Judging by the total number of votes cast at the polls early this afternoon, Manchester's town election today is going to be a record breaker. The town registrar's office reported that as of 1 p.m. there had been 3,184 votes cast at Manchester's five polling places. That is almost 50 votes more than had been cast at the same hour during the 1962 town election. The total vote in 1962 was an all-time high of 12,683.

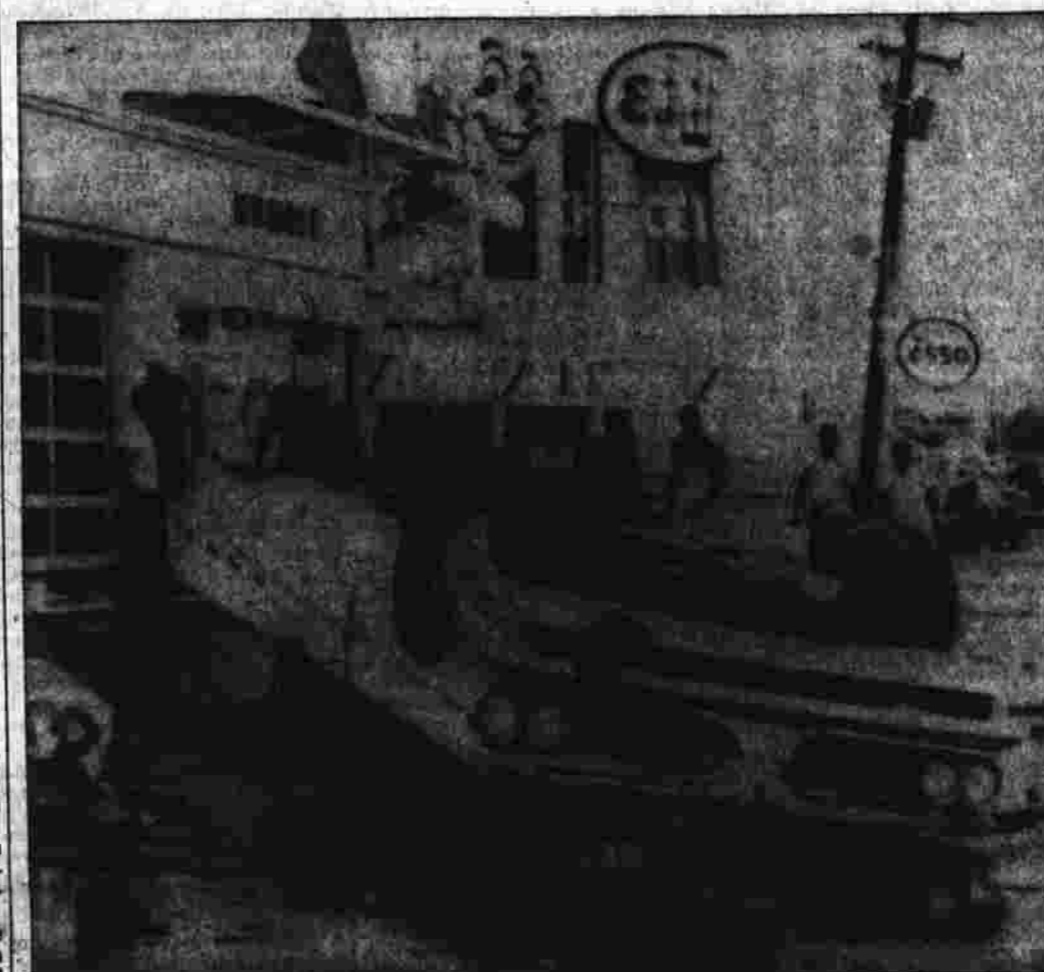

#### Canada And Pearson Again

It must be a wonderful thing in the troubled and complex world of today to be a middle-aged man who has been one of the first division contenders for the perpetual penance of world leadership.

For if your position as a nation is modest, if your national sense of conflict is not so keen that anybody is going to call you coward or soft if you talk of peace, then you have an opportunity to try to do something new and then, for something you think is right.

Such a nation in world life is enjoyed by our neighbor Canada, and an inspired realization of the duties and opportunities of that station has been with all its modern statement, and especially with Lester Pearson, the man who was foreign minister at the time of the Suez crisis and the man who is prime minister now.

And what Canada and Prime Minister Pearson are doing at the moment should be noted, for all the matter of fact and businesslike way it comes into the news, as a matter of potential importance to world history.

Canada has invited, to a meeting in Ottawa from Nov. 2 to 6, all those nations who have, up to this time, contributed to the United Nations peace-keeping operations in the Middle East, in the Congo, in Cyprus.

The list includes Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Italy, Yugoslavia, Pakistan, Indonesia, India, Iran, Colombia and Brazil, and 11 African states, Guinea, Ghana, Mali, the Sudan, Morocco, Tunisia, the United Arab Republic, Nigeria, Liberia, Ethiopia and Senegal. Canada, the host nation, has supplied troops for all three of the UN police forces on which these nations have been represented.

Canada's object in calling this meeting is to discuss and perhaps propose action on the problem of regularizing the procedures by which the United Nations, in hour of crisis, can put such volunteer police forces in the field. The conference at Ottawa will consult with the various officers who have served in command of such police forces in the past. And they will concentrate on tactics and mechanics, logistics and operational efficiency, rather than on any question of the political philosophy or UN procedures for assigning such forces to any particular situation.

These, then, are the volunteers of the United Nations police force, meeting voluntarily on the call of one of their own members, to see what better coordination and operation they can devise for themselves in the future.

This is valuable in itself, as a piece of practical planning and discussion for the kind of operation the world already accepts almost, now, as a United Nations routine.

It is even more valuable when one realizes that, in the classic evolution for such things, this effort to perfect the voluntary type of police force stands as just about the last stage before we begin looking for ways to create the formal standing professional police force which, in some degree, is necessary on the command of the United Nations.

That, obviously enough, is what Prime Minister Pearson, with his wonderful middle-sized nation position, has been driving toward for these prime years of his public service to his nation and to the world. Give him a little more time, and we see him getting there. He has not only made the best of it, he has made it to survive.

#### Slow Start For Mr. Goldwater

Senator Goldwater was not really getting off the ground either as a candidate or as a challenger in the race for the Republican nomination for president. He was slow to get going in the campaign, and the polls show that he is still far behind the other candidates.

### Jimmy Breslin Where The Action Isn't

NEW YORK, Oct. 5—Barry Morris Goldwater's drive to become President of the United States seems to be falling flat. A little bit short. His own polls show it is a little bit of trouble here and a little bit of trouble there, the kind of trouble that should make you go out and get a job. In one important circle this morning, a powerful feeling that Barry is out to make Alf Landon's campaign of '36 look like a crashing success.

The important circle is made up of those to one and that's it. And they're not too interested in doing that, either. Maybe it's right in a couple of weeks. Night now, it's a dead business.

This year they are staying home. Except in New York, where Robert Kennedy is a strengthening 4 to 1 favorite, and in Illinois, where Charles Foy and Otto Kerner are raised even, there seems to be no interest in betting money on election in big elections.

"We make the line-up with Johnson a 6-8 favorite, or 7 to 1 if you bet man-to-man, and I'm still willing to see a carton of cigarettes put up as a Las Vegas odds maker," was saying on the phone, "I never saw a candidate who can kill interest the way Goldwater does. They ought to let the guy go around and campaign from inside of a steamer trunk. Then nobody ought see him or hear what he has to say and maybe a few lunch players would take their best shot. The way it is now, they let Goldwater talk about bombs, and every time people hear that they say, 'I could get killed, too. Then they don't even want to hear his name.

"The only betting on the big election will come in the last couple of days. They'll bet the number of votes Johnson wins by. I make them at 5 million right now. You get over and under. Johnson either wins by more than 5 million or by less. Otherwise, there's nothing. I Miller effecting the election at all. You bet your head he is. He got these mouth on him, that guy. On account of him, we're liable to have to put the vote figure at 6 million."

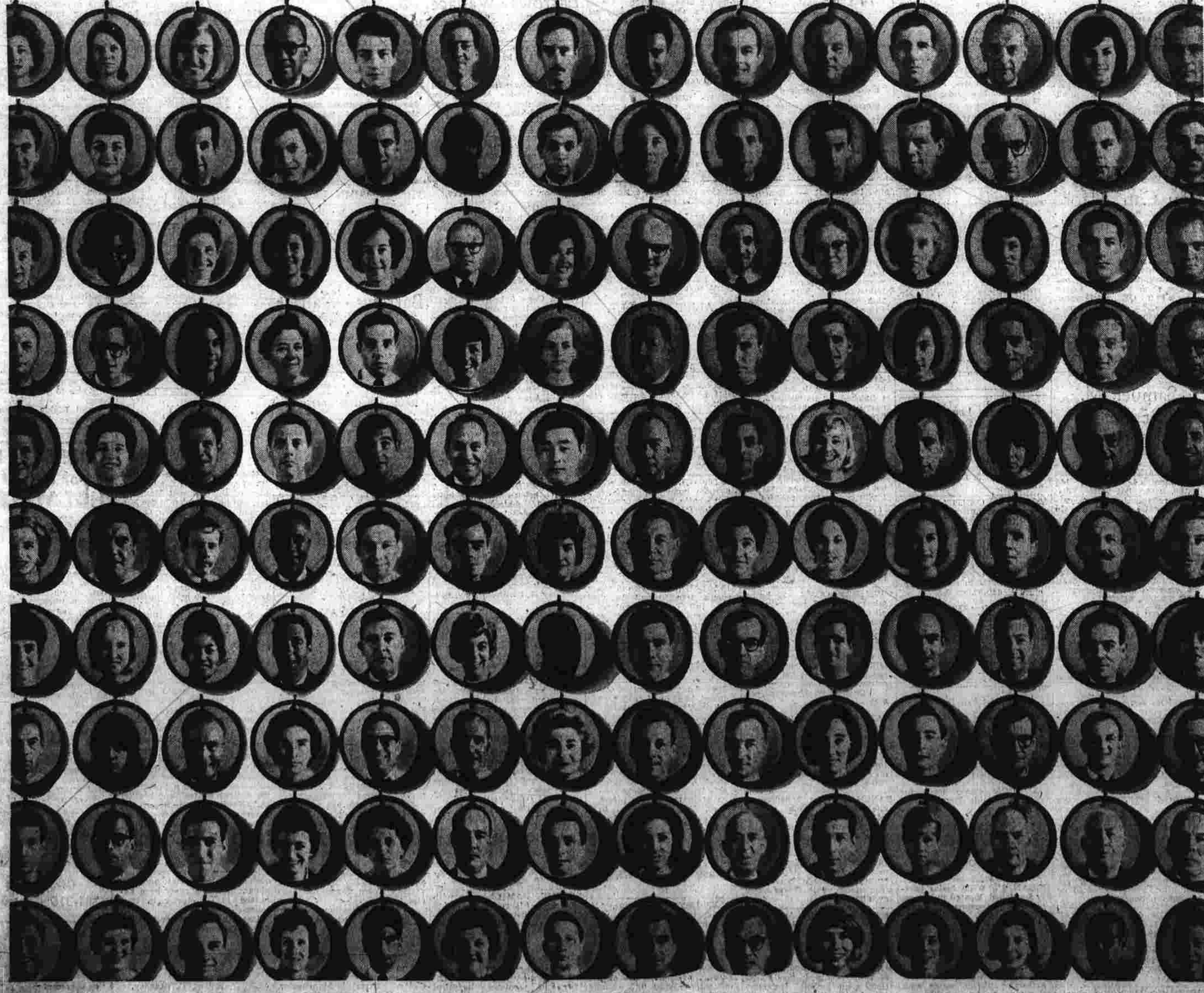

Verdon, officials said, for him to confer with Allied leaders either on his own initiative or in response to approaches from the other side. So far, authorities here said, there has been no approach from Paris for high-level French-U.S. talks.

Other consultations of the organization of NATO and its proposed nuclear weapons force will be conducted by Secretary of State Dean Rusk when he meets with Western European foreign ministers in New York in connection with the Dec. 1 meeting of the U.S. General Assembly. That, it was learned today, will be the New York meeting of Nov. 30 and spread 10 or 12 days thereafter with a wide variety of problems, but U.S. concern over the Atlantic alliance is at the top of the list.

In mid-December, Rusk will head the U.S. delegation to a scheduled meeting of the NATO Council in Paris.

Actually, the post-election period will bring talks in Washington of considerable importance to the alliance. Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak is due here next week for consultations with Secretary of State Dean Rusk, a former secretary-general of NATO, has been one of the European leaders most actively interested in trying to find solutions for NATO's divisive problems and for a severe economic disagreement between France and West Germany within the European Common Market.

In about a month British Prime Minister Harold Wilson plans to come here for talks with Johnson. ### Building Costs Up in October

The total value of new construction in Manchester started in October is 30 per cent more than the value of construction begun during the same month in 1963.

But the amount of construction that is taxable is about 35 per cent less than during the previous comparable period.

The discrepancy is the result of the high value of new municipal construction — which is non-taxable — that was started last month.

The value of all new construction begun in Manchester last month is \$729,587 — half again as much as the \$439,423 in construction started in October, 1963.

But the portion of that \$729,587 reflected by the town's Grand List is but \$282,527. The remaining \$447,060 was for tax exempt projects. The bulk of it is for an addition and alterations to the Robert T. School, estimated at \$442,560.

Other tax free projects include a \$2,000 shed being constructed at the town refuse disposal area and a \$2,000 addition to the VFW Post.

The major category of taxable construction is single-family dwellings. Eight were started last month with a total value of \$119,000. During October of 1963 seven were begun with a value of \$120,000.

The new Sears, Roebuck service station on Broad St. will cost about \$75,000 to construct. There were no other new projects that will cost more than \$10,000.

In October of last year three buildings began to construct new apartments, valued at \$195,000. There were no apartments started last month. Manchester has been experiencing a minor apartment building boom.
