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Canada, What's Ahead — Part III Extension of U.S. Influence Bothers Northern Neighbors

OTTAWA (AP) — The border between the United States and Canada often has been described as the longest undefended frontier in the world. It also has been called "the undefended border."

But you find it hard, nevertheless, to separate Canadians from Americans when you mingle with them at airports and in hotels.

Millions of Canadians have been in the United States or have relatives there. And there are tens of thousands of American citizens, or former American citizens, who live in Canada.

In Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island alone there are 100,000 Americans living in either American-born or born in Canada.

The lieutenant governor of Alberta and the head of the Calgary Rotary Club were born in the United States. The publisher of the Calgary Herald, Frank Swanson, attended the Columbia Graduate School of Journalism.

This interchange is natural, since 90 per cent of Canada's population and all its largest cities are within 200 miles of the U.S. border.

One thing is apparent when you're spent some time in Canada and that is that the two countries are, perhaps, more closely linked through common interests and economic ties than any two countries in the world.

At the time of the U.S. presidential election, Canadians followed the results with the same interest that they would show in their own elections.

Toronto columnist Bruce West found that most Canadians were so warmly at each other across the boundary line that the Great Lakes never quite freeze solid.

New Phase in Cola War

The soft drink war has entered a new phase, quite as fascinating in a relaxed way, as the cold war itself. But before we discuss the latest play, a brief summary of what has gone before would not be amiss.

During the Eisenhower years, one particular brand of soft drink had the special entry at the White House and the distinguished ambassadors to send abroad. When it got abroad, one of its chief functions seemed to be to serve as a symbol of the kind of civilization our ideological enemies in the world attacked, and wanted to send home, and considered it capitalist treachery to drink.

When Eisenhower left the White House, a rival soft drink of imitative name, hitherto in second place in popularity, began to establish itself as the new court favorite. At the same time, it began to employ distinguished ambassadors of its own, who began making extended journeys around the world, commencing as authorities on the cold war while they themselves pursued the soft drink, or the cola, war.

The spectacle of two American soft drinks fighting over the world market proved tempting for the Russians under Khrushchev, who often seemed wistfully envious of the ploys and gimmicks of capitalism, and the Russians announced that they were about to enter the world market with a soft drink of their own, called Kvasa.

What has happened, now, to throw the cola war into a new phase, is the disclosure that one of the American competitors in the cold war involves a contest at Washington with the advent of the Kennedy administration, has apparently decided to steal a march on its American competitor and deal a severe thrust to the prospective Kvasa competition from Russia by invading several of the satellite countries with its own American product.

This prospect of at least a limited co-existence in the cold war involves a contest between the United States and Russia, or between East and West, but between differing views of the functioning and power of the United Nations.

Both Russia and France make essentially the same claim. They claim they are not legally obligated to pay a share in the cost of peace-keeping operations of which they themselves did not approve.

Federal aid to education is important to all workers, organized labor and unorganized alike. It is not an issue which union leaders can take back to their membership and say, "Look what we got especially for you."

This is what makes right-to-work and repeal of 14b so vital to the labor union brand. It is a symbolic issue that every union man understands. It is a part of the union man's bloodstream.

How Mr. Johnson handles this top priority demand of the labor union will tell much about the future relationship between labor and administration. But even if, as now seems likely, the President stays out of it or privately counsels against it so that repeal falls, there will be no labor case to do about it. There's nowhere else for labor to go.

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At Large Voting Gets Opposition

HARTFORD (AP)—Each member of a reorganized state House of Representatives should vote at large, says the League of Women Voters of Connecticut.

A spokesman for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People agreed, as did others Tuesday at a legislative hearing on bills to reorganize the General Assembly.

The League strongly objects to the "winner-take-all" results in towns with more than one representative, Mrs. Nelson J. Miller of Woodbridge told the legislators.

The Democratic house reorganization bill is among those that would have candidates for the House run at large in towns or cities allotted more than one House seat in a reorganized legislature.

William T. Shea, Democratic House minority leader, in denouncing the party's plan, said at large elections were suggested in the reorganization bill.

The three-judge federal court in the reorganization case has asked the legislature to follow the Clark guidelines in reorganizing the Assembly on a "one man-one vote" basis.

The court has given the legislators, who are meeting in special session, until Jan. 20 to reappropriate the House, restrict expenditures to \$100,000.

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Minister Competes With Reds in Algeria

LES PRELON GROVER, Algerian minister of education, capitalism and labor, today competed with the Soviet Communist party in a quiet battle for souls in this little upland village in central Algeria.

The Russians have arrived in numbers, assisted by groups of 20 to 30 satellite communists. Matched against them are the Rev. John Paulini, from Cranbury, N.J., and his wife, Marilyn. He has been a Methodist minister for 10 years, four of them in Algeria and the past 14 months in this village.

The Russians have started building a village for Algerians far from here. They have started with considerable fanfare a month ago but has slowed down. Young Russians, Yugoslavs, Czechs, Bulgarians and Algerians are living in tents near a wooden headquarters which displays pictures of Alexander N. Koyev, premier of the Soviet Union, and Todor Zhivkov, premier of Bulgaria.

Young men come from the Soviet Union and satellites to work to four months constructing the village. The aim is to build a model farm village intensive program in brick apartment houses instead of the rock hewn tents of the past.

They are running a small school, teaching French to Algerians. They also didn't write any language at all. Signs in the headquarters urge everybody to work for communism and against cor-

ruption, capitalism and dishonesty. One of Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella's slogans urges Algerians to be ready to die for the country.

Paulini has his home a short distance away, in the village. Russians have called on him and he has visited the Soviet camp but they don't see a library where he teaches French and English to Algerians. His wife teaches a kindergarten and primary class. In a little church he preaches in French and a translator converts it into Kabyle since this is Kabyle country — an old center of resistance against the French.

"I tell them stories from the Bible," he said. "They like the stories where the good people triumph over the bad."

Many of these Bible stories also are in the Koran, and they sound familiar to some of the 150 or so villagers who crowd into the church on Sunday.

Recently the League of Algerian Youth invited him to give English lessons in their clubhouse. The first night was a great success but when he came the second night it was clear they had not asked permission from the elders. Evidently orders had been handed down against it, for he was met by blank faces everywhere. He accepted it with good nature and dropped the project.

Atomic Desalted Water Not Likely in Future

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Nuclear-powered rockets to desalt water and supply electrical power, these include Dr. Glenn Seaborg, chairman of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

Discounting the feasibility of nuclear-powered planes, Roddis said, "I can see no purpose even in a supersonic passenger plane." He suggested instead that rapid-transit services to airports be established, for the new U.S. submarines, they suggested that both naval and commercial ship builders are lagging in the exploitation of atomic energy.

"Other maritime nations of the world are struggling hard to get into the nuclear-powered ship business," Roddis said, listing the Soviet Union, Germany, Italy and Japan.

"For long space missions, nuclear fusion systems will be required," Roddis said. "It may be between 10 and 20 years before controlled fusion power is achieved," Dr. Shoupp said, "but it's there."

The nuclear physicists, each with more than 20 years in the field, were pleased with U.S. progress in developing the new power source for generating electricity. They predicted even more rapid future progress with private enterprise taking a growing role.

The United States leads the world in nuclear technology, they said. "But don't forget that the British have generated about five times as many nuclear kilowatt hours as this nation," Roddis warned.

"The Russians have no really significant position in atomic power," he said, "but on technology their position is similar to ours."

Coventry Postmaster Lists the Rates For Mailing Christmas Cards

Postmaster Herman F. LeDoy has urged all patrons to send their Christmas greeting cards by first class mail and to mark the envelopes with the return address, including the zip code.

Amounts required for mailing listed by Postmaster LeDoy show the rates of five cents for first class and sealed envelopes; four cents for third class unsealed, and eight cents for each ounce for air mail sealed.

These rates are for all other foreign countries the rates are five cents for first class and five cents for third class cards unsealed. Air mail postage charges apply to all other countries and the post office can be contacted for such charges.

Postmaster LeDoy points out that greeting cards should be sent by Dec. 10 to distant states and abroad and by Dec. 15 to nearby states and local. Also, that special handling and special delivery mailing will speed the delivery of parcel post packages.

Letters mailed in the office will be available to rural patrons the labels for both local and out-of-town mailing. Additional labels will be available at the post office or from the rural carriers. All letters mailed during the month of December must have the correct amount of postage affixed. The rural carriers are not obliged to pick up letters mailed. Postmaster LeDoy says.

The local post office's annual Christmas schedule listed by Postmaster LeDoy will start on Saturday, Patrons are asked to note that the Saturday "shorter day" will be eliminated during this schedule.

From Saturday through Dec. 12 the post office will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., with the exception of Sunday, Dec. 13. The office will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. when the post office will be open only on Dec. 13 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for mailing purposes only (no deliveries).

From Dec. 14 through Dec. 18 the hours will be from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., closed Dec. 20, and from Dec. 21 through Dec. 24, the same hours of 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The post office will be closed Christmas Day and New Year's Day with no mail delivered either day.

Rockville-Vernon Permanent Building Panel Backed by Finance Board

The Vernon board of finance has returned without action a proposal from selectmen to build a permanent school and administration building.

Chairman Douglas Hayes, reporting to selectmen last night, said that his board is returning the proposal with a suggestion that a permanent building committee be appointed before any new projects are undertaken.

Hayes said the action was taken because the permanent committee could set on a seven-month period the conditions under which the school and administration building would be built.

He noted that the new elementary school could be built in two and one-half years.

Hayes said, "We feel we are not postponing anything, but we are trying to bring to a head a Town Municipal Building Committee."

The question of a permanent school building committee was brought up at the last selectmen's meeting two weeks ago. At that time, Finance Board Chairman Samuel W. Pearl noted that there were several school and town committees now in existence, and their number created difficulties among school and town officials.

Pearl said at that time he favored the appointment of a permanent committee, but in view of the fact that the school would soon take over, any action towards a permanent committee would be premature.

After discussion of the finance board's suggestion, selectmen unanimously agreed to present a proposal to voters at a town meeting, set for Dec. 16 at 8 p.m. at town hall.

Included in the proposal would be the appointment of a nine-member committee, three of whom would serve for one year, three for two years and three for three years. After the initial appointments were up, the committee would be filled at an election.

Pearl noted that the committee would be the consolidated government.

Hayes said, "We don't want to drop this building problem in the lap of the new consolidated government. The school and town would be the same as they are now."

"This is a dream I've looked forward to for a long time," Pearl said.

Also on the call of the meeting will be the agreement to accept \$1,000 from Harry Friedman, Ellington developer, for the Juniper Heights project in Vernon.

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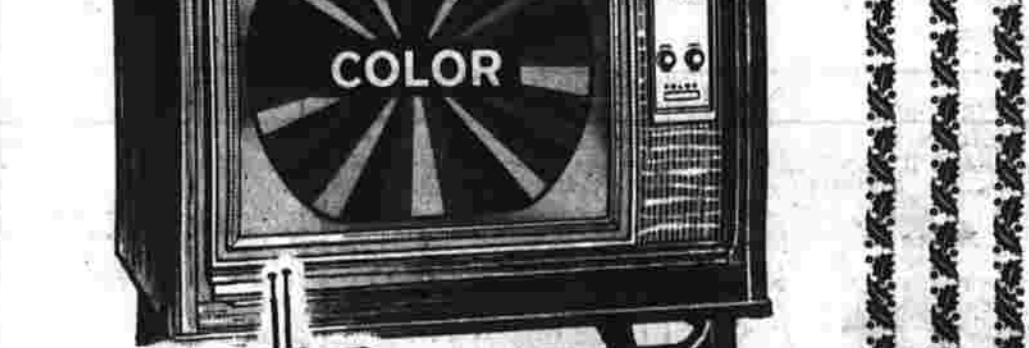
