



At Its Own Heart, A Failure The Springfield Union, endorsing nator Goldwater, made a concise ap

peal on one particular issue, which it described as a choice between philosophies of government. It believed Mr. Goldwater "could call a halt to the expansion of centralized power, the mushrooming of schemes to remake society, the continuous spending on ill-advised projects."

The New Haven Register, endorsing Senator Goldwater, said it did so "on the basis of its long-held faith in conservative political principles, and on the basis of his support of these principles."

"You know in your hearts," the Register told its readers, 'that this country of ours became the greatest country is the world for the freedom of man, offering the highest standard of personal living and the fullest total of national strength because it was built on individual 'get-up-and-go'-not on pressuregroup 'gimmes.' "

The Register, in its detailed discussion of the campaign, branched off into considerable emphasis of foreign policy, with repeated use of the theme that the Communists achieve tougher policies than we do.

But when it comes down to the cenral issue, the backers of Goldwater who want to put their reasoning in type find theory that this could be an opportunity for the American people to make a reponsible shift in their general philosohical direction.

As for the history and behavior of Senator Goldwater in relation to the issue his best-reasoning backers like to make the central issue, that falls into ....

In the first phase, there lies the oraorical and the voting record of Mr. foldwater as a member of the Senate. There, quite obviously, he availed himself of the personal privilege of being a happy againster. He was not, by his votes, deciding issues, or preventing things from happening. It was not, on the other hand, as light a thing as merey establishing himself as a nostalgic eccentric. He was making points, by his speeches and his votes, for an attitude which could conceivably become a cause, and which might some day take over a party. It was the way he himself wanted to live and function and vote; it committed no one else; Mr. Goldwater was free as any maverick can be free. If he attracted admirers, that made for more action and more fun.

It was in this, the first phase of Mr. Goldwater's public life, that he made his own clearest and most uninhibited pronouncements and votes, in which he was able to express his own sentiments and nostalgias and regrets without ever taking responsibility for anything that was or was not going to happen. The voters of his own state rather liked this clear and reckless behavior on the extremely conservative side of national

policy, and gave him a reelection. This reelection in Arizona proved "s right-winger can win," and the seeming emonstration of this was probably the spark for the formation of the nucleus of the movement which was to win the somination at San Francisco last sum-

. . . The moment Mr. Goldwater himself came to think of himself as a candidate for the Presidency, the moment he began to fight public battles for that nomination, he began to feel twinges of rospective and actual responsibility. First, he became aware that his chances of success in seeking nomination and election might depend upon some polite tailoring of some of his views. Second, he became aware that if he were ever to be a President, he might not be able to act the way he had been speaking and voting in the past. So Mr. oldwater began to introduce touches of reservation and qualification into his sublic remarks. He would do such hing as say in Hartford—just about s er ago that he believed "the United tions was here to stay, for the time ing." The idea that the United Naions should stay was his concession to prospective new kind of policy relity; the qualification "for the being" was the tag end conces-

inflationary. In this phase of Mr. Goldwater's campaigning and standing, he seemed to be ndulging in off-hand, almost spur of the moment, compromises between the complete negativism of his own record in he past and some new position which he seemed to think might come closer to the mood of the people or the realities of the office he was seeking. This second phase of Mr. Goldwater's philosophical position, of some random and flimsy adjustment in the way he used to speak and vote, had its moments on the way toward San Francisco, and has made its reappearances since then. The San Francisco acceptance speech was, by contrast, early, undiluted Goldwater, with the free-wheeling negativism of the past buttressed, momentarily, by a collection of platitudes so very well turned the most artistic of them all, about extremism and moderation, seem-

ed a boomerang. We have won the nomination, the scceptance speech seemed to say, so let us have done with any polite attempts to adjust toward center. Let us be, once again, what we were before we began.

But this kind of declaration from the actual holder of the nomination for President of a great political party was not merely something colorfully amusing. It began to wake the Republicans themselves up to what they now had in hand, in nomination.

There was one brief third phase, a one-day stand, almost, and nothing

This was when, back in Arizona, after

his post-nomination adjustments and rests and conferences, Senator Goldwater took to the platform with a carefully written set speech in which he for the first time, undertook an orderly discussion of issues, and in which he offered, for the first time, a voluntary adjustment of some of his own most famous promises and assurances. That speech at Prescott, with its beginning of a discussion of some of the difficulties and adjustments and compromises that would have to be involved in any attempt to carry out the Goldwater set of promises, represented a fleeting prospect that the 1964 campaign might get down to a serious discussion of things that ought to be done, from the conservative philosophy point of view, and of how they would have to be done, in the United States and the world of

This was Senator Goldwater's big, but lonely, and entirely temporary gesture of an approach to the middle of the road. He himself cancelled out most of the speech, hardly minutes after its any change in his philosophy or his approach. The kind of discussion which was begun in the set speech at Prescott has not been resumed.

It is still possible, in spite of this record of campaign performance, or the lack of it, to take it as a matter of faith that Barry Goldwater would intend, if elected President, to fulfil the general philosophical promises which have created his own personal appeal. But there has been no spectacle of the candidate himself settling down to competence on methods and techniques; the candidate has not disciplined himself to eliminate his own confusion in the realm of cause and effect; he has not come down to that prospective responsibility which might be a bridge between the big handsome and careless promises of his early career and the needs of voters who would like to see something of a change in American directions, but not a change which would take America off the road alto-

Even on what might have been his own best and central issue, the one issue where he might have found his greatest number of fellow Americans waiting and willing to join him, Mr. Goldwater has not made his own case and argumentconvincing and consistent enough to hold even conservative Americans. It is at what should have been its own very heart that the Goldwater campaign has failed itself most conspicuously.
