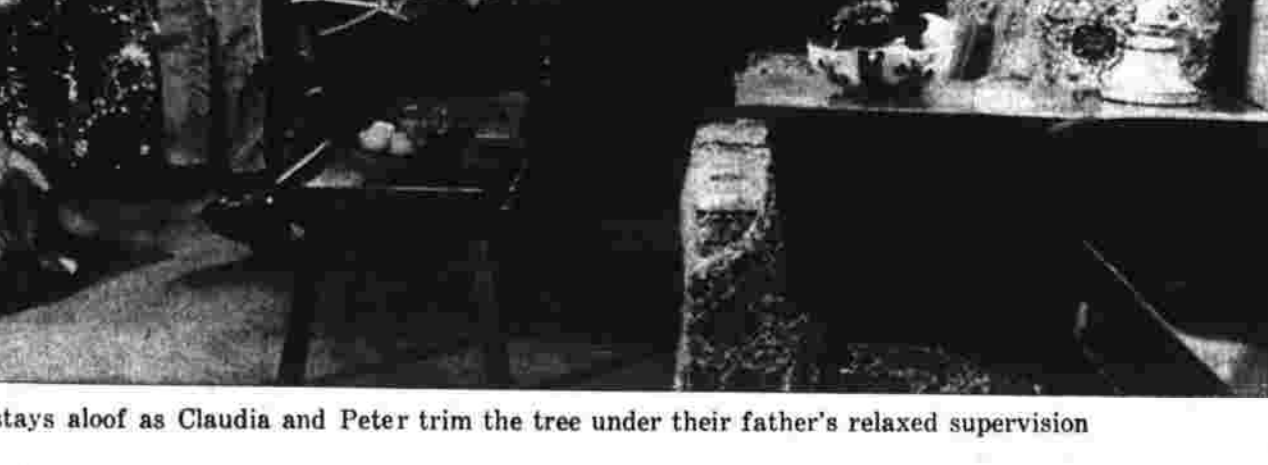

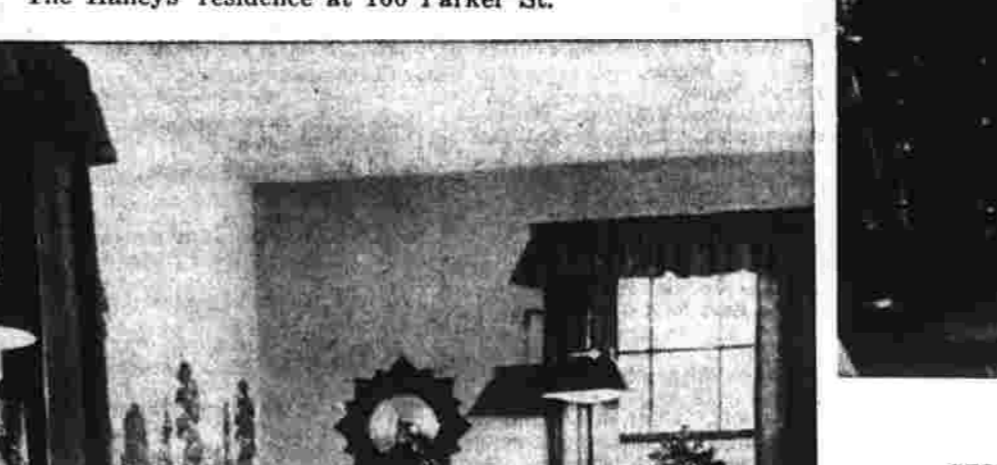

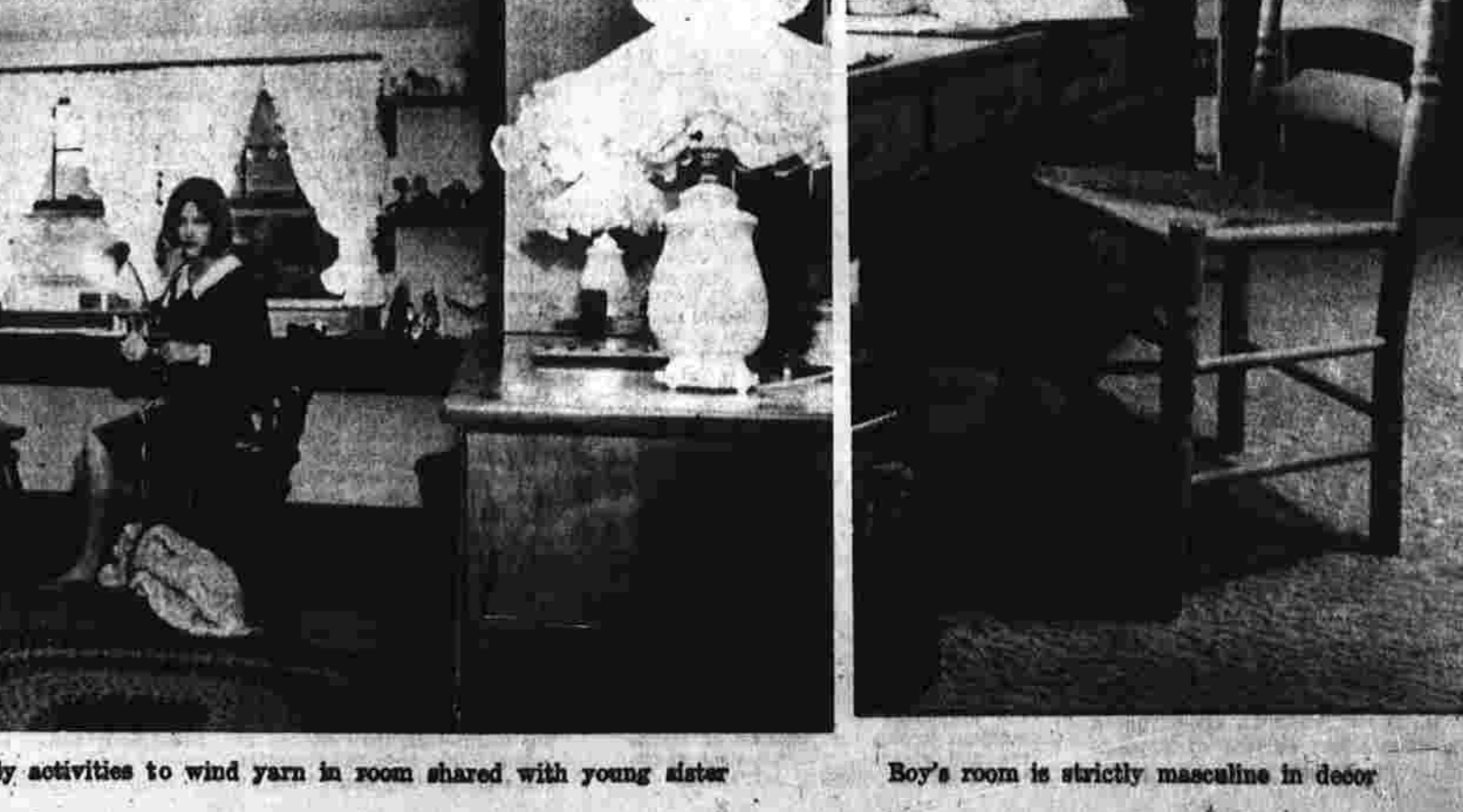

### Parana Welcomes Plan For New Sea-Level Canal

The United States and Panama began after the bloody anti-Communist riots there last January. Panama's president Marco A. Robles hailed it as "a historic day" for the country.

### Cherchez Le Bon

Their historic predicament is, of course, that there is no place for right wing Republicans to go when they are displaced by their party, while Republican moderates can, as they did in 1956 and in 1964, find it possible to find a temporary home with the Democrats. A somewhat similar predicament captured the really extreme liberals on the left side of the Democratic party. They may not many of them, relate the Johnson regime, but where were they to go? In 1948, the liberal fringe did desert the Democratic party and organized an extremist party of its own, and got nowhere, not even succeeding in bringing about the defeat of Truman, the Democrat it couldn't stand. Perhaps the Republican right wing, as of now, is heading toward some eventual third party effort in fulfillment. Or perhaps one can say it has just gone through that effort, on Nov. 3. Perhaps it was the potential third party which ran this year, with an 18 million vote assist from regular Republicans.

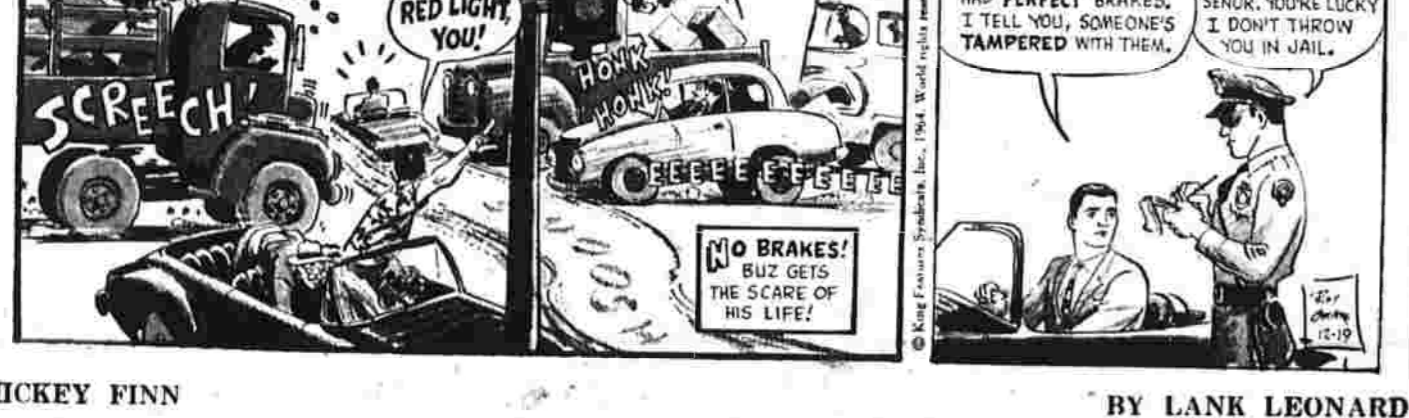

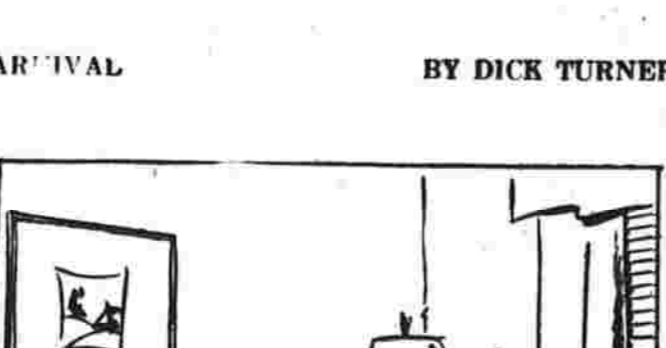

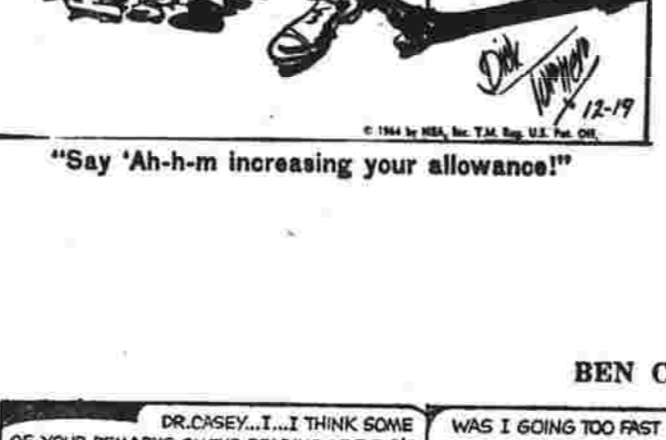

Unique television operation goes into effect today when ABC televises the Liberty Bowl football game inside Atlantic City's Convention Hall.

A company of seven telecasters, one of them placed 24 stories above the 40 yard stripe, will focus on football action as directed by Liberty Bowl team Utah and West Virginia. Their game, marking the first major post-season football bowl ever played in the city, gets underway at 12:30.

High Sales Predicted in Town Stores

With name department stores predicting a six to ten per cent sales increase nationally this Christmas season over the last, Manchester merchants see signs that they will share in the increases.

Phillip Harrison of Harrison's Stationers, Main St., chairman of the Chamber of Commerce's Retail Division, bases his prediction of a similar increase for the six weeks preceding Christmas on the basis of returns already available—and on the obvious activity around town.

The statistical returns are still incomplete, with the biggest shopping days those immediately before Christmas. But the other indicators all point to a banner year, Harrison says.

Besides the active pedestrian and auto traffic, Harrison says, he judges the prospective increase by such measures as charge sales.

This season, he says, he has seen more new faces in his store, and had more requests for new charge accounts, then he can recall from any of his previous 20 years on Main St. Joseph Garman of Coret Casala, Main St., chairman of the Downtown Development Association, is also optimistic.

For himself, Garman observes, sales have been running ahead of last year's since October.

And for others on the street, things must be pretty good—even the chronic complainers aren't really complaining this year," he says.

The same picture appears at the Shopping Parkade at W. Middle Tpk. and Broad St., according to Harry Cohen, manager of the D & L Store and chairman of the Parkade Merchants' Association.

The final figures will include sales from the two extra shopping days during Christmas week this year; last year's Christmas on a Wednesday left only two days between the week-end and the day compared to four this year. Many feel this will make a difference too.

It all adds up, the merchants say, to a very good end to another year of growth for Manchester.

I can do contemporary things that don't require an actor like Alec Guinness. At this point, I would rather do something small and meaningful, like the role in 'A Carol for Another Christmas,' than star in 'Tammy Goes to Hawaii.'"

Ratings Dip

CBS Is Remodeling

NEW YORK (AP) — It's tough to be in first place, it has often been said, because there's no place to go but down.

The CBS television network, former leader in audience popularity, has started a drastic cure for its drooping ratings.

Network programming executives spent the past week tearing up and rebuilding their evening schedule. It is the most extensive mid-season rearrangement of programs ever made by a network and affects more than a dozen shows.

In an effort to aid "Evelyn Hillbillies," which plummeted from last year's no. 1 show to 18th position in the most recent Nielsen ratings, "CBS Reports" was yanked out of its old lead-off spot on Wednesday nights and replaced by two comedy series.

The public affairs program, in spite of its usual excellence, never attracted big — in television terms — audiences. Henceforth it will be the windup program on Monday nights — the 10-11 spot where "Slattery's People," a fairly good dramatic series has been languishing. The change starts tonight with "Casals at 88."

CBS obviously hopes that "Slattery's People" will have an easier time on Friday nights, opposite NBC's Jack Paar, whose show has not had impressive Nielsen ratings this season, and network competition from ABC for only the first half hour.

"The Reporter," a dreary dramatic series about unlikely characters, dies a sudden death, along with the very disappointing "Mr. Broadway." CBS will bring back a summer replacement variety show, "On Broadway Tonight," for Thursdays and will shift a flagging variety show, "The Entertain-

ers," to Saturday night.

Hardest assignment goes to a new dramatic series called "For the People." It will be pitted against NBC's "Bonanza," rated the nation's most popular program. It will tell its courtroom stories from the point of view of the prosecution.

As late as Friday, CBS executives did not think this series could get into production in time to be added to the schedule. They planned to plug the Sunday night hole with comedy show re-runs and a panel show. Sunday, they announced the series would start on Jan. 24. William Shatner stars as an assistant district attorney.

'Amahl' Opera Tomorrow

The fifteenth presentation of Willis Patterson and John Menotti's Christmas opera "Amahl and the Night Visitors" will be telecast on NBC's "Hall of Fame" tomorrow from 4-5 p.m.

"Amahl and the Night Visitors," the tender story of a lame boy miraculously cured when he offers his crutch as a gift to the "child" during the visit of the Three Kings, won the nation's affection when it was first presented. Breaking precedent, newspapers reviewed the TV opera on the front pages as a major story. It has since won a wide following the world over, having been presented in many languages, including Japanese.

The cast includes Kurt Yaghjian as Amahl, Martha King as the mother, Richard Cross,

Collum as the Three Kings and Julian Patrick as the page. Herbert Grossman is the conductor.

# Connie Stevens Reports All's Well

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The one person who has never doubted that Connie Stevens would be a star is — Connie Stevens.

She has a way about her, a kind of sunny confidence that sweeps all doubt away. Listening to her, you are convinced that everything is going swimmingly, professionally and personally.

In plain fact, she is enjoying her best season. After a faltering start, her television show with George Burns, "Wendy and Me," seems to be in the safe column. This has left her tired but exhilarated.

"It's great that the show is going so well, especially since we had the toughest competition in television," she commented. (The ABC show faces Lucille Ball and Andy Williams). "Nobody is going to take Lucy off the air — I'll fight them if they try — and it's hard to beat the only weekly musical-variety show on TV. But one of the recent ratings showed we were ahead."

"It's fun to be carrying a show, but boy, is it work. I know now what Laurence Olivier meant when he said the most important factor for success as an actor was not talent but energy. They had to move my dressing room next door to the stage so I could save the walk."

"Connie's cheerful attitude toward her work is in contrast to her years with 'Hawaiian Eye.' Then she was in frequent skirmish with the Warner Bros. brass.

"Now their approach is entirely different," she said. "When I go to ask to do the Perry Como show in April, the wheels start turning. They gave me a percentage of the series, which has never happened at Warners before, and all my outside salaries. That's a small concession, because I can earn 10 times my studio salary by doing a guest spot on another show."

Even with the concessions, she's not entirely satisfied. Having been at the studio since she was 18 — that's five years — she finds the executives continue treating her as a kid.

That may change. She's



trying like mad to get the other woman's role in "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" with the Burtons. And there is talk she may be tapped for "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying."

"That's what I need right now," she said. "No more 'Palm Spring Weekends.' It would be silly for me to do another B picture now."

On the personal side, she still seems honeymoony over her year-old marriage to actor Jim Stacy. "We've adjusted to the fact that my career is a step ahead of his," she remarked. "But those things change. Jim is up for a television series of his own, and I hope he'll be getting the break he deserves."
