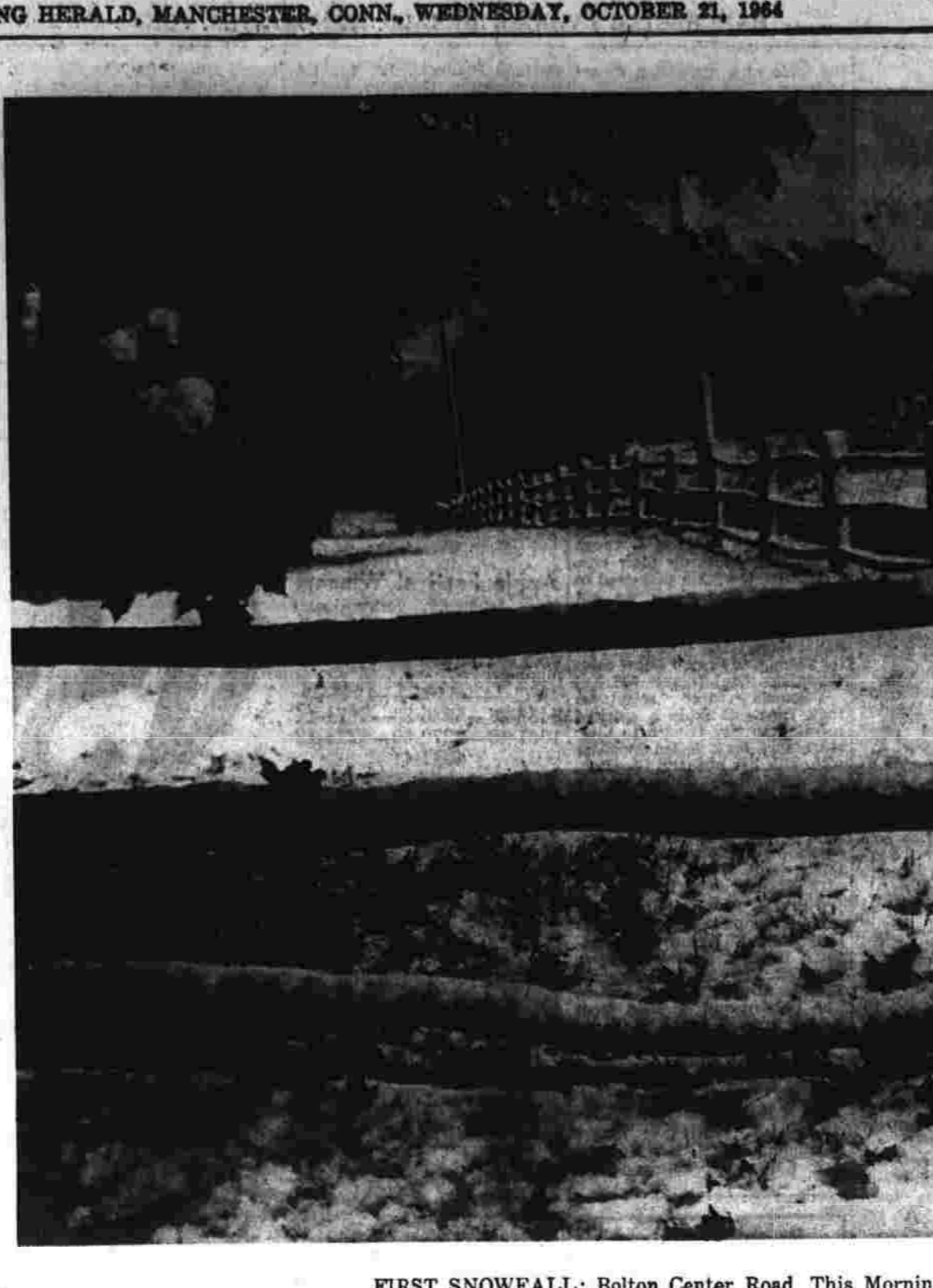

Hoover was only the second president of the century to be defeated after one term. The other was William Howard Taft, who later became Chief Justice of the United States.

Hoover's final illness began abruptly last Saturday with a massive hemorrhage of the stomach and intestinal area.
