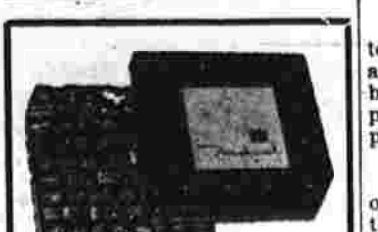

## People In the News

**GEN. DIONG MINH HONOLULU (AP)**—Gen. Duong Minh, South Viet Nam's second highest military official, was in Honolulu today for the support given the Communist Viet Cong.

Minh, who led the coup which deposed President Diem a year ago, said Friday that South Viet Nam is resolved to fight on to victory, no matter who the foe.

Concerning "whose influence predominates in the north," Minh said: "To us it makes little difference who it is. Our problem is the same."

**SYNGMAN RHEE SEOUL (AP)**—Syngman Rhee, 86, former South Korean president, is in Honolulu since he was ousted from power in 1960. He got his health improved in his home-land. It was reported Friday in Seoul.

Rhee is among a handful of politicians still on the blacklist under the 1961 Law of Retardation of the military revolutionary government to purge a number of former politicians.

Government sources said the South Korean cabinet took Mrs. Rhee's request and agreed in principle to take steps to make it possible.

**REP. HALLECK GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)**—Charles A. Halleck of Indiana goes to Gettysburg, Pa. today to confer with former President Eisenhower.

Halleck's Washington office announced the scheduled two-hour conference Friday. There was no indication of what was to be discussed.

**VICE PRESIDENT MURPHY MINNEAPOLIS (AP)**—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said he will resign about mid-December from his U.S. Senate seat.

Humphrey said the schedule would allow Minnesota Atty. Gen. Walter Mondale, who was named his successor, a good transition period in assuming his new duties.

Mondale was picked for the Senate seat Tuesday by Gov. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

**PRESIDENT KAUNDA EDINBURGH, Scotland (AP)**—President Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia and his minister of information, Peter Matoka, were bawled out publicly by their wives Friday for not writing home.

Kaunda and Matoka were speaking a telephone line between Britain and their newly independent nation. A loud-speaker transmitted the ceremonial conversation. Mrs. Betty Kaunda came on the line and told her spouse: "Have you been getting my letters? You haven't been writing."

Mrs. Matoka also complained she hadn't heard from her husband, to which he replied: "Ah, yes, I am receiving your letters, but like the president I just have not had time to reply."

**Britain, U.S. Clash Over Oldest Tank**

LONDON (AP)—The British army claimed today that it took the U.S. Army's oldest tank in running order.

The British contender is a veteran of actual combat in World War I and its engine is the one originally installed by the manufacturer.

Recently, a U.S. Army unit at Ft. Knox, Ky. reported it has a 1918 Ford tank which can still get around under its own power.

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## Sheinwold on Bridge

**SHOW YOUR SINGLETON LEFT PARTNER CHAMPION**

BY ALBERT SHEINWOLD

Stigma that depends on distribution of the hand is not a stigma, you may fear that partner has strength in the suit and that you are elsewhere. And if your partner has the singleton, you may lose the two tricks in that suit unless you find out about the singleton.

Both sides vulnerable

Opening lead—King of Spades

Experts solve this kind of problem by showing the singleton and allowing partner to decide whether or not the singleton is useful. You show a singleton by bidding the other three suits, preferably with a jump bid somewhere along the bidding. This shows you indicate shortage in the fourth suit.

North used this method in the hand shown today. He began with a jump response in hearts, continued by showing diamonds, and completed his story with a bid of 3NT.

Answer: Bid two clubs. At your next turn you will raise partner's suit (to game, to game).

## Wonders of the Universe Mars Exploration Part II

By DR. M. LEVITT, DIRECTOR The Franklin Institute

That magnificent bright reddish object you see in the early morning sky is the planet Mars. It is destined to be the object of at least four probes to be launched within the next few weeks in the United States. Two Mariner C Mars probes will be launched within weeks of one another to head off toward the planet. In the past few years Russia has launched several successful probes to Mars and the propaganda value of a successful Martian probe is so overwhelming that in all probability they will try again in November.

What is so intriguing about this planet which captures the imagination of the layman? Why has Mars been the focal point of a controversy which has lasted for almost 20 years and is destined to remain so until spacecraft fly by the planet at close range? History provides the answer.

In the year 1878 Giovanni Schiaparelli, the director of the Milan Observatory and a highly competent observer, scanned Mars with his 8 1/2-inch telescope and saw strange, highly competent markings. These markings apparently possessed no permanency but they did remain visible long enough to be recorded and on maps of the planet a complex of delicate straight-line markings were drawn. Later other astronomers in other lands saw these markings and, indeed, the Lowell Observatory in the United States was established with but one objective—the study of the planet. These markings have still not been defined and our hopes for the resolving of this riddle rests with the Mariner C Mars probes.

Schiaparelli had called the straight-line markings "canals." An Italian word meaning channels. Unfortunately, this word was translated into English as "canals" and with this translation the stage was set for popularizing Mars with all sorts of creatures.

Science-fiction writers were stimulated to write about "life" on this planet and place Mars high on the list of fascinating celestial objects.

The planet appears reddish in color for the surface is predominantly the color of a red desert. Even with a moderate sized telescope we can see the white patches at the top and bottom of the planet—the so-called polar caps. Keen-eyed observers can also see discolorated areas adjacent to the reddish areas, which may be brownish or greenish and which are intimately associated with the seasons. It is these dark areas

## That Fateful Day Nov. 22—a Bad Dream That Proved Reality

EDITOR'S NOTE—On that fateful day in Dallas, Jack Bell was riding in the presidential motorcade—four cars behind President John F. Kennedy's limousine. Bell, a veteran political writer and chief of the AP's Senate staff, recalls the tragedy of last Nov. 22.

WASHINGTON (AP)—It still is a bad dream that couldn't happen in real life. But it did on that day of Nov. 22, 1963, when a vibrant young president was murdered.

It had rained in Fort Worth, Tex., that morning. When I perched out of the window of my hotel room I saw a dark, heavy drizzle, a crowd already gathered in a parking lot across the street where President Kennedy was scheduled for a brief appearance.

By the time the smiling president stepped out of an elevator in the crowded lobby two hours later, the sun had broken through the clouds and the air was fairly certain that indeed the police cars were a form of hoarfrost probably not exceeding ten inches in thickness. ## AP Engineers Announce New Wirephoto Recorder

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—The Associated Press announced today the development of a revolutionary new wirephoto recorder, called AutoPhoto.

The new recorder is completely automatic, and delivers a glossy photographic print within 20 seconds.

Wes Gallagher, AP general manager, made the announcement to the annual meeting of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association in Phoenix. Gallagher said the AutoPhoto is the greatest single improvement in wirephoto reception network 20 years ago.

The machine was developed by Murrhead & Co. Ltd., of England, in consultation with the AP electronics laboratory. Gallagher said that AP engineers have been working five years on the concept.

AutoPhoto delivers a high-quality 20 photograph positive print, measuring approximately 8 1/2 inches including a caption area.

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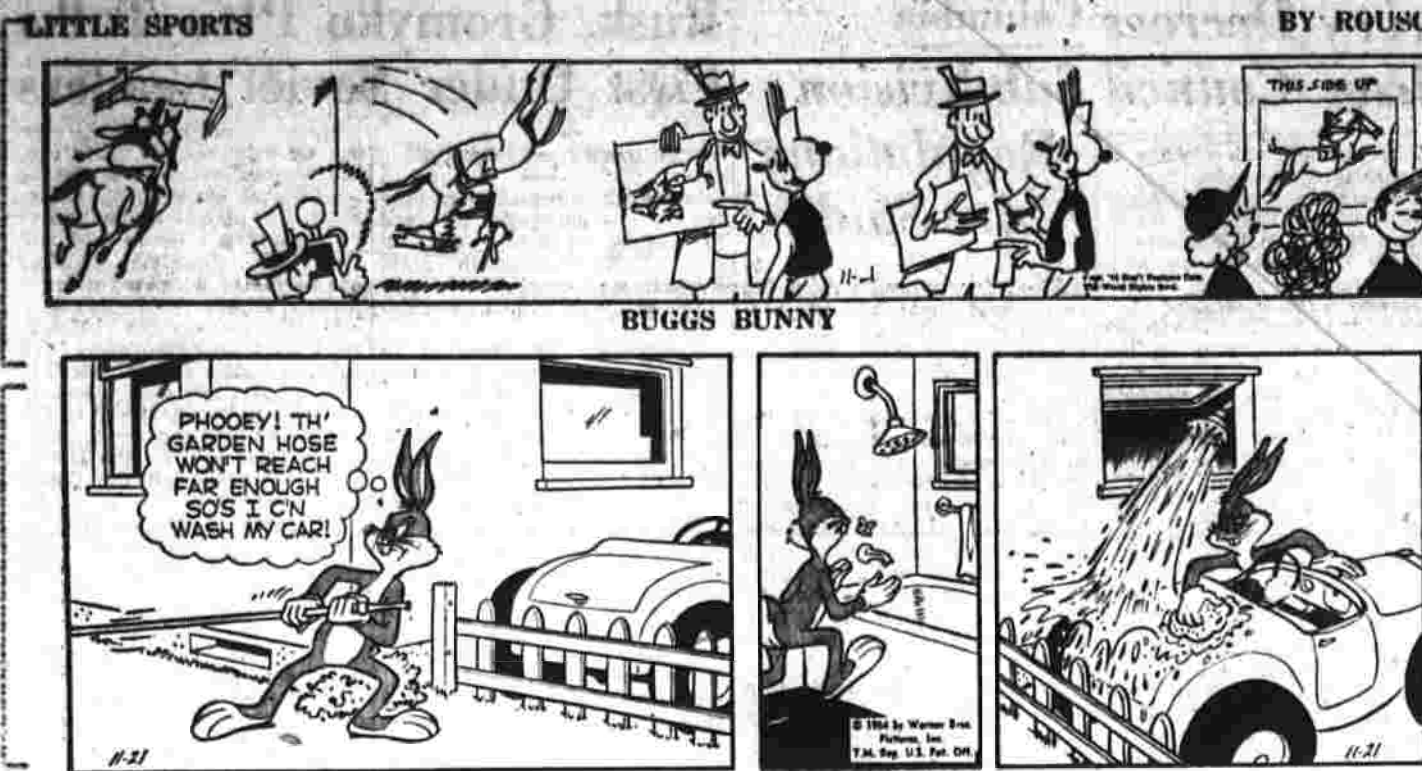

"Architecture and the Handicapped" was the subject of an address given this week by Manchester Architect Arnold Lawrence, A.I.A., at the 1964 Institute for Municipal Building Officials of New England held at the University of Connecticut.

Lawrence stressed that "consideration of the physically handicapped and the need to eliminate architectural barriers in the design of public buildings should be the concern of all architects and municipal officials. Medical science has made great strides in the past few years in extending the usefulness and life span of handicapped people. Such progress is wonderful and worthy of recognition. On the other hand, this same progress has created additional problems for the architect."

"He must give more consideration than ever before to the needs of the handicapped and the aging. His plans must take into consideration their problems and need to obtain economic and social independence. Many are providing a valuable community service and are making a significant contribution in the lives of the handicapped and aged by incorporating the American Standards Association's specification 'Making Buildings and Facilities Accessible to, and Useable by, the Physically Handicapped' into their working plans."

"Approximately one person in six in our nation has a permanent physical handicap; 5,000,000 with heart conditions; 250,000 in wheelchairs; 200,000 with heavy leg braces; 139,000 with artificial limbs; plus 16,500,000 men and women over 65 with varying disabilities, all of whom, as well as able-bodied people, would benefit from the inclusion of the American Standards Association specification in the design of buildings."

Television will commemorate the first anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy tomorrow with a number of special telecasts.

A memorial Mass will be televised from Holy Cross Cathedral in Boston on NBC from 10 to 11 a.m. It will be the first Roman Catholic Mass in English to be telecast. Richard Cardinal Cushing will be the celebrant.

"John F. Kennedy Remembered," will be presented by NBC from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. The program will return along the route by which President Kennedy's body was brought to Arlington National Cemetery from the Capitol. Chet Huntley, David Brinkley and other correspondents stationed along the route will recall, through words and news film, the high points of the Kennedy years.

The funeral route scenes have been recorded with infra-red film which will turn the sky black and trees white for dramatic effect.

CBS will televise "Four Dark Days," from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program is an hour of highlights from a two-hour and 35-minute summary presented Nov. 25, 1963 of the four-day coverage by CBS News of the assassination and its aftermath.

The broadcast recalls the period from Walter Cronkite's first bulletin that President Kennedy had been shot to the funeral in Arlington National Cemetery.

ABC will present "John F. Kennedy: Two Worlds" from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Personal glimpses of Kennedy as family man, friend and colleague will be shown in

film sequences and interviews with many of the people who were close to him. ABC said exclusive films will be telecast of the President and his family in leisure hours.

NBC's "Sunday" will televise the laying of memorial wreaths at the cemetery and services in the National Cathedral in Washington. The program, from 4 to 5 p.m., will include songs of lament that were written on Kennedy's death.

Photographs by Jacques Low of the President will be shown on a memorial tribute on ABC's "Direction '65" from 1 to 1:30 p.m.

The world's reaction to Kennedy's death will be dramatized in "Some Small Part of Each of Us" on NBC's "Eternal Light" at 1:30 p.m.

NEW YORK (AP) — Bill Cosby, one of the brightest of the new comedians, has been signed to co-star in an action-adventure series, "I Spy," aimed at NBC's schedule next fall.

The show will be produced by Sheldon Leonard, the man behind a string of successful series that have spun off CBS' old "Danny Thomas Show." Exteriors will be shot on location in Hong Kong. Most important, it will be the first time a Negro has had a lead role in a dramatic series.

Cosby, a studious-looking, gentle-mannered fellow who reserves his comedy routines for professional appearances, feels that his assignment is important.

"Not as a racial issue," he explained. "It's a personal quest. Can I do the job? Can this comedian turn into an actor?"

Robert Culp will play an agent disguised as a tennis bum. Cosby will be his colleague, disguised as his trainer. Cosby thinks the casting of a Negro in an important role is simply evolution — "it had to come, a time when the fact that the character was dark-skinned had no importance to the story line."

Still in his 20s, Cosby was a star athlete at Temple University. He was "discovered" on NBC's "Tonight Show," about 18 months ago and since has turned up on most of the television variety programs, scoring on most. He keeps away from what he calls "racial humor."

"I can only do what seems funny to me, and it isn't that," he said. "I think that perhaps the only real wheeler-dealer in bitter racial humor now is Dick Gregory, and that's because he is overwhelmingly concerned with it."

## Bing Crosby's Casualness Is Reflected on Studio Set

HOLLYWOOD — Bing Crosby always has been known as a casual, relaxed entertainer, and the atmosphere on the set of his new ABC comedy series certainly reflects this.

Between scenes, musician Sheldon Smith noodles softly on a baby grand piano, much in the manner of the mood music that used to be heard on the old silent movie sets.

Occasionally Bing will sing a few bars, or break into a soft shoe routine with that great trooper, Frank McHugh, a regular in the series. Pert Carol Faylen and little Diane Sherry, who play Bing's daughters, frequently improvise the newer steps, like the Watusi or the swim.

Usually assistant directors bellow for quiet in intimidating tones, but on the Crosby set results are achieved with a soft-spoken plea for silence.

Crosby seldom tampers with scripts, but sometimes a line just doesn't sound right to him. So he ad-libs. Like the other day when he and his TV wife, Beverly Gariand, supposedly were engaged in clowning banter while watching the old desert drama, "Beau Geste," on television. Beverly said:

"... I love the burning sands, the romantic tribesmen. Take me with you, Beau."

The line, "Unhand me, Lady Gwendolyn, 'tis my duty as British officer to seek adventure alone" seemed to stick in Bing's throat. So, instead, he said: "No, hanky-panky, Milli-cent." It played easily and director James nodded his approval.

The company shoots five shows in about 16 days, then takes two weeks off before filming another batch of five. This gives Bing more time for fishing or golf, and Beverly has chance to spend some time with her baby daughter. The rest also enhances the pleasant atmosphere on the sound stage.

But the crowning example of relaxedness came recently when a set visitor asked a crew member about a large, odd-looking net supported by aluminum tubing. He replied:

"Oh, that catches Bing's golf balls when he takes practice shots between scenes."

Warren Testimony Released

Eyewitnesses Recall Tragedy of Dallas

NOTE — The Associated Press today released testimony of President and Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, contained in the Warren Commission report but previously withheld from publication. Their accounts of the Dallas tragedy of a year ago follow.

26 Volumes Of Testimony Released Now

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — All testimony before the Warren Commission which investigated the assassination of President John F. Kennedy will be released today for immediate publication, the White House announced today.

Presidential press secretary George E. Reedy said the 26 volumes of testimony will be placed on sale at the Government Printing Office in Washington at 1 p.m. and will be for immediate publication.

Reedy, in making the announcement, said the action was taken because some of the testimony already had been released for publication by The Associated Press and at least one other source he did not identify.

Reedy said "released rather than large portions of the Warren Commission testimony."

He said it was clear the AP had access to more than one volume of the testimony.

Asked whether the AP had acted improperly or improperly, Reedy said he was not going to express an opinion on that.

Congolese Troops Keep Moving

Missionary Given Another Reprieve

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP) — Rebel leader Christophe Gbenye has stayed the execution of American medical missionary Dr. Paul Carlson again but he says the stay will end today.

Central government troops led by white mercenaries resumed their advance on rebel Stanleyville. They captured the town of Lubutu, about 120 miles southeast of the rebel capital.

In a Stanleyville radio broadcast heard in the Central African Republic, Gbenye added: "We expect results of the first negotiations before 24 hours."

Gbenye was speaking of talks in Kinshasa on the fate of Dr. Carlson and about 1,000 white hostages held by his forces.

Gbenye charged that an American plane bombed a small boat Sunday 75 miles from Stanleyville killing several men, a pregnant woman and a 2-year-old child.

He announced the decision to release all the testimony at a news briefing at White House press headquarters in Austin, Tex.

Ford Production Ready to Resume

DETROIT (AP) — With the last of its local strikes settled, Ford Motor Co. planned to begin turning out automobiles again today.

The first of 80,000 laid off or striked employees returned to assembly plants and manufacturing units as Ford prepared to rejoin the production race on 1965 model cars.

Ford, crippled since Nov. 6 because of what it called parts shortages, is expected to resume production by the end of the week.

After a wild chase in which he ran several stop lights, Yokum smashed into two police cars that were blocking Main Street at Christian Street, police said.

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Southwesterly winds are bringing milder air toward New England, the U. S. Weather Bureau said today.

Britain Moves To Reverse Trade Deficit

LONDON (AP) — The Bank of England discount rate was raised today from 5 to 7 per cent.

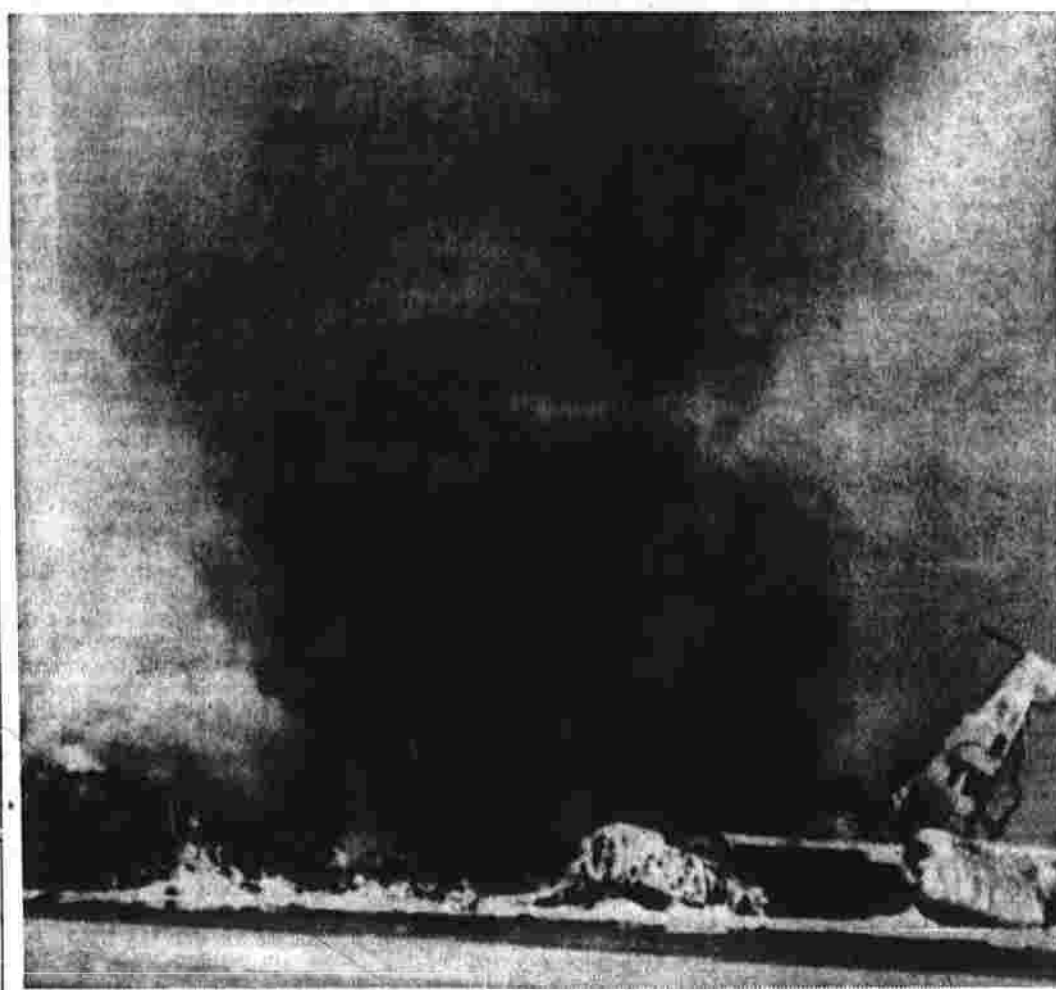

Death Toll Set at 43; 29 Survive

ROME (AP) — A jet airliner faltered on takeoff today, swerved off the runway and exploded after hitting a road grader. Forty-three of the 72 persons aboard the TWA plane were killed.

Eight of the 29 survivors were in critical condition, authorities said.

The plane was carrying 55 passengers and a crew totaling 17. The survivors included 22 passengers and seven crew members.

At least 20 of the passengers making the Rome to Cairo flight from Fiumicino Airport here were employees of TWA or dependents of TWA employees.

Listed among the passengers was a Bishop Daly and a Msgr. Sondag. The only bishop by that name listed in the Vatican year book is Bishop Edward G. Daly of Des Moines, Iowa.

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Rail Strike Delayed, Holiday Travel Saved

CHICAGO (AP) — Postponement of a nationwide strike scheduled for 6 a.m. today will allow rail traffic to move as usual this Thanksgiving week, but negotiations between the railroads and three unions will resume next week in Washington, D. C.

The three nonoperating shop craft unions put off the threatened strike for at least a week Sunday after receiving an urgent request by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz.

Later Sunday, J. E. Wolfe, chief negotiator for the railroads, telephoned Judge Joseph Sam Perry of U. S. District Court that the carriers were dropping an injunction petition which sought an order barring the strike.

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Thoughtful Nation Honors Memory of Beloved Leader

NEW YORK (AP) — A cluster of white rosebuds and jasmine lay among hundreds of other floral offerings on a grave in Arlington National Cemetery.

A somber President and Mrs. Johnson, both dressed in black, attended a special memorial service in Austin, Tex.

Air Force planes flew over Cape Cod in the missing buddy formation — one position vacant.

In these and many other ways a thoughtful nation paused Sunday to remember, and pay tribute, on the first anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

Many brought home-made bouquets or single flowers. The first tribute of the anniversary day was an armful of wildflowers from the sandy soil of Kennedy's beloved home at Hyannis Port, Mass.

A policeman stepped into the street, raised a gloved hand and halted traffic for one minute. A tall, middle-aged man, not quite sure what he should do, removed his hat.

Hundreds and perhaps thousands thronged throughout the day to the site.

They came at dawn and as late as 10:30 p.m., when one man using a flashlight added

Arlington

WASHINGTON (AP) — Shivering with cold but warm in remembrance, some 30,000 Americans climbed the long slopes of Arlington National Cemetery Sunday to pay tribute to the memory of President John F. Kennedy.

Some wept, some knelt, some touched rosaries. Some pushed the wheelchairs of the aged, others trundled baby carriages bearing infants who were unborn when, a year earlier, the young president was assassinated.

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Dallas

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Beginning at dawn and continuing until late in the night, people thronged Sunday around the spot where John F. Kennedy was assassinated one year ago.

About 200 to 300 persons were watching when the clock atop the Texas School Book Depository flashed 12:30 p.m., the time the President was shot Nov. 22, 1963, by Lee Harvey Oswald. Many snapped pictures.

At 1 p.m., the moment Kennedy died in Parkland Hospital one year ago Sunday, there was silence and stillness, as Mayor Erik Jonsson had requested for a sign of public respect.

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A single white rose, one of hundreds of tributes, is placed on the grave of President John F. Kennedy by his brother, Robert. People of all ages lined the walk at the Arlington grave from dawn to dusk yesterday, the first anniversary of the assassination of the president. (AP Photofax.)

Passengers O.K. After Emergency Boston Landing

BOSTON (AP) — A two engine plane made an emergency belly landing at Logan International Airport today after its nose wheel jammed.

Five persons aboard were unhurt.

An airport spokesman reported the plane had left Springfield, Vt., at 6:30 this morning with three executives of the Jones and Lamson Machine Co., which owns the plane.

When the nose gear jammed, Pilot Fred Vieweg of Springfield, Vt., returned to Springfield, circling the airport three times for about three hours while he and his co-pilot, Robert Page of Charleston, N.H., tried without success to lower the wheel.

Other planes took to the field to observe from below, but reported the wheel was only partly down.

The pilot then flew back to Boston requesting that fire trucks and other emergency equipment stand by.

The plane landed, damaging the bottom, and the engine coverings.

The three passengers were identified only as Jones and Lamson executives named R. Smith, R. Howe and a man named Cormier.

Students Aid In Dedication

TORRINGTON (AP) — Gov. John N. Dempsey dedicated a new highway today with an assist from some third grade pupils.

The governor officially opened a 1.7-mile section of Route 8 with 26 pupils from the East School as his special guests because they are studying highways in social studies class.

Several of the pupils helped the governor slip the white satin ribbon.

Dempsey presented a pair of engraved acetates to the children's teacher, Miss Judy Broggi, and directed that each child be given a piece of the ribbon.

The governor called the construction of modern highways such as Route 8 a sound investment in the future of Connecticut.

He said that new roads encouraged industrial expansion, provided more jobs, and served the public's convenience and necessity.

Tributes to President Echo Across Native New England

BOSTON (AP) — The assassination of John Fitzgerald Kennedy echoed in anniversary services of remembrance throughout his native New England Sunday.

Richard Cardinal Cushing, who knew the late president as a friend, offered a special memorial Mass before about 3,000 at Holy Cross Cathedral and a national television audience.

Rose Kennedy, mother of the slain president, attended two Masses in memory of her son at St. Francis Xavier chapel at Hyannis Port where he often had worshipped.

A hushed gathering of about 2,000 in the Massachusetts State House Hall of Flags heard Gov. Endicott Peabody say:

"Our nation shall be strong, our people free, our youth confident, our aged hopeful, if we but set ourselves to follow with vigor and determination the example of John Fitzgerald Kennedy. How well each one of us does this will be the true measure of our will to honor him."

Special memorial services, meditation hours and concerts were held in many churches and synagogues in New England.

Cardinal Cushing termed the assassination "a senseless blight on our country."

"He was taken from us on the very threshold of the promised land to which he had led us."

"How can I or anyone say that his life was incomplete or his promises and pledges unfulfilled? We are proud and grateful to God that he had him for almost three years."

The president's sister, Patricia Lawford, was the chief Kennedy family representative at the cathedral Mass.

Participation Key Element In English Version of Mass

NEW YORK (AP) — A layman in a dark business suit stood facing the Roman Catholic congregation, and read from the Scriptures, "Brethren . . . may you walk worthily . . . growing in the knowledge of God."

The setting was an image of things to come next Sunday in Catholic parishes throughout the country — a new mode of active communal worship with about half of the Mass being said in English.

In the forerunner here, the people rose after reading of the Epistle and in unison intoned a psalm in English instead of the priest alone doing it in Latin.

"Out of the depths I cry to you, Lord, O Lord, harken to my voice! Alleluia."

Participating more Scripture came another, unfamiliar experience — hymn singing. "Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices . . ."

The service, at Manhattan's Corpus Christi church Sunday foretold some of the sweeping changes to be inaugurated a week hence in the nation's approximately 17,000 Roman Catholic parishes.

METS BUY SPAIN NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Mets purchased pitcher Warren Spahn from the Milwaukee Braves today.

ESTES FORFEITS BOND DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — U.S. Dist. Judge Sarah T. Hughes forfeited the \$10,000 bond of convicted promoter Billie Sol Estes today and told the United States marshal to take him into custody.

It marked the first time that Estes had been confined since his first arrest by the FBI March 29, 1963. U.S. Dist. Atty. Barfoot Sanders made the motion for bond forfeiture because, he said, Estes had traveled outside the jurisdiction of the federal court, violating a condition of the bond.
