... world issues was not included on the agenda when Pope John's council met in October 1962. But Leo J. Cardinal Ruffini, a leading theologian and closest personal collaborator of Pope Paul VI, suggested that such a topic be drafted.

The fourth chapter is titled "The Principal Duties Required of Present-day Christians."

The first section, on human dignity, says that laws should uphold the essential dignity of all, regardless of race, sex or social condition. It says Catholics should be stationed at the front lines of the struggle to maintain the dignity of the human person.

The section on marriage and family says that the purpose of marriage is procreation and education of children and mutual perfection and sanctification of man and wife. It notes that the church is not bound to reconcile occasional need to "tender parenting" with the "tender parenting" of the church.

October in India Was Win for Evil

 NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Good should triumph over evil in October, 1964 will go down as a win for evil.

In the first place, there wasn't enough of the rich sweets and cakes Indians love to eat during the annual Dussehra festival. These 10 wonderful days of eating, dancing and singing commemorates the homecoming of the Hindu god Rama who led an army of monkeys to Capone to battle the demon King Ravana and recover his kidnapped wife.

The tale of victory by Rama, good over Ravana, evil, is dear to Indians. With fireworks, burning effigies and feasts they turn it into a combined Christmas, Thanksgiving, Day and Fourth of July.

Marriages often are scheduled for this time of year in hope a little of Rama's success will rub off on the newlyweds. Each family tries to outdo its neighbors in entertaining with elaborate meals and merriment.

This year, with a crippling nationwide food shortage, many families "lost face" because they couldn't offer guests even a cup of sugared coffee or a handful of sweets.

Biographers who had festival foods available raised prices beyond reach of many Indians. And there were the usual power failures in the capital, sickness from contaminated water, and government fumbling.

By this time, Dussehra for many was not much fun. Then came serious developments on the international scene.

Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri returned empty-headed from the Cairo nonaligned conference. There were fears the nonaligned diplomacy, India's concept of an active force to assist good against evil, was seriously weakened if not discredited.

A few days later the festivities were dampened further by the political game of musical chairs in Moscow.

Nikita Khrushchev, left standing when the music stopped, had been considered a tried and true friend in India — a best factor who, though he didn't

TWO-OR-THREE LANE HIGHWAYS

FOUR-LANE (OR MORE) HIGHWAYS DIVIDED

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — With an almost astonishing show of independence, Czechoslovakia is shaping up a new modified free-enterprise economic system, and at the same time objecting to attacks on Nikita Khrushchev. The Czechoslovakian Communist Central Committee already has approved a new economic plan going far beyond any program the Soviet Union or other states have approved. But on top of this came a new show of daring for Czechoslovakia in the face of official Soviet criticism of the record of Khrushchev. The Czechoslovakian party Central Committee adopted a resolution expressing "surprise and emotion" at his remarks. But even more impressive to observers in Prague was the new economic plan, already approved in principle by the Central Committee, giving industrial managers many of the powers exercised in the free enterprise Western countries. The new plan was forced on the Czechoslovakian economy by a steady downhill slide in production. The rate of increase in production has slowed down to most other Socialist states, including the Soviet Union, but

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A long black limousine glides up to a modern apartment house on Madrid's fashionable Generalissimo Avenue. A husky footman-bodyguard springs from the right front seat, two Spanish police guards snap to attention at the building entrance. From the car emerges Maria Martinez Trujillo, widow of the former dictator of the Dominican Republic and titular head of the fabulously wealthy, exiled Trujillo clan. Constitutional Amendments, Liquor Issue on Machines

Manchester voters, next Tuesday, in addition to voting for a president, vice president, senator, congressman, registrar of voters and justices of the peace, will be confronted with four questions, three proposed state constitutional amendments and one local question. The local question is on the Sunday sale of liquor and reads: "Shall the sale of alcoholic liquors in the Town of Manchester be permitted on Sundays, between the hours of 12 noon and 9 p.m., in hotels, restaurants and clubs, as proposed by petition?" The petition referred to was presented to the board of directors in September for possible action on a permissive, low-licensing ordinance. The board refused to take any action other than to refer the question to the voters on Nov. 2 at the date for a referendum on the proposal. The three questions pertaining to state constitutional amendments concern: 1. Voting requirements for amendments to the state constitution. The proposal would require the general assembly (Senate and House of Representatives) to approve a constitutional amendment by a two-thirds majority of those present at the time of the vote. It would change the present law which provides for passage by a two-thirds majority of the entire membership. 2. Removal of the present one-year state residency requirement for new voters, in favor of a six-month residency requirement. 3. Provision for voting by absentee ballots on religious holidays by those unable to appear in person because of rules of their religion.
