The One Thing We Have For 19 years now the United Nations has been this world's only practical hope of achieving for itself a system of sur-

During this time it itself has fought and won a "police action" in Korea, thus restraining aggression without letting aggression expand and deteriorate into world war. During this time it has prevented and halted war in the Near East, over Suez, and in the Congo, and in Cyprus. The only war it hasn't been able to do anything about in this period has been the war in Southeast Asia, where the big powers have so far refused to grant it jurisdiction.

Not a single one of the good historic accomplishments of the United Nations has come without controversy, without trouble, without dissension within the organization itself, without moments of hair-line drama in which the fate of the world seemed to hang on a thread, or on the precise interpretation of a single word. The United Nations, and the world peace, have been living from hand to mouth.

More and more, as the United Nations has managed to continue its existence, it has become factional and political. Perhaps neither side of the great world political division is yet ready to tional status similar to that of a political party in a democracy, but the actual situation is getting to be that there are world parties, two main world parties at the moment, at least, plus some splinter parties and blocs which may sometimes hold the balance of power between the two main parties.

In any case, no single nation can dominate the United Nations any more, and no single party can exercise unchallenged or permanent control over its

And all this, even though it annoys some, and troubles policy makers, and even causes occasional outbursts against the institution itself, is to the good. We want the United Nations to become more and more political, like a world Congress or a world Parliament, because politics is the science of conducting joint business in spite of differences. The joint business is that of sur-

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



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
