EDITOR'S NOTE: Approaching 70, J. Edgar Hoover is once again the subject of criticism and controversy. But he is fazed neither and looks forward to a continuing active career. He granted an exclusive interview to Don Whitehead, author of "The FBI Story" and former Associated Press correspondent, and told him of plans for the future and Hoover's views on the place of the FBI in the nation's law enforcement apparatus.

Part of his exuberance, no doubt, comes from the fact that President Johnson waived last week the requirement that he retire at 70, which he reaches in January.

FBI Makes 20 Arrests In Civil Rights Cases

PHILADELPHIA, Miss. (AP) — The FBI arrested 20 men, including the Neshoba County sheriff, his deputy and five Klux Klansmen, today in connection with the mid-summer slayings of three civil rights workers. Striking swiftly, agents rounded the men up during the morning and carted them off to the naval air station at nearby Meridian. Teams of FBI agents at the sealed-off base questioned the men, took their fingerprints and photographs. They were to be arraigned during the afternoon.

Total Job Security Steelworkers' Goal

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Total job security for the steelworkers is a goal for the past few months. Today in a five-point program and a goal of the United Steelworkers Union says it will seek in coming contract talks with the basic steel industry.

A 12-page statement issued at the conclusion Thursday of a meeting of the union's internal affairs committee, which was headed by David J. McDonald, had referred to previously in general terms.

Other objectives listed were higher pay and "justice on the job." McDonald declined to estimate what the package would be but said the proposals were not inflationary.

As expected, the statement from the union's highest policy-making body directed that negotiations on the current contract be reopened Jan. 1 with 11 mill for steel firms that represent 70 per cent of the nation's production.

Plant level talks on local issues already were scheduled to start on Dec. 15. If no agreement is reached on either level by May 1 the union is free to strike.

Air Force Asks \$104,000 Refund From Hamilton

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force paid \$104,000 more than it had to when it purchased a traffic control sets from the Hamilton Standard Division of United Aircraft Corp., the General Accounting Office said Thursday.

Comptroller General Joseph Campbell said in a report to Congress that Hamilton Standard, located in Windsor Locks, Conn., should refund the unnecessary cost.

The Air Force could have bought 287 transmitters used in the traffic control sets directly from the Chicago firm that made them for a total cost of \$28,000.

Instead, the Air Force paid Hamilton Standard \$472,000 for the transmitters, the GAO report said.

Hamilton Standard added \$389 to the \$138 cost of each transmitter to cover handling, administrative costs and profit, Campbell said.

"It seems reasonable to conclude that all or a major part of the \$104,000 represents a duplicate and unwarranted payment of costs and profit," he said.

What the Air Force should have done was to buy the transmitters directly from the Chicago manufacturer and then hand them over to Hamilton Standard for installation in the traffic control sets, Campbell said.

Personnel at the Rome, N.Y., Air Materiel Area mistakenly permitted the indirect purchase because they thought the Navy, not the Air Force, had jurisdiction for buying that type of electronic device, Campbell said.

He said that under the circumstances, the Air Force should have waived Navy jurisdiction and bought the transmitters itself.

"Although the personnel responsible for the decision may have made a mistake in judgment, they were conscientious and have acted in good faith in the discharge of their responsibilities and that accordingly no disciplinary action was indicated or recommended," Campbell said.

Mail Early, Says Bailey

Postmaster Alden E. Bailey

officially began the Christmas season for the post office today with his personal suggestion "mail early."

He urged Manchester residents to undertake this heaviest of all Christmas chores as soon as possible.

"Virtually all Christmas mailing can be disposed of now by observing the following five suggestions," he said.

1. Shop for your Christmas gifts now.
2. Check and revise mailing lists for cards and presents.
3. Package and mail Christmas parcels promptly. Don't worry about being too early—just mark them "Do not open until Christmas."
4. Buy Christmas cards now and address them right away, separating them into their own town and local bundles. Mail them immediately, and don't forget ZIP codes.
5. Buy plenty of stamps now while post office windows are uncrowded.

Although Christmas cards may be mailed for four cents if they are unsealed and without personal messages, Postmaster Bailey recommends the colorful, new five-cent Christmas stamps.

"This year the stamps come in different varieties—pine cones and spruce, holly, mistletoe and poinsettia—all set against a white background. Use of these stamps insures first class mail treatment; not only may they contain personal messages but they also may be forwarded or returned free of charge."

To speed Christmas card handling, letter carriers and post offices will have free supplies of "local" and "out-of-town" bands for Christmas cards. Use of these will expedite delivery and assist the post office.

In urging patrons to insure parcels, Bailey noted that despite postal efforts, the postal service each year has been unable to deliver or return about half a million parcels, including many lost because of poor packaging or incorrect addressing.

He emphasized, in addition to accurate and clear addressing, the use of the ZIP code.

Canada, What's Ahead — Part V Creating Cultural Identity Causes Constant Frustration

EDITOR'S NOTE — Canada has seen her novelists, actors and painters blend the American artistic landscape with Hollywood television to fill the Canadian airwaves. The following, last of our articles, explains the efforts Canadians are making to develop a national culture.

OTTAWA (AP) — Despite the huge, creeping shadow of the United States, Canadians like to talk about building a distinctive Canadian culture.

Trying to create a cultural identity is even more frustrating for many than attempting to assert Canada's economic independence.

Some Canadian intellectuals complain that their own efforts are constantly nullified by massive doses of "Madison Avenue" influence. They also deplore the wall of big money which bars Canadian talent across the border.

Another obstacle noted by visitors is the multicultural nature of Canada. It is difficult enough to develop a cultural image if there are only English and French cultures to consider. But Canada is a country of many transplanted cultures and it has never attempted to assimilate any of its numerous national groups.

In Nova Scotia and Cape Breton Island there are Scottish clans with their bagpipes; in New Brunswick there are French-speaking Acadians who do not agree with the Quebec French; in the west there are Ukrainians, Greeks and Hungarians. In Victoria, B.C., there are English who still retain the flavor of their British ancestors.

The prairie provinces in many ways are much more like their neighbors south of the border than the French of Quebec or the Scottish of Nova Scotia.

Canadians themselves are hard put to define what they mean by Canadian culture. In a seminar, one speaker came up with an unusual definition. "It's not American, it's not English, it's not French," he said.

Canada has produced some excellent novelists, poets and painters, but not all of them could be readily identified by their works as Canadians. One of those who can is writer Hugh MacLennan, who deals mostly with purely Canadian material.

Prof. Neil Compton, chairman of the English Department at St. George's University in Montreal, has noted that the late Stephen Leacock is often taken for an American humorist. Jack Ludwig for an American novelist and Christopher Plummer for an English actor.

"The modern national state is an extremely useful organ of social policy," Compton said, "but we should not exaggerate the extent of its relationship to artistic creativity."

This view is reflected by Canadian scholar Brian Stook, who was graduated from Harvard in 1952, is now at Cambridge and has elected to live abroad. In a letter to the Atlantic Monthly, Stook expressed doubt that Canada has the spiritual resources to support creative arts.

"A great writer can only let the spirit of his age speak through his sensitive pen," he said, "and Canada is incapable of producing a Mann or a Chekhov, for she lacks the spiritual nourishment which might produce such an artist."

This view is hotly disputed by many Canadians, including MacLennan, who often has struck a blow for a Canadian identity in the arts. Others are campaigning in their own fields.

Canada has made a real effort to produce distinctive television shows in an effort to get away from U.S. influence, but this has been a losing battle, too. Even some Canadian products, such as the Miss Canada Pageant,

Glastonbury, Eng., Harbors Religious, Mythical History

GLASTONBURY, England — Inhabitants still say it grew into its thorn tree that blossoms twice a year, at Christmas and Easter.

Joseph is reputed to have brought with him the chalice that Christ used at the Last Supper. It is said to be buried in the vicinity of what now is called Chalice Hill, near the mysterious carpet of grass that grows around pillars of what was a great cathedral.

There is little doubt that Glastonbury is the ideal religious foundation in Britain. Archeological evidence indicates the presence more than 2,000 years ago of a Celtic pagan temple.

But what of Arthur, that half-legendary 6th century knight who is the hub of so many glorious British stories? The Arthurian cycle of tales was much inflated by French writers during the Middle Ages. It is doubtful that the historical Arthur was anything more than a heroic British general who fought effectively against the Saxon invaders.

But medieval writers spoke of him as king of all Britain and began his ministry, he came to Britain with Joseph and stayed briefly at Glastonbury.

In 1133 monks here said they had found the true bodies of Arthur and his queen. They were transferred in 1278 from the ancient cemetery south of the town to Glastonbury, where they were buried in the cathedral itself.
