Special Tribute For Late Judge

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Colleagues of the late Judge Carroll C. Hincks, including a large delegation of judges from federal and state court systems, paid tribute to him Monday in a special court session. The ceremony was a combined session of the U. S. District Court and the U. S. 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals.

Hincks, a resident of Cheshire, died Sept. 30 at the age of 74. He had been retired since 1959, although he continued to sit as a judge on selected cases before the court of appeals until about a year before his death. The gathering of about 100 persons included attorneys, guests and friends of Hincks, in addition to the array of judges.

Representatives of the federal bench included Justice John Marshall Harlan of the U. S. Supreme Court; Judges Harold R. Medina, Joseph Smith, Robert F. Anderson, J. Edward Lumbard and Thomas Swan of the Circuit Court of Appeals; and District Court Judges William H. Timbers, M. Joseph Blumenfeld, T. Emmet Clark and Robert C. Zampano.

Chief Justice John Hamilton King of the State Supreme Court of Errors and Judge Herbert S. MacDonald of the Superior Court represented the Connecticut bench.

Smith, comparing Hincks with one of the greatest of all federal jurists, said, "He was truly a judge in the tradition of Learned Hand."

Timbers said Hand himself had once said, when endorsing Hincks for promotion to the Court of Appeals, "His impeccable impartiality stands without equal."

MacDonald pointed up the activities Hincks pursued outside of his official duties, particularly by his efforts through many years to bring about the best possible relationship between the New Haven community and Yale—his alma mater.

Four Americans Will Spend Christmas in Chinese Prison

HONG KONG (AP) — Four Americans will spend Christmas in their Chinese prison cells as they spend any other day. On Christmas night they will get their only reminder of the Yuletide — small Christmas puddings.

Their families were allowed by the Communist Chinese to include the puddings in regular monthly packages from home. The packages, shipped through the Red Cross, also include cigarettes, vitamin pills and letters.

These Americans have been jailed on vague charges of espionage. Three of the four have been given little hope of ever spending Christmas in their homes again.

For all attempts by the U.S. government and relatives to obtain their release have so far been rejected by the Chinese. For Hugh F. Redmond Jr., 46, of Yonkers, N.Y., a former businessman in China who serving a life term, this will be the 14th Christmas in a Chinese Communist prison.

For John T. Downey, 34, of New Britain, Conn., and Richard Fecteau, 37, of Lynn, Mass., former Army civilian employees of the U.S. State Department, they will be serving a life term and Fecteau a 20-year sentence. With only seven years left, Fecteau is the only one likely to see the United States again unless Peking has a change of heart.

The other American is the Most Rev. James E. Walsh, a Roman Catholic bishop of Cumberland, Md. He was sentenced two years ago to 20 years in jail. The bishop, 72, has no illusions about his fate. When his brother visited him in jail last year, Bishop Walsh's parting words were: "We will meet heaven."

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "What makes you think you can direct a movie?" I asked Mike Nichols. "I don't know that I can," he replied. "The only way to find out is to try it."

So he's trying it, and he's starting at the top. Next March 22 he will begin directing Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton in "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" for Warner Brothers.

Nichols has been successful at nearly everything to which he has turned his hand.

As a comedian-actor he enjoyed enormous success with Elaine May, their satires leading to the quick of contemporary society. They could have sustained a long career in radio, television and on the stage.

Elaine has turned to writing and is working on a play for Owen Roizman, Nichols reports. His own best has been toward directing, and he has been hailed as the brightest new director on Broadway.

His direction of "Barefoot in the Park" helped make one of last season's hits, and the three-character "Luv" is one of this year's few successes.

Nichols, 33, here for conferences with studio boss Jack L. Warner and producer Paul Lehman, said he has aimed at directing films for 10 years. He had already contracted for two movies with "Virginia Woolf" came to mind. He is acquainted with the Burtons and believes that they asked for him.

Leper Faces Joyless Yule

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Dorella Kainos, 30-year-old Oakland, Calif., housewife and mother of four, faced a joyless Christmas.

She would be separated from her youngsters on Christmas Day.

There was the chance she might be pregnant with a fifth child. She feared pregnancy would reactivate her arrested case of leprosy.

Early Monday morning she slipped out of the house while her husband slept, got into the family car, and joined the commuter traffic to San Francisco.

Midway across the Bay Bridge she stopped, got out of the car, climbed the railing, and plunged 225 feet into the chill, storm-whipped San Francisco Bay.

Six minutes later a Coast Guard boat on patrol near the bridge plucked her alive from the water.

Within minutes she was taken to San Francisco Hospital, still clad in her dripping, blood-stained housecoat. Doctors operated to repair a severe pelvic laceration and a broken pelvis.

Late Monday night she was in critical condition, but an assistant physician at the hospital said she was responding.

Royal Kainos, 37, a big, black-haired mechanic, maintained a vigil in the emergency ward's waiting room. His eyes filled with tears as he told of the last few bleak days.

"We didn't do much about Christmas," he said. "She told me what to buy for the kids and I went out and bought it. The presents I didn't buy a tree for us. We didn't get any Christmas cards this year. She didn't want to be reminded about Christmas."

His wife, he said, has had leprosy since she was quite young. She had an arrested case that flared up again with the birth four years ago of their youngest son, Roy.

Two of the children, Royal Jr., 10, and John, 4, live across the street with her parents because the disease is believed communicable only to children.

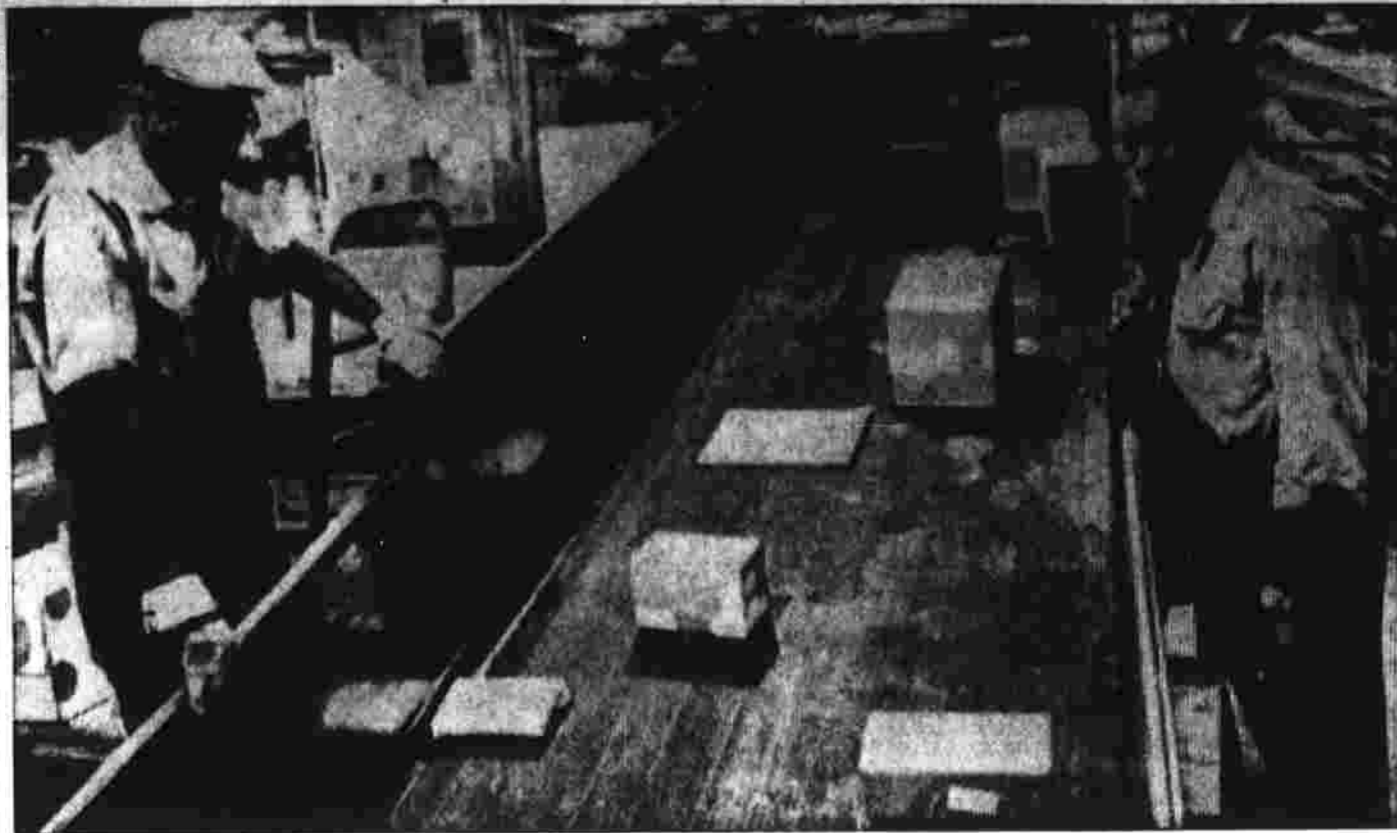
Two older children were adopted by a family in Honolulu when the couple left Hawaii for the mainland in 1957.

She could watch through the windows when Royal left for school and came home again. On Sundays with a U.S. Public Health nurse present, she could sit near John in a nearby park.

"But she couldn't kiss him," Kainos said. "There could be no physical contact."

"Last week she was afraid she was pregnant again," he said. "She thought the pregnancy would reactivate the leprosy. She told me she had an appointment with a doctor today. When I woke up she was gone."

WASHINGTON (AP) — American and Egyptian officials are cooperating in the investigation of an incident Dec. 19 in which an American oil company plane was shot down near Alexandria by United Arab Republic jets, according to the State Department.

Press officer Robert J. McCloskey said Monday that no diplomatic action has been taken.

The plane's American pilot, Hoyt Williams, 44, a Texan, and the Swedish flight mechanic, Kjell Grupp, 35, were killed.

McCloskey said an account of the incident, which combined details communicated to the U.S. Embassy in Cairo by the U.A.R. government and a report received from the American consul general in Alexandria, agreed in general with Egypt's claim.

McCloskey said he did not know if the plane's owner, the John W. Mecon Oil Co. of Houston, Tex., or the pilot had filed flight plans for the trip across U.A.R. territory from Amman, Jordan, to Benghazi, Libya.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Howard Coughlin, president of the Office Employees International Union, A.F. of M., held out the prospect Monday of a four-day week which "if translated into jobs as of this moment would immediately eliminate our unemployment in the United States."

"We may be able to announce the first acceptance of the four-day week at a very early date," Coughlin said on ABC's recorded radio program "from the capital."

The union is proposing a four-day, 32-hour week with salaries the same as for the present five-day week.

WASHINGTON (AP) — O. Roy Chalk, chairman of Trans Caribbean Airways, Inc., has offered to buy Northeast Airlines and operate its New York-Florida passenger service at low-cost jet rates.

The proposal was sent to the Civil Aeronautics Board Monday.

Soviet delegate Platon D. Morozov said in Monday's proceedings that the resolution put Syria on the same footing as Israel. The council vote was 8-2, with Czechoslovakia and Morocco voting with the Russians.

At the meeting, the council rejected a Soviet-backed Moroccan resolution condemning Israel for the clash.

MOSCOW (AP) — Congolese Charge d'Affaires M. Gaston Ndamanga said Monday that the Soviet Union had agreed to pay for "hostile activities" left by planes for Brussels today after unusual delays in passing through customs.

Ndamanga carried a diplomatic passport and his belongings were not searched. But Soviet officials spent more than 90 minutes examining the luggage of his chauffeur, Jean Nkandou. They even played a tape on Nkandou's recorder.

MANILA (AP) — President Diosdado Macapagal ordered Justice Secretary Salvador Marino today to make an on-the-spot inquiry into three recent incidents at U.S. military bases which have touched off anti-American sentiment.

The incidents include the fatal shooting of two Filipinos by American guards and a reported attempt to bomb an American elementary school at Clark Air Base.

Opposition congressmen have called for a congressional investigation. Some demand that the U.S. waive jurisdiction as the guards can be tried in Philippine courts.

PARIS (AP) — Four French doctors have made what they believe is a new discovery in the cultivation of cancerous growths.

Merchants Feel Bills Will Be Paid

NEW YORK (AP) — "I don't know how long it will take, but the general confidence that good things will continue — that the January bills can be met, and others right along for months to come, but debt also has been increasing faster than a year ago, both in mortgages and consumer credit. This increase frets merchants as long as total incomes continue to rise."

The Securities and Exchange Commission reports that in the first nine months of this year the individuals decreased their holdings of common and preferred stock by \$1.5 billion. The New York Stock Exchange, however, says that its Monthly Investment Plan whereby individuals buy shares

at a regular rate — is chalking up the best year yet. It started in 1962. Some \$2.6 billion were opened this November, to top the previous November record of 4.122 set in 1963. In the first 11 months of this year 66,000 plans were started. The previous full-year record was 48,000 plans in 1960. The SEC counts investment in stocks as one of many forms of saving.

The SEC says that while stock holding in general declined, individuals were buying their savings and checking accounts over the summer months. And it's part of this bulge that merchants are tapping now.

All the records — income, savings, debt, spending — reflect totals for all citizens. The individual may have quite a different picture. He may have a different story himself. But counting in all Americans with pay checks, or other forms of income, this December sees more money than ever before available for spending or saving. And the New Year looks bright.

Individual savings increased in the first nine months of this year by \$2.5 billion. The gain was about one-third more than in the like period of 1963. The big boost in tied in with the rise in personal incomes, now running at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$20 billion, compared with \$17.5 billion in the final stretch of 1963.

But the rise in savings also shows that Americans haven't changed their habits much despite all the stress on prosperity. They're spending more because they're making more. They're also saving about the same percentage of their income as before the federal income tax cut.

That the big jump in the total of incomes is spurring a corresponding rise in retail sales is obvious in most cities this month. Record December volume already is in the bag. And the bulge in charge accounts and installment loans is reported at about the normal rate. So the spending spurge doesn't worry many general, but most chronic pessimists.

Rockville-Vernon Mental Health Clinic Asked In Address by Dr. Kristan

The needs of the mental health community in the Rockville-Vernon area were outlined at yesterday's Rotary meeting by Dr. Joseph J. Kristan, a Rockville psychiatrist.

Dr. Kristan discussed the present and future needs of the area and the Rockville-Vernon Hospital to a audience of prominent local business and civic leaders.

He told Rotarians that one of the prime needs of the hospital is a mental health clinic. "We have a disproportionate number of people who need this type of care," Dr. Kristan said.

He added that a new concept in the treatment of mental patients was to "get them back to the community" under supervision. But, he noted, that the only care available for such patients is a boarding home, and these, he said, are really inadequate.

Dr. Kristan noted he is trying to get a meeting of physicians and all area clergymen to consider medical patients. The meeting is tentatively scheduled for sometime next year.

In discussing other needs at the hospital, Dr. Kristan said that another new hospital wing was needed to care for patients; that a professional building attached to the hospital should be built "so physicians will be available immediately in case they are needed"; and that a convalescent wing should also be built into the hospital for patients who no longer need complete medical care, but who should remain close to such care.

He noted that there are several convalescent homes in town, and he suggested that these be consolidated into a hospital wing. He added that the total number of beds in all local convalescent homes was 122. "We are underpowered in this respect," Dr. Kristan said.

Also needed at the hospital, he suggested, is some new equipment, including new beds on the first floor. He told of some new equipment which would assist physicians in treating patients, including closed circuit TV, new oxygen tents and motors that were quieter than those presently used, and a number of recently developed medical machines.

hospital who would teach other physicians about new medical concepts, would be available for emergency care, and would handle other medical situations.

Dr. Kristan proposed the formation of a Vernon Mental Health Association of physicians, and suggested that pharmacists be recruited to have one of their number available, upon call of the physician, at any hour of the 24 hours.

The association would also handle such things as clinics when emergencies arise and provide public speakers.

Dr. Kristan, who heads the Manchester Heart Association, is starting a teaching clinic for doctors at the hospital to acquaint all physicians with new treatments.

He also spoke about aged residents, and said that their needs should be considered. "The elderly housing project on Franklin St. is wonderful," Dr. Kristan said.

Dr. Kristan reported that a new, nationwide movement of medicine's role toward the patient was changing.

"We are now concerned with treating the patient, not just the body," he said. "The patient is a total person, including emotional, financial, religious and other aspects are being considered by physicians."
