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"THE WAY I HEARD IT"

The opera season will open Saturday at the Bushnell with the production of "The Pearl Fishery" by Bizet. Some of you will be going to an opera for the first time; others will have seen one or two operas and will be wondering whether it's all worthwhile; a few will be veteran attendants. But even the seasoned veterans miss much because it's the thing to do. A great many people go only once and decide that opera is not for them. The reason is that they don't really know what to expect, and don't understand the medium when they go. Usually they envision some sort of high-class musical comedy, a sort of superior "My Fair Lady." Opera, however, is no more like a musical comedy than a circus is like a carnival. Of course I know there are people who cannot distinguish between these forms of entertainment, either.

Let's start with the libretto, or "the book" on which the opera is based. Many people get the libretto in advance of their first opera, read it and are immediately disappointed, so they do not go. It is a questionable state of mind at the outset, prepared to dislike what they are about to see and hear.

Most opera librettos are in verse, so right off the bat there is a distinct change in thinking habits required of the reader. You can read Shakespeare, for example, in the same fashion of mind as you would approach "Death of a Salesman." The more fact that this is a verse drama, and that it is one so few people can realize.

Opera is not realistic. It never has been, and although modern composers try a realistic approach, their efforts are unsuccessful. Sometimes they achieve some sort of theatrical success, but realize there is no realism, even if they set a prose book to music.

There is the matter of music, well. Just as people don't go around spouting poetry, neither do they go around singing their every thought. Nor are they accompanied by a symphonic orchestra. Essentially, opera is music created from drama floating around in the air, but it is the music and its expression that are important to this art-form, not the drama or the plot nor the acting ability of the singer. These help, of course, but the music comes first.

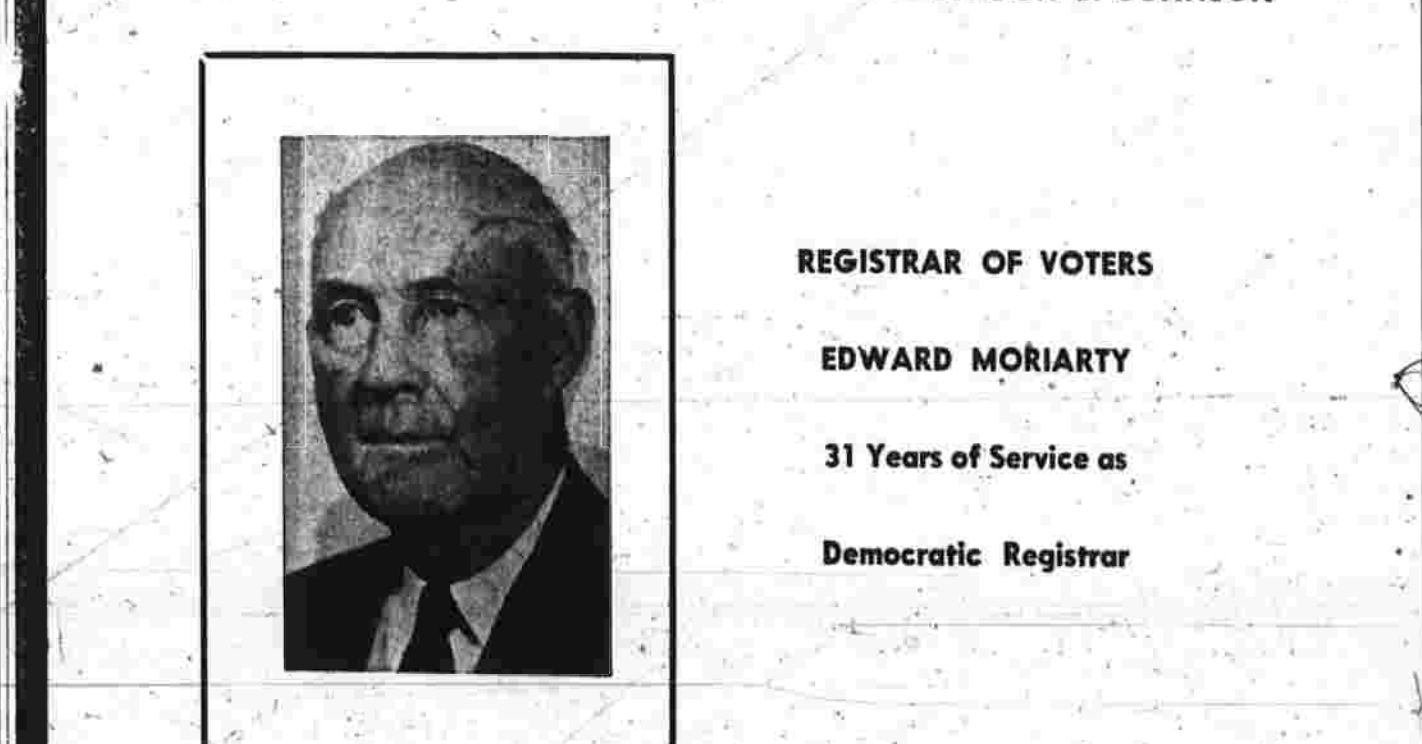

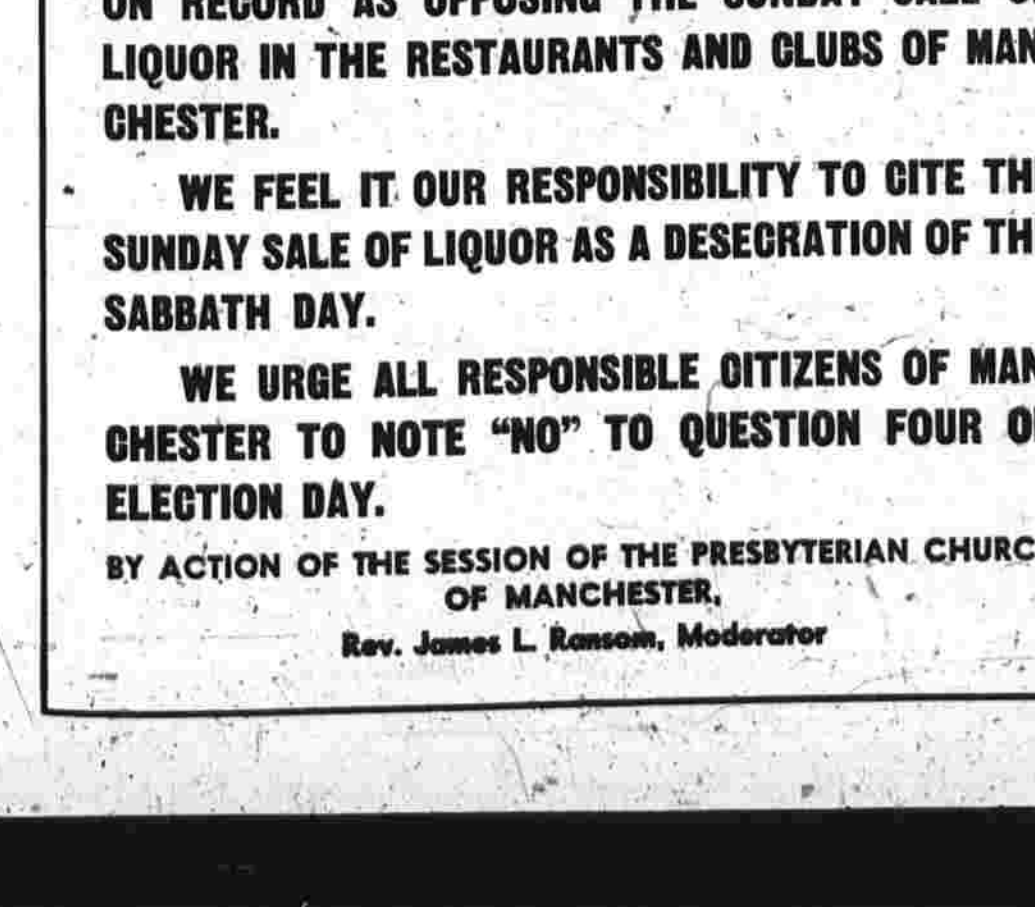

Billy Graham Urged to Say How He'll Vote

MONTREAT, N.C. (AP) - Evangelist Billy Graham, noting his family is "politically divided," says he will remain strictly neutral despite thousands of requests that he take a stand in the presidential election.

"My wife does not even know for whom I am going to vote," Graham said Sunday in a statement.

Dr. Graham issued the statement after learning there was "considerable comment" about the appearance of his 16-year-old daughter, Anne, at a Columbia, S.C., rally for Republican presidential candidate Barry Goldwater Saturday night.

He described his daughter as a "beautiful, intelligent high school senior who has a growing interest in civic and social affairs."

Noting he and his wife have taught their five children "to think independently," Dr. Graham said some of the family supports President Johnson while some are for Goldwater.

The evangelist said he had received hundreds of telegrams and thousands of letters urging that he endorse one or the other presidential candidate.

The Western Union office at Richmond, Va., had to call in extra employees Sunday to handle 3,000 Richmond-area messages and about 20,000 for other points in the Virginia-North Carolina region. Most urged Graham to back Goldwater.

Telegrams poured into Western Union offices at Phoenix and Tucson in Arizona; Port Worth, Odessa, Midland and San Angelo in Texas; and at Kansas City, Mo.

Western Union officials in Phoenix alone reported receiving more than 5,000 telegrams to Graham.

The Western Union in Minneapolis, headquarters for the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, Inc., said it had not received an unusual number of telegrams for the evangelist.

About 20,000 circulars prepared by the Minnesota Citizens for Goldwater and saying Graham supports campaign issues stressed by Goldwater were distributed Sunday on car windshields outside churches in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area.

"I have the privilege of being personal, long-time friends with both President Johnson and Senator Goldwater," Graham said. "Both President Johnson and Richard Nixon have advised me on several occasions to stay out of politics and I intend to follow their advice."

"The ultimate answer to the world's problems does not lie in any political party, but in the reign of the kingdom of God in the hearts of men."

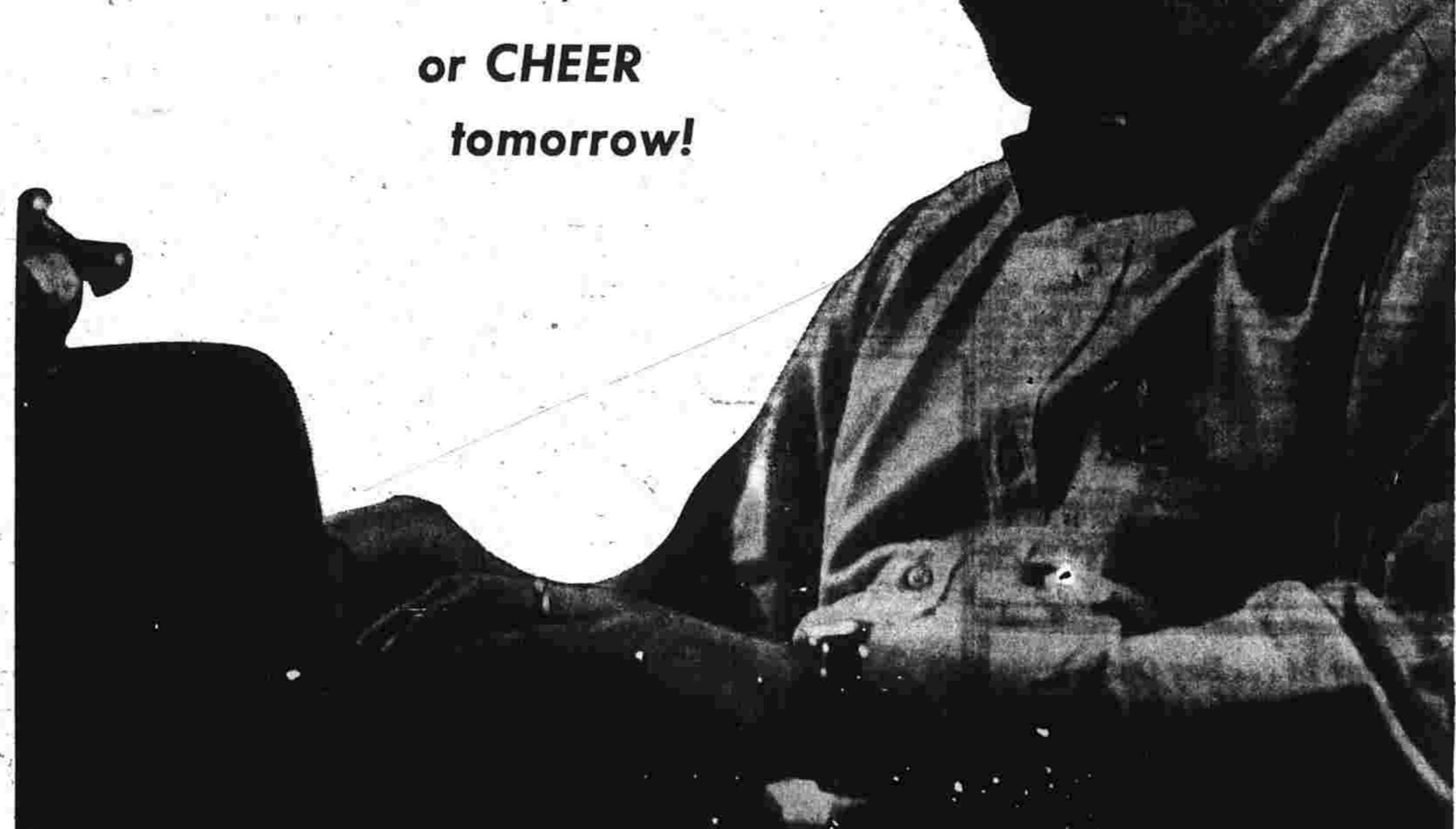

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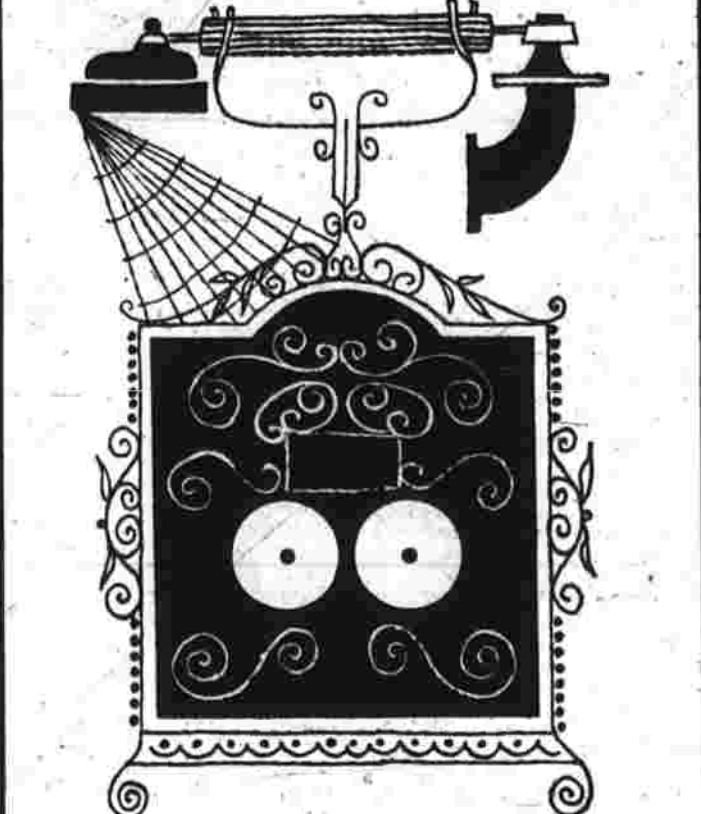

Prize Oxen Are His Hobby

Although he calls it a "foolish hobby," R. Kneeland Jones of Bolton is justifiably proud of the ribbons he has won in co-draws at fairs all over Connecticut and beyond in the past eight to ten years.

Jones, a retired dairy farmer, and his wife live in a neat white cape on their former "Oxera" farm at the first top of Bolton Center. Houses have sprung up along the road, but the fields in back are still vacant. Motorists can often see a red-brown "pair of oxen grazing in the corner field above Clark Rd.

At 77, Jones seems as happy with his own as a youngster with his 4-H calves. He also has two cows and ten sheep.

The first year he has owned four pairs of oxen at once. (Oxen are really steers once used to clear the fields of rocks and so called "stone breakers" but this is loaded with cement blocks and the contest is to "draw" increasing weights over a three- or six-foot course.)

The oxen are entered in classes according to their weight. Jones said that when a pair of oxen drew as much as 100 pounds by limiting food and water to get them under



the wire. He mentioned a school principal who weighs all feed, water and hay scientifically. Although Jones admits he sometimes cuts down on feed and water the night before a fair, he vowed that "you never hear my cattle bellow for want of something to eat."

Jones went further ahead than usual this fall and brought back a fourth prize in type of competition new to him and his oxen. At the Fryeburg, Maine, fair, the contest was for the greatest distance in a prescribed time.

This is the first year Jones has not done the "driving" of the oxen himself at the fairs, leaving it to his friend George Cavanaugh, who has won a blue ribbon as the best driver in the 2,800 pound class at almost every fair. His friend Tom Daley drives the truck that carries the oxen.

Jones says he buys his pairs when they are about two months old and starts to train them "as soon as I get home if it isn't too dark." At first a ring holds their ropes together. Later, they are yoked, then pull a chain between them, then a

Sitting in the heap of satin is a trophy for the championship in the annual eastern sea coast ox-draw under 2,700 lb. class, won in Chester Oct. 18, 1963. Although the prize brings cash as well as glory, Jones said he just about makes expenses.

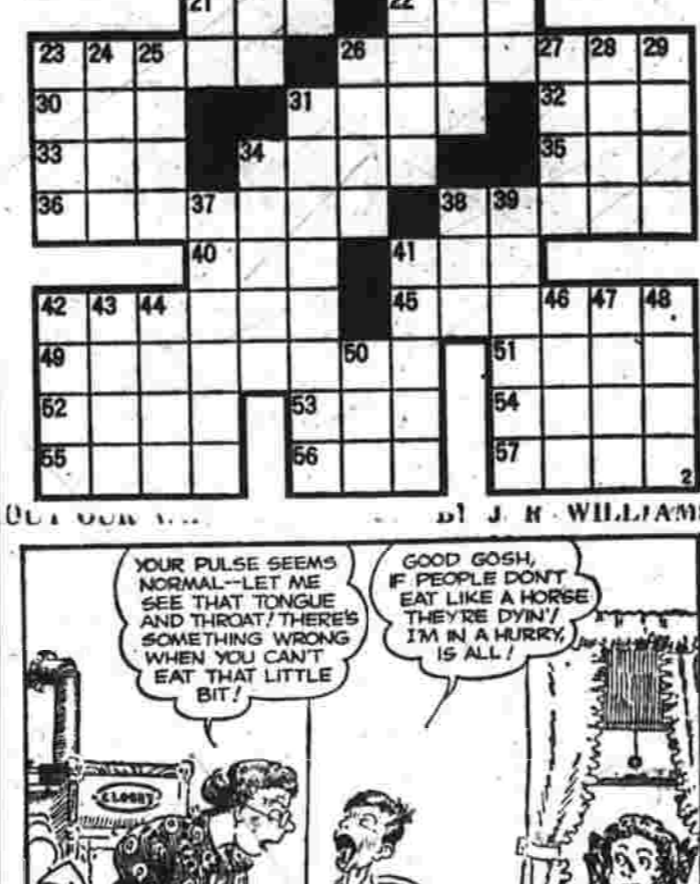

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Voting Across Nation Both Early and Heavy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Americans got out early and in big numbers today to register their choice between Lyndon B. Johnson and Barry Goldwater for president.

A morning spot check by Associated Press member newspapers and bureaus across the nation brought reports of moderate to heavy voting. The weather was generally favorable, and it appeared probable that the advance forecast of a record 1 million ballots would be reached, if not surpassed.

There was a scattering of precincts, however, where the voting was reported to be running somewhat below the 1960 turnout when there were fewer voters in the national total of 68.4 million.

Since there are more registered Democrats than registered Republicans, backers of Johnson believed a heavy turnout was favorable to their candidate, the overwhelming favorite in all the polls.

On the other hand, Goldwater's supporters have argued that in past elections many conservative-minded voters have stayed at home, believing there was no great choice between the candidates. Their hope was that Goldwater's name past stay-at-homes were taking the opportunity to vote for a conservative candidate.

As always, there was a race by a few isolated precincts to be first in the nation with all votes in and counted. Dixville Notch, Vt., with all its votes in right after midnight, all eight went for Goldwater, which meant none of the registered Republicans had split a vote.

Johnson was the first voter to cast his ballot in his precinct—a 4 in Essex County, Vt. Mrs. Johnson was second. They voted the straight Democratic ticket.

Johnson seemed to be confident of victory. Asked by a newsmen what he would do to heal the wounds of his campaign, Johnson replied: "I'm going to try to make the government as bipartisan as possible."
