





Same Day Primaries? An informal survey among governors,

by the Christian Science Monitor, has revealed considerable sentiment in favor of having presidential primaries held, wherever, they are held, on the same day everywhere. India And The Bomb

If one needed any special illustration of the way the world's nuclear curse tends to make its own appeal contagious and irresistible, one can take a look at the way Prime Minister Shastri of India discussed, the other day, the question of whether or not India should begin seeking to manufacture its own way into the world's nuclear club.

Prime Minister Shastri, as would be expected of a prime minister of neutralist India, and of the successor of Nehru, answered no, that India should not, just because its giant neighbor just to the north had now exploded a bomb, abandon its own traditional abhorrence of the bomb.

Quite within India's civilized tradition, Mr. Shastri said that India should, rather than trying to push its own way into the nuclear club and thus broaden the sovereignty of the bomb, keep on trying to "broaden the area of peace." And he said he had letters from the President of the United States and the Premier of Soviet Russia congratulating him upon that sensible stand. But Prime Minister Shastri also felt

compelled to say a few other things. In addition to setting forth high principle, he felt required to argue that China didn't have very much nuclear power, to argue that it would be a mountainous task for India to take up such a project, and to say, finally, that "our policies need not be rigid or valid for all

Perhaps it is not quite fair to extend and amplify the subsidiary meaning of such arguments. But, if one does so, one arrives at the possibility that if China were to develop a good many more bombs than it has now, and India were to find some easy, speedy method of catching up to China and having just as many bombs, then that might be what India would then choose to do.

India might quite well then choose to do that, rather than try to extend "the area of peace," or to follow the principles of nonalignment and coexistence. Even Nehru, it might be remembered, felt compelled to take Goa and to hold Kashmir, both by force, relying upon the opposition to contribute the nonviolence in such particular instances.
