Mrs. Bourn Heads School Board Again

Mrs. Katherine D. Bourn, elected on Oct. 5 to her third 3-year term on the board of education, last night was re-elected its chairman. At the same time, Atty. William B. Collins, member of the board since 1962, and chosen to replace the late Mrs. Bourn, was re-elected board secretary.

The brief election, devoid of any ceremonies, took place at the board's regular meeting at Bennett Junior High School.

Mrs. Bourn, a Democrat, is the first woman to be chairman of Manchester's board of education. She also has the distinction of being the first woman to serve on the town board of directors, having filled that post from 1959 to 1962.

In September, 1963, she was appointed to the State Commission on Higher Education by Gov. John F. D'Amico. Various times she had been a member of the town parking authority, the building and jury committees and the charter revision committee.

Atty. Collins, also a former town director (1961-62), is a member of the Democratic Town Committee and has served on the town development commission. He is presently chairman of the town's education personnel committee.

Just prior to last night's election, Atty. Collins administered the oath of office to two new board members, Atty. Thomas A. Bailey, Rep., and Leonard Seader, Dem.

They replace Christine F. McCormick, Rep., and Ted Cummings, Dem., neither of whom ran for reelection in the town elections. Beldon H. Schaffer, Dem., who was re-elected to a second 3-year term, received a record of congratulations.

In another action last night, the board accepted the resignation of Miss Linda Landro, a third-grade substitute teacher at Waddell School. Miss Landro will be married today and will leave immediately with her husband for Fairbanks, Alaska, where he is employed.

She also approved the appointments of Edwin Klatt and Anthony Baranowski to the position of school custodian.

Clubs Boost Pre-Holiday Outlook

NEW YORK (AP)—An annual flood of money is spilling into pre-Christmas business channels.

It is the \$1,714,120,000 saved this year by 14,700,000 Christmas Club members.

The money is being distributed by 9,000 banks and savings and loan associations throughout the country.

It compares with savings of \$1,000,000,000 last year.

This substantial increase in Christmas savings forecasts good Christmas business, says Edward F. Dorset, president of Christmas Club A Corporation.

The Christmas Club has been promoting the savings program since 1910.

A survey by the club indicates that 82.11 per cent of \$876,138, 949 will go for Christmas purchases. 12.11 per cent, or \$21,945,917, for taxes; 6.13 per cent, or \$10,821,247, for year-end bills; and 1.19 per cent, or \$1,128,468, for miscellaneous uses.

Dorset says a survey indicates that 45 per cent of the members feel their pre-Christmas checks represented money that never would have been saved without the systematic plan.

The savings plan is based on the psychology of obligation, he has been described as a conventional, fair-minded, and practical man.

The program gets underway each November with members signing up to save anywhere from 50 cents to \$20 a week on the deposits and some very small weekly savings.

"The average man likes to have a goal," says Dorset, "and carry it out."

"That's proved by the fact that the money is saved in the bank, not in the hands of the saver."

The club was founded in 1910 by late H. H. Bailey, who sold printed forms and supplies to banks and businesses.

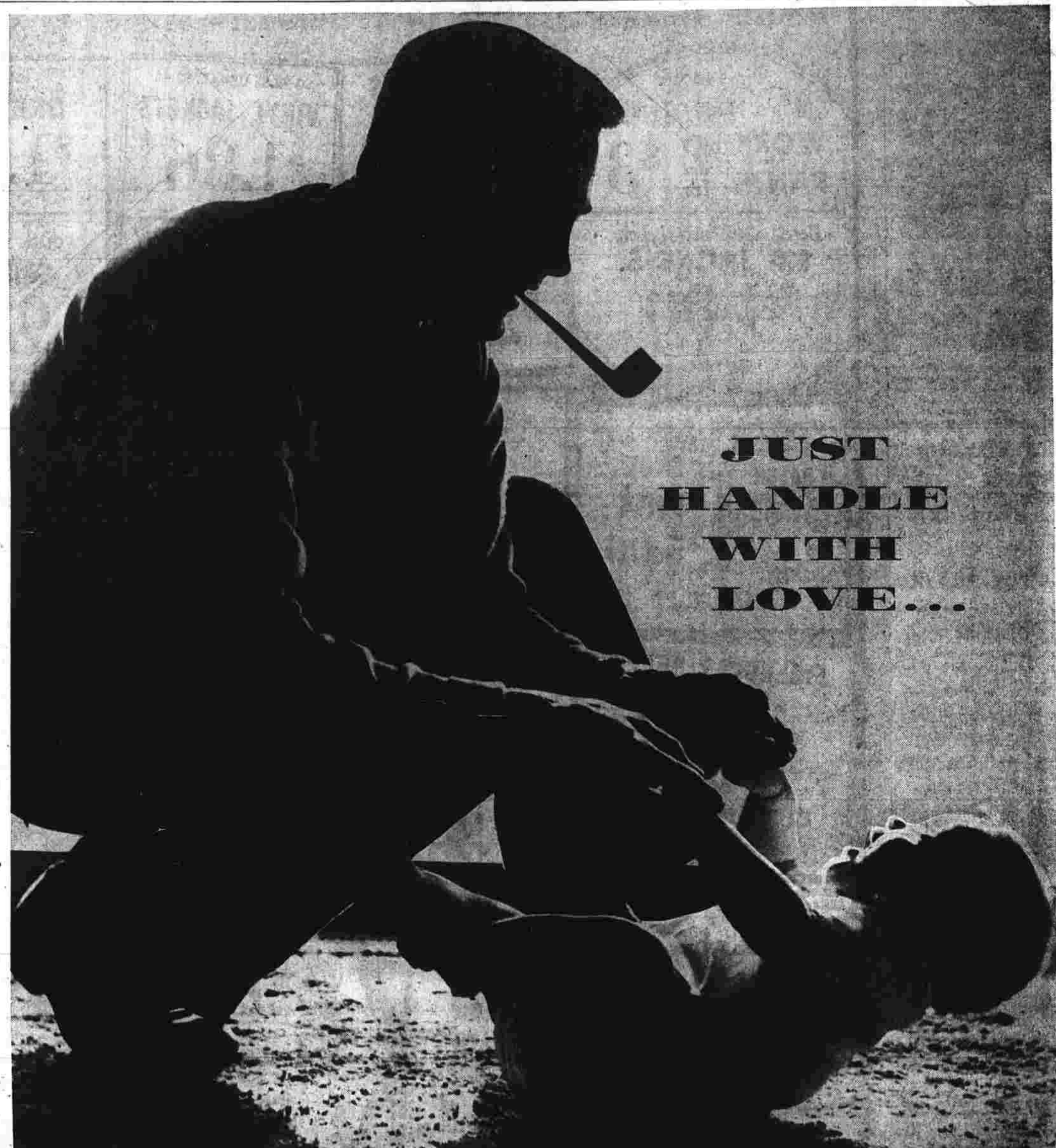

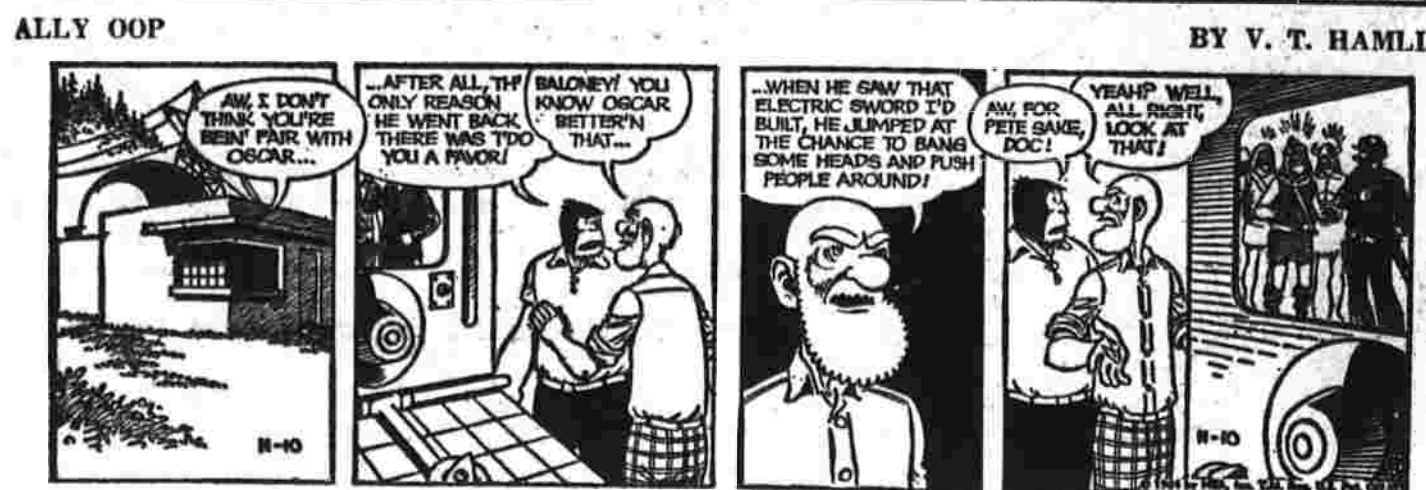
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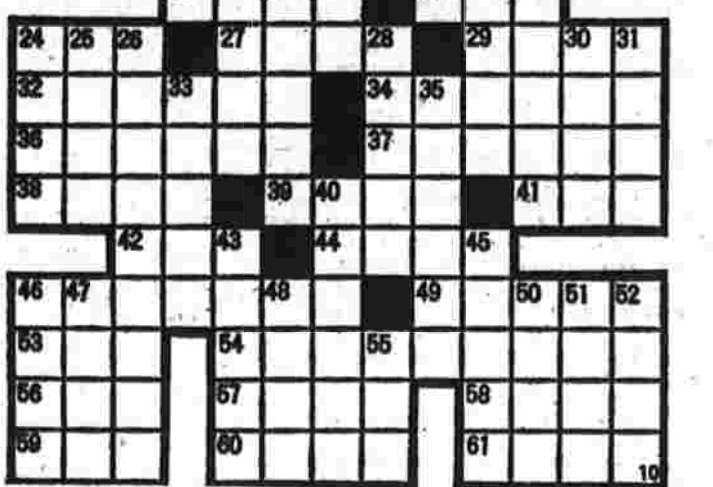
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Rockville-Vernon Catholics Leading in Town, Area Religion Survey Finds

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Veterans Day Ceremonies Honor Heroes of All Wars

By ROBERT KILPATRICK MANCHESTER (AP) - The busy 1963 Connecticut General Assembly, its latest special session under way, has a new deadline to meet for reaching an agreement on reapportionment.

Legislative leaders set Jan. 6 as the date for the closing of the special session and agreed to frequent caucuses to discuss the session strictly to reapportionment, issues - except for emergency legislation - by the House Speaker and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

The Legislators opened the session yesterday. Before adjourning until next Tuesday, they heard Gov. John Dempsey's special message, in which he urged them to do the reapportionment.

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Events In State

Proposed Name For Route 8 Honors Darcey HARTFORD (AP) - Gov. John N. Dempsey says that he will personally have introduced in the General Assembly a bill to name a major section of Route 8 the "James H. Darcey Memorial Highway."

Darcey, general manager of The Waterbury Republican and American, died earlier this year of cancer. He was 64.

The governor said yesterday that the bill he is having drafted will give the highway the name of the route from the Naugatuck town line north to Route 44 in Winsted.

Dempsey said that Darcey "as much as any individual was responsible for the legislative push that made possible the speedy construction of Route 8 through the upper portion of the Naugatuck Valley."

He recalled that at a ground-breaking ceremony in 1962 for one section of Route 8 he had joked that the highway should be designated "Darcey Drive."

The bill will probably be introduced in January when the general assembly begins normal business. Dempsey said he expected the bill to be passed in both houses.

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
