

Norman Major Jr. Dies After Auto Crash Friday

Norman R. Major Jr., Old Will-echarge of the investigation is limantic Rd., was pronounced dead on arrival at Windham Community Memorial Hospital yesterday after his car struck a tree off Thompson Hill kd. in an early morning accident.

His was the first recorded automobile fatality in the state for 1965.

State police report that Major, 27, apparently lost control of his car as he was driving west on Thompson Hill Rd. east of Mache Rd. at about 5 a.m. on New Year's morning.

The auto ran off the right side of the highway and traveled about 90 feet before hitting a tree, according to police reports. The car was totally demolished.

Firemen from the Columbia Volunteer Fire Department had to pry Major, pinned behind the steering wheel, from the ear. He was alone when the accident occurred, police said.


