It has become a firm part of the good curiosity and inquiry and appraisal of our time that every public figure now has to have an "image" by which he

can be pegged. This is, as we say, a good instinct or the part of people-provided it isn't too hasty and careless and emotional in the way it is carried out.

And it is supremely important, in the way we use it. For it has become, whether we realize it or not, pretty much the way we here in America, for instance, decide our presidential elec-We decide what kind of a guy we

think this candidate is, and that one is, and then we choose between them. And sometimes, perhaps, we are rash, and live to regret our mistake. And again, we can be very shrewd. All kinds of build-up and image-shaping by professionals can go for nothing if we happen to catch what we judge to be the authentic image, lurking underneath the So much for images in general. What

we set out to say in particular is that what seems to be the quickest piece of image-establishing in history has already been accomplished by one Aleksei N. Kosvgin, who now holds the position of Premier of Soviet Russia.

This fellow Kosygin, in a twinkling, has succeeded in getting himself pegged. He is the product and representaive not of the Communist revolution but of the managerial revolution. He is neither the capitalist nor the proletarian, but the executive. He is more the technical expert than the politician. His language is that of figures rather than that of ideas. He proved this, the other day, by de-

livering a long address to the Supreme

Soviet. This address became notable for one particular thing. It received less applause than any address ever delivered to that body by any Russian leader. The reason his speech received so little applause was that it included so few of the customary oratorical devices cer-

tain to elicit applause-like references to the "building of Communism." the "precepts of Lenin," or the "irresistible march of Socialist labor." It was a speech which read like the annual report of some mammoth American cor-For a while, one can predict, there is going to be a certain enchantment, especially for Americans, in the prospect of dealing with a fellow whose mind is

all business and no politics. But unless Kosygin already possesses or hastens to develop a little political savvy on the side, too, nobody will be dealing with him for a very long time. Neither in Russia nor in America, sad to relate. has the day come when the corporation man, the professional manager, can function in government without needing recurrent wisdom and protection of the kind that only the science of politics can provide.

When Ends Justify Means

It's a rare day when anyone cuts through the delusions surrounding foreign policy so cleanly as did Dean Acheson in his speech at Amherst this week. The former Secretary of State's disse tion deserves the thoughtful attention of the present occupant of that post, his superior in the White House and all others concerned about America's di rection in the world.

All the more so because the election campaign, which promised an airing of foreign-policy fundamentals, bogged down on this along with other issue Since then about the only notable attempt at analysis has been an address former Ambassador to India Jo Kenneth Galbraith, in which he preach ed far-reaching accommodation of the preservation "not of our way of life out of life itself."

Mr. Acheson's discussion lacks the reckless overtones many found in Ser ator Goldwater, but it is far tough then the Galbraithian mushiness As though in answer to Galbraith, Acheson oundly asserts a duty "to preserve values outside the contour of our skins, and at the expense of foregoing much that is desired and pleasant,including t may be-our own fortunes and lives. Such forthrightness rings refreshingly, in these "better Red than dead" days the Declaration of Independence. It is message: What he calls his strategi approach means that the object of for aign policy is not peace at any price,

merely in the hope of peace; rather, s to preserve and foster an environ ment in which free societies may exist terion by which our foreign policies and actions must be tested. Mr. Acheson recognizes that there ap pears to be a moral question here, and he meets it head-on. If his strategic ap proach sounds like saving the end jus ifies the means, his answer is that in foreign affairs only the end can justify the means. Not just any ends or any

means; but if the purpose is the preser vation and strengthening of freedom. then it can require national action be yond what is accepted as ethical con duct among individuals. Nations, the Secretary reminds us, are not individuals, and a good part of our foreign-policy grief stems from a attempt to translate individual moral standards into national policy; the result is usually not morality but moralizing and sloganeering. In fact, a gov ernment's foreign decisions "are no helped by considering them in terms of

Rule, or inducting our citizens into the kingdom of heaven." The determining factor should be how the decisions bear upon major objectives. Consider, then, the use and threat of force, not normally condoned among individuals and condemned for govern-

Yet the Communists have used force or the threat of force whenever they hought they could get away with it They would neatly tie our hands, proclaiming their right to support "wars of iberation" like the ghastly rebellion in the Congo while we are obligingly to refrain from any action in the defense "Is it moral," Mr. Acheson asks, "to deny ourselves the use of force in all circumstances, when our adversaries employ it, under handy excuses, whe

ever it seems useful to tip the scales of power against every value we think of as moral and as making life worth iving?" To him, and to us; it seems a bad and stupid bargain, and very likey immoral as well. The great virute of the Acheson approach, we think, is exactly this some what old-fashioned emphasis on values that are worth fighting and if need be dying for. In the campaign any such suggestion was scorned as too "sim-

We suspect that the truth is more nearly the other way around: Foreignpolicy thinking in this country has be come so infected with fear and doub and irrelevant moralizing that it has confused and even paralyzed decisions and obscured the essentially simple purpose of policy. If the purpose is contiued freedom for ourselves and help for others wanting freedom, it cannot be well served by putting peace above all. A firmer adherence to the fundamer purpose is unlikely to entail any more risk of war than we now face. It may be we have already risked too much for illusions of peace—that hope of preserving "not our way of life but life itself." If so, Mr. Acheson in the wisdom of years has sharply called us back to first principles. — WALL STREET JOURNAL
