New York Trying to Protect Unwary UN Diplomats

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.S. mission to the United Nations has teamed up with New York's City Hall to try to protect unwary envoys from con men and color-conscious landlords.

The mission intends to do all in its power to see that diplomats are given every courtesy in making their stay enjoyable, says Frank Montano, an American Negro staffer whose job is to iron out rough spots for African and Asian delegates.

A recent gang attack on a Mauritanian diplomat hasn't eased Montano's task. Montano and the New York City Mayor's Commission to the U.N. have charged a campaign aimed at New Yorkers in daily contact with foreign delegates.

Expenditure Council Look for Tax Cuts

EDITOR'S NOTE: When the state and the town spend the taxpayers' money, you constantly out of the CPEEC's headquarters. The CPEEC, a private organization, doesn't sell anything. Every booklet is free, and the consultants it tends to turn to help them with their problems, are provided without charge.

Hubert W. Stone, executive director of the Council, said its staff members have served as advisors to 135 local charter commissions and charter revision commissions since the state's Home Rule law was passed in 1957.

"The CPEEC makes no bones about its motives; it wants to increase efficiency and economy in government. It devotes \$200,000 a year to the cause. Where does the money come from? It comes from the biggest business in Connecticut — the utility companies, the banks, the manufacturing giants — but also from drug stores and other small businesses. These business memberships plus a few individual members make a total of slightly over 1,000 members.

Dues for business members are figured by several formulas, depending on the type of company. Manufacturers, for instance, pay \$1 per employee for the first 500 employees and 50 cents for each additional employee.

Nasser Seen Depending on U.S. Food

AP Special Correspondent Gamal Abdel Nasser, whose United Arab Republic is a strong voice in the African chorus against the United States, has been heavily on U.S. surplus food. Indeed, he wants more of it.

U.S. surplus food may have helped Nasser survive politically, and more of it may do the trick for him again. But only half a year ago, the U.S.A.R. was telling Egyptian officials that if necessary the country could get along without any U.S. surplus food.

In that respect, Nasser seems to have changed his mind. Dispatches from Cairo report he has asked for 335 million worth in addition to the annual 700 million worth a year.

His diplomats in Washington are reported urging expansion of a 1962 agreement so that Nasser can receive more corn, beef and poultry to meet his growingly critical shortages.

Last spring, in a May Day speech, Nasser scoffed at the idea that U.S. surplus food was really important to Egypt. He referred to a suspicion that Britain was urging the United States to cut off aid to Cairo because of Nasser's military interference in revolutionary events in the Arabian Peninsula.

"From America we accept wheat," Nasser said. "Last year (1963) we received 330 million in American economic aid. This year we have not yet received any economic aid. We amount to anything, but Nasser already is deeply in debt for support of a program to stimulate small industries.

Domestically his drive for socialization continues and less than 20 per cent of Egyptian firms, mostly small enterprises, have escaped it. This program causes food-grubbing among Egypt's middle class.

Nasser is having difficulty with foreign exchange, despite earnings of 800 million annual in Suez Canal fees and exports without American food. Prices in Egypt would have skyrocketed.

On a per capita basis, the U.S. surplus food operation in Egypt has been one of the world's biggest. There is no other U.S. economic aid going on now, to government continues to lead an

anti-American chorus in Africa. As recently as last month Nasser suggested U.S. food aid was used as a weapon to silence attacks on Western "imperialism."

The United States, still trying to win popularity in Egypt, two months ago made it a 12-million-gallon, a third of the cost of preserving ancient temples threatened by the Aswan Dam program.

Nasser's government apologized for the recent anti-American rioting in Cairo, but his diplomats continue to exhort Americans. The performance, in less complex times, might have been characterized as biting the hand that fed them.

Gruber Model Train Bug

Although monsters, giants and jet-propelled rockets lead the parade this season, youngsters all over the world still look forward to seeing that old standby, the electric train, under their Christmas trees.

And the fact they can't wait to assemble the tracks and get the trains rolling, so that they may spend hours showing their little boys how to operate them.

That's how "model railroads" got started, and John Gruber, the Herald's music critic and columnist, has a cellarful of operable trains to prove it.

John's railroad system would turn any youngster (and dad, too) goggle-eyed with envy for its anything but a toy train — it's as near to the real thing as one can imagine.

His "rail" occupies about 400 square feet of cellar space, and includes more than three and a half scale miles of track scaled 110 feet to the mile.

The "Manchester and Eastern," as he calls it, is largely dedicated to heavy industry serving a complete steel mill and fabricating plant, from raw ore to the finished product.

Gruber's Manchester is a faithful one, and is not modeled after Manchester, Conn., or any of the other Manchesters in the U.S. or England.

As one looks north up the pike, he sees a large suspension bridge over a river, where barges deliver iron ore to a complex of buildings, comprising a complete iron and steel works.

A massive steel blast furnace, which dominates the scene, converts the ore to pig iron, whereupon it is transferred to open-hearth furnaces for conversion into steel.

Next door to this scale model house is an exact duplicate of Gruber's home on Manchester Rd., Glastonbury. It is even painted the same colors as the original and, in the driveway, is a 1948 Cadillac convertible.

The real house, designed by Gruber, will have a ceiling shaped differently than the one in his present house, and when the Grubers move, John may have to start all over again, designing and building a "model railroad" to fit.

Unlike modern railroads, diesel engines are not altogether superfluous in the "Manchester and Eastern," for the model depicts the period of 20 years ago, when railroads were in the process of conversion.

Gruber's railroad includes several steam locomotives (all of which emit steam) and four diesel, as well as one Budd DC (Rail Diesel Car), which provides passenger service on the unprofitable branch line to "Doraville," "Thittler," and "Yon," where only commuter traffic is handled.

All of this equipment demands facilities for servicing, and the "Manchester and Eastern" boasts a four-story roundhouse with turntable, as well as a diesel shed, which doubles for heavy maintenance. The turntable, incidentally, is powered by an old motor that once controlled a furnace damper, while the roundhouse was contrived from a parking case that once protected a refrigerator in transit.

The critic in Gruber comes to the fore when he speaks of the standard train layouts.

"There's basically nothing wrong with them," he explains, "but for Pete's sake, let's get the tracks and passenger yards set up for them and leave them set all year round. Then, next year, build another table and extend the run."

He practices what he preaches as "The Manchester and Eastern" started with a second-hand toy train, about 15 years ago, when John lived in East Hartford. This road increased gradually until it was about 12 by 12 feet, built on plywood tables.

"The plywood was a mistake," says Gruber. "It's very much like a drumhead, and the

Tannenbaum Remains True In Germany

BONN, Germany (AP) — O Tannenbaum is not going plastic in Germany. This country is staying true to tradition. The holiday symbol originated here in the 8th century St. Boniface dedicated the Tannenbaum (fir tree) to the Christ child. He wanted a symbol to help win over the pagan Germans to Christianity. They were used to worshipping the oak, sacred to the Teutonic god Woden. The new symbol caught on, becoming a cherished part of German life. This year more than 15 million Christmas trees will glow in West German homes. They will all be natural trees, cut in snow-covered woods, hauled out to market on horse-drawn sleds. Plastic substitutes, now taking over a share of U. S. sales, are unknown. Real candles will burn in most homes. The few families who have gone over to electric lights buy one color — plain white. Colored lights are considered in bad taste. The public also wants traditionalism in prices. In other words, no increases. The feeling is that this is a special trade, affecting the national way of life, and no undue profits should be made out of it. An average-sized tree costs the buyer no more than 75 cents to \$1.25 on the lot. Vatt and nutti (dad and mom) don't rush right home and set up the tree. They hide it — cellar, attic, closet — until Christmas Eve. Then, while the children are put in another room or taken for a walk, it is brought out and decorated. The great moment comes, the door is thrown open, the children run in and see this wonder — the big tree burning bright with white candles. The story Catholic parents tell is that the Christ child and angels achieved wonder. In Protestant homes the children are told it was the Welnachtmann (Christmas Man, like Santa Claus).

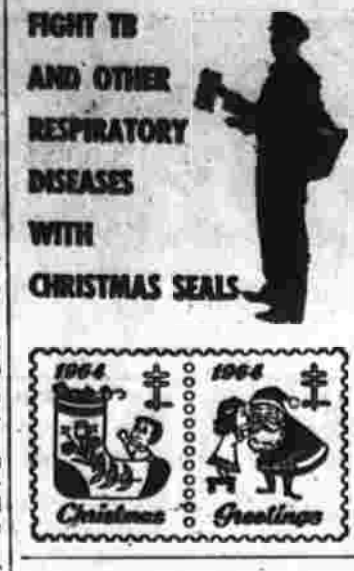

Steel Mills Push Output

By SAM DAWSON
 AP Business News Analyst
 NEW YORK (AP) — While steel workers and management argue over how to divide the profits, the mills turn out the goods at a near record rate. In steel the long run of high production seems assured, by the backing of orders to extend through the first months of 1965. The problems have become delivery times and in some cases even allotments, and the hard bargaining sessions just starting between the United Steelworkers and the Union and the major companies.

The wage talks themselves are helping swell the demand for steel. Many customers are planning to build up inventories against the risk of a strike next May cutting off supplies and also against the possibility of higher prices as a result of gains the unions may make in wage scales or fringe benefits. All fall the mills have been turning out more than 2.8 million tons each week. Not since early 1960 have the mills kept up that high a rate for so long a time.

They have turned out more than 120.8 million tons so far this year, against 106 million tons in the same period last year. And they already have beaten the old record of 117 million tons for a whole year, set in 1955.

Their busy production lines feed general property with

to fill the real demands of their customers, as apart from any stockpiling buildup of stocks. The customers have been buying for the most part, too. The auto industry, except for the crippling strike, was ready to let a record this year; and now talks cordially of producing eight million cars in 1965. The construction industry has been expanding, and taking more steel despite the inroads of competing materials. Appliance makers have had a good year and say they expect still higher production next year.

Together with other industries especially in the soft goods fields, steel's customers have pushed the industrial output to new highs. And steel has been busy looking for new customers, upgrading its product to meet competition, devising new products to create new markets.

The sustained demand for steel is one reason most forecasters feel that industry as a whole is sure to prosper for some months to come. And steel's major role is a result of the course of the steel union-management talks for a clue as to possible effects on future prices and wages in many other industries.

Carved Crib Brings Fame After Death

STREATOR, Ill. (AP) — When Julius Nowag was a boy in Germany he longed to have a Christmas crib. He often admired manger scenes in store windows. But he was too poor to buy one. So he told himself: "I'll carve one." At 18 he went to work in a coal mine, but falling health forced him to quit after 10 years. He moved to a farm near Cologne. Idle spells in winter gave him an opportunity to transform his childhood dream into reality. Nowag practiced on potatoes. When ready, he chopped down two large linden trees and, in 1900, began his knife work. In the course of almost 20 years he carved 1500 cribs. He died in 1936, and left the Nativity scene to his daughter, Mrs. Ted Winkler of Streator. During World War II her brother, Lukas, buried it so it would not be burned or stolen. With the return of peace it was dug up. Mrs. Winkler visited Germany in 1964 and brought home her heritage. Each Christmas season she proudly displays it in the living room of her home. "It is how my father imagined the first Christmas," Mrs. Winkler said. "When I look at it I see my father. To me it's a treasure." She said Nowag regarded it as something personal and as a family keepsake. She added: "People in Germany would come and say, 'You make beautiful things. You should be known.'" But her father would shrug and say something about how traditionally an artist "becomes known after his death."

Bolton Basement Expansion Eyed for Town Hall

First Selectman Richard Morra said at a voter-making session that the town needs more room. He has mentioned the possibility of renovating the Community Hall basement. Last night at the selectmen's meeting he gave an unofficial report on an unofficial estimate for remodeling the basement, done by an engineer.

The selectmen will meet with the architect Sunday at 7 p.m. in the town office to discuss the Community Hall basement. Last night at the selectmen's meeting he gave an unofficial report on an unofficial estimate for remodeling the basement, done by an engineer.

The engineer estimated that it would cost between \$25,000 and \$30,000 to turn the large basement into two rooms, leaving a large hall. The hall could be used for sports, Scout meetings and other gatherings, Morra said.

The basement now has a dirt floor, uneven rock walls and wooden pillar columns. The floor and the walls would be cemented and the ceiling supported on I beams, according to Morra. Furnace rooms would be fireproofed and heating ducts changed from round to flat.

Morra suggested that the two smaller rooms be made at the rear of the building which is one step above grade level. Here, he said, the assessors could have their office and other offices, a place not usually used for meetings.

Last night the Republican town committee met in the conference room and the board of finance met in the town clerk's office, a place not usually used for meetings.

Morra said that he and the engineer envisioned entrance to the basement on either side of the main entrance to the Community Hall, as well as in the rear. And in order to save money, the upstairs lavatories could serve the basement, too.

It was estimated that the same facilities built separately and not by remodeling the basement would cost around \$40,000.

Any intentions for basement renovation must be taken up with the planning commission and the public building commission, Morra pointed out.

The selectmen spent most of their meeting last night signing checks. There were no voters

formed "in a sense by invitation" to be held in the town office.

Walter Waddell said that, as in all school activities including sports, the student should take the initiative for joining. Then there can be "cut backs" by some specific screening process. He said there was nothing wrong in giving a student "notice" to get him to join an activity, however.

Ligouri said that whether or not they agreed with the particular way of organizing, the important thing is that the club is established. "Even in a democracy we are elected in many ways," he added.

Harold Smith said that "any club that is seeking the qualifications" and asked what the qualifications were for the science club.

Ligouri replied that those students chosen were the ones who had a study period when the club was scheduled to meet and who, in the judgment of the advisor, would benefit from the club.

Smith said that every student should have the opportunity to try, then the number should be cut, if necessary, by a known process of elimination. Harold Porcheron said that there could be a chance of error in the teacher's judgment and that those not invited might feel that they had been snubbed.

The board asked that the superintendent convey their feelings on the matter to the ideas of board members were all right, eventually, but that their practical application was more difficult.

'Pa Kettle' Was Enigma To Fellows

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — He was nobody more than he was. Percy Kilbride was a puzzle to the Hollywood crowd. He had been an actor most of his life, starting in his native San Francisco before the earthquake. He had played hundreds of roles in stock companies all over the West, getting stranded in some of the lesser towns.

He finally made it to Broadway, and became a standard character man. His wry, nasal voice, his wide-eyed comic manner and his spare frame became familiar in a succession of comedies. He was content in the semi-anonymity of his acting career.

Then came the movie. He was generally cast as a taxi driver — he didn't drive or a farmer — he didn't have any sense, he was wide-eyed and casting, and the one that ended his career was 'Pa Kettle.' A lifelong bachelor, he had to play the rural patriarch of a dozen kids.

The Kettle series made him famous, and he hated it. He had always lived near Hollywood Blvd., and he enjoyed taking long walks in the most crowded part of the city. He could not proceed a block without being stopped by an autograph-seeking tourist.

The series finally became intolerable for him. He was required to perform videotaped which his trail frame could not endure. He was playing a variety of characters during his career, he found no pleasure in portraying 'Pa Kettle'.

Despite the banishments of more money and better working conditions at Universal, Kilbride quit. For eight years he

lived quietly in Hollywood, meeting cronies occasionally, but mostly occupying himself with his solitary walk. He developed a determined gait that helped to discourage tourists from detaining him for autographs and conversation. He merely wanted to be left alone.

He submitted reluctantly to an occasional interview. The last one was a few months ago, when he met me for lunch. He talked vaguely of doing another play or movie, but there wasn't much conviction in his voice. I asked if he had always lived alone.

"Well, not always," he replied with his dry grin. "When I was in stock, we used to 'sketch' a play or movie, supposing a play was going on tour with the company, in order to save on expenses you might just 'sketch' for a season. It worked out well for both."

Only once during the lunch did Percy abandon his casual diet. It was when he discussed the traffic that an investor wanted Percy to handle. He spoke with real fear when he mentioned being struck down by a car a few years earlier.

He left me to continue his jauntly stroll down the boulevard. On Sept. 21 he and another actor were hit by a car as they crossed a Hollywood intersection. The other man died. Percy survived until last Friday. He was 76.

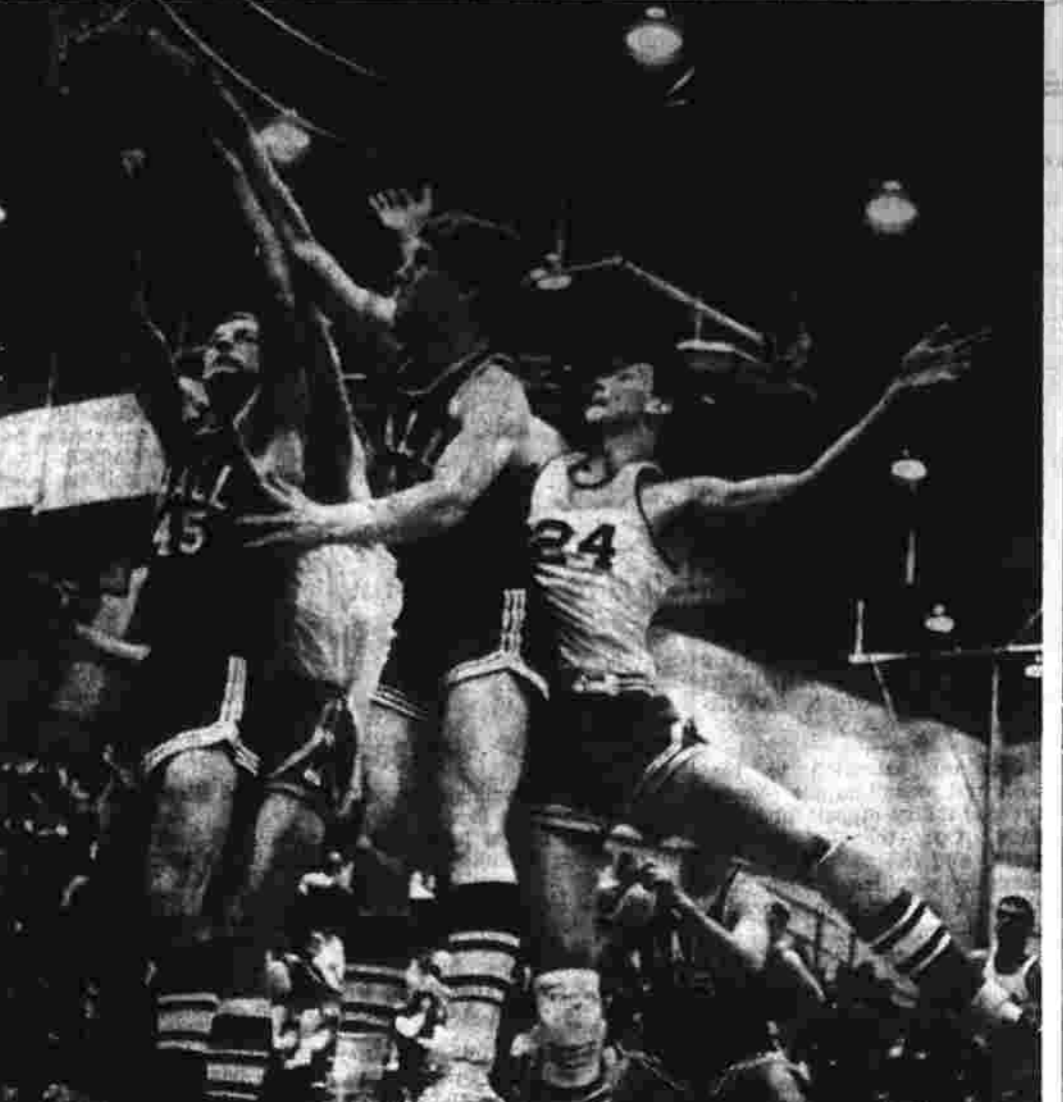
