Garbled Viet Names Confusing to West

The Westerner, confused by many things in Viet Nam, is completely baffled by Vietnamese names. One reason is a sort of happy-go-lucky Vietnamese willingness to adapt to Western ways, so that first names easily become last ones, and last names first Another is that the names really aren't surnames or first names in the Western sense. In fact, there are few surnames at

Another reason for confusion is that Vietnamese custom is much like the Chinese, placing what would be considered the surname first and the other names after it. Under Western influence between the offer to influence, however, this often is reversed.
