Veterans Day

It was not until the year 1954, 36 years, a Second World War, plus a Korean police action, after Nov. 11, 1918, that the American holiday known as Armistice Day was formally changed to Veterans Day.

When the change was made, it was a reflection of everybody's realization that what had been achieved in 1918 was not even a very long or very reliable armistice, let alone the lasting peace, in a world safe for democracy By 1933, when a fanatical, zealous, and poison-minded minority took over in the same Germany which had been defeated in 1918, it had been demonstrated that democracy contained no guaranteed safety in itself. A year or two later, in Ethiopia and in Spain, it had been demonstrated that the world had not been made safe for peace any more than it had been made safe for democ

Veterans Day, coming many millions f human casualties later, is a little more realistic. It tenders its heart-felt comage to all those men, living and dead, who have offered their last full measure of devotion to the cause of that country which they hoped was in the

But it no longer holds, Veterans Day, the easy promise that ideals have, even by such sacrifice, been safely won and safely protected. The terrible task remains for present day and future humanity itself; we, the people, the people of country, and the people of the world, have to learn to choose alternatives for surselves. We have to learn to choose such a thing as peace, and choose it even in little things because that may be the way we develop the muscle and things. We have to recognize that the world of our time calls on us for intellectual as well as for physical courage. If men could bring themselves to serve in the fields of world policy and politics with the same selfless devotion, the same unquestioning allegiance, the same unlimited courage the veterans of the world have always brought to the field of actual military combat, then, perhaps, but perhaps not until then, will their courage in service receive, for their posterity, the kind of reward it de-

MLF Spells Nonsense

Among the problems Washington has to handle, now that the election is over, is that of the question of a thing called a multilateral nuclear force, which has been given the initials MLF, for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, which is NATO.

The campaign produced no slight contribution of sense or solution to the problem involved. We doubt that there is very much sense available for its solution. The easiest way to rule on the problem would be to say that it should never have been permitted to arise, that there is no solution which is going to be really pleasing to anybody,that any solution whatsoever has to head in a direction opposite to that in which any sane policy should be heading, and that, therefore, the finest thing that could happen would be just to forget the whole thing and go ahead with something else.

This MLF is a proposition for political vanities which we ourselves have helped nourish and inspire. It has almost nothing to do with how safe we are, or how safe Europe is. To the contrary, it could add to the danger in which civilization makes its way from day to day.

Once again, then, as so often in the cold war, we seem fated to do something which is quite foolish and unnecseary and even potentially quite dangerous. Once it has been proposed, obody dares offend West Germany or cancel the policy hours spent in NATO consideration or in State Department and Defense Department planning on "how" it can be done by labeling it frankly and openly for the unnecessary nonsense it is.

But, if we may venture to describe what we think is the basic policy situstion involved, we think it is one of those matters in which intelligent high leadership finds some delicate, artistic way of shunting the problem involved off to one side so that nothing ever really happens on it. Perhaps the best thing the new administration at Washington can do for this problem of nuclear arms for NATO is not to try to produce any solution at all and leave it in a state of non solution.

The best way to accomplish such a strategy would be to set before the world, the American people, and the peoples of NATO itself propositions and goals which might make a lot more sense and have a lot more to do with the question of whether this small globe is going to be able to keep revolving without blistering and scorching itself with nuclear arms. Not how many fingers can get on the trigger, but how ar all fingers can be removed from it -that would seem a more fruitful direction for policy planning.

WASHINGTON - With shrunken ranks of House Republicans is a growing mova-ment to throw off rigid party discipline requiring bitter-end opposition to all Democratic pro-

Although this discipline was imposed by the regime of Rep. Charles Halleck of Indiana, there is today hardly any sentiment to oust Halleck as Republican floor leader. Rather, the mood of surviving House Re-publicans is to retain Halleck ut with greatly diminished authority.

Nobody has devised a clearly

defined substitute to replace Halleck-style opposition for op-position's sake. There is only vague talk about Republican offering alternative programs or perhaps trying to reach compre mises with the dominant Demo crats. But it seems clear that the day when Charlie Halleck could lead a solid phalanx in Congressional battle is gone. The answer is found in the election returns. Halleck's six years of leadership have been based solely on trying to eke out majorities to beat Democratic programs. Now that is virtually possible. With an effective gain of well over 40 seats, President Johnson has a working majority on any issue. This points to a need for new Republican posture in the House, Moreover, Republican Congressmen have noted just who went down in the LBJ land-

Roughly speaking, House Republicans can be divided into three groups: Old guardsmen whose conservatism is predictable and unyielding; militant young Turks, who often are just as conservative as the old guardsmen but more pragmatic; and a small liberal-to-moderate faction who favor a more positive style of opposition.
