





st radical position of the Chinese Communists on the left and that of the American Birchers on the right, it must seem an intolerable prospect that the very existence of the United Nations might founder on the question of whether or not several powers, including both Russia and France, can be forced to pay for United Nations peace-keeping expenditures of which they themeselves disapproved and whose legality they have questioned.

But if we concede, on the one hand, that it would be ridiculous to let the United Nations dissolve into division and impotence because of such a money issue, we also have to face, on the other hand, another kind of policy reality. The United Nations, quite obviously, cannot keep operating an "I'll pay only if I please" kind of world organigation. It isn't fair to those who do pay to just smile pleasantly at those who do not pay and then distribute their share of the burden to the good mem-Between these two considerations, the

obvious need is for some present compromise way out of any rule or ruin showdown, to be followed up by some clearer understanding for the future. The UN corridors are full of small nation efforts to find some good siv formula by which Russia and France can pay their obligations without admitting they are doing so, and by our point without really having won it

As for the long-range future, one great UN need is being emphasized gain and again by every fillip of this resent controversy over the bills for ast peace-keeping operations. It is the need of the UN to have its own indeendent, international source of reve-

which may resolve the present clash at the UN, the United States is engaging n certain maneuvers by which it hopes to strengthen its hand on its side of the argument. Thus, yesterday, at the annual pledging conference at which naions normally announce their prospecive contributions to United Nations echnical aid programs for help to deeloping countries, the United States anounced that it was withholding, temorarily, its usual generous grant, which s always much bigger than that of any other nation. Our point, in doing this, was to put dollar pressure on some of he smaller and needler nations of the world, so that, in a showdown, they might vote with us to deny Russia and France their votes in the General Assembly, if the showdown gets that far. Judging from the atmosphere at the

United Nations vesterday, however, we were not making either votes or friends by our maneuver. Instead, we seemed to expose ourselves to the argument that it was not big time statesmanship to be threatening to cut down one of the most worthy of UN programs because we were trying to win a policy point involving another and separate UN ac-

This is the kind of difficulty often encountered by any personal view of history, and one which Mr. Truman inparticular has to contend with whether he is giving a television account of some historic feud, or reminiscing to a class of students about something he once told Stalin, or even sitting down and producing his own formal memoirs in

What makes the experience particularly frightening to Mr. Truman's viewers, listeners, or readers is the enthusiasm and completeness with which, once he has reached his own conclusion and judgment, he reorganizes all existing evidence and perhaps reaches into some private resource for new and additional evidence in order to make a smashing case for his opinion. Mr. Truman may be quite correct in

many of the major contentions he makes and the major judgments he reaches. But his excessive zeal for finding and presenting the kind of evidence which ennobles his own role has again and again, provided a striking example of the way a little innocent prejudice, a little innocent ego, can alter almost any given event in history. Any given situation can be described in as many different versions as it has witnesses. And truth remains, usually, something not much better than a clouded confusion located somewhere among the different

Pick Your Own Drought Theory

Of all the things that can be nice about weather, the most wonderful thing of all is the way fact and fancy can be interchanged in theories either laymen or scientists have about weath-

You think, perhaps, that you are "way out" and just indulging a little humor when you blame any oddity in the weather on the atomic age? Don't be so smug. The scientists car sound twice as fanciful when they come up with their explanations of why it is

flooding or droughting, perspiring or

Take the present drought. It is being caused, meteorologists tell us, by the prevalence of westerly winds, which blow straight across the continent, dropping most of their moisture on the West Coast, and giving their cool shoulder to those clouds down South which might otherwise come up and fill our

westerly winds?

You can take your choice of scientific explanations. One scientific theory holds that this is a period of low sunspot acamount and type of heat and radiation reaching the earth, which in turn af fects the patterns of the winds. another scientific theory holds

that some sudden burst of heat from the sun happens to hit some great piece of ocean and warm it up a degree or two higher than normal, which accelerates evaporation in that particular section of ocean, and also produces, by associations not yet charted, rather persistent changes in the world's weather elsewhere. Once a pattern for drought has been set—the pattern so clearly marked for us here in New England in the past two years-it may hold on ever a considerable period of time.

Whether you like the sun spot theory or the hot spot in the ocean theory, you also have to consider a third possibility. This is that the cloud of dust thrown up in the atmosphere by the eruption of the Agung volcano on the isle of Bali last year has been shutting off normal amounts of sun from some parts of the world, thus triggering abnormalities of one kind or another almost everywhere.

These are scientific theories. If you don't like any of these, there seems absolutely no reason why you should feel ashamed of going back to your own suspicion that the bomb has done it, or that that second Van Allen radiation belt we established up there has done it, or that the orioles have been hanging their nests on the evening side of trees, or just that we humans haven't been living the right
