Veterans Day Ceremonies Honor Heroes of All Wars

By ROBERT KILPATRICK MANCHESTER paused today to remember the fighters—living and dead—who had battled throughout the world to obtain the freedom and peace we know today.

It was a cold and gloomy Veterans Day and ceremonies were performed under rain-threatening clouds.

But it was a time of rededication. The keynote speech of Edson M. Bailey, World War I veteran and former principal of Manchester High School, set the tone.

"It means more to me than any meaning it is that once again we reflect upon the ideals for which our country was fought; on the virtues which have made America great; and on the resolve once more to take whatever arms must be employed to keep America great."

Many small clusters of on-lookers had gathered to watch the parade as it headed down E. Middle Pike, and onto Main St. before turning right to the World War I Memorial located before the hospital.

Some of the units represented were the various veterans organizations and their auxiliaries, the Boy Scouts, and Girl Scouts. The Manchester High School Band was accompanied by its costumed bandwits.

Police diverted traffic and the parade reached the hospital about five minutes before the ceremonies were to begin.

The participants slowly gathered in a semi-circle on the freshly raked lawn surrounding the memorial. There was a chill in the air and from long before both spectators and participants were huddled in Hospital employes and patients watched from windows.

The crowd on Main St. was also large. The parade was led by the National Anthem, chairman Anthony O'Bright of the American Legion welcomed the parade and the band.

Proposed Name For Route 8 Honors Darcy

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. John N. Dempsey says that he will personally have introduced in the General Assembly a bill to name a major section of Route 8 the "James H. Darcy Memorial Highway."

Darcy, general manager of The Waterbury Republican and American, died earlier this year on a simulated bombing run over the Naugatuck town line north to Route 44 in Winsted.

Dempsey said that Darcy "as much as any individual was responsible for the legislative push that made possible the speedy construction of Route 8 through the upper portion of the Naugatuck Valley 'Darcy Drive'."

He recalled that at a ground-breaking ceremony in 1962 for one section of Route 8 he had joked that the highway should be designated "Darcy Drive."

The bill will probably be introduced in January when the general assembly begins normal business. Dempsey said he expected the bill to be passed in both houses.

Pleads Innocent HARTFORD (AP) — Edward N. Roche, 29, of Westbrook, has pleaded innocent yesterday in U.S. District Court in charges of bank robbery. Roche is charged with the robbery of a bank in Westbrook.

Legislators Faced With Jan. 6 Limit

HARTFORD (AP) — The busy 1965 Connecticut General Assembly, its latest special session under way, has a new deadline to meet for reaching an agreement on reapportionment.

Legislative leaders set Jan. 6 as the date for the closing of the special session and agreed to frequent caucuses to discuss the session strictly to reapportionment, issues — except for emergency legislation — by the House Speaker and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

The legislators opened the session yesterday. Before adjourning until next Tuesday, they heard Gov. John Dempsey's special message, in which he urged them to do the reapportionment.

Seven Crewmen Die As Bomber Crashes

WOLF POINT, Mont. (AP) — An intercontinental B-52 bomber crashed and burned in a desolate ravine - cut northeastern Montana area late Tuesday night, killing all seven crew members and starting a prairie fire.

The bodies were found today, the Air Force reported. Two of the bodies were located near one of the eight jet engines, which were hurled more than a fourth of a mile from the point of impact.

A tail section of the aircraft with the number still visible was the largest piece of wreckage. Other pieces were no bigger than a washbasin, authorities said.

First reports of the crash came about 11 p.m. from Wolf Creek, N.D., but carried no bombs.

It said radio contact was lost with the plane as it was descending from an altitude of 36,000 feet to 23,000 feet.

Residents of the house nearest the crash, the Jake Schopp family, neither saw nor heard it and were informed by neighbors. The Schopp house is three miles from the crash site.

Names of the men were withheld by the Air Force pending notification of next of kin.

The plane was from the 462nd Strategic Aerospace Wing, the Air Force announced, at Larson Air Force Base, Moses Lake, Wash.

The Air Force said the plane was on a simulated bombing run to Blackfoot, N.D., but carried no bombs.

The demonstrations in Sasebo were more sporadic. But Socialist leaders predicted 10,000 demonstrators would be on hand when the 2,500-ton Sea Dragon docks Thursday in Sasebo for a three-day visit.

### Residents Protest Inaction over Brook

More than a dozen residents of the Lenox-Benton Sta. area unleashed a five minute tirade against the Democratic majority of the town board of directors last night after the board voted down a Republican plan to enclose a portion of Bigelow Brook.

The vote came after more than an hour of debate between the Republican and Democratic board members, over the project for the project and after a second vote on the project.

"Think of the children" in the area who are in danger of falling into the brook.

After the vote, with all the Democrats opposed to the \$60,000 enclosure, Republican Harold A. Turkington noted that "I guess DellaFera wants assuming too much after the project was backed by Turkington and other Republicans on the board."

Turkington said that "I believe this is one of the few projects that need doing that involve the safety of our children." He asked the appropriate funds to be kept faith with the people of the area by showing that we recognize the project is needed.

He warned that the town capital improvement reserve fund "if we wait until spring to act on this," he said, "the money available now will all be used up."

If we want to see that this project gets done, we must authorize the funds through direct appropriations, he said.

Taylor expressed support for both Stone's clean-up plan and for enclosing the brook. When Stone made a formal motion instructing town officials to proceed with the clean-up, Taylor asked the motion be amended to include instructions to the town engineer to begin planning the necessary \$60,000 to enclose the two blocks between Lenox and Benton Sts.

General Manager Richard Martin had warned that, "Unless the board is willing to go ahead with the project (by allocating funds for the project), the project will be put off until some other project is completed."

He said that the design work should include studies of the watershed in the area that drains into the brook as well as the drawing of detailed plans and specifications.

During the portion of the meeting devoted to hearing the public on items on the agenda, about eight of the residents present pleaded with the board to "make up its mind on the subject."

"We've been coming back to directors meetings every month since last summer to see what the board is going to do," said Mrs. David Tyler, 325 Brunford St. "We wish they would stop stalling and act."

When the proposed \$60,000 cost of installation was turned down an hour later, Mrs. Tyler rose again to criticize the directors for putting off action once more.

Although the public is not usually permitted to speak during later portions of the directors meetings, the dozen or so residents of the area loosed an emotional five-minute barrage of criticism and threats at the board before angrily leaving the room.
