WASHINGTON — Despite Sen. Goldwater's headline defeat, the purge of non-Goldwater employees at the Republican National Committee has not been resumed.

From an end-of-the-campaign level of some 75 National Committee staffers is now less than 200. Dismissals are on their way to another 125.

Who is on the purge list? "The old ones are going," contends a non-Goldwater Republican. "The new ones are staying."

There is no better evidence that the Goldwater-dominated National Committee, headed by Dean Burch, intends to hang on.

After the Republican National Convention last summer, all but one or two of the Committee's top-level old-timers were checked out of party headquarters in Washington's C&O Building.

For example, Dr. William F. Buckley, Jr., regarded Chief of the Research Staff, was one of the first to go last summer. Several lower-level researchers were retained. These are now getting their "thanks," but letters from Burch.

Charles Lichtenstein, the No. 2 man in the all-important research department in Washington, is also being let go.

Dean Asks CAC For Nite Report

Dean Frederick Love on Monday will ask the executive committee of the Manchester Community College Citizens Advisory Council to call a meeting of the entire council to act on recommendations in respect to converting the surplus Nike site to a college campus.

The executive committee will hold its regular meeting Monday at 1:30 p.m. in the faculty lounge at Manchester High School. At least Monday night's meeting of the board of education, Beldon Schaffer, chairman of the board's finance committee, submitted a list of 10 questions, for which he requested answers prior to Dec. 1, the deadline date for the board to act on a recommendation for purchase of the Nike site. If the board acts affirmatively, his recommendation will be passed to the town board of directors, so that it may submit an application to the federal government before Feb. 1, the deadline for purchase of the site. Schaffer has asked for projected costs of fitting the site for educational use, above and beyond the \$36,000 estimate submitted. Public Works Director Walter Fusa, for restoring the buildings to their original condition. He has asked also for statistics projected 10 years, on the need of a new site campus, and the capabilities of the high school to handle estimated increased enrollment.

GOETTINGEN, Germany (AP) - Two East German soldiers shot their way through the mined border area early today and escaped to West Germany, police reported. The two uniformed men, a corporal and a private, fired 20 rounds from a submachine gun into the mined ground to open a narrow path for their escape. Police said three other East Germans, a 20-year-old woman and two men aged 19 and 23, escaped about the same time.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - India's critical food shortage appears to be easing slightly. Government spokesmen said 6,000 tons of rice had reached Kerala State and stocks in government grain stores had increased to 18,000 tons. They said a bumper winter rice crop is expected.

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - The Seoul district prosecutor arrested the president of a radio network Wednesday night on charges of sympathizing with a Communist formula for unification of the divided country. Hwang Yong-Joo, 46, president of the semigovernment Mocomhwa Broadcasting Co. proposed in a magazine article that foreign troops be withdrawn from Korea and both North and South Korea be admitted to the United Nations as steps to facilitate unification of the country.

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (AP) - A U.S. Embassy spokesman has labeled as "clumsy forgeries" three documents that the government said were proof that foreign powers intend to attack Tanzania. The spokesman denied that the United States was involved in a plot to use white mercenaries to attack the East African nation. "Their allegations concerning the United States are wholly without foundation," he said. The paper, the Nationalist, attributes the documents as photostat copies and said they were part of the evidence on which Foreign Minister Oscar Kambona charged Tuesday that Portugal and certain other Western powers planned an attack.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The special U.N. committee on colonialism has approved a subcommittee report calling for the United States to move urgently toward independence for Guam. The vote was 7-6 with 10 abstentions. U.S. delegate Dwight Dickinson said the United States reserves the right to withdraw its report. Soviet delegate Pavel F. Shubkov charged that the United States had subordinated the economy and welfare of the Pacific island territory to military purposes.

TOKYO (AP) - The Japanese Communist party said today it has expelled 10 party members - most of them artists and writers - for publicizing criticisms of the party. The party newspaper Red Flag said the "standards" criticized included charges that the Central Committee was degenerate, dictatorial and bureaucratic, and was encouraging a split in the international Communist movement.

GENEVA (AP) - For the first time a Communist government is allowing Western organizations to enter the country to help people wishing to go to the West. A council meeting of the Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration was held Wednesday that the Yugoslav government is allowing voluntary Western aid organizations to operate inside its territory to help thousands of Yugoslavs to emigrate. Most are going to Australia to join relatives, many who fled Yugoslavia several years ago.

UConn Aid Goes to 26 From Area

Twenty-six area residents are among the 276 University of Connecticut students who have received a second \$200 scholarship in university-administered scholarships for the current academic year, according to information released by John Fowers, UConn scholarship officer.

Fowers said that "although students aid from all sources this year (scholarship plus state and federal aid), is expected to top \$1.2 million, the total is still far short of U of C overall student need."

He added, "This averages out to about \$100 per student, when one counts the number of undergraduates at the main campus and the four branches.

The area students who were awarded scholarships are:

Patients at Cedarcrest Taught to Speak English

Non-English speaking patients at Cedarcrest Hospital are being taught English this year through joint efforts of the Connecticut Tuberculosis and Health Association, the administrative staff of Cedarcrest and the Newington Public School System.

James A. Swomley, executive director of Cedarcrest, announced the program today and explained why the voluntary tuberculosis association was particularly interested in the non-English speaking patients.

"The ability to communicate, especially in a foreign setting, is one of the most valuable assets a human being can have," said Swomley. "Medical treatment and proper diet, all so important in the recovery of the TB patient, can never replace the dignity felt by the individual who understands and can be understood by those with whom he is in daily contact. Our support is a regular part of the patient's treatment and rehabilitation program."

Thomas S. Agronome, president of the Newington Division of the Tuberculosis and Health Association, explained that the English class, is an important part of the program. A Cuban refugee himself, he said Communist Cuba with its anti-English attitude, is a difficult place for an immigrant who finds himself in a new land.

"English like most languages, is an arbitrary and inexact system," he explained. Agronome said that the class is held in a room at Cedarcrest which is used for the instruction of adult students. The class meets two nights a week, the class is made up of students between the ages of 17 and 40. The native languages are French, Italian, Spanish, and Portuguese. Educational backgrounds vary from the first grade through high school.

How does the Cuban-born teacher communicate with such a diverse group? Agronome said, "We use English and rely heavily upon visual aids. Pronunciation and word association are the two main things we stress. After this understanding sets in and the student is in a comfortable position to continue from there."

Dr. J. P. Bachman, superintendent at Cedarcrest, and Mrs. Victoria Shannon, medical-social worker for the Office of Tuberculosis Control, Hospital Care and Rehabilitation, made Agronome's commendation in favor of the English class after recognizing the communication difficulties many of the patients were having while undergoing treatment at the hospital.

"The general purpose of the class," said Dr. Bachman, "is to equip the patient with language skills for basic communication. There's nothing elaborate about it, but it's rather significant in reducing some of the emotional distress of the patient confined to an unfamiliar hospital setting."

After only a few weeks of instruction, everyone associated with this pilot program is convinced of its success and popularity. As a result, steps are being taken to promote the English classes at the hospital in a regular adult education course. As such, they could be fully sponsored and supervised by the Newington Branch of the Tuberculosis and Health Association.

Swomley has indicated that a continued willingness to finance the temporary program until formal arrangements can be made.

Back on the Stick

"I'm a dictator," Coach Auerbach has told his players. "It's up to you to keep me happy."

"The Celtics presumably, are keeping Red happy. They have played 11 games thus far this season and have won them all, including a 110-84 romp over San Francisco Wednesday night. They are four short of the NBA's record gateway of 15 straight victories after the old Washington Capitals in 1948.

Auerbach had said he would reserve judgment on the 1964 Celtics squad, which includes four newcomers as well as last season's championship nucleus, until after his first meeting with the Western Division champion Warriors and Bill Chamberlain.

The only thing the Warriors showed Auerbach was Chamberlain's new beard. Bill Russell held VII to 24 points, 10 under this current average, and Ben Francisco was stopped short of the 100-point mark for the seventh time in his last eight encounters with the perennial NBA champion.

In Wednesday night's other game, Hal Greer and Charley Walker led a Philadelphia breakthrough that carried the Royals past Baltimore, 123-114, while Cincinnati's Wayne Embrey capped his 35-point closing burst with a basket in the last half minute that sank St. Louis, 118-116.

While Russell and the tenacious Celtics defense kept Chamberlain in check, Willie Naulls came off the bench twice and keyed Boston rallies from a 44-39 halftime edge, and then served it up with a 40-point final quarter. Larry Siegfried, high scorer for Boston, with 29 points, fired 17 in the last 12 minutes.

Greer, who led all scorers in the 76ers-Bullets game with 34 points, scored seven in the last five minutes and Walker added

Wait, Bellamy and Gus Johnson scored 23 and 26 points, respectively, for the Bullets.

Embrey's winning basket, with 25 seconds left, ended Cincinnati's three game losing streak and St. Louis' four game winning string. The Royals, playing without Oscar Robertson, out with an eye injury, got Tom Turner 287, Steve Acosta 371, Win Conant 143-133-382.

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State, Local Water Supply Shows No Immediate Danger

With few exceptions, the water supply in most sections of Connecticut was described today as adequate despite the drought. Major cities generally are in good supply, but smaller communities are taking precautions to make the most of dwindling reserves.

In Manchester, the shortage affecting town water department users has resulted in a partial ban on outdoor watering. The condition is not serious enough to require any further restrictions at this time, according to water superintendent Lawrence Witkowski.

The private Manchester Water Company serving the North End reports no shortages; the company's prime resources are wells, not reservoirs such as serve the rest of town.

A couple of big cities, Stamford and Norwalk, report severe shortages. The Bridgeport Hydraulic Company said no emergencies are threatened there and also threatened fines and penalties for anybody found guilty of wasting water.

Wells have been conserved during dry spells, forcing some persons to purchase water or get it in some other manner. For example, some fire departments are delivering water in hardish cases.

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Big Ford Layoff To Start Tonight

DETROIT, Mich. (AP) — The strike-troubled Ford Motor Co. starts a huge layoff of workers across the country Friday night in what Ford President Arjay Miller says may become a full shutdown by next week.

Week-old strikers by the United Auto Workers at eight factories, including key parts and stamping plants that feed car production setup, are held to blame.

If Ford closes all its 90 plants, a total of 160,000 hourly workers will be laid off.

Ford, with 255,000 men on strike at the eight plants, announced a layoff Friday night of 35,000 more at eight assembly operations and 16 manufacturing locations in several states, including key Michigan plants.

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Rail Unions Set Nov. 23 Strike Date

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six railroad shop unions have scheduled a strike against most of the nation's railroads for 4 a.m. local time, Nov. 23 union sources said today.

The strike notice has not yet been served on the railroads but union general chairmen are sending instructions to the more than 150,000 shop workers, sources said.

Federal mediators continued efforts to reach a settlement in a 13-month-old dispute, but a meeting with union spokesman Michael Fox.

J. E. Wolfe, chief railroad negotiator, returned to Chicago Thursday night after a meeting with mediators. The formal strike announcement reportedly will come from the Railroaders' Department of the AFL-CIO in Chicago.

Union sources said the strike probably will be sent out today or Saturday.

The six shop unions are among 11 nonoperating unions involved in the wage talks. The other five unions have set no strike action, but reportedly would respect the picket lines of the shop men.

All told, the 31 unions involve more than 400,000 railroad employees.

The shop craft unions have rejected a recommendation of a presidentially appointed mediator for wage increases of 27 cents an hour over three years, contending it was too little.
