

Death Toll Set at 43; 29 Survive

ROME (AP)-A jet airliner faltered on takeoff today, swerved off the runway and exploded after hitting a road grader. Fortythree of the 72 persons aboard the TWA plane were killed. Eight of the 29 survivors were

in critical condition, authorities

The plane was carrying 55 passengers and a crew totaling 17. The survivors included 22 passengers and seven crew

At least 20 of the passengers making the Rome to Cairo flight from Flumicino Airport here were employes of TWA or dependents of TWA employes.

Listed among the passengers was a Bishop Daly and a Msgr. Sondag. The only bishop by that name listed in the Vatican year book is Bishop Edward G. Daly of Des Moines, Iowa. The only Sondag in the book is Msgr. Jo-seph Sondag, also of Des

Both were listed as passengers for Athens. Among the survivors was the pilot, identified as Capt. Vernon Lowell, Glen Head, N.Y.
