This, in broad outline, is the way the new reorganization will stack up, sources said:

The current 400,000-man guard would be swelled by Jabout 150,000 men from the organized Army Reserve. The other 150,000 reservists now drawing drill pay would go into the manpower pool that would total about 450,000 men available to fill out units or create new ones in time of need.

Acheson, Not Goldwater

We herewith submit, to our limited panel of readers, a series of quotations. If they are not quotations from a speech made by former Secretary of State Dean Acheson up at Amherst the other night, then they are from some of the collected utterances of Senator Barry Goldwater. The game our readers are nvited to play is to decide, for themselves, who should get credit for each

Quotation No. 1: "Where an important purpose of diplomacy is to further enduring good relations between states, the methods-the modes of conduct-by which relations between states are carried on must be designed to inspire trust and confidence."

Quotation No. 2: "The fact is that nations are not individuals; the cause and effect of their actions are not individuals; the cause and effect of their actions are wholly different; and what a government can and should do with the resources which it takes from its citizens must be governed by wholly different considerations from those which properly determine an individual's use of his own."

Quotation No. 3: "The criteria should be hard-headed in the extreme. Decisions are not helped by considering them n terms of sharing, brotherly love, the Golden Rule, or inducting our citizens into the kingdom of heaven."

Quotation No. 4: "Is it moral to deny ourselves the use of force in all circumit, under handy excuses, whenever it seems useful to tip the scales of power against every value we think of as moral and as making life worth living? "It seems to be not only a bad bargain, but a stupid one. I would say al-

most an immoral one." Quotation No. 5: "I told him that on the day of judgment his view might be confirmed and that he was free to go forth and preach the necessity for salvation. It was not, however, a view which I could entertain as a public ser-

Quotation No. 6: "This is what I mean by the strategic approach. If you object that is no different from saying that the end justifies the means, I must answer that in foreign affairs only the end can justify the means."

However our panel of readers divided these statements between Mr. Acheson and Mr. Goldwater, they were wrong if they divided them at all.

They were all pure Acheson, and closer examination will reveal that these quotations bear only the most superficial resemblance to anything ever maid by Goldwater.

The superficial resemblance between these statements by Acheson and what people have assumed to be the mood of Goldwater lies merely in their atmosphere of toughness and ruthlessness, in the free and easy way they advocate that we meet force with force, deceit with deceit, and go after results, never mind the niceties of casual principles

which might lie in the way. Acheson and Goldwater are both "tough guys," when they talk about how we should act in the world.

But Goldwater has never come close

to being as cynical and unprincipled as Acheson. Goldwater, instead, is a man who cannot resist spending a lot of time and thought on those same moral precepts and maxims which Acheson says ought to be left out of national policy. Goldwater says we should be more moral; Acheson preaches that we should be less moral. Goldwater mourns the passing of old ideals; Acheson laments the fact that we pretend to have so

underneath their different brands of surface talk, what a policy pair they could make! Just imagine Acheson formulating the smoother. more diplomatic words for Goldwater, and Goldwater applying the gentler. restraining hand to Acheson's love of showdown action!

There's only one thing standing in the way. A long long time ago the right wing to which Goldwater belongs decided that Acheson was "soft on Communism," and it has not yet brought itself to admit the truth, which is that. for many years he has been taking the hardest line of all American policy thinkers, including those of the far

ed that Communists have never won a free election who have also claimed that Premier Cheddi Jagan, of British Guiana, is clearly a Communist. Yet Jagan, by all easonable tests, got into office through free elections, supervised by our friends

But perhaps, if the rule about how Communists can get into office may have to be discarded, here and there, a new rule can be substituted. Perhaps one can say that Communists once in office will never concede the loss of office as the What we have today, anyway, is this

same Premier Jagan, on the short end n British Guiana Monday, proclaiming that he will not honor its results, and will stay in office until he is thrown out, not by the election results, but apparently by somebody's physical force.

Premier Jagan, in other words, is willing to take the free election route into power, but not out of power. This may, or may not be, exclusively a Communist trait.

Legalized gambling, whether it be bookmaking, slot machines or a statesponsored sweepstakes, builds the atmosphere well loved by the clutchinge predatory type of individual-and the syndicates, of course. What appears to be sweet and clean at the outset attracts such influences over a period of years. This will be discovered eventually by the state of New Hampshire or any other state that cultivates the some-thing-for-nothing fever

The National Consultation on Legalized Gambling held recently in New York City by the National Council of Churches was told by a U.S. circuit court judge from Detroit that legalized gambling does not take control of such activity from criminal elements. "Rathe than getting rid of crime by legalized gambling," he said, "you would put organized crime in charge in an even big ger way. Gambling is the easiest business to run dishonestly. We've seen what has happened in Nevada." The reference was to a Justice Department that Las Vegas, Nev., had "by far"

the highest per capita crime rate in The editor of a leading labor publication said it was time for "more businessmen and union officers to get better acquainted with the facts" about legalized gambling. He added that "too often in recent years, intelligent citizens have bling without bothering to find out what it's all about." The editor noted that when the nation was young, gambling was legal in every state, and that public private lotteries were common.
