



Blind Man Seeks Place As Engineer

WASHINGTON- (AP)-In a small office in the Bureau of public roads a big German shepard watches curiously while its blind master clicks away on a typewriter.

Nearby are a mechanical Braille writer, a tape-recorder and a Braille slide-rule.

There are other aids immediately available for the blind man, James W. Jennings, but perhaps the most valuable tool is one he seldom touches — a bank of electronic computers on another floor in the building. The computers may become as indispensable to his career as his guide dog, Tara, is to his personal life.

They may provide a big boost for Jennings in his efforts to become a practicing civil engi-neer. He obtained the academic credentials years ago — he was graduated with honors from Michigan State University but he has run into considerable difficulty in finding a practical outlet in this field for his trained
