

# LBJ Leads Democratic Voting Deluge

## Bolivian Regime Falls Revolt Spreading, President Escapes

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP)—President Victor Paz Estenssoro was overthrown today and apparently fled the country.

He left the government palace at 8:45 a.m. with his principal aide, Gen. Alfredo Ovando Candia, after a spreading military revolt against his regime.

There was speculation he had gone to Chile or to Peru.

National police rebelled in La Paz today.

The loss of the police, who with the president's militia had helped quell an army revolt Tuesday in the capital, was the final blow to Paz Estenssoro's tottering regime.

The Interior Ministry said Paz Estenssoro had "gone to inspect his bases."

The Communist Radio Continental asserted the president had left at high speed in his car for the frontier of Peru.

The development came as the chief of the armed forces, negotiated with rebellious army and air force factions in an attempt to save the government.

The revolt was led by Vice President Rene Barrientos, who broke with Paz Estenssoro last month after the president cracked down on antigovernment students and a revolt of tin miners in the interior.

An air force general, Barrientos led the uprising from Cochabamba, 300 road miles south of La Paz. A military revolt broke out Tuesday in La Paz and army units in various parts of the country rallied to the vice president.

A communique signed by the army commander, Gen. Hugo Suarez Guzman, called on the nation to remain calm, and ambitious military officers ended the government palace and said they were taking it over in the name of Gen. Alfredo Ovando Candia, Ovando had called for unity of the armed forces and entered negotiations Tuesday with the rebels in Cochabamba.

As word spread of Paz Estenssoro's departure, Bolivians began surging into the streets of La Paz shouting "viva the army."

Military circles for several weeks had been discussing the necessity of a takeover to halt the downward economic slide of this land-locked nation, and to quiet unrest.

Apparently, Paz Estenssoro had overtaxed his welcome, because it was he who rammed through a constitutional amendment to permit him to run for a second consecutive term last May. Political opponents boycotted the election.

His election was followed by a teachers' strike for higher pay, which drew the sympathy of the students. The strike was settled but the students continued their agitation.

Leftist-led miners took up the banner of rebellion last month in a series of clashes, 17 persons were killed.

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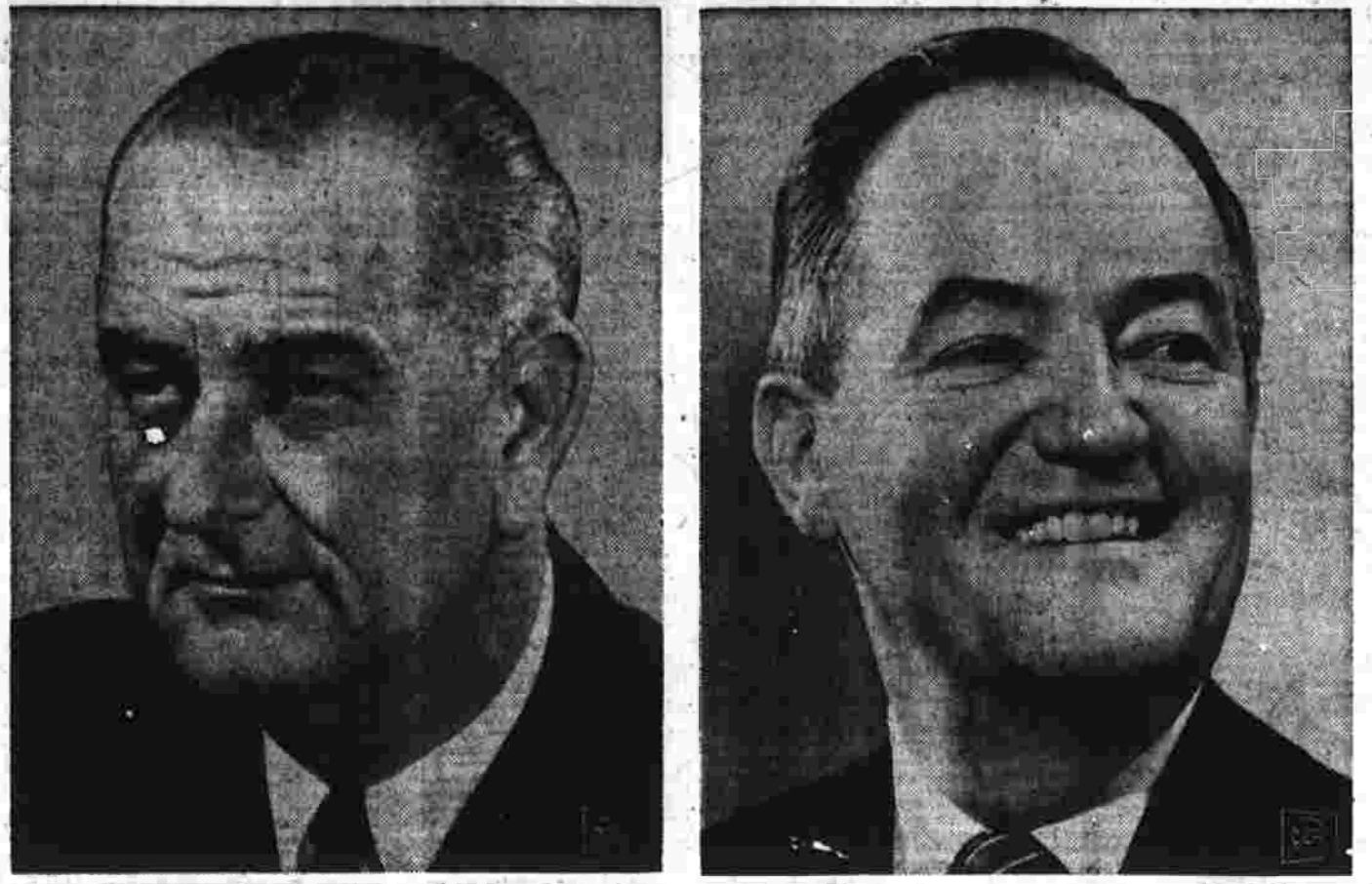

## Margin Soars Near Record of 15 Million

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lyndon B. Johnson's smashing landslide in the election sent his popularity margin soaring toward a record 15 million votes today. In triumph, he called for a united America facing the world as one.

In late morning, the one state still in doubt was Arizona, home of Republican Barry Goldwater who was deluged in the coast-to-coast tide of votes returning Johnson to the White House. Goldwater was leading in Arizona.

Johnson had won 44 states and a total of 486 electoral votes. He needed 270 to win. Goldwater had five states — Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina — for a total of 47.

There had been nothing like this since 1936 when Democrat Franklin D. Roosevelt carried all the states except Maine and Vermont.

In the popular vote Johnson was running ahead of Roosevelt, with about 53 per cent of the vote tabulated, Johnson's vote was 61.3 per cent of the total compared with 60.3 per cent given Roosevelt in 1936.

Johnson's sweep strengthened the Democratic party's hold on Congress. With 17 races still in doubt, the Democrats were assured of 281 seats in the House and the Republicans of 137.

In the Senate, the Democrats had 66 seats with holdovers and the Republicans 32.

Two Senate seats — in Ohio and Nevada — were still in doubt.

Republican Robert Taft Jr. had appeared in the early morning hours to be the winner in terms of votes rolled up and margin over his opponent.

Young into a narrow edge with the final outcome uncertain.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, elected vice president with Johnson, planned to fly to Texas to meet with Johnson.

The 56-year-old President, who has served 354 days since the assassination of John F. Kennedy, said early today "I am confident that the words were adequate to really express the feeling of this occasion."

"Most of all," he said, "I wish to be equal to your confidence and the hopes of all of the people of America."

He said that now that the election is over Americans must "face the world as one."

"I ask all those who supported me and all those that opposed me to forget our differences, because there are many more things in America that unite us than divide us."

Johnson won his first elective White House term by battering down the Republican bastions across the nation. Maine and Vermont fell in his column as did usually Republican Kansas.

Only in the South, where he lost five states, and possibly in Arizona, did his surge falter in the sweep toward the greatest presidential victory of modern times — the largest ever in terms of votes rolled up and margin over his opponent.

Sen. Goldwater, the conservative who offered "a choice, not a war," was elected vice president with Johnson.

## Assembly Convenes Tuesday

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. Dempsey will summon the legislature into special session next Tuesday to make another attempt to reapportion itself on an equal population basis.

He announced that all but special session notices would be prepared later today and delivered Thursday by State Police to the 330 lawmakers.

The federal court tribunal which has the legislative reapportionment issue under its wings suggested last week that a special session be called by Nov. 16 to tackle the job.

But the Governor said today, he preferred to get the legislature moving sooner and hence selected the Nov. 10 starting date. He said he had checked on the matter with both Republican State Chairman A. Searle Pinney and Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey.

The Governor said it would be up to the General Assembly to prepare its own work schedule to meet the Jan. 30 deadline.

The special session has two major tasks to perform:

Adopt a temporary Senate redistricting and House reapportionment plan, founded on an equal population basis for election of the next General Assembly.

Authorize and set up procedures for election of a state constitutional convention which would establish a "permanent" House-Senate redistricting commission to the voters for approval.

Failure to accomplish these chores, the court has decreed will leave the matter up to a special court-appointed "master" to do the job.

## State Democrats Cheering Greatest Election Victory

HARTFORD (AP) — Democrats held their greatest election victory in the state's history today atop a skynote vote for President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The President carried all but 11 of the state's 169 towns in rolling up a record plurality of more than 432,000 votes.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, Republican, led Connecticut Democrats to triumph in a U.S. Senate race and in six congressional contests.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd crushed Republican John Lodge for the Senate seat but his plurality was nearly 80,000 less than that of the President.

Complete unofficial returns gave Johnson 325,416 and Goldwater 392,556.

Dodd defeated Lodge by a vote of 179,252 to 423,374.

Democrats held their five congressional seats and took the sixth away from a Republican incumbent in the fourth district GOP stronghold.

Thousands of Republicans in ticket-splitting Connecticut aided the Johnson victory by rejecting their national ticket.

The outcome in the state was a humiliating defeat for the Goldwater faction in the badly split Republican state organization.

Goldwater won only 11 small towns in the state and some Dwight D. Eisenhower carried those by narrow margins.

Ninety-seven Republican towns in rock-ribbed GOP areas switched to the Democratic column. There were no switches to the Republican ticket.

The Goldwater towns were Hartland, Madison, Orange, Darlin, Easton, Monroe, Eastford, Canaan, Warren, Washington and Woodbury.

The Republican Senate Candidate and all of the GOP congressional candidates ran ahead of their national ticket.

Johnson won record victory margins in the state's four largest cities and ran up overwhelming pluralities in every other city.

He carried Hartford by 40,000 votes, Bridgeport by nearly 25,000, New Haven by 32,000 and Waterbury by 29,000.

Greenwich, the GOP's inner fortress in Fairfield County, went Democratic by the first time in memory in the presidential race while giving the Republican congressional candidate a plurality of nearly 5,000 votes.

Johnson recaptured Stamford, Norwalk and Manchester for the Democrats. Stamford gave him a plurality of 13,000, Norwalk 7,000 and Manchester nearly 4,000.

Johnson state plurality was the biggest since President Dwight D. Eisenhower carried the state by 308,000 in 1952. Eisenhower lost only six of the 169 towns.

John F. Kennedy carried the state by 91,000 in 1960, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, the previous Democratic record holder in a presidential election, won by only 104,000 votes in 1936.

Ninety-five per cent of the 1,279,029 registered voters in the state as of Aug. 31 (the latest official figure) went to the polls yesterday.

Johnson won 67.8 per cent of the presidential vote, Goldwater, 22.2 per cent.

It was the most crushing Republican defeat since Abraham Lincoln, now a U.S. Senator, was reelected governor in 1958 by a record gubernatorial plurality of 248,000 votes.

The Republican state organization today found itself in pretty much the same position that it was in then.

The moderate wing in the party had been defeated by conservative faction led by former State Comptroller Fred R. Zeller.

The state organization has been split by intra-party fights since.

## Goldwater Intends To Stay at Helm

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater wired his congratulations today to President Johnson, landslide victor in the presidential race. Despite his overwhelming loss, the beaten Republican nominee made clear he intended to remain at the helm of the Republican party.

The Arizona senator said he will have plenty of time to devote to leading and strengthening the party, "being unemployed as of Jan. 2."

But Goldwater said, in what he intends to do.

"I don't feel that the conservative cause has been hurt," he said.

Goldwater said 1968 is a long time off. But "as of now, I would think they would probably pick another man to run."

But as of now, that would be fine with me.

He said the traditional role of the national ticket, even a beaten one, is to strive, lead and strengthen the party.

"I have no bitterness, no rancor at all," Goldwater said after he strolled to the rostrum of the plush desert motel, smiling.

despite his overwhelming defeat, his telegram to Johnson, Goldwater said:

"Congratulations on your victory. I will help you in any way I can toward achieving a growing and better America."

"The role of the Republican party will remain in that temper, but it also remains in the party of the opposites when the opposition is called for."

"There is much to be done in Viet Nam. One of the problems of law and order in this country, and I know all America will join with you in an honest solution of these problems."

Goldwater told newsmen and a television audience he thought his role in the party would be to work with leaders in Congress and to raise funds for the party.

The Republican nominee said "being unemployed, I will have a lot of time to devote to the party."

Goldwater said his defeat, "to some degree, although not a major degree," was caused by Republicans who would "not work for the top of the ticket."

Speaking of the turnout for Johnson, Goldwater said, "He did a wonderful job and as a politician, I have to congratulate him for it."

The justice the peace vote was 13,402 for the Democrats, 7,958 for the Republicans.

Variations from this straight party vote show the general direction of ticket splitting. The presidential ticket ran furthest ahead, with a plurality of almost 5,000 votes. Daddario as ran ahead of the party tally with a plurality of about 6,600 votes.

U.S. Senator Thomas J. Dodd seems to have been the only Democratic coastal rider. His plurality was about 5,100—about 600 votes behind the probable straight party vote.

The recipient of the Dodd defections was Republican John Lodge, who ran at the head of the GOP with a total vote of 7,900.

The Republican party lever vote, estimated on the basis of the justices of the peace tally, was about 7,500; the presidential ticket of Barry Goldwater and William Miller ran last, winning only 6,600 votes of a total of more than 21,000 votes cast.

The town is split into five voting districts; the figures from each show about the same pattern, although District 5 and 6 appear to have the most who favored the Republicans.

The official tabulation is printed elsewhere in The Herald.

The total vote cast for party candidates in the presidential race, including more than 1,200 absentee ballots, was \$1,149,422.

## First Since FDR LBJ Wins Big Margin In Manchester Vote

By a margin of better than 2 to 1, Manchester voters yesterday declared themselves squarely behind the presidential ticket of Lyndon B. Johnson and Hubert H. Humphrey. The only other Democratic presidential candidate ever to win Manchester was Franklin D. Roosevelt who carried the town in 1936, 1940 and 1944 by pluralities ranging from 129 to 385. President Johnson's plurality in town was more than 8,000 votes.

The winning ticket carried with it by not so large a margin—all the Democrats on the ballot: U.S. Senator Thomas J. Dodd, U.S. Representative Emilio Daddario, Registrar of Voters Edward F. Moriarty and a state of justices of the peace. Republican Registrar Frederick E. Peck and a slate of GOP justices of the peace were also elected, because the two parties between them nominated only a few candidates as there were available posts.

The voters approved by margins of more than 3 to 1 a set of amendments to the State Constitution. About 11,000 persons voted on the questions.

Half again as many voted on a proposal to allow the Sunday sale of liquor in Manchester, and turned it down by a few more than 2,000 votes.

The voters endorsement of the Johnson-Humphrey ticket was apparently responsible for the Democratic party's performance in Manchester.

Although the Republicans still have an edge in the number of registered voters in town, even the least contested justices of the peace race—the one most likely to show how many people voted a straight party ticket—gave the Democrats a margin of more than 8,000 votes.

## Sunday Sale Loses Again In Town Vote

Manchester will remain dry on Sunday, as a result of yesterday's 57 per cent vote against a proposal to permit the sale of alcoholic beverages, the Sunday hours of noon and 9 p.m., in local restaurants, clubs and hotels. The question drew 15,827 voters, with 9,024 voting "no" and 6,803 "yes."

The proposed measure, backed by the Manchester Restaurant Association and fought by the Manchester Council of Churches, drew tremendous interest, as evidenced by the fact that about 5,500 more people voted on this question than voted for the other three questions on the voting machines.

The last time the question was voted upon at a town-wide referendum was on Sept. 20, 1955, when it was defeated by a better than 2 to 1 plurality, 4,119 to 1,966. It had the same opponents and backers then as it had yesterday.

The history of Sunday sale of liquor in Manchester goes back to Oct. 1, 1917, when the town voted to go bone dry, seven days a week.

However, the following year, on Oct. 7, 1918, the town voted again, and permitted liquor six days a week, but kept the ban for Sundays.

In 1920, the national prohibition amendment (Volstead Act) went into effect and the town, by the rest of the country, was dry until 1933, when the 18th Amendment was repealed.

The sale of liquor was permitted again locally, but only for six days a week, with Sunday sales still banned.

In October 1939, an attempt was made to remove the Sunday ban, but the proposal was defeated by a townwide vote.

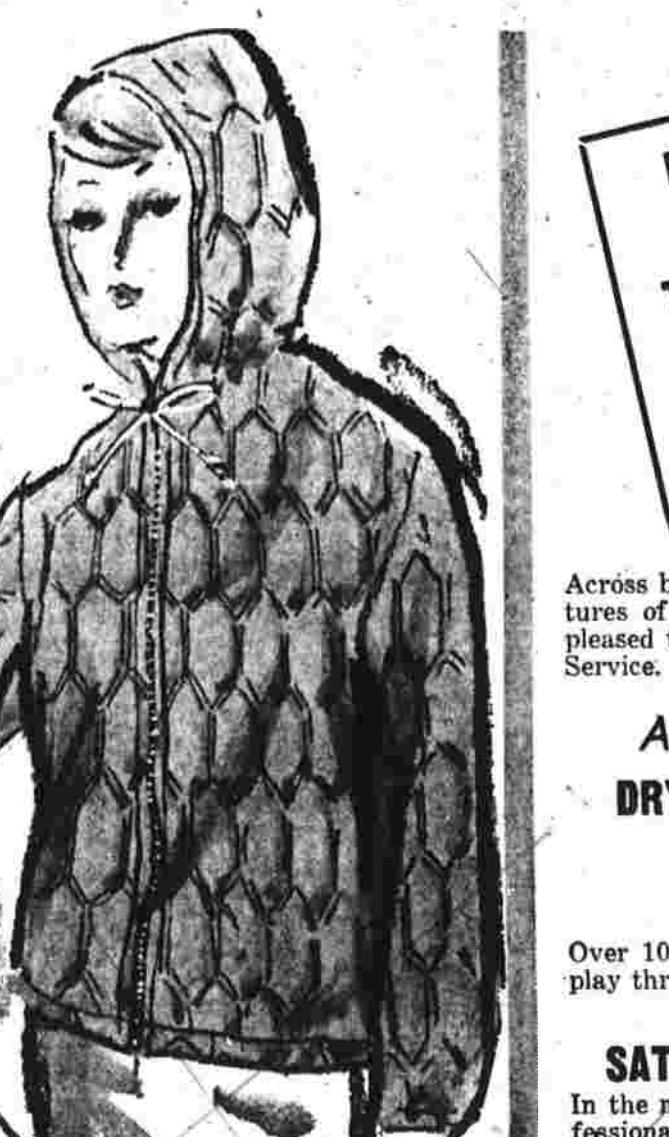

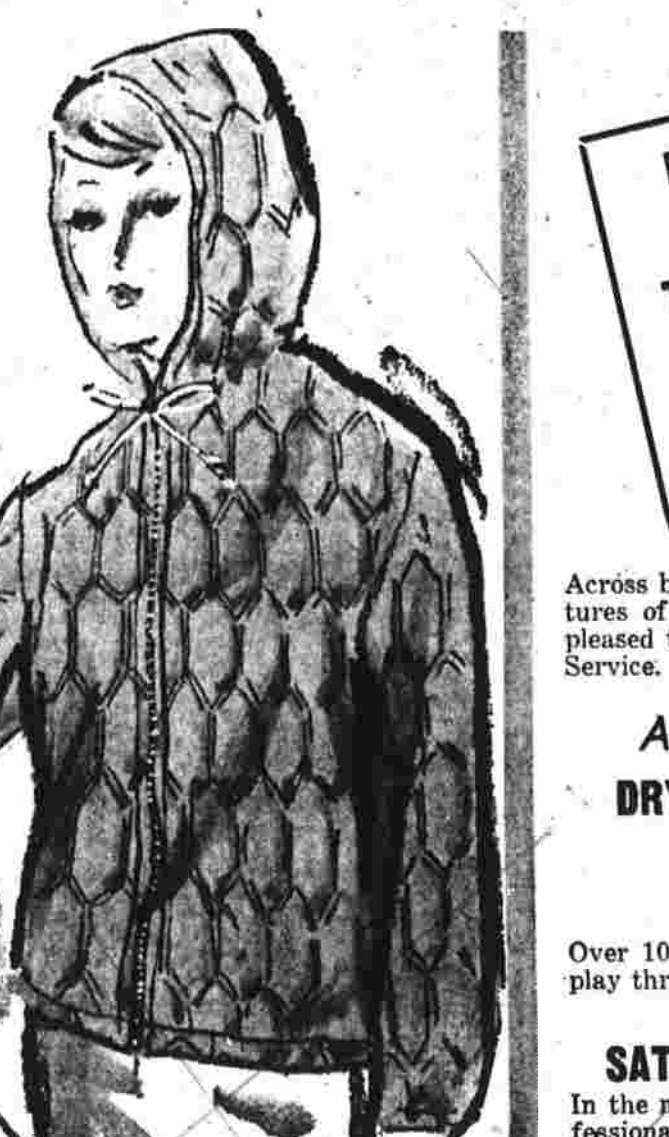

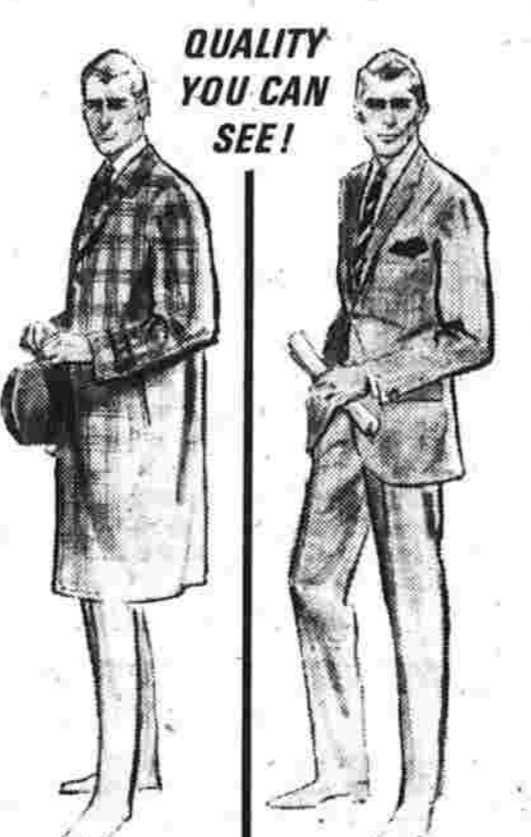

### Rockville-Vernon Votes Close Between the City, Town

The closest result of yesterday's elections were the total vote cast between the City of Rockville and Vernon's rural district. Five votes separated the two areas, as district residents cast a total of 4,375 votes, the city recorded 4,380 votes.

Political newcomer Belton Copp of Old Lyme, opposing incumbent Congressman William St. Cyr, a Democrat, led his party's ticket. He squeaked ahead of Republican senatorial candidate John Lodge by 13 votes. Lodge received 3,050 to Copp's 3,063.

District voters gave Richard Nyte three votes for president; Henry Cabot Lodge three votes; Gov. William Scranton three votes and Harold Stassen, one vote.

One complaint was received by voting officials regarding the party levers on voting machines. The complainant, a city resident, complained before he entered the voting booth, and Moderator Robert W. Deming called the secretary of state's office for instructions.

A college folk music quartet complete with banjo and a washbasin bass fiddle, entertained the large crowd at GOP headquarters.

A number of younger workers, most too young to vote, sat around a tape recorder listening to a speech by Alabama Gov. George Wallace.

Thomas Carruthers, GOP Town Chairman, said last night he did not consider the outcome of yesterday's vote a defeat for the local Republican party and said there would be no change in the local party because of the election results.

William Johnson, president of the Connecticut Youth for Goldwater, which shared GOP party headquarters in the Blonstein Fuel Building, said the results did not show the end of conservatism. "This shows the beginning of a war," he said.

Vernon's other Democratic state representative, Raymond Spelman, commented when asked for a statement. "Speak to LBJ! He's our spokesman!"

Neophytes Have Various Fates Sub Boss, Dancer Win, Football Coach Blitzed

NEW YORK (AP) — A former nuclear submarine skipper allied to victory and a former football coach was blizzed in the Johnson Democratic sweep. But a twinkling chairman who once danced with Shirley Temple walked off with the upset of the day.

People famous in other fields tried their hand at politics and encountered various fates at the hands of a ticket-splitting electorate.

Former Navy Capt. William Anderson, who in 1968 took the atomic submarine Nautilus under the polar cap, won a House seat from Democrats in Tennessee by sinking retired Army Col. Cecil Hill.

The Johnson foe deposed the political horse of Charles (Bud) Wilkinson, Oklahoma's Democratic political coach whose record of 145 victories in 178 games was one of the most spectacular in gridiron history.

But George Bush, son of former Connecticut Senator, was missed by a mile in trying to get the family name back in the Senate via a Texas race, in which he was badly trounced by liberal Democrat Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

Similar failure befell Republican Howard Baker, son-in-law of the silver-tongued Senate minority leader, Everett M. Dirksen, in Tennessee. Democratic Congressman Ross Bate, who voted for the civil rights bill, beat Baker for the late States Kefauver's old seat, while Sen. Albert Gore, a Democrat who voted against the bill, won re-election to the Tennessee's other Senate seat.

Another Wilkinson also had an unsettling day. Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson, who resigned as president of Brigham Young University to champion the cause of conservative Republicanism, failed to unseat Democratic incumbent Frank E. Moss in Utah Senate race.

Windrop Rockefeller, fourth of the fabulously wealthy Rockefeller brothers, tried to keep Democrat Orval E. Faubus from winning his sixth straight two-year term as governor of Arkansas. Republican Rockefeller pumped new enthusiasm plus a considerable chunk of his own wealth into the long dormant Arkansas GOP. But it wasn't enough.

### New Congress Lineup Like 'New Deal' Era

WASHINGTON (AP)—The people have given President Johnson a heavily Democratic Congress that seems to smug behind his program. It may evoke memories of those early New Deal Congresses that whisked through the proposals of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The new Congress also will feature names that come from the past but may augur power in the future. Democrat Robert F. Kennedy who took away a New York Senate seat from a Republican, and Republican Robert Taft Jr., who took away an Ohio Senate seat from a Democrat.

Besides these and other new names in the Senate, the big story of the congressional election was the creation of a House that seemed to shed most of the obstacles to a Johnson program.

This came despite some spectacular Republican gains in the House. They snared seats in the eight mighty Democratic Districts of Alabama and Mississippi by far, for the most part, these were votes that rarely ended up on the side of Johnson legislation anyway.

The Democrats made spectacular gains of their own—upgrading Republicans for their one-seat bastion of Florida and their two Texas House seats. Both Rep. Bruce Alger and Ed Foreman were elected Democrats in the President's home state.

The Democrats, besides their victories in New York and Maryland, picked up another Senate seat in New Mexico, when Rep. Joseph M. Montoya, a veteran of World War II, defeated the Republican incumbent, Sen. Edwin L. McChesney.

The Republicans were disappointed when Bud Wilkinson, who played football as coach at the University of Oklahoma, failed to win his first contest for public office. An Oklahoma state senator, Fred B. Harris, defeated Wilkinson in the race for Oklahoma's 1st Congressional District.

Several familiar Republican names will be gone from the House next year, including Rep. Ben Jensen, R-Iowa, the ranking Republican on the powerful House Appropriations Committee. Others include Rep. Louis C. Wyman of New Hampshire, John R. Wilson of New York, and Earl Wilson of Indiana.

Missing Democrats will include Rep. Arthur Winstead of Mississippi, George Grant of Alabama, Kenneth Roberts of Alabama, and George Huddleston of California.

Although Keating was defeated, some moderate Republicans survived the Johnson landslide, including Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania and Sen. Hiram Fong of Hawaii. Rep. John V. Lindsay of New York and number of other House Republicans who refused to endorse Goldwater won re-election.

The gains by Northern Democrats and the losses by Southern Democrats indicate a greater chance for success than ever before next year when Democratic liberals in the House try to pass these Democratic Southerners who supported Goldwater in the campaign.

Rep. John Bell Williams of Mississippi and Albert Watson of North Carolina are the targets of the Democratic liberals, who may be a majority within the Democratic party in the House for the first time.
