Congo Rebels Reveal Execution Plans American Missionary Sentenced to Death

BULLETIN NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) - Stanleyville radio said today that the Congolese rebel government "has agreed in principle to offer of the U.S. consul" to negotiate over the life of American missionary, Dr. Paul Carlson.

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP) - Dr. Paul Carlson, an American medical missionary who refused to abandon his Congolese patients behind rebel lines, is to be executed in Stanleyville today, a rebel broadcast announced.

The rebels charged Carlson, 36, was a major in the U.S. armed forces.

In Washington the Pentagon said Stanley is not a military man.

Another Radio Stanleyville message heard by a central government listening post Sunday night said Carlson had been sentenced to death by a military tribunal of the "Popular Liberation Army."

The broadcast referred to Carlson as "the American spy Major Carlson." A broadcast

today claimed he had fought against the rebels.

U.S. Embassy officials in Leopoldville have denied that Carlson, 36, was in the armed forces. They said Carlson belonged to the Protestant mission Evangelique de L'Ubangi which has its headquarters at the Covenant World Mission in Chicago.

Carlson was captured by the rebels on Sept. 21 at Yakoma, north of Stanleyville on the Congo's border with the Central African Republic. He had radioed earlier that he intended to stay behind to treat sick and wounded.

Christophe Gbenye, self-proclaimed president of the Communist Party of the Congo, said Carlson was a spy.

Key Witness Backs Rinaldi

HILLSBORO, N. C. (AP) - A key defense witness testified today Frank Rinaldi was out of his sight only a few minutes last Dec. 24 when Mrs. Rinaldi was killed.

John F. Sipp, an insurance agent and friend of Rinaldi, returned to the stand as the first degree murder trial of Rinaldi entered its second week. Rinaldi, a University of North Carolina English instructor, is charged with killing his pregnant wife. Both formerly lived in Waterbury, Conn.

Sipp said Rinaldi was out of his sight five times that day when he went on a shopping trip to Durham. The longest he was away, he testified, was about five minutes. Sipp talked slowly and calmly, describing the scene when he and Rinaldi entered the Rinaldi apartment in Chapel Hill between 1:30 and 1:45 p. m.

Sipp told the jury, "We both stood there for a few seconds, then Frank started talking, mumbling incoherently. 'Oh God, go see what happened.' He kind of pushed or nudged me into the room."

Officials closed U.S. 160 over Wolf Creek Pass in southwest Colorado and Independence Pass in the central portion as snow piled up three feet deep. Ten inches of snow fell in Aspen.

In Wyoming light snow continued to fall and highways were reported slick and dangerous.

The temperature dropped to 25 below zero in West Yellowstone, Montana's traditional icebox. It was 4 below in Butte.

A 16-inch snow stalled traffic near Broadus, Mont.

Snow fell in the mountains of western New Mexico, and Zuni reported a 4-inch fall. Northern Arizona and the mountains of southern Arizona were hit by snowfalls.

The Midwest drought abated somewhat after a day of substantial rainfalls. The U.S. Weather Bureau predicted a sharp temperature decrease as a cold front moved toward the heart of the nation.

Considerable street flooding was reported in northeastern Kansas after a 4-inch rainfall and varying amounts of rain dampened soil areas from central Illinois to the Texas Panhandle.

Temperatures in the eastern United States remained unseasonably warm. The range went from the below 25 in West Yellowstone to 90 in Presidio, Tex. Records were set in Louisiana, Tennessee, Arkansas and Texas as the mercury lifted into the 80s and 90s.

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - A snowstorm that blitzed the Rocky Mountains Sunday brought blizzards to northern Arizona and spilled wintry weather across normally mild central and southern deserts.

Hundreds of motorists were stranded, hunters marooned and 13 persons reported missing as the late afternoon blizzard struck the kingdom area in Arizona's northwest corner.

Police Charge Hartford Wife With Murder

HARTFORD (AP) - Police have charged the estranged wife of Kenneth L. Brown, 47, of Hartford, with murder in the fatal shooting of her husband.

Brown's body was found Saturday night on the landing between the first and second floors of the apartment house where he resided (at 5 Gray St.).

Mrs. Bertha Brown, 49, of Southington, who said she had been separated from Brown for 18 months, was picked up in West Hartford after the shooting and taken to Hartford Hospital for treatment of a back injury.

Police said she was hurt in a scuffle with Brown just before the shooting.

Police said they were told by Alex Toth, 31, Brown's roommate, that Brown was slain shortly after he answered a knock on a door leading to the apartment.

Toth said he heard what sounded like a scuffle and two muffled shots. Moments later, he said he found Brown's body.

Police said they caught up with Mrs. Brown after she had driven to West Hartford and stopped at an unidentified West Hartford house to complain of a backache. She asked for medical aid.

While summoning an ambulance, police said they checked Mrs. Brown's car and found a .22 caliber derringer pistol in it.

Mrs. Brown said she is the mother of three children by a previous marriage.

All 28 Aboard Perish In Nevada Air Crash

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - Wreckage of an airliner that hit a mountain peak in a storm last night was found this morning. Sheriff's deputies said all 28 persons were dead.

The propjet Bonanza Airlines plane vanished during a snowstorm just before it was due to land on a flight from Phoenix.

Searchers spotted the wreckage shortly after dawn Sunday. Helicopters flew to the scene and began flying bodies to a lower level.

The scene is about 16 miles southwest of Las Vegas near the railroad community of Arden.

The terrain is so rugged that Jeeps could not reach the crash site.

Searchers were directed to the area by a motorist who told them: "I was driving on Highway 91 between 8 and 8:30 p. m. when I saw a Bonanza plane, 70 to 100 feet off the ground, heading southeast. There were no landing lights on. One landing gear was down."

Baker's location was about where the plane was last sighted on radar but his sighting gave the plane a different direction: south instead of north. Sheriff's Jeeps and squad cars gathered on Highway 91 - the road between Los Angeles and Las Vegas - near the railroad siding settlement of Arden, where Baker said he had seen the plane.

The season's first snow was falling heavily as the search was launched. Soon after the F27 disappeared McCarran field was closed to traffic. Another Bonanza plane, Flight 104, landed north of the city at Nellis Air Force Base.

Six to eight inches of snow covered the open desert country near Arden, and higher drifts stalled many rescue-party cars.

Weather Rocks Nation East Remains Dry, Snow Blizzes West

CHICAGO (AP) - Forest fires continued to ravish woodlands in the desperately dry eastern half of the nation today, adding to the already staggering cost of the record-shattering autumn drought.

Rainfall dampened portions of the Midwest Sunday, but the light downfall wasn't enough to make up for weeks and months of no rain.

Communities renewed their effort to gain federal emergency relief funds, farmers hauled water to livestock, city officials planned alternate water supplies and farmers watched their winter crop will.

But in the Northwest, snow was piled three feet deep in spots and temperatures plummeted below zero.

U.S. Space Advances Slowed by Delta Ills

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. - America's scientific satellite program has been slowed seriously by problems with a new third stage on the once reliable Delta rocket.

Three Delta launches scheduled in October and November apparently will be delayed until 1965. They are the Tios 9 weather satellite, an orbiting solar observatory and an Explorer radiation-sensing payload.

These delays in turn will cause postponement of follow-on Delta shots. Only two launching pads here are available for the rocket, the workhorse booster for medium-size satellites.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Goddard Space Flight Center is trying to solve the third stage problem. It also is looking for a possible substitute motor.

The third stage, called the X288, is 59 inches tall, weighs 576 pounds and burns solid fuel. It has been used four times on Delta rockets and not once has it performed as intended. However, three of the satellites achieved orbit, and two - the Syncom 3 communications payload and the first Interplanetary Monitoring Platform (IMP-1) - are operating as planned.

An Explorer ionosphere-study satellite failed to orbit and IMP-2 achieved such a low orbit that most of its instruments are not providing useful data.

A space agency spokesman said engineers believe the X288 is "tipping-off" and "coning." Tipping-off is a term to describe a slight jar when the X288 separates from the second stage, knocking it off line. Coning means that it travels in spiral fashion instead of on a straight line.

The demanding missions as well as the problems with the X288 are the reason for the delays.

Parts Shortage Threatens Full Ford Shutdown

DETROIT (AP) - Ford Motor Co. studied its next move today in a parts-shortage situation which it says could lead to a system-wide shutdown of its 90 plants by the end of the week.

Approximately 58,000 of Ford's 180,000 employees remained idle in strikes or layoffs at factories across the country as negotiations continued with the United Auto Workers Union.

Included were 16,700 workers affected by local plant strikes which were reduced to five over the weekend.

Ford, blaming a car-parts shortage from key manufacturing plants, laid off 34,000 men last week. At that time a string of local plant strikes was idling 24,100 workers.

Both company and union expressed hope that all the strikes would be settled by the end of the week.

Teachers One Walkout Ended Today; New Trouble

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Striking teachers ended their eight-day-old walkout today, claiming success in their efforts to improve the city school system.

A spokesman for the Louisville Federation of Teachers said it would attempt to boost its membership and added: "We are convinced the system would be worse next year had we not attempted to wake up this community."

The board of education is planning to offer the public another referendum to raise teachers' pay as soon as possible after the first of the year, but the LFT said it would oppose the proposal unless it is included in the plan.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) - Scores of public school teachers, demanding an average \$1,000-a-year pay boost, descended on the Louisiana Capitol today as the legislature started a special 20-day session.

Teachers from a number of rural parishes (counties) joined those from three urban New Orleans area parishes in a demonstration for the full raise rather than Gov. John McKeithen's half-a-loaf.

One spokesman put the number of rural parishes sending delegations at 12. A half-dozen busloads came from New Orleans.

An Avoyelles Parish teacher spokesman said 300 or more teachers would come from their parish alone, where teachers notified their school board they would be absent and would make up for the missed day at the end of the school year. Public schools in the New Orleans area were closed for the day.

JFK's Monument Classically Simple

WASHINGTON (AP) - Plans for a white marble terrace and a low, plain monument for John F. Kennedy's grave were announced today.

The central theme for the grave site will be the eternal flame lit by the president's widow the day of his funeral almost one year ago.

The grave in a small grass plot will be marked by a gray slate tablet which the designers said was the tradition in early New England.

The flame placed at the head of the grave, will be directly along the historic axis extending from the Capitol to the Lincoln Memorial, and then across the Potomac River to the Custis Lee Mansion at Arlington National Cemetery where Kennedy is buried.

Steps will lead up to the grave site, on a slope just below the mansion.

In the center, slightly elevated is to be the rectangular grass plot where President Kennedy is buried. Its marble "frame" contains a kneeling step for prayer. Within the grass plot will be a slate marker about three feet by 1 1/2 feet in size, bearing the inscription: John Fitzgerald Kennedy 1917 - 1963

A small cross will be incised above the grave.

The marker for the late president will be flanked by smaller tablets marking the graves of the two Kennedy children who died at or shortly after birth.

The eternal flame will burn to the rear of the tablets emerging from a 3-pronged bronze font. The backdrop for the flame is to be a long low wall bearing the presidential seal.

Plans for the grave site were announced at a news conference six days before the first anniversary of Kennedy's assassination last Nov. 22 in Dallas, Tex. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and architect John Carl Warnecke were in charge of releasing the details.

Sen.-elect Robert F. Kennedy, the late president's brother, was to be on hand to represent the family, which approved the plans in advance.

The models for the gravesite will be put on public display at the gallery for one month, beginning Tuesday. Construction is expected to begin soon.

The grave is down a gentle slope from the Custis-Lee mansion where Kennedy, on a bright March day some nine months before his death, stood looking out over the city - the Potomac River, the Lincoln Memorial, the white shaft of the Washington Monument and the Capitol.

Burch Claim Pushing GOP To Showdown

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Barry Goldwater's support of Dean Burch's claim that he has "a four-year contract" to head the Republican National Committee pushed bickering Republicans today toward a showdown over control of their party machinery.

Burch said Sunday he will fight back if anyone tries to oust him.

Among others, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, former Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and Sen. Jacob K. Javits of New York made it clear they will use all the influence they have to force a change in leadership of the national committee.

Burch said Sunday he will fight back if anyone tries to oust him.

Goldwater said on his return Sunday night from a Jamaican vacation that his defeat by President Johnson that the party should honor Burch's "contract." Goldwater picked Burch for the chairmanship after his own nomination at the San Francisco convention and a committee in turn elected the Phoenix, Ariz., lawyer.

Burch has scheduled a January meeting of the national committee at which, he said, he would stand or fall on a vote of confidence.

Veteran politicians had expected Burch to save his \$30,000 a year job by some conciliatory statement that he would serve all party factions as a non-policy making director.

This would have followed the pattern of Goldwater's statement that the Republican course in the next four years will be carried out by GOP members of the Senate and House under the leadership of Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois and Rep. Charles A. Halleck of Indiana.

Burch, accompanying Goldwater on his return, said that as chairman he would be "mechanic and technician, not a creator of policy." He added, he had been elected for a four-year term, intended to serve it out and if anybody thought to oust him, he would fight back.

Goldwater backed up this statement with the observation that Burch was under contract to the party.

Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon told newsmen on his arrival in Tokyo Sunday that a GOP comeback hinges on finding new leadership "that is acceptable to all elements within the party, from Goldwater to one end of the spectrum to the other."

UN Council Hears Syria, Israel Today

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - Israel and Syria go before the U.N. Security Council today to charge each other with aggression and ask for action to stop it.

The urgent council meetings resulted from artillery and air battles Friday and Saturday in which 10 persons were reported killed and 37 wounded. It was the most serious outbreak along the border in years.

U.S. chief delegate Adlai E. Stevenson, the council president for November, called the meeting at the request of Syrian chief delegate Rafik Asha. Later he got a counter request from Israeli chief delegate Michael S. Comay.

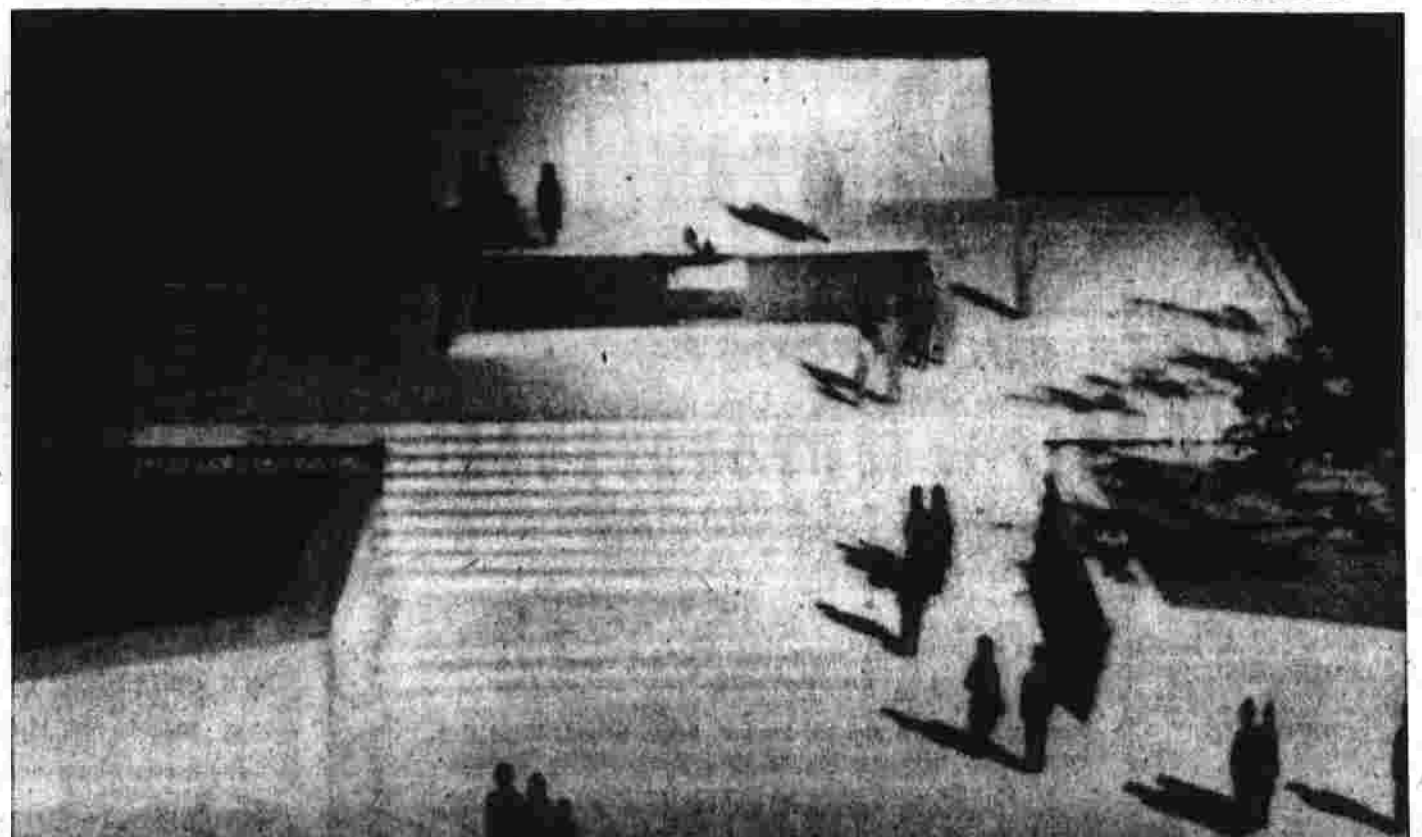
Syrian spokesman said his government was asking the 11-nation council "to condemn Israel and to stop her from committing aggression."

Israel was understood to want the council to call on Syria to hold her fire and settle any future grievances peacefully.

After hearing both nations, the council was expected to adjourn until members could study a report on the clashes from the head of the U.N.'s Palestine Truce Organization, Lt. Gen. Odd Bull of Norway.

A Syrian army communique on Friday charged that Israeli artillery that day shelled the Arab villages of Tel Hamra and Azzinat in the demilitarized zone between the two countries. It said Syrian forces hit back at five Israeli settlements and military positions and U.N. observers finally got a cease-fire. It said 7 Syrians were killed and 26 hurt.

Eastern Rain Eases Severe Fall Drought

CHICAGO (AP)—Rain swept across the eastern United States, easing one of the most severe droughts in history, but many areas continued to battle brush fires and to seek emergency water supplies.

Rainfall over much of the Midwest dampened charred fields and forests, but in the East water supplies dwindled and intermittent precipitation did little to alleviate serious drought conditions and fires in woodland areas.

Substantial showers moved over southern Illinois, wetting the area where fires destroyed some 15,000 acres of timber this fall. It ended a 48-day rainless span for Cairo in the southern tip of Illinois.

Rain in Indiana broke a 19-day drought, and a four-day ban on outdoor fires was lifted. Rain fell throughout Ohio, but the U.S. Weather Bureau said it wasn't enough to alter the drought-plaguing south central and southern states.

New England, which has suffered through its worst autumn drought in history, had some relief. Connecticut received only 1/8 inch of rain, but officials said it was enough to reduce the danger of brush and forest fires.

Maine and New Hampshire received some snow, but officials said it was not enough to bring the water table up to seasonal levels. An inch of snow in southern Maine and 2 1/2 inches of snow in northern Maine would have been a relief to the area.

Massachusetts officials considered asking federal aid for transportation of water to communities where reservoirs are low.

Water, water—almost nowhere! That's the story at this bone-dry section of the Cambridge reservoir in Lincoln, Mass. New England and much of the east are experiencing the worst drought in a century.
