Added Troops, Security In Wake of Viet Bombing

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—The Vietnamese government ordered a battalion of paratroopers into Saigon today and extended martial law for another month to head off further trouble in the wake of the Christmas Eve bombing of a U.S. officers' hotel.

U.S. armed forces in the capital were placed on maximum alert.

U.S. authorities put stringent new security measures into effect. Bomb squads in the city and Christmas gift packages for patients at the U.S. Navy Hospital, Bethesda, Md., were examined.

Buddhist leaders resumed their campaign against Premier Tran Van Huong's civilian government.

The United States demanded restoration of civilian authority and charged that the purge amounted to "improvement of the military."

The deadlock has precipitated a crisis in South Vietnam.

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Heavyweight Champ Under Arrest Again

DENVER (AP)—Charles Sonny Liston, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, was released by Denver police Friday afternoon after he was given a summons to appear Tuesday on a charge of driving under the influence of alcohol.

The arrest, Liston's second here in nine months, was not accomplished without some hard work on the part of the Denver police—30 of them to be exact.

Patrolmen Edward E. Nelson, Max W. Wilson and Donald Smith had pulled Liston's car to the curb after, they said, they noticed him stagger and almost fall down in a parking lot before getting in the car.

The three police officers ordered Liston and a man identified only as a friend of the car, Liston at first refused, then permitted himself to be led from the car.

"That," Nelson said, "he refused to show us his driver's license and said we would have to take it off him to get it.

"We kept asking him not to make us fight him. We told him we weren't pro and tried to reason with him and get him to cooperate with us."

He was fined \$300 on each count and sentenced to a 90-day jail term on the concealed weapon charge. Sentence, however, was suspended.

Willamette River Subsides Giving Portland Reprive

Portland, Ore., residents are getting a reprieve from a massive flood threat. In water-logged Northern California, rain was expected to have rescued and clean-up operations in scores of devastated communities.

The death toll stood at more than 40 in the Far West five-state flood plain. More than 14,000 persons were homeless and property damage was estimated in the millions of dollars.

After cresting Friday at 23.8 feet, almost 12 feet above flood stage, the murky Willamette began to recede. Officials said only a three-foot concrete parapet held back the water.

Among the debris the river carried was a broken raft of logs, which passed under Portland's 19 bridges without doing any damage.

Forecasters predicted the Willamette's fall would be slow.

Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield said "We're watching the state as a whole, but the situation remains critical in Portland."

More than 1,200 families were evacuated in the North Portland area as the Columbia River threatened to inundate the section. Army engineers finished the evacuation by precautionary, but they declined to guarantee that the river would be held back by a broken raft of logs, which passed under Portland's 19 bridges without doing any damage.

Flood waters were receding in California's Sacramento valley. Color temperatures were forecast for today, promising more discomfort for about 7,000 flood refugees.

The dropping mercury was a mixed blessing. Mountain areas, especially the Sierra on the Nevada-California border, are reducing flood threats from melting snow.

Washington State weather forecasters called for snow tonight in the northwest and eastern portions of their state and rain elsewhere.

Predictions are that the Spokane River will crest and may cause some damage.

In Idaho, the Portneuse River dropped to a flood level of 6 1/2 feet as the weatherman predicted lessening rainfall for a 24-hour period.

The Weather Bureau in Boise reported the gradual reduction of south Idaho streams and that the Snake River on the Idaho-Oregon border had crested slightly below flood stage.

Flood conditions in Reno had improved. Officials said Reno had a steady, decreased flow. Earlier it had washed into streets in Vista, east of Reno.

Rain operations in California by 48 helicopters scattered over the northern coast will go on today, officials said. Dense fog and rain kept the aircraft on the ground most of Friday, although a few got through late in the day. Many of the helicopters were from the 70-squadron, which arrived at the flood rescue center ofureka, Calif., on Friday morning.

U.S. Ambassador Cecil B. Lyon asked Ceylonese Premier Mrs. Sirimavo Bandaranaike what help was most urgently needed. Britain, West Germany and Cuba also offered assistance.

Two Indian navy vessels reached Rameswaram and rescued about 200 persons. No planes were able to land on the island because of washed out runways. The island's rail link with the Indian mainland was washed away.

Railway officials said 118 persons aboard a passenger train hit by the 15-foot tidal wave that swept across the eastern end of Rameswaram were believed drowned.

A spokesman said the six-coach train left Panambur on the island about 10:30 p.m. Friday and was pulled into a station at the eastern tip of Diannusho at several hours later when the disaster struck.

All that remains visible above water is six inches of the engine's smokestack. Officials who flew over the island Friday said the railroad station was destroyed.

Death Toll Passes 40 In 5 States

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Light Plane Flyer Claims a Record

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—A 40-year-old pilot who landed here today, stretched his legs wearily and claimed a national long-distance record for light planes.

The 81-year-old pilot, who left Cape Town, South Africa, at 12 a.m. Thursday, brought his Piper Twin Comanche down at 8:49 a.m. after more than 56 hours in the air.

His claim to a record surpassing the one of 7,688 miles he set in 1959 on a single-engine Cessna, Morocco to Los Angeles, and said he was "very, very lucky to make it."

He passed St. Petersburg this morning en route for New Orleans, and almost landed at San Juan, Puerto Rico.

"I had a very, very stormy flight," he said.

"I was down to about 40 gallons of fuel when I got to Cape Town. I was almost out of fuel when I got to St. Petersburg. I had to keep myself pulled a bender, and I got cautious and turned back."

"I wasn't worth risking one blunder sporting a good trip. I knew I had broken the record and I almost landed at San Juan, Puerto Rico."

He said he was "very, very lucky to make it."

Several persons received minor injuries and two were treated at hospital for cuts incurred in a series of scuffles that erupted like brushfires amid the audience. One man was hospitalized.

The audience coughed its heels until after 9 p.m., when the show went on—partly. Singer Aretha Franklin performed. Then the audience walked another half-hour—Jazz singer—Gloves Lynn.

Miss Lynn finished about 11 p.m. So did the show.

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Siberian Exile Rejoins Family

HARTFORD (AP)—"I worked for awhile in the woods in Siberia—that's all. That was about all Mrs. Stepania Pukas, 58, would say about the 15 years she spent in Siberian labor camps.

After a separation of 33 years, Mrs. Pukas was reunited with her husband Konstantin, 58, and her daughter Nicole, 26, at Kennedy Airport on Christmas Day, which is also her birthday.

The family had a traditional Lithuanian Christmas dinner at the home of Mrs. Pukas' uncle, Frank Stankus, at 86 Beacon St. after the drive in from the airport.

Mrs. Pukas spoke in Lithuanian and her daughter, who is studying for a Ph.D. in English at the University of Arizona, acted as translator in Russian.

Among the relatives and friends at the dinner was George A. Athanson, a Hartford lawyer whose letter in 1931 to then Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev was instrumental in getting Mrs. Pukas to the United States.

"It's amazing she got out," said Athanson.

Mrs. Pukas was separated from her husband, then a school principal, and her daughter on June 12, 1931, when she was seized by Russian secret police at the Rukus home in Kaunas, Lithuania.

Rukus and Nicole were staying elsewhere that night. They were displaced persons camp near Hamburg, Germany, and arrived in the United States in 1950. They are now U. S. citizens.

Mrs. Pukas, meanwhile, was in Siberia. In 1936 she was allowed to return to her home town of Kaunas and soon her husband was trying to get permission for her to join him.

The United Aircraft Corp. of East Hartford enjoyed one of its busiest years in 1964, reported President William F. Gwinn in his annual summary of the corporation's operations. Sales of about 200 new commercial jetliners equipped with Pratt & Whitney Aircraft turbine engines represented the high point of UAC progress. This number is the highest for any year since the commercial jet age began, Gwinn said.

P&WA was responsible for the engine design and manufacture of two revolutionary Air Force fighter planes, the YF-12A interceptor which cruises at 2,000 miles per hour at altitudes above 70,000 feet and the recently unveiled F-111, now in the testing stages.

P&WA was selected as one of two engine manufacturers to undertake studies for proposed supersonic transport plane.

UAC has continued its march into the space realm, Gwinn stated, supplying power for orbital flights, shipping giant rocket boosters to Cape Kennedy and contributing knowledge and materials to the manned moon shot exploit.

The payroll level for 1964 rose 0.5 per cent from 1963 to about 65,000, two-thirds of whom are employed by the P&WA division. Hamilton Standard of Windsor Locks currently has 8,000 workers, Sikorsky Aircraft of Stratford, 8,200.

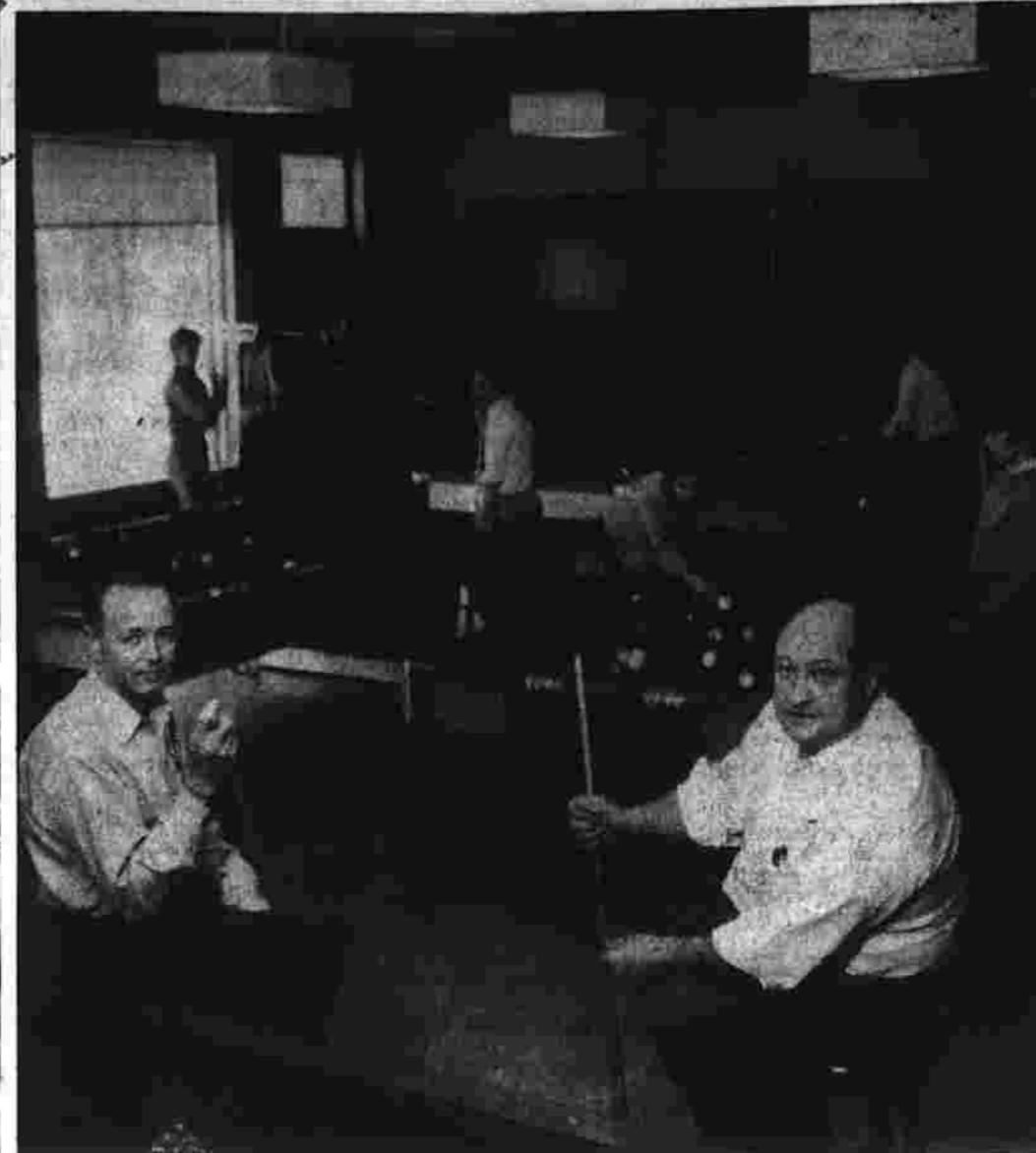

New High Forecast For '64 Grand List

Manchester's October, 1964 Grand List, the basis for 1965-66 town taxes, will reach the all-time high of over \$170 million, according to Town Assessor Joseph Murphy.

Murphy predicted that, when the figures are released about the middle of next month, they will show an approximate rise of \$3.5 to \$4 million over the \$166.5 million Grand List of October, 1963.

Thus, the value of assessed Manchester property will continue to rise in about the same ratio it has been doing for the past few years.

If Murphy's figures prove accurate, an estimated \$170,000 in property taxes (based on the present 42-mill rate) will be available during the next fiscal year.

However, most of this expected, added income has already been earmarked for next year's installment on the \$1.7 million school and redevelopment bond issue.

The greatest part of the grand list rise is attributed to a spurt in apartment dwelling construction this year, plus the usual number of added single dwellings.

Additions to several commercial buildings have also helped to bring the figure upward.

Approximately 10 per cent of Manchester's assessed property is divided among five of its largest taxpayers: United Aircraft, First Hartford Realty, Hartford Electric Light Co., Lydall and Foulds and Cheney Bros.

The October, 1964 Grand List, which, by state statutes, must be announced by Jan. 31, 1965, will be available two weeks early, due to its compilation by the use of data processing.

In previous years, only motor vehicle values were so compiled, but this year, real estate and personal property have been included in the process, thanks to an appropriation, voted last spring, by the board of directors.

To James Garner TV 'Was Acting Class'

NEW YORK (NEA) — Jim Garner is not the usual breed of actor. Actors, for instance, are often late for dates, but they never acknowledge it. Garner a few minutes late and apologizing profusely.

"It wasn't traffic, or anything like that," he smiled. "But you know how actors are — I was with someone who was flattering my ego, and I couldn't bear to leave."

Garner, who is appearing in "The Americanization of Emily" and the soon-to-be-released MGM film, "36 Hours," also has consideration for people involved in producing the pictures in which he appears.

"When I am deciding whether or not to accept a role, the yardstick applied consists of my own personal likes and dislikes. I ask if the role is within my capability. And I want to know who will be working on the picture, and finally, will it be a success?"

"When everything is added together, and it still looks as if somebody is going to lose money and be hurt by the film, I don't see the point in making it. Some pictures are made just so the star can act in them. Someone probably has to take a financial loss, and that's not fair."

Garner's sense of humor has not been dimmed by the years or the long hours he put in as one of television's brightest early stars (Bret Maverick, in case anyone has to be reminded). He says he watches himself on the movie screen with "sensations of fright, fear and nausea. It's different from television, which you could not look at seriously. It was just an acting class and the people who saw it, forgot it after 15 minutes."

The ironies of Garner's early success are not lost on him. He was a fairly untrained actor when Maverick hit the air and became a sensation. His easy, natural, humorous personality came through and won fans all over the country.

"But eight years ago, when the show started, I wasn't even fit to carry Henry Fonda's script. Yet, I had a hit television series and he didn't. There is no comparison in talents, he was one of the greatest actors — and still is."

years ago are now doing TV commercials. If I had been in Maverick for two more years, I would have been overexposed and would need another five years to begin a new career. Or, if I hadn't succeeded in moving into films, I would have done a new TV series, and if it wasn't a success, I would be on the road down hill.

"I did Maverick for three years. People liked the series, not me. The scripts began to slip after the first year. There was one story we did three different settings. Our first Maverick was based on a movie called 'The War of the Copper Kings,' that starred Errol Flynn. That's how I got my costume for the show — they matched it to stock film footage of Flynn that they used in long shots."

Jim and Steve McQueen are, at the moment, the only two former television stars whose names have become big box office attractions. The major difference in his life now and then — aside from considerations like money and sufficient time to rehearse and film a picture — is the attitude of fans.

"Now I'm Mr. Garner," Jim smiled, "I used to be Bret. One day my mailman asked me if I was going to be home Sunday. 'I'd like to bring the kids over to meet you,' he said."
