Immediate Objection Launched Confession Revealed At Murder Hearing

MERIDIAN, Miss. (AP)—An FBI agent told a U.S. commissioner today he had a confession signed by one of 21 men charged in connection with the killing of three civil rights workers. A dozen defense attorneys immediately objected to use of the alleged confession on grounds it was "hearsay" evidence. The report of the alleged confession came at a preliminary hearing before Commissioner Esther Carter for 19 of the 21 men arrested last Friday. Henry Rasp, 35, FBI agent from Atlanta, Ga., told Miss Carter he got a confession in the killing from Horace Doyle Barnett, 26, last November. Miss Carter ruled Rasp could not give details of the alleged confession. Defense attorneys requested a copy of the alleged confession and Miss Carter called a recess to study the question of admitting it as evidence. Nineteen of those arrested were charged with conspiring to interfere with the federal rights of the three youths. The other two were charged as accessories. Barnett formerly was employed at Meridian as an auto-

Hot Debate Expected In Security Council

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U.N. Security Council headed into a free-for-all debate on the Congo today after voting to hear charges from both sides in the dispute. Russia launched a bitter assault against the United States and Belgium Wednesday night in a vain attempt to block discussion of Premier Moise Tshombe's charges that Moscow has been aiding the Congolese rebels. After a sharp exchange between the Soviet and American delegates, the council rejected the Russian demand that it ignore Tshombe's charges that at least three African countries were shipping aid to the rebels with Russia's help. The council voted 7-4 to take up Tshombe's charges as well as the charges by 22 nations, most of them African, that the recent U.S.-Belgian paratroop operation to rescue the hostages from the rebels was interference in the Congo's internal affairs. The debate, closed to the public to prevent demonstrations, was expected to heat up still more after Tshombe arrives Saturday to argue his case. Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko called the Congo rebellion "a holy struggle" against imperialism and branded Tshombe a stooge of the West. Tearing Tshombe's charges "an awkward maneuver," he said the council should deal with "the action of the imperialists and colonialists and their puppets in the Congo." U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson replied that the Russians were trying to throw up a smokescreen to conceal charges that they played a key role in aiding the insurgents. Stevenson said it was "almost incredible that the council should be asked to hear a complaint against those who have not intervened in the Congo, while refusing to hear the government of the country itself against those who by their own admission have."

Desperation Artillery Fire Routs Viet Cong's Assault

BA DUA, South Vietnam (AP)—Four U.S. Army advisers cornered in a small building by attacking Viet Cong infantry early today called in air burst artillery right on top of themselves to drive off the enemy. This desperate measure caught the Viet Cong in the open only yards from the Americans' positions. The assault faltered and lost momentum as shells screamed in from six howitzers. "We hugged our foxholes as that stuff burst 30 feet up in the sky," said Capt. Harry Spaulding of Seattle, Wash. "We were taken over the country. Another American is missing. South Vietnamese military officials believe the Viet Cong is spreading and firing three follow-up attacks in a South Vietnamese battalion guarding Ba Dua were caught in the latest of a series of concerted Viet Cong attacks on government positions. The Viet Cong have had mixed success. But there was little doubt they were thoroughly walloped in Ba Dua, a hamlet in Dinh Phuoc Province 45 miles southwest of Saigon. White House Asks Moscow For Aid in Viet Struggle

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House today asked the new Soviet leaders to use their influence to halt Communist operations from North Vietnam against South Vietnam. The request was made to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko by Secretary of State Dean Rusk in the course of a series of conferences Gromyko held here with Rusk and President Johnson. Rusk also asked the Russians Wednesday to work for peace in Southeast Asia. Gromyko conferred with Johnson at the White House for about 90 minutes. In a show of cordiality, the President escorted him to the door when the talk ended. Gromyko said disarmament and several other subjects were

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—Capt. Jesse F. Foley, 57, of Trumbull, has submitted a request for retirement after serving 34 years with the State Police Department. Commissioner Leo J. Mulcahy confirmed receipt of the request on the basis of medical disability. The commissioner said the request is under study and that Foley will undergo a physical examination later this month. Foley, who has served under five state police commissioners, has been assigned as field captain for the department's western division. He was appointed a state trooper Nov. 5, 1930.

Fatal Accident

ASHFORD (AP)—Arthur Angelo, 21, of Putnam, was fatally injured early today when his car hit a utility pole and tree on Route 44. State Police said Angelo was traveling at a high rate of speed when his car went off the left side of the road, sheared off a telephone pole, continued on and hit a tree, causing it to bounce back onto the highway. Angelo, who was alone, was thrown from the car. He was taken to Johnson Memorial Hospital in Stafford Springs and later transferred to Hartford Hospital.

Firemen Hurt

BRISTOL (AP)—Two firemen were injured while fighting a blaze that caused heavy damage to a two-family house early today. Edward Murawski, 22, was admitted to Bristol Hospital. The other fireman, Warren Coligan, 38, was released after treatment. Both were burned about the face as they fought the flames from a stairway in the house at 17 Cottage St. The fire, which broke out at about midnight, apparently started near a furnace in the cellar.

TORRANCE, Calif. (AP)—A private plane crashed in a fog-covered field of this Los Angeles suburb early today, killing four persons aboard, police reported. The plane was a Cessna 441, a two-engine, high-wing, four-seat aircraft. No identification was immediately available. Federal Aviation Agency spokesman said his information indicated the plane took off from Torrance late Wednesday.

Women Enjoy 47,000 Lead

STORRS (AP)—There are 47,000 more women than men in Connecticut today, whether bachelors care or not. And by 1964, bachelors may find themselves even more outnumbered, says a report written for the University of Connecticut's Institute of Public Service. The author, James S. Klar, wrote: "If our projections prove true, the rate of increase during the next 30 years will be 70 per cent for males and 86 per cent for females, and our fair state will have just about a quarter of a million more women than men."

Dr. King, Six Others Receive Nobel Prizes

OSLO, Norway (AP)—Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., American Negro civil rights leader, accepted the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize today as "profound recognition that nonviolence is the answer to the crucial political and moral question of our time—the need for man to overcome oppression and violence without resorting to violence and oppression." In companion ceremonies later in Stockholm, Sweden, Nobel awards in physics, chemistry and medicine were to be presented to two American scientists, an English woman, a German and two Russians. Gunnar Jahn, chairman of the Norwegian Parliament's Nobel Committee, presented the gold medal and diploma in a ceremony at Oslo University on the 88th anniversary of the death of the donor, Alfred Nobel, Swedish inventor of dynamite. King got the monetary award of 272,000 Swedish kroner—\$33,122—and announced he had given it to the civil rights cause. King, 35, is the 12th American and the third Negro to win the peace prize. He was honored for asserting the principle of nonviolence in the civil rights movement. Jahn said that King "is the first person in the Western world to have shown us that a struggle can be waged without violence." "He is the first to make the message of brotherly love a reality in the course of his struggle and he has proclaimed a message to all men, to all nations and races. "Today we pay our tribute to Martin Luther King, the man who has never abandoned his faith in the unarmed struggle he is waging, who has suffered for his faith, been imprisoned on

Flying Launching Pad Successfully in Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The Titan 3A military space rocket apparently propelled its third stage into orbit as a space launching pad today. After the platform circled the globe once, it was to launch a dummy satellite. Air Force reported that the second and third stages had fired as planned, and that tracking information indicated the upper stage had fired itself into orbit about 115 miles above the earth as a flying launch pad. The third stage is a unique multipurpose rocket called a transstage. Half way through the first orbit, above Australia, the transstage was to execute a space somersault, flipping around 360 degrees, to align its stabilizing gyroscopes. Upon completion of one 100-minute circuit of the globe the transstage was to kick loose a 3,750-pound cylinder-shaped satellite above the Gulf of Mexico west of Cuba. Judge Says He'll Delay Rail Strike

CHICAGO (AP)—A district court judge today said that a disagreement over wages that could affect traffic on more than 90 per cent of the nation's railroads has moved from the bargaining table to the bench. U.S. Dist. Judge Joseph Sam Perry said Wednesday he would issue a restraining order Monday forbidding three railroad shop unions representing more than 35,000 workers from striking for at least 10 days. The order would nullify a strike scheduled for Dec. 15. Judge Perry said the restraining order would take effect Tuesday and run through Christmas Eve. The unions issued a strike call Tuesday after negotiations with the railroads broke down in Washington. The railroads filed a petition in federal court in Chicago asking that the scheduled strike be postponed and requesting a temporary injunction. Judge Perry said he would hear arguments for a temporary injunction after he issues the restraining order Monday. The carrier argued that the strike deadline is an illegal attempt to compel the railroads to bargain directly with the three unions rather than with the AFL-CIO Railway Employees Department. The unions, in their reply, contended the court is without jurisdiction in the dispute, the railroads' complaint fails to state a claim for relief, and the three unions are autonomous and need not bargain through the employees department. The unions involved are the Electrical Workers, Machinists and Sheet Metal Workers. The railroads contend a nationwide work stoppage would cost them a daily loss in operating revenue of \$38,752,000. They have stood solidly behind a presidential emergency board's recommendation of 27

HARTFORD (AP)—A special legislative subcommittee puts the bill which would call a preliminary draft of a bill summoning a constitutional convention. The proposal will be submitted Friday to a bipartisan leadership conference. The bill would declare that the primary objective of the constitutional convention will be to redistrict the Senate, reapportion the House, provide for mandatory reapportionment every 10 years, and consider other constitutional changes affecting the executive and judicial branches of the state government. The bipartisan subcommittee, working on the proposed bill, reached essential agreement on

Uneven Show At Bushnell, Says Critic

Things went unevenly at the Bushnell last evening as Arthur Winograd's "Jack of Hearts" orchestra through another of the orchestra's regular subscription concerts, Guitman Novace, outstanding woman pianist, was soloist and conductor in a rather uneven performance, too.

Professors' "Lieutenant Kije" Suite opened the program and received a very good performance under Mr. Winograd's baton. It is a clever piece of music, not a great one, entertaining rather than significant. We were treated to a performance that fulfilled all the requirements, but was perhaps a bit over-serious in concept.

Guitman Novace then offered Mozart's D-minor Concerto for Piano and Orchestra. Her tempo was much faster than that of Mr. Winograd's and she has the technical equipment and tonal resources to play it very well, but it was not as convincing as she had hoped. It was unevenly done, and she did not seem to be in control of the piece. Her tone in the opening theme of the "Romanza" was a bit forced and her phrasing somewhat angular, yet when the very same notes recur in the recapitulation, she played them to the queen's taste, or even to a bright but unwarmed speed, which Mr. Winograd increased perceptibly in a couple of the orchestral tutti. Madam Novace played Carl Reinecke's cadenzas to the composition, and they are not eminently suited to the style of the original composer. So here we had an uneven performance of a piece that was not as convincing as she had hoped. It was unevenly done, and she did not seem to be in control of the piece.

Nuns Work In Factory

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Some habits had to be changed—in more ways than one—when two Michigan nuns went to work in a factory.

For instance: "The first day to start work, it was just like wrong on a job, and one of the men let loose with a loud and candid comment. You could almost hear an elbow hitting ribs," said Sister Jean Lawrence, who works in the factory.

She and Sister Janina of Detroit also told, in an interview Wednesday, how they had to modify the large sleeves on the habits they wore and take some extra material from the skirts for safety and convenience.

"When we arrived at the plant to start work, it was just like dropping a bomb," Sister Jean Lawrence recalled. "But Sister Janina and I were the only two nuns at the plant in North Can. Ohio, this summer as the sister of Mother Genevieve, superior at the Dominican motherhouse in Adrian.

The company makes colored glass windows. Mother Genevieve asked company owner Rudy Nobis if she could send two nuns to work as apprentices.

"Sure, any time," Nobis laughed.

"They had not really expected us," said Sister Jean Lawrence. "But they put us to work."

The two nuns, both school teachers, had been in the plant for four weeks, two 18-by-8 1/2-foot, for the new Maria Hall for sick and aged nuns at Adrian.

"The men were a little upset by having women invade their private domain, especially nuns," said Sister Jean Lawrence. "But, after a while, they seemed to get used to us. When one of them would have a minor injury, we usually got the job of patching it up, since we were the only women in the shop."

The two were chosen because of their art studies at Siena Heights College at Adrian, where they earned their degree credits.

Sister Janina said the nuns did all their own work, "except they answered us what to do once and lifted the windows for us."

She estimated the nuns filled some 1,500 small pieces of red, yellow, blue, green and other colored glass to fit the pattern for the window, designed by Sister Janina.

When they left the factory, their fellow workers gave them a going away gift of a box of candy.

Dean Patterson of 222 St. James St., bakes Cherry Glaze Cookies from a recipe given to her by her mother, Mrs. Marion A. Stevenson of Compton, Calif. Fluffy Salmon Loaf is another family favorite that Mrs. Patterson loves to enjoy since early childhood.

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup sour milk
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 2 cups coconut

Blend sugar and shortening; add egg, then molasses and sour milk. Sift dry ingredients and add to mixture. Blend well. Add coconut. Drop by teaspoonful on cookie sheet. Flatten with bottom of greased glass which has been coated with granulated sugar. Dip glass in sugar after flattening each cookie. Bake eight to ten minutes in 350 degree oven. This recipe makes six dozen thumbprint size cookies.

Fluffy Salmon Loaf
 1 cup salmon
 1 one stale bread crumbs
 1 cup scalded milk
 1 tablespoon butter
 1/2 teaspoon onion juice
 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 1 teaspoon lemon juice
 2 egg whites beaten stiff
 Combine bread crumbs and scalded milk and add to salmon. Add salt, butter, onion juice, lemon juice and egg yolks. Gently fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into a lightly greased soufflé dish or casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 40 minutes, or until knife blade comes out clean after being inserted in center of loaf.

Jagan Tries To Remain In Power

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (AP) — Charging irregularities in the general election that cost him his legislative majority, Marxist Premier Cheddi Jagan maneuvered today to remain in the government of British Guiana.

Jagan made clear he would fight attempts to install a coalition government, made up of Forbes Burnham's Negro People's National Congress and active United Force.

Instead, Jagan, leader of the British colony's East Indians, proposed that he and Burnham join forces in a coalition as "the quickest way to achieve national independence and economic and social peace."

Jagan achieved such a coalition, and with the East Indians outnumbering the Negroes 3 to 2, he would be in a good position to win the next election.

But the possibility of Burnham agreeing to a coalition with Jagan was considered remote. Jagan telephoned his proposal to Burnham and the latter rejected it.

Burnham said he had talked with D'Aguiar in general terms about a partnership. He said he anticipated no difficulties in getting together with the conservative leader.

The final official count from Monday's election showed Jagan's People's Progressive party received 109,332 votes, or 45.3 per cent, and 24 National Assembly seats. Burnham's party had 96,897 or 40.8 per cent, worth 22 seats, and D'Aguiar's forces got 29,812, or 12.4 per cent, and 7 seats.

Telephones Seen Doubling by '70
 NEW YORK — By 1970, telephone density in the United States is expected to rise to 57 per 100 population from about 45 per 100 at present. Long-distance calls are expected to double by 1970, so is the number of common-carriers. Revenues of the industry by Dec. 31 are projected at \$19 billion compared with about \$11 billion in 1963. The number of phones in service in the United States by the end of 1964 is likely to be about 87,400,000.

'Neutral' Home May Be Verdict For Actor's Son

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The 6-year-old son of Marlon Brando and Anna Kashfi might be placed, if necessary, in a "neutral" home, says a judge who heard charges that:

Brando didn't want the boy in her home because, he said, she had tried to kill herself, had a loaded pistol, and might harm herself and the child.

Judge Edward R. Brand allowed the boy Christian David Brando to remain with Brando while he considers affidavits filed by her.

Miss Kashfi's attorney in an effort to get the boy returned to Brando sent a probation officer to Brando's home to investigate conditions. The officer's report did not mention the Taliban woman. It said a nurse, a chauffeur, Brando and the boy report by the actor's home.

The officer's report said Christian was "extremely bright but very nervous."

The judge ordered a psychiatric examination for him prior to a hearing Dec. 17 into Brando's request for permanent custody.

"In this state," the judge said Wednesday, "the court has jurisdiction, even above the parents, over their children. If it is found to be in the best interests of this child that he be placed in a neutral home, this court will not have the slightest hesitancy in doing so."

Brando won temporary custody of the child Monday after he told the judge he feared for the child's safety.

The boy had been placed in the mother's care under terms of the 1958 divorce that ended their two-year marriage. Miss Kashfi was being treated Monday for what she told newsmen was a suicide attempt at the time Brando won the temporary order and then took the child from her home.

Later she took Christian from Brando's home and Brando took him back—aided by police and Judge Brand's order—in a wild scene in which a policeman later said Miss Kashfi slapped his face.

Her attorney said later that the actress had swallowed an overdose of pills, prescribed by a doctor, which were actually harmless, containing mostly sugar.

Miss Kashfi was to be arraigned in West Los Angeles Municipal Court on charges of battery and disturbing the peace in connection with the alleged face-slapping incident.

"I told him if he just wanted the money we would cooperate, but if he planned to harm the children he might as well go ahead and shoot us," said Ray E. West, 30. His wife and two small girls were close by.

The masked man with the .45-caliber pistol snatched, "take it easy, take it easy. Everything's planned," West said.

Police and FBI agents confirmed Wednesday that everything was planned — up to a point.

The plan called for holding West and his family as hostages to get into the suburban Buckle Park, and a valid passport. After police bullets and the helicopter halted his escape attempt.

But that was many hours after West's verbal exchange with the man with the mask and the pistol.

Police Capt. R. E. Little said the robber entered the West home about 8:30 Tuesday night. He wore sunglasses and a mask that covered his facial features.



NEW YORK (AP) — In a year of striking economic gains, 10 business news stories stand out. Stock prices, a tax cut, an interest rate hike, a tax cut, an interest rate hike, a tax cut, an interest rate hike...

1. Federal tax rates were cut. Results showed up in take-home pay in March. At first the money went toward paying off debts and increasing savings, but by late summer and fall spending was on the way up.

2. International money markets had a bad scare in October and November and American borrowers had some anxious days until President Johnson intervened to hold the interest line. Britain's fast deteriorating economic situation brought a run on the pound. The bank government tried a 15 per cent import tax, then boosted the bank rate to 7 per cent from 5 per cent. But it took a \$3-billion fund by other nations to halt the raid. Short-term rates in the United States also were boosted to prevent loss of dollars to Britain.

3. Stock traders clashed with federal regulators. The New York Stock Exchange and the Securities and Exchange Commission came eyeball to eyeball over curbing the activities of floor traders who act for their own accounts, and the SEC won that one. The giant over-the-counter market for unlisted stocks got a milder than expected crackdown, but also was subjected to more federal supervision.

4. Labor made some impressive dollar gains and set out on negotiating paths. A general pact with the auto workers sparked talk of inflation ahead and inspired the bulls in the stock market. Steel union emphasis on changing working conditions at the mills hinted of troubles ahead and customers began stockpiling steel. A rail strike threatened off and on all year, and labor strife on the docks was another cliffhanger.

5. Corporate profits soared. Gains were scored in each of the first three quarters and many companies set records. Dividends increased, too.

6. Government-business relations took a new turn. President Johnson won an unusual amount of support from business executives during his campaign.

7. Giant stock offerings and a record number of stock splits enlivened the year. In February AT&T issued rights to buy \$1.5 billion of common stock, a record offering. Investors also snapped up the offer of stock in Communications Satellite Corp. in June and pushed prices when it was listed on the exchange.

8. Prosperity made news. The business upswing neared completion of its fourth year, a record for peacetime. Climbing to new highs were personal income, industrial production, Gross National Product, and consumer debt.

New England Hit by Cold

Rain and snow fell in a wide crescent from the Northwest to the Gulf Coast, and made driving hazardous in some sections of Colorado and New Mexico today.

Cold weather continued to grip parts of New England and portions of the Midwest. The temperature ranged from zero to the teens in New England, dipping below zero in the northern valleys. The U.S. Weather Bureau predicted that sunny skies and southwest winds would raise the temperature to seasonal normals.

Harriehburg, Pa., received its first measurable snowfall, one inch, Wednesday.

Workers toiled around the clock to restore electrical power cut off Friday night in a 10-county section of eastern New York. The Niagara Mohawk Power Co. of Albany said several lines, including a 23,000-volt transmission line broke Wednesday after ice thawed and the lines snapped back into place. Some 14,000 updates New Yorkers remained without power.

Temperatures were in the 20s during the night in the Midwest, but were expected to warm during the day.

Kentucky, still short of rainfall for the year, was spattered with intermittent precipitation. The Weather Bureau said a storm that brought snow to the western and northwestern areas would spread into the eastern section. Mountain passes were snowed out.

One inch of snow fell in northwestern Colorado, increasing the amount on the ground to seven inches.

A storm moved into New Mexico, dropping snow on Farmington.

Showers spread from northern California along the western slopes of the Cascade Mountains. Cape Blanco in southwestern Oregon received .78 inch of rain in a six-hour period.

Salk System Works Well In Research

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) — When polio vaccine inventor Jonas Salk got the idea of bringing some of the world's great scientists together for a broad assault on the remaining diseases of man, there were some who wondered:

1. Would the impatient genius of such people allow anyone to tell them what direction their research should take?
2. Would they be any more successful working together than separately?

After several shakedown months in cramped temporary laboratories while a \$18 million institute is being built on a hill overlooking the Pacific, Dr. Salk and his associates have found answers to both questions.

First, Salk told newsmen Wednesday, he and the staff of the Salk Institute have worked out a democratic system he believes is virtually unique among research bodies.

In some institutes the director has absolute authority. At the Salk Institute each top scientist, or fellow, as he is called, is recognized as an authority in his own field, capable of determining what line of investigation should prove most rewarding.

He governs expenditures for budgets allotted him by the board of trustees, hires and fires assistants and can even nominate new fellows subject to final approval of the board.

The board, made up of prominent business and professional people, generally relies on advice from two committees. One is a guiding committee of three resident and three nonresident fellows working to coordinate the efforts to watch for possible duplication.

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Hans-Peter Tschudi, minister of the interior since 1959, was elected president of Switzerland today for 1965.

The election by a joint session of the two houses of Parliament was a formality. The presidency rotates annually among the seven members of Switzerland's government. Tschudi, who was vice president this year, was elected in his place.

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has launched its first manned space earth satellite, announced Wednesday night. The satellite would be dissolved Dec. 27 and a new legible message would be transmitted.

Disolution of Parliament was made necessary last Thursday by its vote of no confidence in the government of Prime Minister Sirimavo Bandaranaike, the world's only woman to head a national government. She has been in office since July 1960.

Defection from Mrs. Bandaranaike's Freedom party defeated her on the confidence vote.

The government radio-television network and weekly magazines also were hit by the contract dispute. Only foreign-language dailies were still publishing.

Speculators in the United States, Europe, and the Middle East have found now that Scotch is in short supply that they can buy new whisky from a distiller, hold it three or four years, then sell it to a blender who mixes malt and grain whiskies into a palatable blend. More than a million gallons of Scotch were bought for some \$2,500,000 by such investors in 1963, about 5 per cent of Scotland's output.

Soviet Chiefs Stress Domestic Problems

By WILLIAM L. RYAN, AP Special Correspondent

The post-Khrushchev Soviet regime seems to have decided that attempts to restore a semblance of world Communist unity add up to a bad gamble. Apparently it has turned inward to domestic problems instead.

The 1965 budget, unveiled Wednesday in the Supreme Soviet (parliament), and accompanying official statements appear to envision a period of relatively relaxed relations with the United States. Probably this must be at the expense of improved relations with Red China and the world's impatient revolutionary Communists.

Evidently the Kremlin plans a period of making time in the global political contest while the new regime entrenches itself and decides what directions it will take in the future.

Budget statements and pronouncements from the official press in recent days have shown a marked tendency to defy Red Chinese criticism and plug ahead on the theory that the internal economy cannot be shifted aside.

The statements pay lip service to world Communist unity, but there are deviations in the Kremlin attitude to delight the envious critics of Soviet policy.

Steps toward rational development of the Soviet economy, as outlined in the budget statements, surely will bring more anguished howls from Chinese and other critics who have accused the Kremlin of infusing

eastern dispute with Red China. In advance of the opening of the Supreme Soviet session, the newspaper Pravda carried long and important articles on "The State of the Whole People," a restatement of the Soviet Communist contention that the U.S.S.R. has advanced beyond the state of the "dictatorship of the proletariat."

This theory, first advanced by Nikita Khrushchev at the 22nd Soviet Communist Congress in 1961, has been a sore point in the persistent quarrel with Peking, which has long scored on the idea and demanded its repudiation. Pravda not only failed to repudiate it but gave the theory renewed emphasis.

Perhaps the new Soviet regime has decided that a developing contest with its big neighbor, China, for influence in Asia, Africa and Latin America is inevitable. Having irretrievable pressure for a reversal, it seems to have set its sights on a stronger internal economy as its most promising weapon.

South Windsor

Building Methods Given at Hearing

The public building commission... will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the high school addition in South Windsor...

The second notice received... building commission on Jan 8, 1964.

Joensuu stressed the fact that... building commission are tentative figures unless stated otherwise.

A cost of \$724,926 for the high school addition and \$27,783 for the firehouse were presented by architects at the public hearing.

Henry Fairchild, architect for the high school addition, said the cost of the addition includes the cost of the building, site work, incidental costs as architect's fee, the printing of plans and specifications for bidding purposes, equipment and a contingency fund against unforeseen problems that come up.

Fairchild emphasized that in all the work his firm had done in South Windsor one per cent of the total cost of the addition would be set up as a contingency fund in case of need.

Fairchild said he felt the estimated prices for the addition were high enough to cover the work and most likely the final cost of the addition would be less.

Joensuu said that 50 per cent of the reason for increasing the gym size was the lack of bleachers at the gymnasium. If there would be adequate space in the future, Fairchild stated that if bleachers were added on the back, thus requiring more space. It would mean rebuilding the gym or a separate gym.

By adding another set of bleachers at the end of the gymnasium, room for 250 spectators would be obtained. Principal of the high school, Fred J. Caruolo asked about increasing the number of tiers in the bleachers.

The architect is proposing that a reverse folding unit be used between the old gym and the new portion. When the unit is folded it would provide a partition between the two gyms.

The reverse folding unit is only constructed in a 10-tier unit. In order to obtain a 15-tier unit a wall type of bleacher would have to be installed.

Councilman Vernon Petersen asked if the folding partitions between classrooms in Orchard Hill School have proven satisfactory in preventing noise between classrooms.

Fairchild noted that a 12-inch partition has the same reduction rate in noise as a four-inch cinder block.

Supt. Charles Warner noted that the school had been getting good use with the folding partitions.

The proposed fire house will be located on the corner of Sullivan Ave. and Rye St. Chief Philip Crombie pointed out that eight or nine years ago Firehouse 2 was built. A survey of the town was made by the Fire Rating Bureau. At that time three fire stations were recommended for the town.

Crombie emphasized that the people in the northwest section of town are out of the three-mile limit. This includes Rye St., Main St. north of Strong Rd. and Griffin Rd. west of the railroad tracks.

These people do not receive credit on their fire insurance. He also noted that response to fire calls in these areas is about double of that in other areas.

Chief Crombie emphasized the danger to life and property because of the added time in answering fire calls in these areas. Chief Crombie pointed out that a fire station in this section of town will help in the recruitment of firemen. He said about 10 men had already been recruited from this area.

The firehouse will be a two-bay station of colonial design. It will also provide room eventually for a ladder company. There is storage room and work area and a training area.

The proposed firehouse will also provide space for minor repairs to fire trucks. The firehouse is not designed as a headquarters unit with administrative offices although it does have office space. It was designed as an outlying station.

The building is built on a brick base with a masonry block back up. A spray glass will be used on inside of the station for easy maintenance. The architect emphasized that it was a "solidly built building with few frills."

The cost of the building without site work in the preliminary plans was \$57,708 with a contingency fund of \$24,000.

The public building commission and fire department will meet again to cover the preliminary plans.

Chairman Joensuu outlined the steps in the methods and procedures set up by the town in order to construct a public building. He declared everything was right on schedule for the building of the high school addition.

Joensuu explained the history of the public building commission and said when the need for a building arises in the town, the need is presented to the town council.
