ing, day-by-day war as the world has  
 witnessed since Korea, but the only way  
 its existence has ever been reported to  
 the United Nations has been in connec-  
 tion with possible trouble along the  
 border between South Vietnam and  
 Cambodia.

The gaps and deficiencies in the  
 American position are therefore obvious.  
 This is still what President Eisen-  
 hower's military advisers told him it  
 was in 1954—the wrong war in the  
 wrong place. And, as the biggest war  
 now being waged on the face of this  
 earth, it certainly belongs in the juris-  
 diction of the United Nations.

The real principle on test in South  
 Vietnam is not Communism or democ-  
 racy, nor American prestige or Chi-  
 nese expansionism, but the principle of  
 law and order.

How that principle applies to the sit-  
 uation in South Vietnam, and who  
 should be entrusted with the responsi-  
 bility for enforcing that principle should  
 be matters for broadest international  
 decision, and for internationally orga-  
 nized police action, not for one nation  
 vigilanteism.

We, in our position in South Vietnam,  
 need help, not in guns and dollars and  
 soldiers, which we have, but in policy  
 and diplomacy, where we seem unable  
 to achieve freedom of thought and  
 movement.

**The Good Life**

What may be the oldest shelter built  
 for himself by man on the continent of  
 Europe has now been located in North-  
 ern Greece. It contains many of the

Before the election, we at-  
 tempted to describe something  
 of the manner in which Dodd  
 and Republican challenger John  
 Davis Lodge, seemed to be try-  
 ing to play in each other's  
 court. And we said it was a lit-  
 tle difficult trying to keep  
 score, what with Dodd ap-  
 pointing to Goldwater conservatives  
 with his record but not his 1964  
 campaign oratory, which sel-  
 dom mentioned foreign policy  
 issues, and with Lodge appar-  
 ently trying to fight off Dodd's  
 appeal to Republicans of the  
 foreign policy right without of-  
 fending Democratic and inde-  
 pendent foreign policy liberals  
 who might want to take a walk  
 away from Dodd.

The actual election returns  
 would seem to indicate that the  
 voters, such of them as do ex-  
 hibit mobility in a situation  
 such as this, managed to reach  
 certain decisions without en-  
 ducing in too much intricate  
 score-keeping.

In the main, they followed a  
 relatively simple and consistent  
 pattern. Only in one thing did  
 they did one of the special fac-

**The Angle Not Discussed**

For the best of motives—to keep  
 the people of Southeast Asia from being  
 swept up into a Communist tide—we  
 now looked into a war we do not know  
 how to win.

We are in a position which has been  
 faced by many nations before us—most of  
 them in situations and with motives  
 much less worthy than those we like to  
 credit to ourselves.

We are trying to win a war on the  
 soil of another nation without having  
 first won the people of that nation. We  
 are trying to win it without having  
 in position of power, a government which  
 we can trust or which is trusted by its  
 own people.

Almost every outside power in history  
 which has played such a role has  
 been forced to lose.

The way things go for us in South  
 Vietnam is typical of the ways all such  
 wars have gone since World War II.

The enemy we seek to pin down and  
 isolate can blend itself into the peace-  
 ful population at will. The population  
 will not, either because it fears the  
 enemy or secretly sympathizes with the  
 enemy, help us trace and corner the  
 enemy.

It is another completely typical fea-  
 ture of this kind of war that much of  
 the military equipment the enemy uses  
 against us is the very same equipment  
 we ourselves have brought into the  
 country, to arm our own supposed al-  
 lies. This equipment is either taken over  
 by the enemy, or easily captured by the  
 enemy from the native forces to whom  
 we have given it. And then the enemy  
 uses our own mortars and shells against  
 us.

It is not an inevitable law of such  
 wars that the more weight the outside  
 power puts into its search for victory,  
 the deeper it sinks into the quagmires  
 of defeat. But usually that is the way it  
 works. And the story of South Viet-  
 nam, through the past few months, has  
 been a story of the United States put-  
 ting more money, military equipment,  
 and military manpower into South Viet-  
 nam, and it has also been a story of  
 how the war has been going steadily  
 worse for us.

It is quite possible that, even with  
 more money, more guns, and more men  
 thrown into South Vietnam, the war  
 would keep on going worse for us, until  
 we would wind up in a few isolated gar-  
 rison cities being taunted outside by  
 invisible enemies.

It is quite possible, too, that we could  
 seek to broaden the war in South Viet-  
 nam by taking it across certain borders  
 in a proclaimed effort to snuff out the  
 sources of strength and supply for the  
 rebels in South Vietnam.

But there is no assurance that carry-  
 ing the war across borders would pro-  
 duce any definite result inside South  
 Vietnam itself. It might merely make  
 the trouble in South Vietnam seem  
 rather petty and local by giving us a  
 larger and broader kind of war.

All the possibilities involved in this  
 situation so far are obviously enough  
 part of official discussions going on in-  
 side the administration at Washington.  
 It has military experts and political ex-  
 perts who advise in both ways, in favor  
 of more and wider intervention and in  
 favor of trying to hold the present pat-  
 tern.

It has on one side of its thinking, the  
 memory of what we ourselves advised  
 France to do, in a similarly hopeless  
 outside power situation in 1954. The ad-  
 ministration has, on the other, the mem-  
 ory of its thinking, the heady feel-  
 ing that it hit the real enemy on his  
 own soil in the Gulf of Tonkin reprisal  
 raids last fall and got away with it, and  
 might therefore be able to strike  
 across international borders again with  
 impunity.

The one side of the Southeast Asian  
 picture the administration at Wash-  
 ington never quite likes to admit or  
 face is that it has never succeeded in  
 obtaining any international sanction for  
 unilateral American military action in  
 South Vietnam. It is in the area sup-  
 ported covered by SEATO. But that  
 paper tiger does not fight there. It is  
 in the area supposedly under the inter-  
 national guardianship of the Geneva  
 Conference of 1954. But that Confer-  
 ence sanctions nothing we are doing  
 there.

Finally, this is as much of a contin-

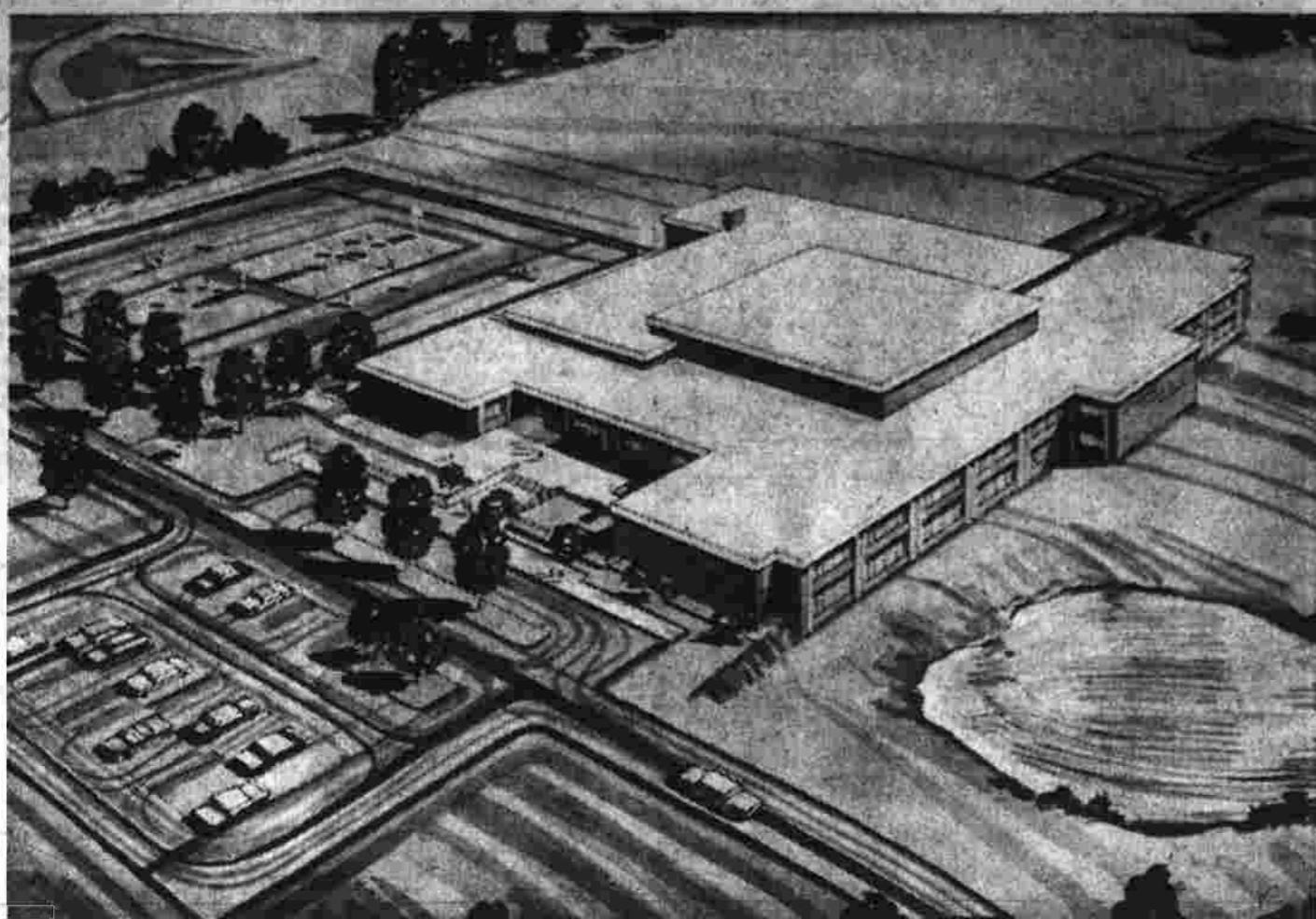

Poverty was Dignified

# Truman in TV Debut THURSDAY Television PROGRAM

NEW YORK (AP) — A peppery 80-year-old who has often appeared on television is making his formal debut this week as a television star. He is Harry S. Truman, former president of the United States, and the name of his series is "Decision: The Conflicts of Harry S. Truman." Twenty-six shows have already been completed.

The reason the series — an examination of his major decisions during the eventful years in the White House — has been launched without the usual fanfare is that it is sold to individual television stations around the nation, instead of to one of the three major networks.

Most of the 50-odd stations which have acquired the series have launched it this week, but on various nights and in various time periods.

The Truman series has been a long time in the making. The former president originally entered into an agreement with producer David Suskind to make 13 one-hour shows for network broadcast. Two were made and shown to the networks, which were not interested.

Ben Gradus, producer of the new shows, said the pilot films were made without strong documentation and amounted to a eulogy of Truman. Besides, ABC had been disappointed by the low audience ratings of its fine series on Winston Churchill. It has also completed a documentary series on Franklin D. Roosevelt but has never scheduled it.

Truman, however, wanted a television series and ultimately the rights were acquired by Screen Gems. Gradus was assigned to produce the series.

"Mr. Truman had the final say — but I don't think he made more than five minor changes in the scripts," Gradus said. "His own book, of course, was the base of our research."

## '90 Bristol Court' Tenants Leaving

NEW YORK (AP)—NBC has decided to drop two of the three comedies pulled together under the title of "90 Bristol Court." The first, "Karen," will remain its Monday night schedule, but "Harris Against the World" and "Tom, Dick and Mary,"

NEW YORK (AP)—It looks now as if ABC's "Mickey," which has not been well received and has also been hit by the death of featured player Sammie Tong, will be replaced in a couple of months by an extra half hour of the show that precedes it, "Shindig," a pop music half hour which has been a hit with the young rock and roll crowd.

CBS is not expected to make firm decisions about changes until the Nielsen Report to be released on Dec. 7. "Mr. Broadway," however, is not expected to last long, and several switches in time spots are expected.

## Rusty Hamer Will Be Guest

Rusty Hamer, who for 11 years played Danny Thomas' son and virtually grew up on "The Danny Thomas Show," has begun rehearsals for three guest appearances on CBS' "The Joey Bishop Show," seen Sundays, 9:30-10 p.m.

Still in his role as Thomas' offspring, he is cast as Rusty Williams, now attending college in the East and visiting Joey Barnes (Bishop) as a house guest.

Rusty, now an 18-year-old six-footer, already has graduated from high school and plans to enter Santa Monica Junior College in February.
