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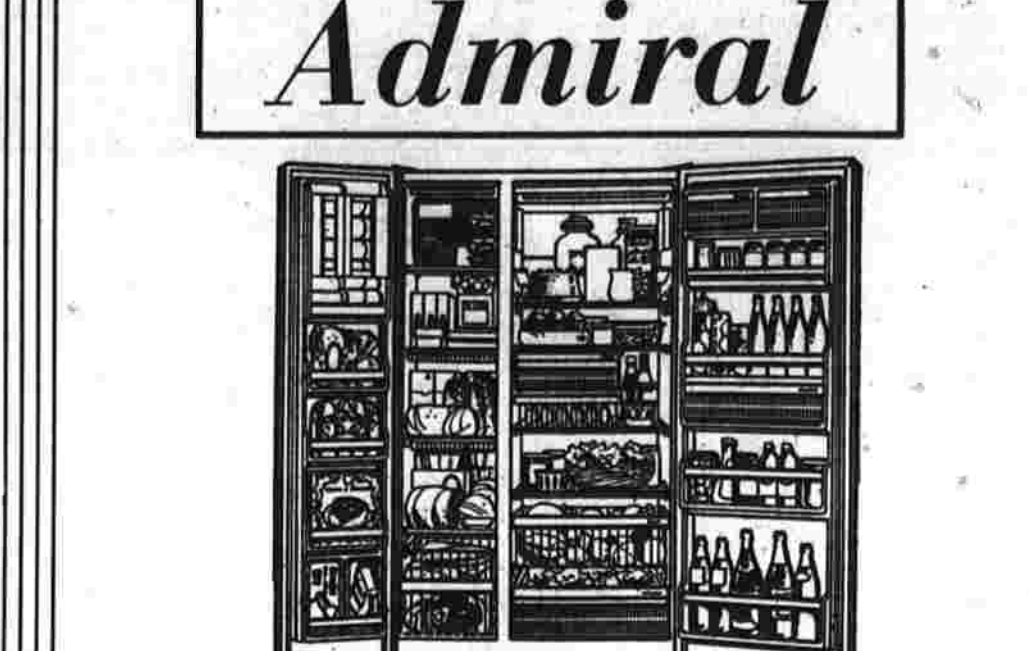

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Spaak Reveals Rebel Threats Tshombe Calls Off Visit to New York

ROME (AP) — Premier Giuseppe Tshombe of the Congo dropped today plans to go to New York, at least for the present and scheduled a trip to Bonn, Germany.

A press spokesman announced Tshombe's change of plans, saying he would go to Bonn Saturday, but left open the possibility he might go to New York later.

Tshombe left Leopoldville Wednesday night, saying he was heading for the United States. He also said he would see Pope Paul VI, Italian bishoprics, and government officials.

There have been widespread demonstrations against him here. Earlier, a source close to Tshombe's party said he was going to Bonn to seek financial aid for the Congo from German businessmen and government officials.

He reportedly has been discussing financial help during his talks here, too. But his wife came here was not too hospitable to the mission.

A well dressed woman in a fur coat threw a rotten egg at Tshombe today as he arrived at the Italian Ministry of Industry. He missed Tshombe but struck one of his aides.

Police said the woman was Laura Gonzalez del Castillo, 26, a Neapolitan student. She questioned her but released her without charges.

The egg was the first personal contact Tshombe had with Communist inspired protesters against his visit to the Italian capital.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak declared today a rescue mission was sent to Stanleyville after Christophe Ghebreyesus had reportedly threatened white hostages "would be devoured and gasoline fires set at their homes to cook them alive."

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20th Man Freed In Murder Case

BILOXI, Miss. (AP) — Attorney General James B. Cannon today freed a 20th man arrested last week in connection with the slaying of a federal grand jury member in Mississippi.

Commissioner Verla Lee Swainman dismissed the charges against James Edward Jordan, 38, during a preliminary hearing here that took only two minutes.

Nineteen other white men arrested in the case were freed Thursday at Meridian, Miss., when another woman commissioner, Esther Carter, refused to hear a purported confession on grounds it constituted hearsay evidence.

Government lawyers said it was an unprecedented action. They refused to offer other evidence at the Meridian hearing and announced they would ask that a federal grand jury be convened as quickly as possible to consider the evidence.

The FBI had arrested 21 white men Dec. 4 in connection with the slaying last summer near Philadelphia, Miss., of the civil rights trio — two white New Yorkers and a Mississippi Negro. The 21st man, Horace D. Bar-

ton, was arrested near Shreveport, La., and was not affected by the preliminary hearing in Meridian.

James Barton in Shreveport said he was not arrested any other time. He was released from the Justice Department on Barnett's condition. Barton has not set a date for a hearing. Barnett, 26, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, was arrested on a conspiracy charge. Jordan, also arrested on a conspiracy charge, is a construction worker at the space testing facility in Hancock County, Miss. (See Page Twelve)

CEA Outlines Plans For Legislative Moves

HARTFORD (AP) — The Committee on Education and Labor today outlined its legislative program to be introduced in the 1965 General Assembly.

Included is a bill calling for an expanded state-supported college scholarship program which would allow awards averaging \$500 each to about 6 per cent of each year's high school graduating class.

Also included is a bill which would establish a master-of-education teaching program on a full-time, graduate level on a tuition basis at all four state universities in Connecticut.

Another bill supports a proposal of the State Education Department to revise the minimum of 20 per cent state support of local current expenditures, plus special grants for special education and health care grants for low-income children.

The recommendations are spelled out in the December issue of the CEA Advisory, a publication mailed monthly to the association's 20,000 members.

The CEA urged members to call on their local representatives and senators to become acquainted with them or to renew old acquaintances and to establish previous understandings regarding legislation.

The CEA said it will introduce bills next year that would: Change the present \$25 a month economic adjustment to \$40; Change the present \$75 monthly economic adjustment to \$100; Change the present \$100 monthly economic adjustment to \$125.

Give teachers at age 70 with 15 or less than 20 years of service a retirement allowance based on an actuarial reduction from what they would otherwise receive after 20 years of service.

Call for an equalized grant to set in Connecticut. Permit local school boards to determine the necessary school appropriations without going to another town body or agency for funds.

Budget Submitted HARTFORD (AP) — The State Education Department is seeking \$268 million for the 1965-66 biennium, \$24.4 million more than its budget during the current two-year fiscal period.

Most of the increase—\$42 million—is for proposed greater state contributions to local public school systems.

Of this amount, \$6.8 million would simply cover anticipated higher enrollment. The remainder would be for other purposes.

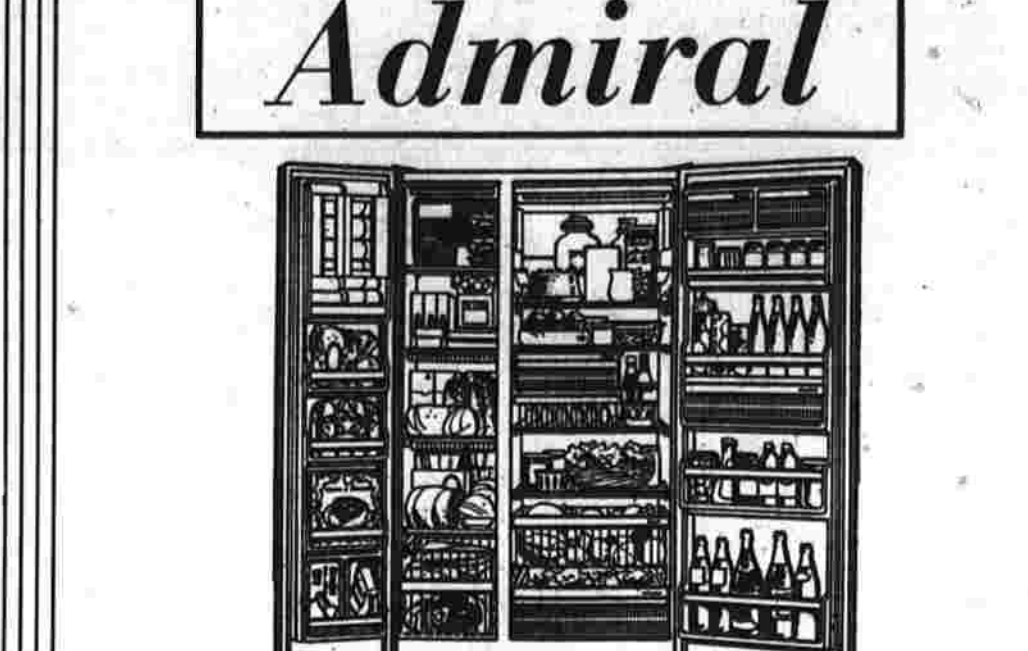

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### 150,000 Army Reservists May Be Shifted to Guard

(Continued from Page One)

...congressmen, told a newsmen, "I can't comment at all. This is broad outline, in the way the new reorganization will stack up, sources said."

The current 400,000-man guard would be swelled by about 150,000 men from the organized Army Reserve. The other 150,000 reservists now doing drill pay would go into the manpower pool that would total about 400,000 men available to fill out units or create new ones in times of need.

This would reduce over-all drill pay strength from 700,000 to 550,000. But where only about two-thirds of the 700,000 now are in high priority units, the 550,000 will be in such units. A high priority unit is one allotted 80 per cent of full strength and 100 per cent of its equipment. It is expected to be in top shape.

A total of 15 Guard divisions and 9 Reserve divisions, all now given low priority on men and equipment and unlikely to be of much use in less than a year from today, would be reorganized into high priority Guard divisions of perhaps 4,000 men each. Of these 24 divisions, a total of 16 would be assigned to fill out existing Guard divisions. There are eight such divisions, which have important roles in war plans.

The remaining 8 new brigades would be independent, along with 11 other such groups in the present priority force, and available for less-than division tasks.

Thirteen reserve training divisions, essentially paper outfits with only about 3,000 men assigned to each, would go into the guard structure. These divisions would come to life only in a general mobilization and would be filled out with draftees, volunteers and men from the reserve pool.

Fourteen Army corps headquarters would be abolished. Their main duties are to supervise the reserves.

**MANCHESTER SESSION**

The communiqué said: "The government of Viet Nam has just completed a series of discussions with the United States mission with regard to measures which should be taken to improve the situation in South Viet Nam in all its aspects.

"The U.S. government has offered additional military and economic assistance to improve the economic situation of the people and to reorganize the mounting infiltration of men and equipment by the Hanoi regime in support of the Viet Cong.

"The government of Viet Nam has accepted this offer of support, which includes provision for increased numbers of military and economic assistance, the strengthening of the air defense of South Viet Nam, and further economic assistance for a variety of forms of industrial urban and rural development.

"For its part, the government of Viet Nam is reviewing ways of increasing the scope and effectiveness of its programs related to the development of security and local government in the rural areas.

"Together, the government of Viet Nam and the U.S. mission are making joint plans to achieve greater effectiveness against the infiltration threat.

In the course of the discussions, the U.S. representatives expressed full support for the duly constituted government of Prime Minister Huong."

argued with the warden over some of the restrictions on the 1,200 members of the island prison and to have helped a convict-commissioner press for a new set of rules.

With Beck's release today he has served nine days less than half of a five-year sentence for filing fraudulent tax returns for the union's Joint Council Building Association in Seattle. Before he entered prison he had won reversal of a conviction of evading more than \$240,000 in personal income taxes.

He will remain under supervision of a federal parole officer until June 20, 1967.

The state also prepared parole papers for Beck to sign in connection with a five-year sentence for grand larceny. He was convicted in county court of pocketing \$1,900 from the sale of a union-owned auto. The state parole will last three years.

During his time in prison Beck worked as an apple canner, labored on his memoirs and was stricken with pneumonia resulting from a bad case of sunburn.

In his interval in the life he will return to an interest in conservation and will very likely devote a meeting to the subject. The Andover PTA sponsored such a meeting in October with Commissioner Joseph N. Gill as the speaker.

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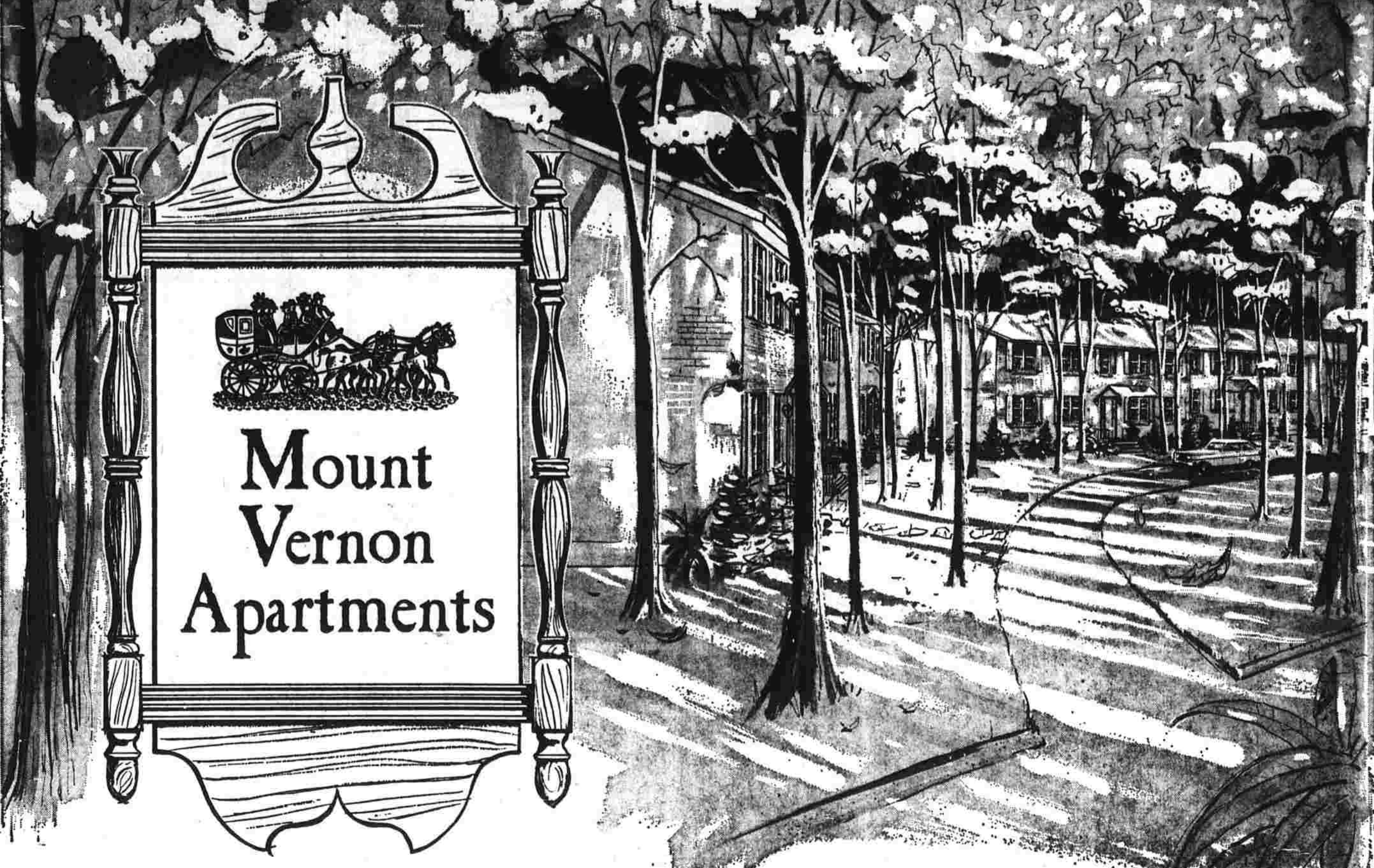

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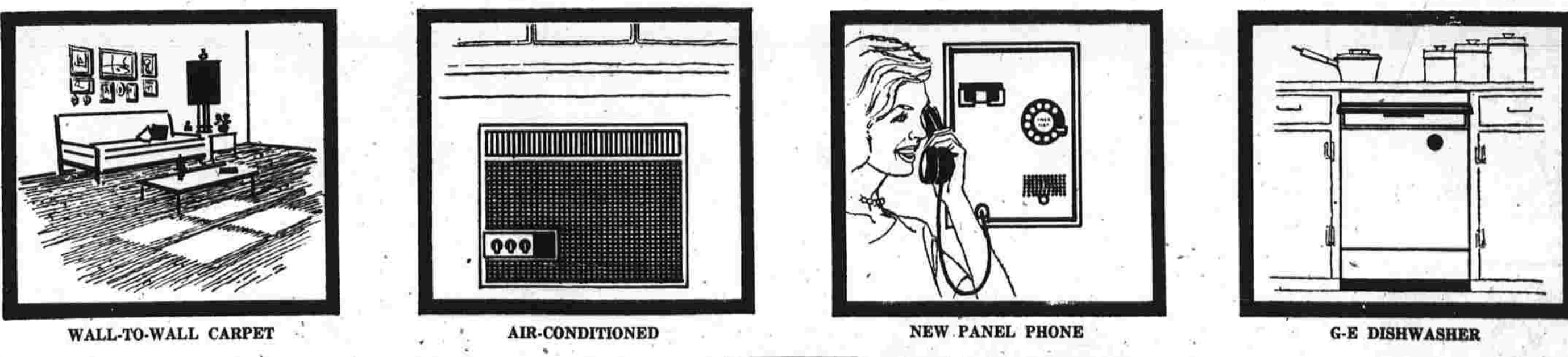

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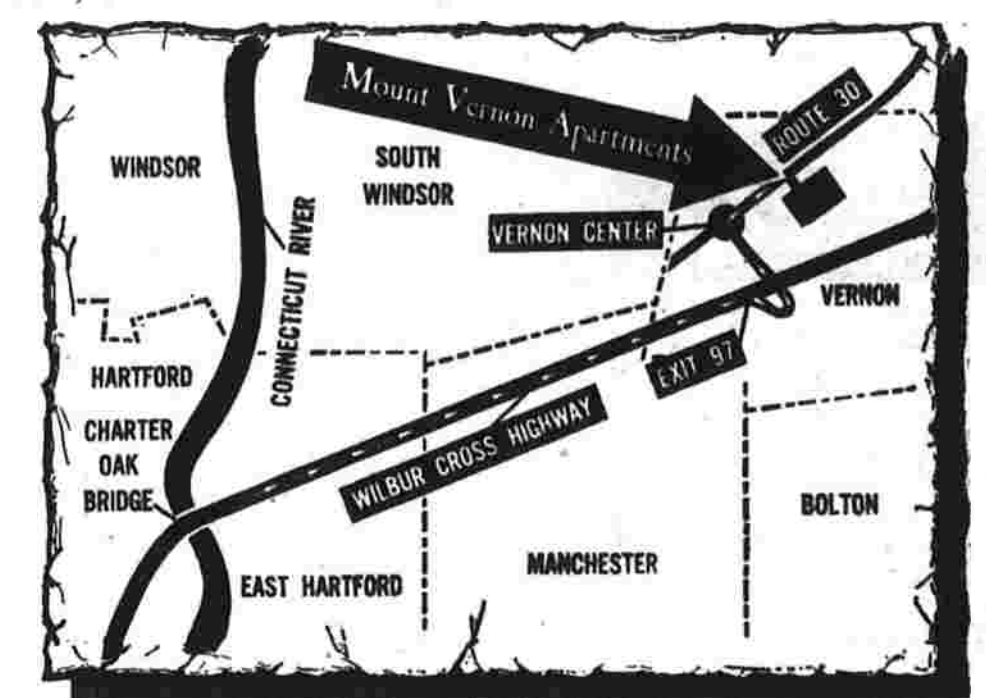
