**Unbelievably Forward, Too**

Savagery inspired and assisted by witchcraft has been dominating news from the Congo, and has been inducing a number of summary judgments as to the present status of civilization in Africa.

This, we all feel ourselves, shows how far that continent has to go, how incapable its people are of governing themselves or showing any consideration for the rights of others, how much of a mistake it has been even to try to agree with the jury, and shaken off the dire warnings of Dr. Terry's official report, and drifted back into the first that they can make some reasonable use of cigarettes which will be reasonably safe for them. Millions of Americans, quite obviously, have decided to risk the dangers Dr. Terry's report tried to make so dramatic and conclusive no sane individual would ever smoke again. To him, it may seem like committing suicide. To them, apparently, it means a choice of a way to live, long or short.

Dr. Terry shouldn't be surprised. Mankind had warnings even more dramatic about the nuclear bomb, and it has, so far, made little difference.

a cigarette manufacturer by the estate of a Miami gentleman who died of cancer after some 30 years of smoking three packs a day.

The jury thus absolved the manufacturer of liability in the matter. Furthermore, it had been told by the presiding judge, that it was to base its verdict on its answer to this question: "Are cigarettes reasonably safe and wholesome for human consumption?"

The jury had to answer that question in favor of the cigarette before it could dismiss the case.

As Dr. Terry has made haste to claim, this did not, however, constitute an endorsement of the smoking of cigarettes.

What the members of the jury really thought of smoking and its connection with health was illustrated by the conduct of the foreman of the jury, a pack a day man until midway through the trial, when he decided not to gamble with his health any more.

But when it came to proclaiming some hard and fast verdict, the jury found itself snagged on that word "reasonably." That covers a lot of territory, and an infinite number of individuals, and a wide variation in smoking habits. And in the particular instance it was considering, the jury had to decide that 30 years of survival smoking three packs a day had, realistically speaking, been a "reasonable" amount of safety after all.

Between this hard legal judgment and what Dr. Terry would like to see the public believe, there is a dangerous gap. Dr. Terry's official report almost a year ago claimed the final conclusive establishment of a cause and effect relationship between cigarettes and cancer.

Human nature seems likely to make entirely too free and indulgent a use of any development which seems to contradict those formidable proclamations of last January.

The jury verdict down at Miami Beach opens such an ability to indulgence. Dr. Terry might as well, however, face realities which had become apparent long before this jury verdict. Millions of Americans have obviously not agreed with the jury, and shaken off the dire warnings of Dr. Terry's official report, and drifted back into the first that they can make some reasonable use of cigarettes which will be reasonably safe for them.

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**And Then Canopus**

Mariner 4 has had his fun with its makers, and has now turned a dutiful electronic eye, forswaking all others, on the outside figures involved in the Congo. And this Jomo Kenyatta, who is he, besides being prime minister of his country? He is, of course, the same Jomo Kenyatta whom the British held captive from 1953 to 1961, after he had been convicted of being the leader of the Mau Mau rebellion. And the Mau Mau rebellion, as news, as movies, as novels have taught all our memories as well, has been the most horrible revival of savage butchery and unpeppared witchcraft this century has so far seen inside Africa.

The leader of this savagery, of this depraved and sensual cult organized against the white colonialists, was released from prison in 1961, to become a leader in negotiating with Britain for the self government of Kenya, and barely out of custody for the unpeppared bestialities which had been committed in his name, became the first prime minister of his country a year ago last June.

That's who Jomo Kenyatta is. Perhaps, even though he is prime minister of his country, he is not really going to make it to stature as one of the first African statesmen. Perhaps he is not going to prove the present leader of understanding and reconciliation in Africa. Perhaps he is going to revert to the instinct to resolve the African problem into a bloody elemental war between blacks and whites. Perhaps that is the highest one can hope of an individual who has gone from terrorist to prime minister in the short space of 10 years.

But it is also amazing to note that Jomo Kenyatta did complete that much of the journey. And this too is Africa, 1964.

Young Turks Seek Early GOP Caucus

Rep. Thomas B. Curtis of Meriden, called the ball for a "Young Turks" in a letter sent to key Republicans early this month demanding the December meeting.
