



conquest of France. The determining factors were indeed more psychological than military. The false sense of security created by the Maginot Line ate into the resolution of the French people themselves. The stiff, artificial challenge presented by the Line ate its way into the ambitions and imaginations of the Ger-

The Maginot helped cause the war it was supposed to defend against, as do all such exaggerated postures of defense. Then it helped lose the war it had helped cause, as do all preconceived and rigid devices of security.

A nuclear Maginot Line would spread just a little more moral sickness behind itself, present just a slightly more inhuman tantalization to those living in front of it, and, in the great crude sweeping justice in which actual history so often imitates the fables of mythology, a nuclear Maginot Line would probably be just a little more certain to end up blasting its own creators off the face of the globe. Obviously, we need it badly. It is

just what mankind has been waiting for. It is the kind of goal which, if we trace our own human and national behavior since Year One of the Atom, we have been heading directly for, as if drawn to it by some instinctive compulsion much more powerful than our capacities of reason.

But even if we do follow through on our own blind compulsions, and build ourselves such a nuclear Maginot Line. let us not draw down to ourselves the additional ignominy of pretending to believe it is security we are buying.

Those Heroic Peaks

Read the following quotation carefully, with especial attention to its mood: It may remind you of some one.

The question is from a formal statement issued, the other day, as an "order of the day" by Lieut. Gen. Nguyer Khanh, commander in chief of the armies of South Vietnam.

And the quotation itself follows: "We make sacrifices for the country's independence and the Vietnamese people's liberty, but not to carry out the policy of any foreign country. Better to live poor but proud as free citizens of an independent country than in ease and shame as slaves of the foreigners and Communists."

This is, for one thing, a plague on both your houses statement from the top general of the moment in South Vietnam. We, the United States, are the "foreigners" mentioned, and we are equated, in that mention, with the Com-

But it is the spirit and the logic of the statement, rather than its particular targets, which seem to seek out our

ing nationalism and isolationism about it, culminating in a proud and righteous disdain of foreign entanglements. The second sentence is a masterpiece of heroics. It could have been Patrick Henry. It could have been American su-

This little Vietnamese general sounds forth, in fact, as if he had been enjoying the services of one of the talented press agents who normally serve the extremist right cause in our own country. He sounds as if he and some of the erst-

Tailgating: An Aggression?

following too closely, is especially dangerous on the older type of highways, where crossroads and traffic signs are likely to interfere with the smooth forward progress of the traffic line. But the concern of the study is going

One of the problems likely to get particular study is that of what might be considered a safe distance for following. One rather standard safety rule holds that there should be one carlength separation, about 17.5 feet, between cars for every 10 miles of speed. But New York State Thruway safety engineers go much beyond that, and calculate that cars going at 65 miles an hour should have 264 feet between

That would seem a safe judgment. And one reason that much distance would seem not an extravagant precaution but actually a safe minimum is that there are all kinds of human fancies present on the highways. Some drivers have altogether too much confidence in their own lightning-like responses. Other drivers have entirely too much confidence in the steadiness and reliability of anonymous characters driving in front. Some of us find out only in an emergency that we are ter-

ribly poor judges of distance. But the prime consideration - the thing any research project would have to head for first-is not a definition of what the safe distance may be, but an explanation and cure for the compulsion which keeps some drivers perpetually in position to climb all over the car just ahead. What puts this kind of pressure in people? Why do some of us have to keep shoving and pushing our way through life? Quite obviously, it is not in actual quest of time, or of getting some place an instant sooner, that we drive the way we do. We somehow resent the fellow ahead for being there. We somehow feel compelled to notify him of our own presence and of our own critical evaluation of the way he is gumming up traffic. Couldn't we, to bring some touch of psychiatry into our attempted solution of highway safety problems, find some more harmless way to humor our aggressions?

NEW YORK (NEA) — Jim Garner is not the usual breed of actor. Actors, for instance, are of-

ten late for dates, but they nev-er acknowledge it. Garner a few minutes late and apologizing profusely.

"It wasn't traffic, or any-thing like that," he smiled. But you know how actors are I was with someone who was flattering my ego, and I couldn't bear to leave."

Garner's sense of humor has not been dimmed by the years or the long hours he put in as one of television's brightest early stars (Bret Maverick, in ease anyone has to be reminded). He says he watches him-self on the movie screen with "sensations of fright, fear and nausea. It's different from television, which you could not look at seriously. It was just an acting class and the people who saw it, forgot it after 15 minutes."

The ironies of Garner's early success are not lost on him. He was a fairly untrained actor when Maverick hit the air and became a sensation. His easy, natural, humorous personality came through and won fans all

over the country.

years ago are now doing TV commercials. If I had been in Maverick for two more years, I would have been overexposed and would need another five years to begin a new career.
