Mayor Asks for United Front On Industrial Development

Despite town leaders' vowed intentions to broaden Manchester's tax base, the community has not been notably successful in attracting new industry to locate here.

In an effort to overcome past difficulties, Francis J. Mahoney has proposed a series of meetings between civic officials and business leaders, to develop a more united front among the people who hold the keys to Manchester's front door.

Community efforts over the past few years, Mahoney says, have foundered because town leadership has not been prepared in advance.

Hence, when the town development commission found a buyer for a new industrial site here last year, commission and Chamber of Commerce members found themselves rushing pell mell to line up the necessary backing for the project. And along the way the project fell through, at least temporarily.

Instead of having to make such last minute efforts, the town ought to prepare in advance, Mahoney says.

As chairman of the town's board of directors, Mahoney has asked General Manager Richard Martin to schedule a series of meetings beginning after the holidays to develop a more united front.

Invited to the meetings will be chairman of concerned town boards such as the planning and development commissions and the redevelopment agency.

The planning commission has set aside land in the town's master plan for industry in the Buckland section of town. The development commission has executed town efforts to locate new industry there.

The redevelopment agency can include present or potential industrial land in its renewal plans.

In addition Mahoney would invite representatives of the Eighth Utilities District, which provides fire protection and sewer service for the northern portion of town; officials of the privately owned Manchester Water Co., with the franchise to provide water in the northern section; and business leaders who might be interested in supporting the town's efforts.

The meetings could also see visits from land owners who might cooperate with the town in offering properties to prospective industrial tenants or purchasers.

And state highway officials might attend to describe the affects of a proposed expansion of the Wilbur Cross Highway on the town's industrially zoned land. A large chunk of such land — including some where light industry is already located — will be taken for the highway expansion project.

School Board Will Study Nike Site Issue Monday

The town's acquisition of the Keeney St. Nike Site as a campus for Manchester Community College will meet the second of its three hurdles Monday night when the board of education reviews the cost figures submitted by Dean Frederick Love.

The first hurdle was passed last week when the Citizens Advisory Council of the community college, using an estimated total figure of \$250,000, recommended acquisition of the site. If the board of education also approves, the move will be presented to the board of directors.

The \$250,000 figure is divided among costs for reconditioning, building reconstruction, equipment, architect fee, contingency, and administration. Potential operating costs and information concerning enrollment, not released at this date, will also be presented to the board.

The community college, figuring state and federal aid will cover 75 1/3 per cent of the capital costs, estimates the final cost to the town at \$4,258.82. This figure does not include operating costs.

Oakley Authors Book on D'Ailly

Dr. Francis C. Oakley, assistant professor at Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., is the author of "The Political Thought of Pierre d'Ailly: The Voluntarist Tradition." The writer is the husband of the former Claire-Ann Lamenza of Manchester.

The book was published this month by the Yale University Press and is now on sale.

Pierre d'Ailly (1350-1420), bishop, cardinal, and at one point a favored candidate for papal election, was a distinguished French theologian. He was one of the ecclesiastical statesmen who succeeded in bringing the Great Schism to an end at an ecumenical council in Switzerland from 1414 to 1418, Spain. Dr. Oakley is a native of Liverpool, England, and a graduate of Oxford University. He came to this country in 1957 and received a Ph.D. degree in history at Yale University in 1959 and taught there until moving to Williams in 1961. He was appointed to the Social Science Research Council Fellowship in Legal Philosophy and Political Theory in 1962, and recently awarded a grant-in-aid by the American Council of Learned Societies for research in Europe on the same subject.

TPC Considers Firehouse Site

The town planning commission has been asked to approve a McKee St. site for a new West Side firehouse. The site has already been approved by the town's board of directors.

The proposed firehouse site was purchased about fifteen years ago by the now defunct South Manchester Fire District and was subsequently turned over to the town when the SMPD consolidated.

Plans for a firehouse tailored to the site have already been started by architect Arnold Lawrence.

The commission will consider the location at its next regular meeting.

Rec Workers Get Checks

Payroll checks were distributed this morning to approximately 30 part-time rec department workers for the payroll period Nov. 16-28.

The checks, which were due on Dec. 4, were held back one week pending a review of time sheets by Park and Rec Supt. Horace Murphey.

Murphy's action had precipitated a three-day boycott by six of the employees, which necessitated a shutdown of the East Side Rec on Monday, and a curtailment of its activities on Tuesday and Wednesday.

The three Rec Centers (East Side, West Side and Community Y) have been fully manned since Thursday night and, with the distribution of the checks, the dispute appears to be ended.

Checks for the current payroll period, Nov. 30 through Dec. 12, are due to be distributed next Friday, on schedule.

Decision Sought In Sewer Issue

Eighth District directors will meet with officials of the privately owned Manchester Water Co. at 7:30 p.m. Monday, at the latter's office, to discuss a possible settlement of a cost arising from a July break in a Hollister St. sanitary sewer.

Victor Swanson, 8th District president, has blamed the water company for the break in the district's sewer line, claiming that seepage from a water line had caused the damage.

The sanitary sewer line has cost \$4,180 to replace and Swanson has authorized to negotiate with the water company for reimbursement of all or part of the expense.

Because no settlement has been forthcoming to date, the district directors requested the Monday meeting.

A district spokesman says the district board's proposal to buy the water company may also be discussed.

Contract Let For New Truck

Hartford Rd. Enterprises Inc. of Manchester has been awarded a contract for furnishing a suburban-type truck for the town engineering department.

Their net price of \$2,195 for a four-door International, Model C-100 Carryall is only \$4.35 less than the price quoted by the only other bidder, Carter Chevrolet, for a two-door Chevrolet, Model C-416.

The prices quoted include the trade-in of a 1956 Chevrolet sedan.

Hartford Rd. Enterprises, at bid openings on Dec. 2, had promised delivery within 5 to 10 days of the award of a contract.

Savings Effected In School Costs

The general contract for construction of additions and alterations to the Highland Park School has been reduced by \$1,510, due to savings in that amount in two equipment and accessories items.

Louis J. Drakos and Associates, architects for the construction, have informed General Manager Richard Martin that the savings were effected for kitchen equipment and for finish hardware and toilet room accessories.

By crediting the savings to the general contract cost, the contract is now \$472,505. The original contract was awarded to the Associated Construction Co. for \$484,000, but changing orders in the amount of \$14,105 have boosted the school's cost to the present figure.

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TV Notebook

NEW YORK (NBA)—Richard Crenna would consider it a personal favor if television viewers would sample his highly acclaimed but low-rated CBS-V series about politics, Slattery's People.

"We anticipated the show would be a slow starter, but we received marvelous criticism? Maybe 10 per cent of the critics gave us what most shows would consider good reviews, but with some reservations. The other 90 per cent raved. After the second show, a lot of the critics reviewed our show and almost 100 per cent accepted us critically."

One of the problems for Slattery's People is the time slot. It is competing with Ben Casey (ironically turned out, like Slattery's People, by Bing Crosby Productions) and The Alfred Hitchcock Hour. Surveys show many people turn off their sets at 10 (when the three shows come on). "At that hour, with fewer people watching," Crenna said, "you don't split an audience. If you do split no one wins."

As Slattery, Crenna, an idealistic state legislator, has finally been allowed to grow up professionally. He was playing a teenager at the age of 30 on Our Miss Brooks. He says he is fatalistic about his show's future. "I have been in television for so long on Our Miss Brooks and The Real McCoys that it is difficult to be optimistic. We just try to make the best show we can and hope someone watches."

Those who do watch the show, and recognize Crenna on the street, are very polite. "They say things like 'Good luck to the show.' But the fans of The Real McCoys used to ask things like 'How's Grandpa?' I think that personal identification is the thing that makes a show a success. I would have much more assurance if someone were to come up to me and say, 'Hey, Slattery, I have a parking ticket I would like you to fix.'"

Burgess Meredith, stage and television star, will replace Dean Jagger in NBC's "Mr. Novak" series. Jagger, who played the school principal, withdrew on doctor's orders.

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Is It Commercialism Or Christmas Spirit?

NEW YORK (NEA) — The trouble with Christmas, if you are a television set owner, is by this time the joyous day has arrived, it's an anticlimax.

It's not the Christmas television specials that are so bad. Mostly they are scheduled fairly close to Dec. 25. It's those stories that bring Christmas to the Ponderosa or Shiloh Ranch or the Wagon Train, complete with dying youngster (there's always a dying youngster), which begin appearing around Dec. 15. Gradually, along with a restlessness, viewers come to accept the "Bah, Humbug" attitude of Scrooge toward, not the day, but the overly long unimaginative observance of it.

But there is hope that Christmas on television will no longer be celebrated with versions of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" set in the Old West, or Palatin's sojourn in a western town called Bethlehem, where the Have Gun, Will Travel script found a woman about to give birth in a saloon where "there was no room."

It's not that the producers have seen the light and realized that a bad Christmas show is worse than none at all. It's the spirit that motivates all television — crass commercialism.

In television's recent past, most series filmed 39 episodes, and repeated 13 of these during the summer months. These series were inclined to have an occasional seasonal show, like a visit from St. Nick. But today's television economics dictate that a series films 26 episodes, and repeats 26 episodes. So if a seasonal episode is tossed in, viewers will be forced to see a repeat of it during television's long, arid summer. Producers try to avoid this.

Shows that have been on the air for several seasons generally have a Christmas episode in the backlog. In a case like this, viewers are treated to a December dose of what must be called "the annual Christmas classic."

This year NBC will be repeating "Mr. Magoo's Christmas Carol" on Dec. 18; Tennessee Ernie Ford's "The Story of Christmas" and Project 20's "The Coming of Christ," both on Dec. 21. Perry Como's Dec. 17 show will originate in Rome, and be tinged with the holiday spirit. The Bell Telephone Hour will have its Christmas program, with Maureen O'Hara as hostess on Dec. 22. Missing from NBC's schedule: The lovely "Amahl and the Night Visitors."

Among the NBC series planning Christmas episodes are Hazel, Dr. Kildare and The Rogues, which has a tale called "Mr. White's White Christmas."

On CBS, Lassie, Red Skelton and Danny Kaye will be decorated with tinsel and mistletoe. Topo Gigio, the Italian Mouse, will be on the Ed Sullivan Show on Dec. 20 disguised as Santa Claus. "Not a creature was stirring, not even Topo Gigio."

The Entertainers on Christmas night, will have Carol Burnett in a hanging - the - mistletoe comedy sketch, taped before her back and neck injuries forced her into traction and off the show.

Jackie Gleason's Christmas show, on CBS, will be telecast on Dec. 26. On Dec. 27, ABC will telecast "Winterland on Ice," a special with Gordon and Sheila MacRae. On Dec. 28, ABC will have the first of the U.N. specials, Rod Serling's "A Carol for Another Christmas," with Peter Sellers, Eva Marie Saint, Ben Gazzara, Steve Lawrence, Sterling Hayden, Robert Shaw, Pat Hingle, Peter Fonda and James Shigeta heading the cast.

It's hard to tell if these shows are late for this year, or early for next.
