ean reorganization in terms of personalities-Nixon giving his famous sneer terms of organized blocs-the Goldwaterites vs. the Romneyites may be an entertaining simplification. But it is not a real approach to the problem. A real approach to the problem has to

begin with two recognitions. One is that people are the way people are, and that, in the realm of political conviction and disposition, one doesn't create liberal, conservative, or middle of the road Republicans by waving either a magic wand or a devastat-

The second thing that needs to be recognized before any intelligent discussion of the problem of Republican reorganization can begin is that the ambivalence of the party is nothing new, and that the organizational situation which happens to seem dramatic at the moment when Dean Burch holds the national chairmanship of the party is not really anything particularly new.

The national chairmanship, specifically, has frequently been in the hands of Republican moderates. Even during such periods, however, the basic conflict between Republican conservatives and Republican moderates has continued, and even during such periods it has been the Republican conservatives who have held the dominant and really controlling much through the national committee organization, although they have always also been strong there, but through the special party organizations connected with Congress, the Republican Campaign Committee for the Senate and the Republican Campaign Com-

mittee for the House. Until he retired to run for the Presidency, one Barry Goldwater was chairman of the Senate Republican Campaign Committee. This meant that he was in charge of putting the propaganda shape on the Republican party record in the Senate, and in charge of helping create the image by which Republican members of the Senate would try to campaign when they sought reelec-

This sort of thing—the presentation of the very conservative image by Republican members of the Congresswent on almost uninterrupted during the years when the great moderate, Dwight Eisenhower, was Republican President. It explained, of course, why, in the Eisenhower elections. Republican members of Congress usually ran behind Eisenhower. It was the same process which was reversed, this time, when Republican candidates for Congress ran so far ahead of the Republican candidate for President.

Republican votes swell when they have a chance to go down the middle. They had it with Eisenhower, but not with the routine Republican member of Congress, But this Nov. 3, the voters thought that even the routine Republican member of Congress was closer to the middle than the nominee for Presi-

What has been illustrated, then, is that the Republican problem is not new. and does not exist today purely because of any present day personalities or

Now, if we may be permitted to do so, we head back toward our first recognition, the recognition that people are people, and not likely to change political convictions at the wave of a wand or the smash of a defeat.

This means that the Republican party is, pretty much like the Demoeratic party, going to continue to include various shades of conviction, from liberal through moderate to ultra con-

We suspect that the only cure it is reasonable to expect is one which is relatively tame in nature. It would concern the manner in which various elements in the Republican party deal with one another more than it would concern the identity of the particular Re-

publican in any particular position.

There has to be some kind of coexstence within the Republican party. sublicans of different shades of opinton have to learn not to try to dominate each other or read each other out of the party completely. They have to learn, rise, to try to keep their own con-

duct, in furtherance of their own priniples, from crossing those lines which vill drive other members of their party into desperation temporary exodus. Such lines have not been observed in he past few months. In a rule or ruin atmosphere, party moderates were invited to leave the Republican house, if they didn't like what was going on there. After the election, the same ele nents which would go that far when they thought they were controlling the party are still pursuing extremist aims, which they are, for the moment of course, tactfully disguising with talk of party unity and team work. It will be safer for the party if the visible controls do pass to moderates, who can be relied upon to be moderate, too, in their attitude toward their fellow Republicans. But the long range solution, such as it will ever be, lies not so much in hanging the nature of Republicans as in developing a better talent and mood for coexistence among Republicans of liffering persuasions.
