

Anti-American Campaign Seen Coming in Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — There were indications tonight that South Vietnamese military men were cranking up an anti-American campaign that may even involve street demonstrations against U.S. Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor.

Informers said Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, commander of the armed forces, already has drawn the outlines of such a campaign before his military council of some 20 high officers.

It was not learned whether the civilian premier, Tran Van Huong, would go along, but Khanh had clearly become the strongest man in South Viet Nam for the time being.

Khanh told the nation by radio Tuesday night that no foreign power could impose its policies on his armed forces.

"It is better to live poor but proud as free citizens of an independent country rather than as slaves of the foreigners and Communists," he said.

In the context of the speech, Khanh was clearly taking an anti-American tone, with the added assertion his country could go on without U.S. assistance if necessary at all.

Later, Khanh granted an interview to a correspondent of the New York Herald Tribune in which he directly attacked the civilian premier, Tran Van Huong, would go along, but Khanh had clearly become the strongest man in South Viet Nam for the time being.

Disagreements between Taylor and Khanh have flared up from time to time in the past three months. But there were no advance signs of the current military purge of the High National Council. The dispute is at least partly a personality clash between Khanh and Taylor.

A military reorganization of the High National Council might have least partly satisfy the American demand for a return of the government to civilian control.

The Vietnamese had no immediate comment on the State Department statement Tuesday night demanding that the Saigon government be free of military interference. Otherwise, the statement seemed to hint, U.S. aid to the war against the Communist Viet Cong might be cut off.

The U.S. statement warned that continued U.S. support of the war in Viet Nam is based on the existence of a Saigon government "free of improper interference."

"We must take a stand on this one," an American official said privately. "Otherwise we face the end of American influence here, and there is too much at stake for that."

Northwest Coastal Region Hit by Third Day of Rain

EUREKA, Calif. (AP) — Gale-whipped torrential rains from the Pacific lashed California, Oregon, Idaho and Nevada today, for the third straight day, endangering scores of cities and towns and threatening to force evacuation of a city of 11,000 population.

The Christmas deluge has killed six persons, left three rescuers missing and forced more than 8,000 persons to flee before raging waters of a dozen flood-swollen rivers and hundreds of streams.

An amphibian helicopter with three Coast Guardsmen aboard was missing and presumed down after evacuating 10 persons of an island in California's Red River.

At Yuba City, Calif., 110 miles north of San Francisco, the Butte County Board of Supervisors made a provisional decision to evacuate Yuba City's 11,000 people if the Feather River reaches 77 foot depth. The river was expected to reach 70 feet this afternoon.

The river is backed up behind a levee. In the disastrous 1963 Northern California flood, 38 persons died when the levee washed out and the river reached 82 feet.

Ramming flood waters have forced evacuations in Guerneville, Orick, Fortuna, Klamath, Lolla, Pastena, Scotia, Rio Dell, Pepperwood, West, Myrtle Flat, Phillipsville and Miranda in Northern California.

The evacuees found shelter with luckier neighbors, in nearby towns, hotels and in emergency lodgings set up by Civilian Defense and Red Cross.

Rain and melting snow washed out highways and a railroad bridge in Southern Idaho today, isolating several small communities.

House OK's Convention Bill Easily

HARTFORD (AP) — Strong bipartisan support overcame 11 amendments Tuesday as the House of Representatives passed a bill to ease the way for the state House of Representatives.

The General Assembly, now in its second special reappointment session, is recessed for the holidays. Barring an unforeseen emergency, it will not reconvene until Jan. 27.

One of the sharpest critics of the bill was Rep. Benjamin Barringer, R-New Milford, who said the "last person thought about in the drafting of this bill was the general public."

The first thought was for the welfare of the two political parties," Barringer said.

He objected to the way in which the bill would have Constitutional Convention delegates chosen.

The measure provides that 14 delegates be elected from each of Connecticut's six Congressional districts. Each party would nominate seven, in each district so that neither anyone voted for or not, each party's nominees would be elected.

One of the 11 defeated amendments would have made it easier for an independent candidate to petition for a place on the ballot. Another would have made it easier to challenge a party-endorsed candidate in a primary.

Barringer said he hoped that when it came time for the public to vote on the measures proposed by the Constitutional Convention, the public would reject the Convention's proposals.

Another critic was Rep. Richard C. Noyes, R-Farmington. His amendment, which would have reduced the number of names required to petition for a place on the ballot, was defeated on a roll call vote, 218-21.

Noyes said it didn't make sense to have an election in which there were no losing candidates.

An amendment proposed by Rep. William E. Mayer, R-East Granby, that would have required a referendum on the bill, was defeated 194-28 on a roll call.

Russians Reject Finance Plans, Throwing UN into New Dilemma

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The Soviet Union plunged the United Nations into a new crisis today by rejecting an Asian-African plan designed to permit the General Assembly to recess for the holidays without a U.S.-Soviet showdown on peace-keeping assessments.

As a result the 115-nation General Assembly has scheduled an unprecedented 4 1/2 day pre-Christmas session to seek a way out of the impasse. Assembly President Alex Quisenberry of Ghana had hoped to wind up the year-end business this afternoon.

"Diplomatic sources said the Soviet objections were so fundamental that a compromise appeared impossible between now and Thursday. The hitch was disclosed after Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko saw Quisenberry this morning.

The finance plan, drafted by the 19-nation Asian-African group and modified by Quisenberry and Secretary-General U. Thant, called for voluntary contributions by U.N. members to put the organization's "stable and solid" base on a "stable and solid" base.

In return, all countries would agree not to invoke Article 19 of the U.N. charter, which suspends the voting rights of countries two years in arrears on assessments. The Soviet Union said six other Soviet bloc countries are in that category.

Diplomatic sources said the Soviets objected to the phrase "stable and solid basis." They also were reported to have insisted that the assembly drop its no-vote truce now instead of postponing it until after the Christmas season, when the Soviet Union were near agreement.

The Soviet delegate was understood to have submitted a series of amendments which would make the plan completely unacceptable to the United States.

Hit 'with Gigantic Blast' Pilotless Navy Plane Crashes into Homes

DEBARY, Fla. (AP) — A Navy reconnaissance bomber with no hand at the controls exploded like a bomb into a residential area today, destroying one home, damaging several others and blasting a 2-foot deep crater.

One occupant of the plane, believed to be the pilot, was killed in a low-level parachute jump. The other occupant landed safely in a tree.

Mrs. Fred Taylor, standing at her kitchen window not far from the crash site, said the plane exploded "with a gigantic blast" shortly before impact. The concussion blew out all the windows of her home, but she was not injured.

"I saw it explode and then go into the ground," Mrs. Taylor said. "It demolished one house and knocked in the walls of some others."

A raging fire, followed the crash and fire fighting equipment was rushed here from De Land, Orange City, the Sanford Naval Air Station, and a Forest Service station.

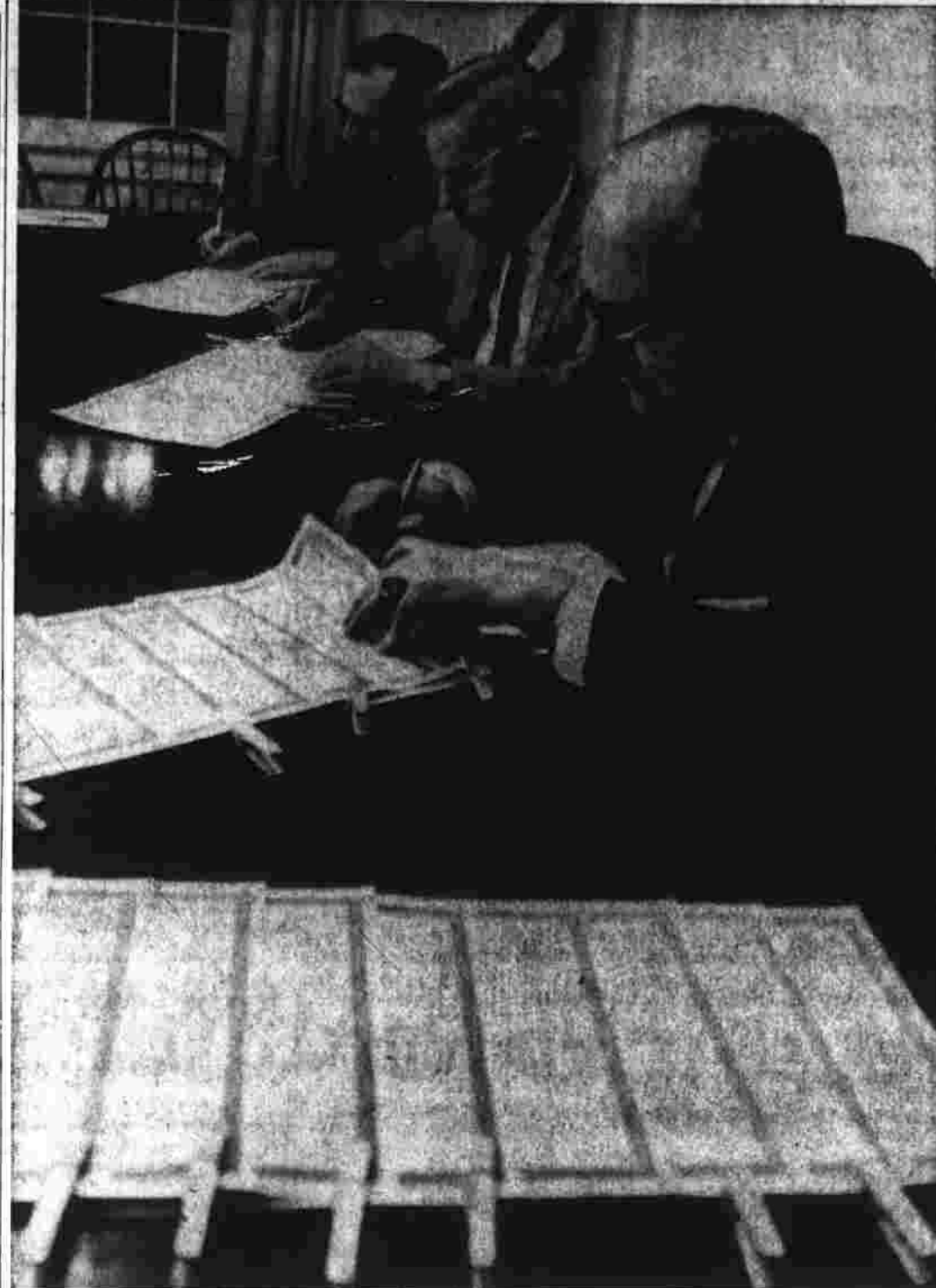
Police Arrests

Directors Set to Consider Plan to Purchase Nike Site

A recommendation that the town acquire the surplus Nike control site off Keeney St. will be presented to the town's directors when they meet next month. The recommendation comes from the board of education, which voted five to two earlier this month in favor of acquiring the 2 1/2-acre site as a site for educational purposes.

The advisory council of Manchester's Community College had recommended to the board of education on Dec. 3 that the tract be acquired as a permanent home for the college.

If the board of directors favors acquiring the Nike site, the town must submit an application to the Federal General Services Administration by Feb. 1. Education officials believe that the federal government will write off the entire cost of the site, since it is slated for educational use.

The town is also probably eligible for state and federal contributions toward the cost of rehabilitating and revamping the Nike site.

The Town Planning Commission is scheduled to act on the proposed Nike site acquisition on Jan. 4, the day before the directors regular January meeting.

The directors will meet at 8 p.m. Jan. 5 at the Municipal Building hearing room.
